invoice in order to pay the bill in full. He would prefer a monthly billing cycle in order to make things easier or himself and for Tech, he said. The latest repairs included the in stallation of backyard lights for enter tainment purposes.

The crew managed to escape through the shattered glass nose of the craft but was hindered from helping passengers because of fire and thick smoke.

According to one Ukranian crew member, the weather was fine when they left Sarajevo, but they encountered

The crash appeared similar to one in April 1996, when a plane carrying U.S. Commerce Secretary Ron Brown plowed into a mountain in a heavy storm while traveling to Dilubr
