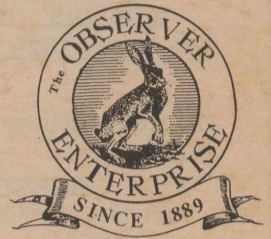

### County rainfall amounts reported

Rainfall amounts varied throughout the county on Monday. At Bronte, Bill Thomas reported 2.65 inches. Other areas around Bronte reported from 1 inch to 1.25 inches.

At Robert Lee, Lake Spence area residents reported 1.2 to 1.4 inches of rain. Mrs. Les Wink at Graham Valley north of town had 1.5 inches. Silver residents reported rainfall amounts of 1.9 to 2.4 inches.

The bottom line on the moisture was that it was very general in amounts in excess of one inch throughout the county and as usual, is always welcome in Coke County. Small grain fields and winter grass and weeds should be the immediate beneficiaries of the good moisture.

**Election votes canvassed**

Coke County Commissioners' Court canvassed votes from the November 8 general election on Monday. A 10 vote difference in totals of one state official was found and a difference of two votes on another. All other totals went on the official records.

Election ballots were certified for the two contested campaigns in the county. In the county judge's race, the official totals were Judge Royce Lee, 565, and Jackie Walker, judge-elect, 744. That race, by precincts, went: Early Voting, Lee 125, Walker 201; Pct. 1, 83-172; Pct. 2, 191-109; Pct. 3, 32-100; Pct. 4, 19-29; Pct. 5, 88-41; Pct. 9, 19-59; and Pct. 10, 8-33.

In the Justice of the Peace, #2, Jack Moore, appointed to finish an expired term, went over Bruce Sonnenberg 316-230. By voting precincts, counts were Moore 61, Sonnenberg 28 in Early Voting; Pct. 2, 154-135; Pct. 4, 21-28; and Pct. 5, 80-39.

Winners of the election campaigns will take office January 1, 1995.

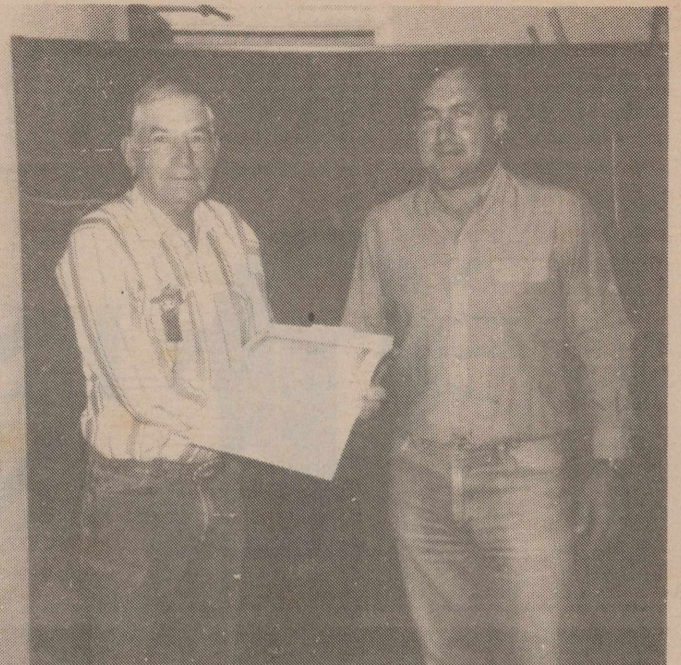
**Dunklin's celebrate 60th Anniversary**

**SCS changes name**

The Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service will soon take on a new identity as the Natural Resources Conservation Service as it streamlines its operations and takes on new program responsibilities. The new agency was authorized under the reorganization ordered October 20 by Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy.

The new Natural Resources Conservation Service will continue to have responsibility for all the programs of the former Soil Conservation Service. In addition, several other programs have been transferred to it including the Wetland Reserve Program, the Waterbank Program, the Colorado River Basin Salinity Control Program, Farms for the Future Program, Forestry Incentive Program, and Great Plains Conservation Program.

"We are working to make this a smooth transition for our customers," said Paul Johnson, chief of the agency. "And we will continue to build on 60 years of a unique relationship between federal

government and this nation's private landowners as well as our conservation district and state agency partners. It's a relationship built on voluntary programs, technical assistance, and conservation cost-share programs."

