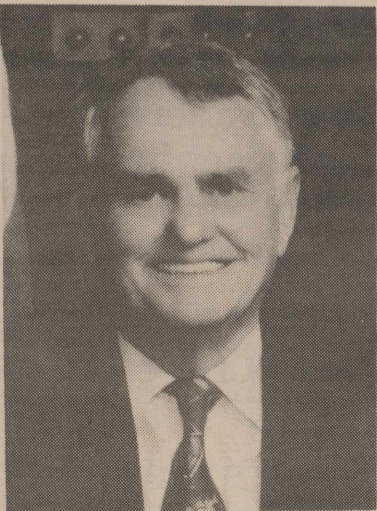

**WTU supports red ribbon week**

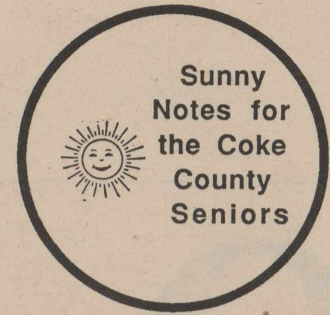

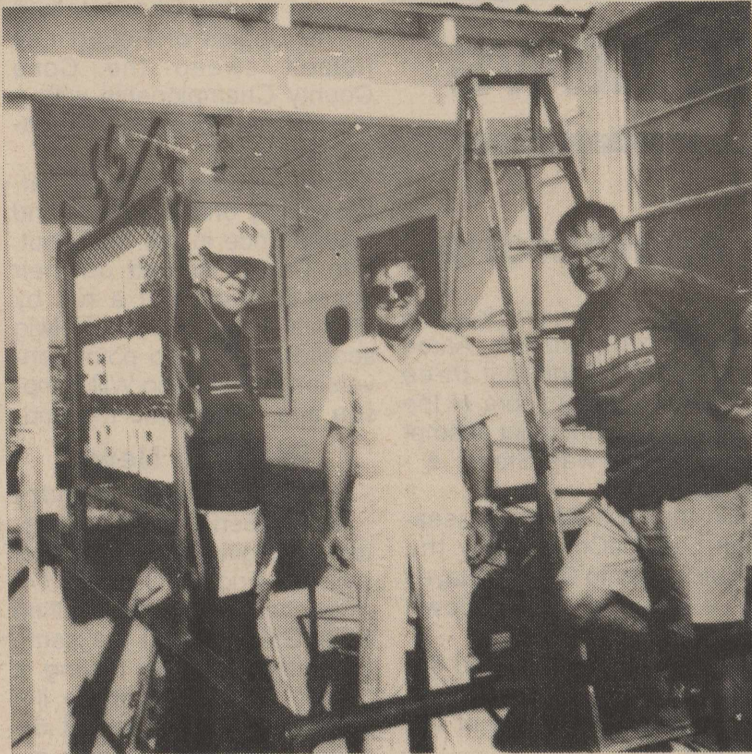

Participation in the upcoming "Adopt-A-Highway" program was discussed.

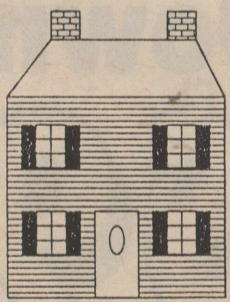

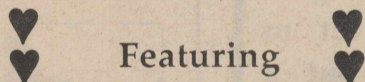

## RL FFA News

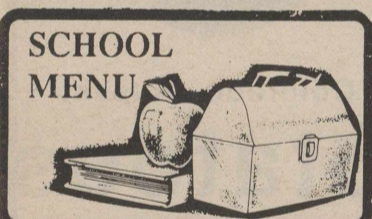

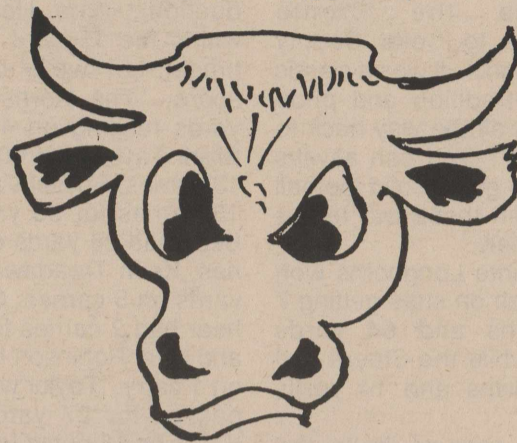

## Horns drop district opener to Steers

The Robert Lee Steers came over Friday night to challenge the Bronte Longhorns to Coke County bragging rights. It was a classic battle of tradition and pride that dates all the way back to the 1920's. You can always count on a good, solid football game when these two teams get together.

