Lone Star Gas Company's ap-plication for a rate increase of 5.4 cents per MCF in each step of its rates for residential and commercial gas service was ap-proved by the Baird City Coun-cil at its meeting on April 21. The new rate will be come ef-fective May 1. This increase to the average residential user would amount to only slightly more than one cent per day, it was pointed out by Lone Star's Local Manager Bob McKennon. 
She was a member of the Baptist Church.
