VA Interest Rate Set On Mobile Homes

WACO — The Veterans Administration announces that the rate of interest on GI loans to buy mobile homes has been set at 10.75 percent.

Purchase of mobile homes under the GI loan program was authorized for the first time by the Veterans Housing Act of 1970, and Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson says that 20,000 veterans are expected to make purchases

during the first year of the program.

Johnson said that two-thirds of the loans would be granted to Vietnam era veterans.

VA will guarantee up to 30 percent of a loan for a mobile home, up to a maximum of \$10,000 for the loan. Once the loan is paid the veteran is again eligible for a guaranteed loan on a conventional house, a guarantee that may go as high as \$12,500.

Defensive Driving Course Offered

ABILENE — A Defensive Driving Course, the first for 1971, will be offered to those 55 years old and over, beginning with the first two-hour sessions Tuesday, March 9, from 9 to 11 a. m., in the Gold Room, First State Bank Building, South 4th & Oak Streets Abilene. The 2nd will be held Thursday, Mar. 11; the third Tuesday, March 16; and the 4th two-hour session will be on Thursday, March 18. The theme of the course will be: Reduce accidents by learning how to control your driving.

The course will consist of classroom training in modern driving techniques, including visual aids and films. Each session will be for approximately 90 minutes, with a 'coffee break' between. Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by yeas and nays on the journals, may propose amendments to the Constitution, to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the Legislature, which proposed amendments shall be duly published once a week for four weeks, commencing at least three months before an election, the time of which shall be specified by the Legislature, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the votes cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the governor thereof."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

(3) Needy blind persons;

(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner not to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Governor Preston Smith placed a new \$470 million revenue raising program before the Legislature, and prompt action toward consideration in the House was promised by Speaker Gus Mutscher.

Governor proposed raising the general sales and auto sales tax rates to four per cent and boosting tuitions in state supported colleges and universities.

He stuck by his original recommendation to appropriate welfare funds for only 10 months of the biennium, meanwhile trusting that the federal government will take over 100 per cent of welfare costs.

Smith, addressing a joint session of the House and Senate, served notice he is again insisting on a biennial (two-year) budget -- except for welfare -- and hinted strongly he would veto a one-year appropriations bill favored by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, as he did in 1969.

Here's how Smith calculates the yield of his revenue plan which replaces the spend now pay later scheme he outlined January 20:

Boosting general sales tax rate from 3.25 per cent to four per cent, \$300 million for the biennium.

Raising auto sales tax rate from three to four per cent, for a \$70 million gain.

Hiking Texas student tuitions from \$50 to \$125 a semester and out of state student fees in state institutions of higher education from \$200 to \$500 a semester, estimated to yield another \$100 million.

While lawmakers found the new plan more realistic than the no new tax message, many expressed the view it would not pass unless coupled some form of business taxation. Some legislators labeled it insufficient to meet budget needs. Most criticism centered on "lack of balance" between consumer-business levies and the stiff tuition increase recommendation.

EMERGENCY BILLS PASSED

Legislature completed action on emergency bills to avert the threatened March 1 cut in medical assistance and aid to needy families with dependent children.

Final bill cleared by the House and sent to the Governor would divert \$35 million of teacher retirement fund income from April through August. An earlier bill made the appropriation to welfare purposes.

Surprisingly, a bill to create a \$185 million bond fund for building new colleges and universities, which sailed through House and has backing of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, bogged down in senate committee. Measure now is in sub-committee, but Lt. Gov. Barnes still predicts passage.

LIQUOR BILL EMERGES -- Long awaited bill to legalize sale of liquor by the drink on a local option bases was introduced in the Senate by Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso and in the House by Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi.

Legislature was empowered to pass such an act by the constitutional amendment lifting the open saloons ban at last November's general election.

Christie said the bill is "clean, enforceable" and contains no "arbitrary, unreasonable and indefensible restrictions" such as limiting mixed drink sales to establishments selling food.

Initial permit fees would cost \$5,000 and annual renewals \$500. Hale will introduce later tax legislation calling for a 10 per cent gross receipts levy on sale and service of mixed beverages.

Tax bill also would increase gallonage tax on distilled spirits from \$1.08 to \$2.70 and up wine tax per gallon in accord with the alcoholic content of vinous liquor.

Bill will further exempt mixed beverage permit holders and private clubs from the general sales tax and repeal the private club service fee of five cents a

drink. Hale and Christie estimate a biennial tax revenue of \$28 million.

Miniature bottles, subject to contention in prior legislative clashes over mixed drinks, would be banned. Mixed drink sellers would buy their stock from Texas wholesalers.

Legislation is expected to stir one of the session "more spirited" debates.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court agreed to consider a court of civil appeals decision concerning the city of San Antonio's annexation of five miles of U. S. Highway 281 right of way.

High Court reversed an intermediate court and withdrew an earlier opinion, concluding that a home for retired teachers in Waco must pay property taxes to the city and school district.

A Dallas woman got a new hearing in a court of civil appeals in her lawsuit against a Connecticut life insurance company over \$20,000 in coverage on her late husband. Supreme Court sent the case back for consideration of whether death was accidental or self-inflicted.