Johnson said farmers, ranchers, and other customers of the agency can continue to receive the same assistance they have found from the Soil Conservation Service during the transition period.

"Throughout this process, we will keep our customers and our employees well informed," said Johnson. "And we will stay connected to their ideas and concerns."

## Longhorns end season with 35-0 win

The Bronte Longhorns closed out the 1994 football season Friday night with a 35-0 win over the Water Valley Wildcats. The cold wind and rain kept many fans away, but did not dampen the spirit of the Horns as they rolled up 258 yards rushing in the rain on 35 carries. The defense held the Wildcats to 35 yards rushing on 38 carries. Ten different running backs carried the ball. Leading the ground attack were Brent Taylor with 6 carries for 89 yards; Russel Vaughn had 7 carries for 42 yards; Michael Sallee had 41 yards on 2 carries; Keith Treadaway had 5 carries for 33 yards; David Wilson had 6 carries for 23 yards; Kale Beck had 5 carries for 17 yards; Clint Brasher - 1 for 8 yards; Michael Martinez - 1 for 3 yards; and Cory Robinson and Cody Holland - 1 for 1 yard each. The defense did an excellent job holding the Wildcats to 52 yards total offense. The Horns were penalized 6 times for 60 yards. Brent Taylor had 2 punts for a 35.5 yard average. Thank you, guys, for the fun and excitement you provided for the

community and to us as parents. Wearing the maroon and white for the last time were Brent Taylor, Clint Brasher, Todd Harrell, David Cason, James Hambricht, Phillip Ratliff, Delvin Pierce and Jon Thompson.

### 1st Quarter

The Longhorns took the opening kickoff and Kale Beck brought the ball out to the 40 yard line. Two pass plays from Taylor to Beck picked up 24 yards. Keith Treadaway, Kale Beck, Russel Vaughn, and Brent Taylor picked up 36 yards on 6 plays. On the 7th play, Kale Beck scored on a 1 yard run with 6:41 remaining in the 1st quarter. The PAT failed. The Wildcats were held to a minus 10 yards rushing and had to punt. The Horns could not hold the wet football and fumbled on the next series. The Wildcats were not able to move the cold, wet ball and had to punt again. The Horns dropped two passes and failed to pick up a first down as the 1st quarter ended.

### 2nd Quarter

The Wildcats picked up one first down and then punted. The Horns took over on their own 46 yard line. On the first play of the series, Brent Taylor ran the ball up the middle on a quarterback keeper and scored on a 54 yard run with 10:23 left in the 2nd quarter. The two-point pass play from Taylor to Arrott was good, and the score was 14-0. On this series for the Wildcats, the Horns were called for three penalties, and the Wildcats picked up three first downs. The Horns stopped the Wildcats when they pushed them back for a 21 yard loss, and the quarter ended.

### 3rd Quarter

The Wildcats were unable to move the ball on the first series of the 3rd Quarter; so they punted. The Horns moved the ball on runs by Keith Treadaway, Kale Beck, Russel Vaughn, and Brent Taylor down to the Wildcats 4 yard line. On the next play

Taylor scored on a 4 yard run with 7:50 remaining in the 3rd Quarter. The PAT failed. The Wildcats picked up a 1st down and punted on the next set of downs. The Horns began to move the ball again, and Keith Treadaway scored from 20 yards out, with Kale Beck kicking the extra point. The Horns led 27-0, with 1:10 left in the 3rd quarter.

### 4th Quarter

In the 4th Quarter the coaches emptied the benches, and everyone played as the rain continued to fall. Michael Sallee had a good run, picking up 41 yards. Cody Holland scored on a 1 yard run. Cory Robinson ran the 2 point conversion in, and the Horns won 35-0. The Horns' season ended with a 6-3-1 record. We all had fun, and you played your best and had a winning season. Let us all support the Robert Lee Steers and the Sterling City Eagles who will represent our district in a first class manner. Good luck to you both. Good luck to the Horns in their 1994 basketball season.

