Provisions of Emergency Hay and Roughage Program Explained

For the benefit of eligible farmers and ranchers, the provisions of the emergency hay and roughage program are outlined below: Administration will be by the Farmers Home Administration with William E. Lawson in charge of the Haskell office. Applications are now ready for roughage at the FHA office.


Amounts: Certificates will be issued in the amount of \$7.50 per ton of roughage. In effect, certificates will serve as cash on the purchase price. The amount of \$7.50 will be granted all types of roughages.

Roughages Qualifying: Loose or baled hay, cottonseed hulls, peanut hulls, corn cobs, sorghum bundles, silage. (Mixture of hulls and meal will not qualify.)

Duration: Certificates will be issued to cover feed requirements until Dec. 31, 1936. (The contract between the Federal and State government for this program runs until March 31, but continuation day on Dec. 31 will depend upon need.)

Who are Dealers: Any seller of feed will qualify as dealers; thus one farmer may buy from another. The certificate is "Cashable" at any bank by the dealer (seller) who endorses the certificate.

Eligibility: This will be determined by the county committee of the FHA. Generally, requirements are the same under the grain program. The applicant must devote 50 per cent or more of his time to farming or ranching or receive 50 per cent or more of his income from that source.

Haskell Foursome Write of Interesting Scenes on Tour of Canada, New England

The Free Press has received letters from vacationing Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Crawford and Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Couch. In describing their trip through New England and Canada, they stated: "We have visited Proctor, Vermont and saw a marble exhibit claimed to be the largest in the world. The marble was in black figured, gray, pink, tan, blue and green colors.

"Leaving Proctor, we attended church in Rutland and then went to Barre, where we saw a marble museum and many products of the marble industry.

"Montreal, Canada has 2 1/2 million people, the city is built on several hills and the streets are steep and very crooked. The city is old and the buildings are large and dark.

"Freighters come there from Liverpool, England with grain cargoes. We saw one large vessel dock and about 400 passengers were on her deck as it pulled up into dock.

"There are about 250 Catholic Churches here.

"Continuing on to Quebec, this city is also built among mountains, crooked streets and narrow. Here we saw the narrowest street in the world; changing of the guards in the walled city. Only a small part of the city is walled now and repairs are being made to preserve it."

The Haskell couples also reported seeing the Scala Sancta, "Holy Stairs" which the people approach on their knees—a form of prayer. Also a painting at the shrine

of St. Anne de Beaupre, called the "Panorama." Mrs. Crawford says, "It is of the country where Christ was born, lived and was crucified; the home of Pilate and King Herod. This painting is in a round room about 150 feet in diameter, but the picture looked as if you were looking as far as the horizon.

"We left Quebec yesterday, August 23 and arrived in Augusta, Maine, at 5 p. m. today, August 24."

Daughter of Early Day Newspaperman Visitor Here

Mrs. R. L. Reid of El Paso, a former resident here, was in Haskell last weekend accompanied by her son, Robert Reid, a member of the faculty of Baylor University.

Mrs. Reid is the former Lillian O'Bryan and her father, the late J. C. O'Bryan was an early day Haskell newspaperman. He came here in July, 1902, and established the Haskell Headlight, and operated the weekly newspaper until April, 1905 when he sold the venture and moved his family to Channing, Texas, where he later became District Attorney of the 69th district.