The Bronte Longhorns won the first half on stats getting 7 first downs and 64 yards rushing, while the Steers had 3 first downs and 14 yards rushing.

In the second half, the Steers and the Horns went at it again shutting each other down. Two plays, a sweep

play and a pass play, netted the Steers 110 yards of their 272 yards total offensive production. The Horns were within the 15 yard line three times, but were unable to score. The Horns had 151 yards rushing on 47 carries. Brent Taylor had 60 yards on 13 carries, Russel Vaughn had 13 carries for 38 yards, Kale Beck had 28 yards on 13 carries, Keith Treadaway had 22 yards on 5 carries, Clint Brashhear had 2 carries for 2 yards and Cory Robinson had 1 yard on 1 carry. Taylor was 3 of 10 passes for 27 yards. The Horns had 5 punts for 34 yards and 3 penalties for 35 yards. The Horns had 15 first downs and 178 yards of total offense.

The Longhorns played outstanding defense, containing the powerful Steers offense with the exception of 3 big plays. The offensive and defensive teams played great.

### 1st Quarter

The Longhorns took the opening kick-off and returned the ball to the 30 yard line. The Horns ran 11 offensive plays picking up two first downs then had to punt. The Steers ran three plays and punted. Both teams traded the ball back and forth, picking up short yardage and then punting again.

### 2nd Quarter

The Horns started the second quarter with the ball and drove down to the Steers 10 yard line before the Steer defense stiffened and a 4th and 1 came up short. For the remainder of the quarter the two teams traded punts and the half ended at 0-0.

### 3rd Quarter

The Steers took the second half kick-off, which was a short one, and returned the ball 10 yards to the their 45 yard line. Three plays later they had to punt. The Horns were not able to move the ball and had to punt. On this series of downs the Steers broke a tight game open with a 28 yard sweep and scored 5 plays later. The Horns picked up two

first downs on the next series, then had to punt. The Longhorn's defense was caught off guard and the Steers completed a 78 yard pass play on a double reverse and scored again with 2:52 left in the 3rd quarter.

### 4th Quarter

The Horns began to move the ball and got down to the 10 yard line, but a holding call put the ball back on the 25 yard line. The Horns got back to the 15 yard line before Brent Taylor was sacked for a loss and the ball went over on downs.

The Steers began to play wide open offense and moved the ball downfield and scored with 2:31 left in the 4th quarter. The next series the Horns lost the ball on an interception and the game ended.

It was a good effort by the Longhorns, the differences in the ball game were the Steer's quickness and speed.

The Horns travel to Roscoe this week to take on the Plowboys. Let's all go to Roscoe and support the Horns in another tough district ball game. **Go Horns! We are proud of you.**

