## Retired commission agent shot during attack

TYLER (AP) - A retired Texas AIcoholic Beverage Commission agent
has been shot and killed during a violent confroniation with a businesswoman, police say. Former TABC agent Gordon Anders was shot Tuesday night by Doris Hardy's 39 -year-old son, Steve Hardy, poitce said.
