The ruling has ended affirmative action in public university admissions and financial programs in the states of Texas, Mississippi and Louisiana, Allen said.

The Lubbock County Youth Center will not expand after the the polls Tuesday.
The proposed 6 cents per $\$ 100$ land valuation property tax increase was intended to go toward adding 144 additional beds to LCYC. Thirty percent of voters were in favor of the property tax increase, and 70 percent voted against the
issue.
However, the crowded youth However, the crowded youth
center will now look for ternatives, said Joel Trevino, chief ernatives, said Joel Trevino, chief
juvenile probation officer at LCYC.
"For whatever reason, the citiLens have spoken, and we are left with what we have," Trevino said. "We will work with deterring the youth in the county, but we will still have to release them before their time is up..
Currently, LCYC is forced to release one inmate for every juve nile arrested.
A 1992 study showed that a
minimum of 270 beds are needed minimum of 270 beds are needed