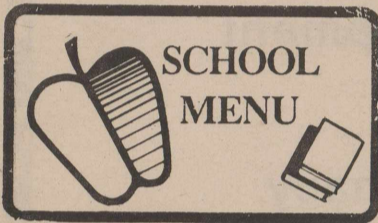
### Bronte PTA

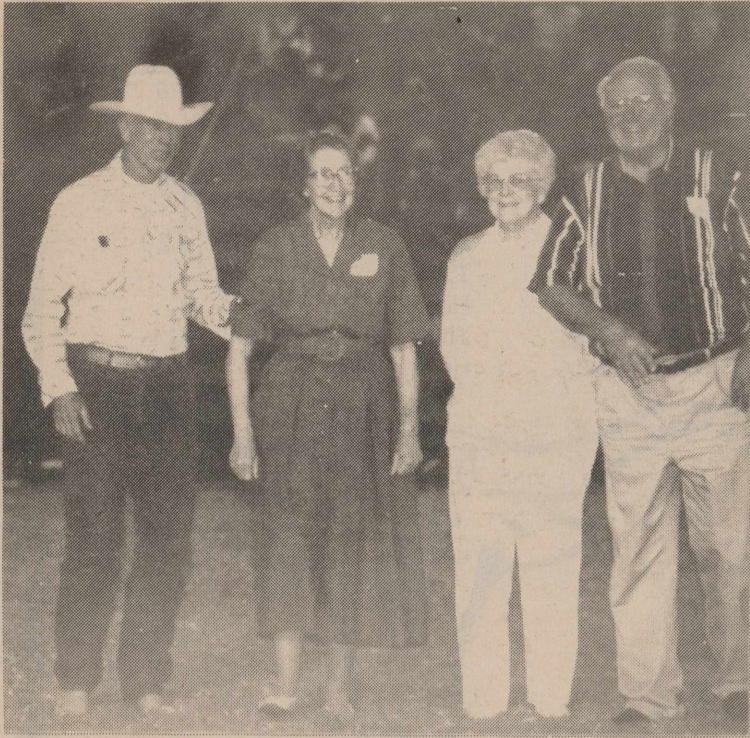

**Early detection key to survival**

Recent advances in genetic research have brought breast cancer again to the forefront of the national discussion about health and disease.

But while a true test for genetic predisposition toward breast cancer may be years away, education and early detection can greatly increase the chance of survival for breast cancer patients today.

The Society recommends that women have a screening mammogram by age 40; women 40 to 49 have a mammogram every 1 to 2 years; women age 50 and over have a mammogram every year.

Also, a doctor should conduct a breast examination every three years for women 20 to 40 and every year for those over 40. The Society also recommends monthly breast self-examination for women 20 years and older.

Breast cancer is the most prevalent form of cancer among women, and it is second only to lung cancer in its deadliness. The American Cancer Society estimates that about one of every nine American women will develop breast cancer by age 85.

An estimated 9,200 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed in Texas women during 1994. About 2,300 Texas women will die of the disease this year.

Ninety-three percent of

women diagnosed with localized breast cancer survive five years.

For cancers that haven't spread to other parts of the body, the survival rate approaches 100%. Seventy one percent of women whose breast cancers have spread regionally survive, while 18% of women whose cancers have spread further survive five years.

Risk factors include: age over 40; personal or family history of breast cancer; and never had children or had children late in life.

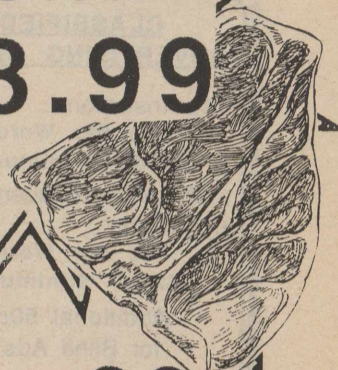

**Don't rely  
entirely on SS  
after retiring**

Here's a message that ap-  
parently needs repeating --  
you can rely on Social Security  
for your retirement, but you  
shouldn't rely only on Social  
Security, according to Franklin  
H. Upp, manager of the San  
Angelo Social Security Office.

Upp said that a recent series  
of focus group studies con-  
ducted by the National  
Academy of Social Insurance  
found "deep disappointment"  
from some (participants) who  
said that they had been led to  
believe that Social Security by  
itself would be sufficient to  
sustain them at the standard of  
living at which they were now  
living. "These participants had  
the notion that current  
earnings would completely be  
replaced dollar for dollar by  
Social Security benefits," Upp  
said.

"That focus group experi-  
ence points out that fact that  
we need to do all we can to  
make sure everyone covered  
by Social Security under-  
stands the way the system  
works".

"We need to emphasize --  
again and again -- that Social  
Security was never intended  
to be the sole source of in-  
come in retirement. It is part  
of what we have always referred  
to as a 'three-legged' financial  
stool. One leg is Social Secu-  
rity, another is pension  
income, and the third is per-  
sonal savings and invest-  
ments," the Social Security  
manager stated.

The National Academy of  
Social Insurance notes that  
"thinking about planning for  
retirement, knowing what one  
should do to save for retire-  
ment, and actually taking the  
steps to adequately save are  
three very different things.  
Only a little more than half of  
all people indicated that they  
were actively saving for retire-  
ment."

Also, fewer than 59% of all  
employees participate in an  
employer-sponsored pension  
plan.

"So, for one reason or an-  
other," Upp said, "the three-  
legged" stool can suddenly  
become a single peg upon  
which people are hanging all  
their retirement dreams."

Statistics show that Social  
Security is the only source of  
income for 14% of elderly  
beneficiaries and constitutes  
90% or more of the income for  
another 26%.

"We want to shrink those  
numbers in the future," Upp  
said. "One way to do that is to  
encourage people to begin  
planning early for retirement.  
A good first step is to contact  
Social Security and request a  
Personal Earnings and Benefit  
Estimate Statement. Just call  
1-800-772-1213 and ask for  
more information about this  
helpful form of retirement  
planning.