U. S. Supreme Court upheld the tough state law on private club operations.

Federal District Court here banned the use of federal funds to buy Mustang Island park land. Appeal is being filed.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed a 65-year prison sentence assessed a man in the shooting of the Cross Plains city marshal.

ENVIRONMENTALISTS RALLY — First Texas Environmental Education Conference drew a crowd of 1,000 to meet with state officials on ecological issues.

Environmentalists, who claim state efforts to save natural resources and prevent pollution are uncoordinated and inadequate, are sponsoring some 60 pieces of legislation. One would establish the Office of Environmental Quality with veto power over other state agencies to protect natural resources.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — For the last several years a dense fog has hung over the Panama Canal -- figuratively, that is.

Six years and \$21 million after it was created, the Atlantic-Pacific Interoceanic Canal Study Commission has submitted a report of more than 1,000 pages to President Nixon. From what has been seen and read of the report, it is more impressive for size than contents.

The Commission did recommend to the White House a site for a new sea-level canal across Central America, about 10 miles west of the existing lock canal, at a cost of \$2,800,000,000. Other than this recommendation the reports seems to raise more problems than it solves.

The two great artificial waterways of the world the Suez and the Panama Canals, are in sharp focus now to all the world. The Suez Canal has long been closed by Egypt while the Panama Canal has never been closed by the United States except for repairs to lock.

Strangely enough, the nation most desirous of opening the Suez Canal is the Soviet Union, an ally of Egypt. Once the Suez is open, the winter-landlocked Soviet will have control of a warm weather route from the Black Sea through the Suez and the Red Sea to the Indian Ocean. Soviet shipping is awaiting at Port Sudan and Aden and, as it well known, is greatly increasing their ship traffic on the Indian Ocean. In time of war the enormous Russian fleet will be free to roam in about all the oceans and seas of the world.

This is mentioned to point out the strategic importance of the United States in maintaining control over the Panama Canal. It is a reason why the communists have for years attempted to subvert United States sovereignty over the Canal and continue to do so.

It is disturbing, therefore, that the Presidential Commission, appointed in 1964, has now delivered to the President recommendations which would require the United States to give up its sovereignty in the Canal Zone and build a new sea-level canal under international control. The Report, if approved and implemented, would require the negotiations of new treaties, give Panama participation in the Canal operation, income and policies affecting the security of our Nation.

The example of the Suez Canal should remind us that when the British and French gave up sovereignty and ownership, treaty rights they maintained were of little value. The Soviets immediately moved into the vacuum left by the British and French and now they are in a position to gain what they have been seeking for 50 years.

It should be obvious that a defense treaty with Panama would be of little or no value if we did not maintain the right of sovereignty in the defense of the Canal. There would be little point in sharing the responsibility of defending it, if Panama should be given ultimate authority in decisions. The Panamanian Government is subject to instability, as has been seen a number of times in recent years.

Our strategic preparedness depends heavily on maintaining our treaty right over the Panama Canal which we built and

operate. Studies show that 70 percent of all shipping that goes through the Panama Canal is bound for or coming from U. S. ports. In World War II, the Korean War, the Cuban Crisis of 1962 and now the Vietnam War, the Canal has played a vital role in naval deployment.

It is true that the present canal will not accommodate some large vessels including our larger warships. There is need for modernization of the present lock canal. Such a decision would require no new treaty and our sovereignty over the waterway linking two oceans would not be jeopardized. In time of emergency we should have control over security measures for the Canal's safety. The Canal can be modernized at a fraction of the costs involved in building a new canal recommended by the new Presidential Commission.

The Panama Canal is too important to us to surrender it into other hands.

BENEFIT - RISK OF 2, 4, 5-T SHOULD BE CONSIDERED

FORT WORTH — Opposition by Southwestern cattle producers to the threatened ban of brush-killer 2, 4, 5-T, was voiced by official statements of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association's special Agricultural Chemical Committee before the recent hearings in Washington of the new Environmental Protection Agency. Frank H. Lewis, TSCRA president, announced, "We are taking all steps possible to see that useful and safe agricultural chemicals are not needlessly banned."

The TSCRA new "watchdog" chemical committee was formed late last year to guard against legislation or government restrictions that are extremely harsh. With John Matthew of Abilene as chairman, the committee is composed of the TSCRA officers and two advisors, Dr. H. O. Kunkel of Texas A&M University and Dr. Joe Schuster of Texas Tech.

"We feel that the Environmental Protection Agency must

learn to judge the benefit-risk in the use of 2, 4, 5-T herbicide. We consider further restrictions of this chemical are not warranted until such time proof of environmental harm has been substantiated," added Mr. Lewis.

Earlier, Matthews and his committee had met with officials of the American National Cattlemen's Assn. to discuss action to oppose unnecessary restriction on chemical use. The TSCRA committee initiated a resolution before the Animal Health Committee the ANCA which eventually came before the ANCA membership and was adopted urging Congressional committees weigh carefully any proposed legislation restricting the use of agricultural chemicals.