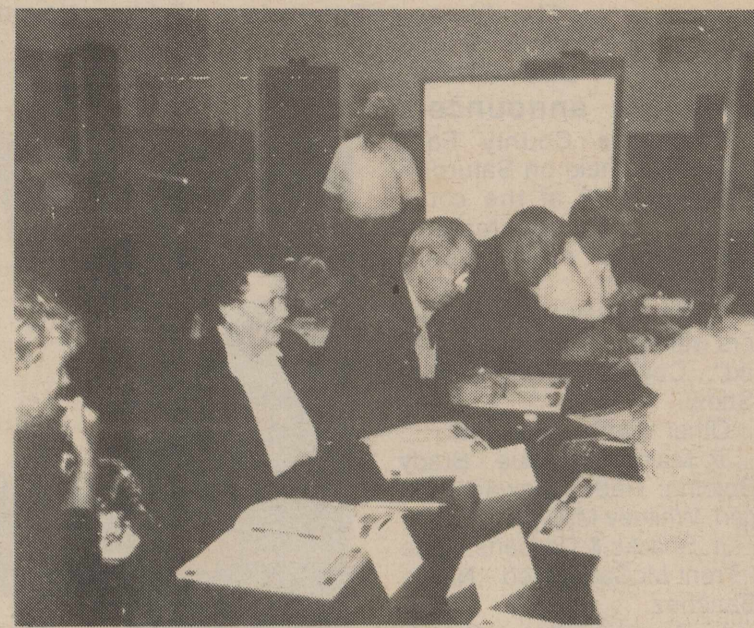
### Br. Christmas Choir practice set

Choir practice for Bronte's community Christmas program began Tuesday, November 15 at 4:00 pm at Central Baptist Church.

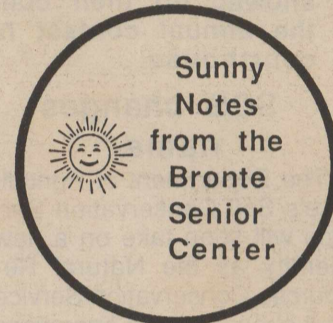

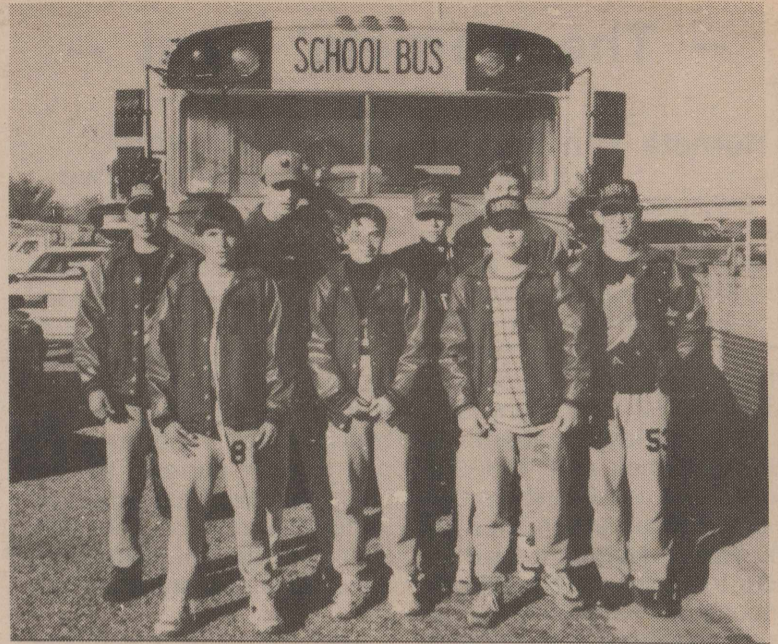

**Ivie reports good bass growth**

O.H. Ivie bass are growing well according to a survey by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Recent electrofishing samples at O.H. Ivie indicate that the largemouth bass population is in relatively good condition and the bass are still growing well. The recently constructed O.H. Ivie Reservoir is currently considered one of the top bass lakes in the state and is providing some of the best bass fishing in West Texas in years. Concern over thin fish and a possible lack of sufficient bait fish for good bass growth led to the survey; however the samples indicate the current conditions are still good and there is adequate forage at this time. Largemouth bass in O.H. Ivie are reaching almost 16 inches in length during their third year while the average growth rate for the area is close to 14 inches at the same age. While growth rates have slowed slightly from those immediately after opening, they appear to be stabilizing. A good spawn of shad this year may be responsible for improved growth over 1993.