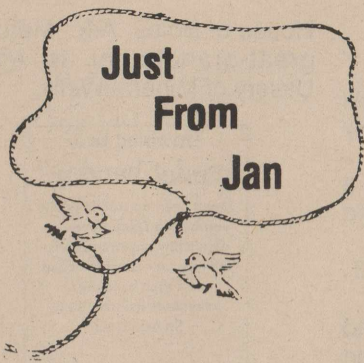

**Personal safety tips when laundering**

To reduce the risk of fire, electric shock or injury when using washers and dryers, follow these basic precautions:

- \*Read all instructions before using the appliances.
- \*Do not reach into the appliance if the agitator or drum are moving.
- \*Clean lint screen, when accessible, before or after each load. Do not operate the dryer without the lint screen in place.
- \*Items containing foam rubber (may be labeled latex foam) or similarly textured rubber-like materials must not be dried on a heat setting. Foam rubber materials, when heated, can under certain circumstances produce fire by spontaneous combustion.
- \*Any material on which you have used a cleaning solvent

or which is saturated with flammable liquids or solids, should not be placed in the washer or dryer until all traces of these flammable substances and their fumes have been removed. Substances such as acetone, denatured alcohol, dry cleaning solvents, gasoline, kerosene, turpentine, waxes and wax removers can give off vapors that could ignite or explode.

\*Do not place into the dryer items that have been spotted or soaked with vegetable or cooking oil. When exposed to heat, these items can become hot enough to catch fire.

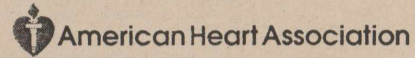

CEU Credits to be offered in West Texas

Pesticide applicators will have ample opportunity to meet U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requirements in the coming months.

EPA requires that pesticide applicators be recertified. Requirements for applicators certified or licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture are summarized as follows:

Certified Private Applicators certified before January 10, 1989 have two options:

Option 1 - Obtain 15 continuing education units (CEU's) including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management by December 31, 1995, and repeat every five years thereafter; or

Option 2 - On a one time only basis, take the Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator test and make application for a private applicator license along with a required fee.

Certified Private Applicator's Licenses dated January 19, 1989 thru December 31, 1989 will expire December 31, 1994. If these individuals wish to continue spraying restricted use pesticides, they must take the Texas Agriculture Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the TDA private applicator test and make application for a private applicator license along with the required fee.

Since January 1, 1990, Licensed Private Applicators

must obtain 15 CEUs including two credits in law and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management every five years. These credits must be earned by December 31 of the year preceding license expiration.

Licensed Commercial Applicators and Licensed Non-Commercial Applicators must obtain at least five CEUs each year for license renewal. Two of these must be in laws and regulations and one in integrated pest management.

\*Sonora, Oct. 19, 5 hours CEUs, Langford Memorial 4-H Bldg., 9:30 am.

\*Eldorado, Oct. 26, 5 hours CEUs, Memorial Bldg. 9:00 am.

\*Abilene, Nov. 15, 5 hours CEUs, Civic Center, 8:30 am.

\*San Angelo, Nov. 18, 5 hours CEUs, Coliseum Exhibit Bldg., Time TBA.

\*Ozona, December 1, 6 hours CEUs, Ozona Civic Center, 8:30 am.

On December 7, there will be 5 hours CEUs offered at the Coke County Farm Bureau Office by satellite teleconference. Also on this date the satellite will be offered at the Texas Agricultural Extension and Research Center in San Angelo. Additional information on this course will be placed in the newspaper and producer newsletter.

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HEALTH NOTES

Breast-Feeding Update

The most frequently mentioned benefits of breast-feeding come early in a baby's life, such as apparent protection from disease until the baby's own immune system develops. However, new research at the State University of New York at Buffalo indicates that women who were breast-fed as infants have a twenty-five percent lower risk of developing breast cancer than women who were bottle-fed as infants.

Dr. Jo Freudenheim's study appears in the journal *Epidemiology* (5-94). She cautions that the results are preliminary, but that there is growing interest in the relationship between events early in life and breast cancer. Among the early influences could be nutritional and biological differences between mother's milk and cow's milk as well as caloric differences.

Dr. Freudenheim says studies with animals have shown that early restriction of calories may be related to a lower risk of breast cancer. This study found that cow's milk and formula fed to babies were sometimes higher in volume and calories than what breast-fed babies received.

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
