



Participation in the upcoming "Adopt-A-Highway" program was discussed.







But while a true test for genetic predisposition toward breast cancer may be years away, education and early detection can greatly increase the chance of survival for breast cancer patients today.

The Society recommends that women have a screening mammogram by age 40; women 40 to 49 have a mammogram every 1 to 2 years; women age 50 and over have a mammogram every year.

Also, a doctor should conduct a breast examination every three years for women 20 to 40 and every year for those over 40. The Society also recommends monthly breast self-examination for women 20 vears and older.

Breast cancer is the most prevalent form of cancer among women, and it is second only to lung cancer in its deadliness. The American Cancer Society estimates that about one of every nine American women will develop breast cancer by age 85.

An estimated 9,200 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed in Texas women during 1994. About 2,300 Texas women will die of the disease this year.





Don't rely entirely on SS after retiring

Here's a message that apparently needs repeating -you can rely on Social Security for your retirement, but you shouldn't rely only on Social Security, according to Franklin H. Upp, manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

Upp said that a recent series of focus group studies conducted by the National Academy of Social Insurance found "deep disappointment" from some (participants) who said that they had been led to believe that Social Security by itself would be sufficient to sustain them at the standard of living at which they were now living. "These participants had the notion that current earnings would completely be replaced dollar for dollar by Social Security benefits," Upp

"That focus group experience points out that fact that we need to do all we can to make sure everyone covered by Social Security understands the way the system works".

"We need to emphasize -again and again -- that Social Security was never intended to be the sole source of income in retirement. It is part of what we have always referred to as a 'three-legged' financial stool. One leg is Social Security, another is pension income, and the third is personal savings and investments," the Social Security manager stated.

The National Academy of Social Insurance notes that "thinking about planning for retirement, knowing what one should do to save for retirement, and actually taking the steps to adequately save are three very different things. Only a little more than half of all people indicated that they were actively saving for re-

tirement. Also, fewer than 59% of all employees participate in an employer-sponsored pension plan.

"So, for one reason or another," Upp said, "the threelegged" stool can suddenly become a single peg upon which people are hanging all their retirement dreams.'

Statistics show that Social Security is the only source of income for 14% of elderly beneficiaries and constitutes 90% or more of the income for another 26%.


"We want to shrink those numbers in the future," Upp said. "One way to do that is to encourage people to begin planning early for retirement. A good first step is to contact Social Security and request a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement. Just call 1-800-772-1213 and ask for more information about this helpful form of retirement planning.

Personal safety tips when laundering

To reduce the risk of fire, electric shock or injury when using washers and dryers, follow these basic precautions:

*Read all instructions before using the appliances.

*Do not reach into the appliance if the agitator or drum are moving.

*Clean lint screen, when accessible, before or after each load. Do not operate the dryer without the lint screen in

*Items containing foam rubber (may be labeled latex foam) or similarly textured rubber-like materials must not be dried on a heat setting. Foam rubber materials, when heated, can under certain circumstances produce fire by spontaneous combustion.

*Any material on which you have used a cleaning solvent

*Do not place into the dryer items that have been spotted or soaked with vegetable or cooking oil. When exposed to heat, these items can become hot enough to catch fire.

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
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This recipe is intended to be part of an overall healthful eating plan. Total fat intake should be less than 30 percent of your total calories for a day — not for each food or recipe.

- wine 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 tablespoons finely
- chopped fresh rosemary
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh sage
- 1 tablespoon Dijon mustard
- 3 cloves garlic, minced

1/2 teaspoon salt

Place steak in an oblong glass baking pan and set aside.
Combine all other ingredients in small bowl. Pour marinade over steak and turn to coat evenly. Cover and refrigerate several hours or overnight, turning meat occasionally.
Preheat grill. Grill marinated steak over hot coals.

CEU Credits to be offered in West Texas

Pesticide applicators will have ample opportunity to meet U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requirements in the coming months.

EPA requires that pesticide applicators be recertified. Requirements for applicators certified or licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture are summarized as follows:

Certified Private Applicators certified before January 10, 1989 have two options:

Option 1 - Obtain 15 continuing education units (CEU's) including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management by December 31, 1995, and repeat every five years thereafter; or

Option 2 - On a one time only basis, take the Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator test and make application for a private applicator license along with a required

Certified Private Applicator's Licenses dated January 19, 1989 thru December 31, 1989 will expire December 31, 1994. If these individuals wish to continue spraying restricted use pesticides, they must take the Texas Agriculture Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the TDA private applicator test and make application for a private applicator license along with the required fee.

Since January 1, 1990, Licensed Private Applicators

must obtain 15 CEUs including two credits in law and regulations and one credit in intergrated pest management every five years. These credits must be earned by December 31 of the year preceding license expiration.

Licensed Commercial Applicators and Licensed Non-Commercial Applicators must obtain at least five CEUs each year for license renewal. Two of these must be in laws and regulations and one in intergrated pest management.

*Eldorado, Oct. 26, 5 hours CEUs, Memorial Bldg. 9:00

*Abilene, Nov. 15, 5 hours CEUs, Civic Center, 8:30 am.

*San Angelo, Nov. 18, 5 hours CEUs, Coliseum Exhibit Bldg., Time TBA.

*Ozona, December 1, 6 hours CEUs, Ozona Civic Center, 8:30 am.

On December 7, there will be 5 hours CEUs offered at the Coke County Farm Bureau Office by satellite teleconference. Also on this date the satellite will be offered at the Texas Agricultural Extension and Research Center in San Angelo. Additional information on this course will be placed in the newspaper and producer newsletter.

Breast-Feeding Update

The most frequently mentioned benefits of breast-feeding come early in a baby's life, such as apparent protection from disease until the baby's own immune system develops. However, new research at the State University of New York at Buffalo indicates that women who were breast-fed as infants have a twenty-five percent lower risk of developing breast cancer than women who were bottle-fed as infants.

Dr. Jo Freudenheim's study appears in the journal Epidemiology (5-94). She cautions that the results are preliminary, but that there is growing interest in the relationship between events early in life and breast cancer. Among the early influences could be nutritional and biological differences between mother's milk and cow's milk as well as caloric differences.

Dr. Freudenheim says studies with animals have shown that early restriction of calories may be related to a lower risk of breast cancer. This study found that cow's milk and formula fed to babies were sometimes higher in volume and calories than what breastfed babies received. ©1992. Lyle Dean. Inc.