The samples also indicated a higher percentage of bass over 12 inches in length (64 percent vs. 36 in 1993) and more bass over 18 inches were collected than in any previous year. However, the lake does not appear to have a good supply of small forage. Few small sunfish were col-

lected and the majority of shad collected were over 8 inches long, indicating the bass population may be reaching the carrying capacity of the lake and lack of forage could limit bass growth in the future. Texas Parks and Wildlife crews will continue to monitor this important fishery to determine if any future changes in management strategy will be beneficial.

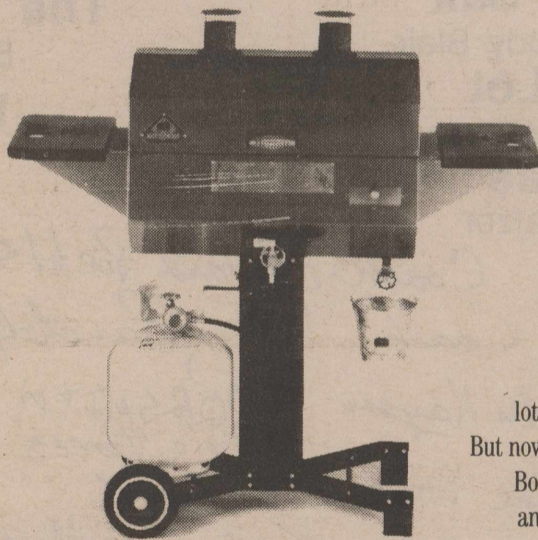

**Pratice hunting safety**

Texas, as well as most other states, is beginning its heaviest hunting pressure of the year now through the end of the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays, a prime time for hunting accidents to occur by careless hunters.

Most hunting accidents can be avoided by following the rules of shooting safety and by successfully completing the hunter education course, which is mandatory for those born on or after September 2, 1971.

There are rules to follow while hunting. One of the most often violated rules is not keeping the muzzle pointed in a safe direction at all times. Another common violation is having a loaded firearm in or around vehicles or camp. Hunters also need to be sure of their target before pulling the trigger.

"Why would you shoot at something if you can't identify it? There's no excuse for that," said Terry Erwin, recreation safety coordinator at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Everything you see and hear in the woods should be considered a human until there's absolutely no doubt. If there's any doubt, raise the binoculars. Bird hunters should stick to their 'safe zone-of-fire' and know where their companions are at all times."

Here are some general tips to remember:

\*always point the muzzle in a safe direction, NEVER in someone's direction.

\*make sure the firearm is unloaded every time you pick it up.

\*unload and put firearms in their case when traveling, separating them from ammunition.

\*do not load the firearm until you're in the field and actually hunting; when finished hunt-

ing, always unload firearm before returning to vehicle or camp.

\*use a hauling line to raise and lower unloaded firearms into and out of tower blinds and tree stands.

\*keep your finger outside the trigger guard until you're ready to shoot.

\*know where your companions are at all times; never swing a gun towards them outside of your safe zone of fire.

\*control your emotions by thinking safety first at all times.

\*avoid alcohol and drugs before or during a hunt.

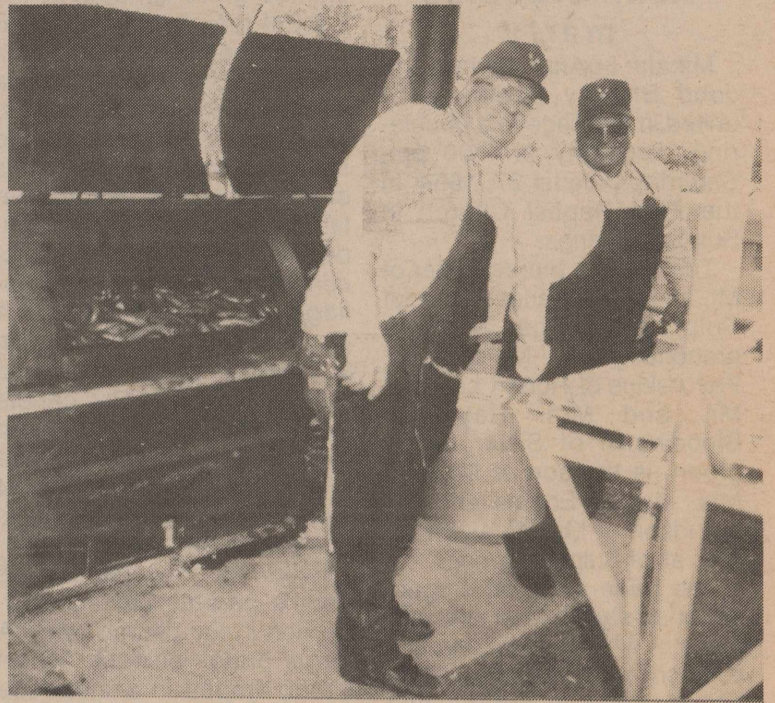
At least two of six hunting fatalities during the 1993 season occurred because the person had a loaded firearm in or near a vehicle and it went off.

Many more accidents may be avoided by wearing hunter orange clothing, Erwin said. Hunter orange is required in 40 states. In Texas, hunters on wildlife management areas and other public hunting lands must wear at least 400 square inches of hunting orange while hunting, including a minimum of 144 square inches on both chest and back, plus an orange cap or hat. National Forest lands require hunters and those accompanying them to wear a minimum of 144 square inches on both chest and back plus a cap or hat.

"We recommend that people wear daylight fluorescent orange for the safety factor," Erwin said. "I recommend wearing it at all times while in the field. If it's not on, it's not doing you a bit of good."

If you're absolutely against wearing hunter orange while hunting, at least wear it to and from the stand, said Steve Hall, TPWD education director. "Hunter orange will allow your companion to see you if you get out of position or stray from your hunting plan. Non-hunters also should wear orange if moving about on public lands or in the field during general hunting seasons."

"Hunting is fun, but safe, responsible hunting is even more fun, and it makes good sense," Erwin said. "Hunting is a relatively safe sport, but one accident is too many."

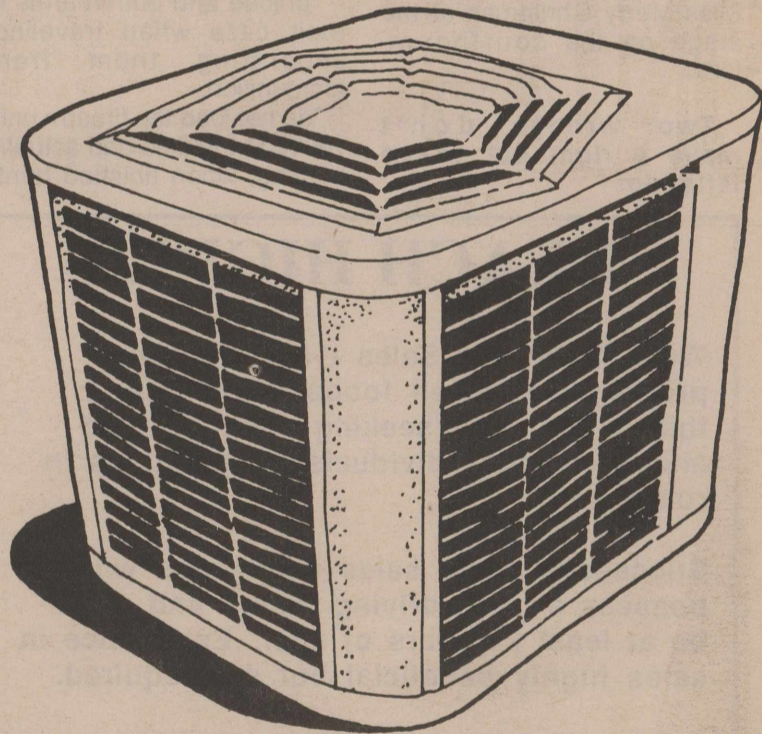