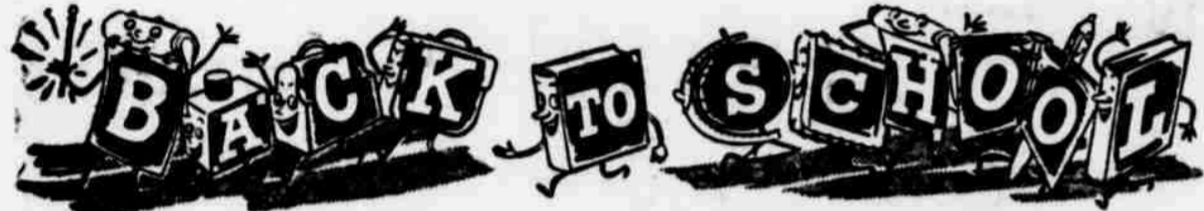

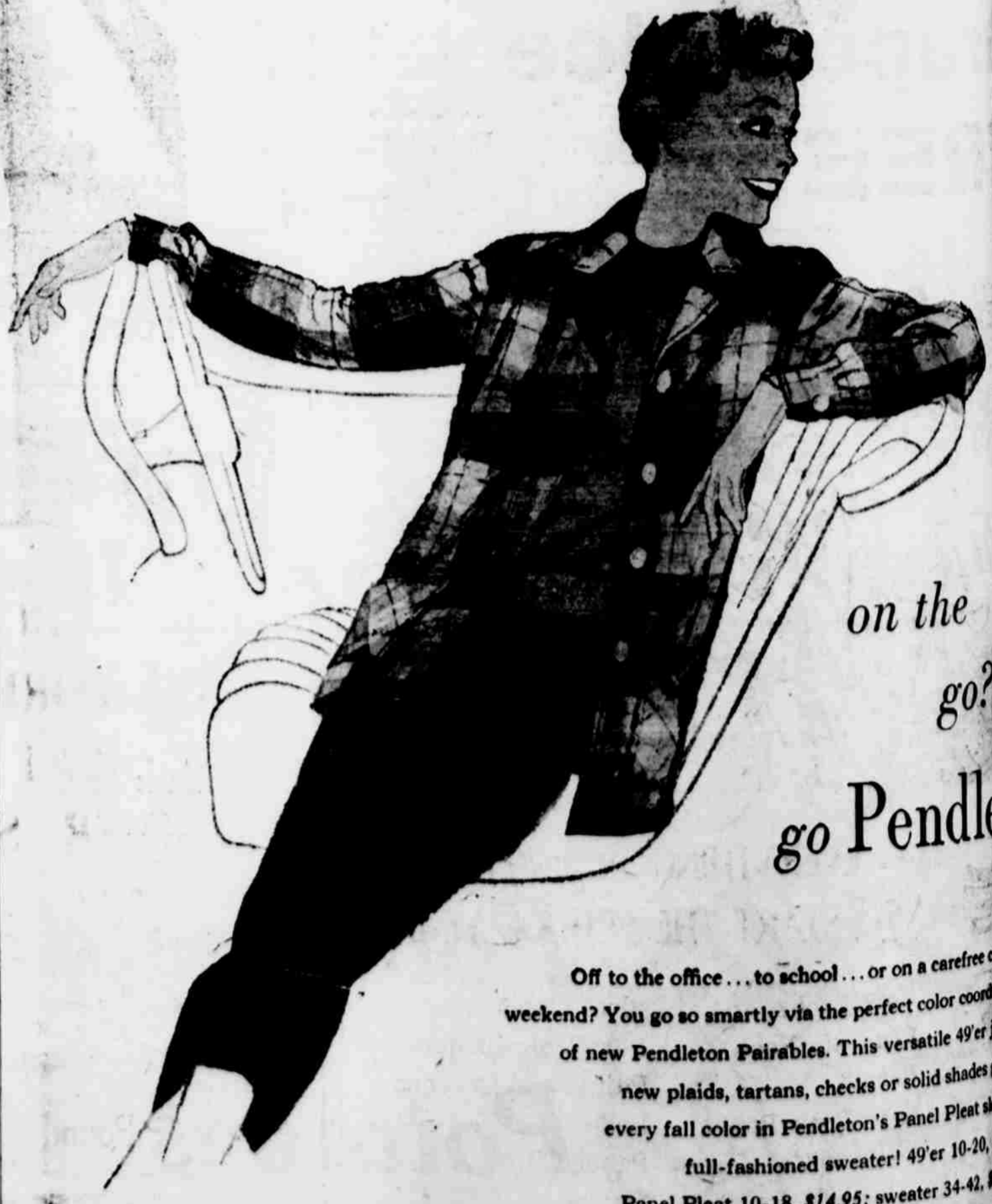

Fire Hazard Check Of School Plants Is Advised

AUSTIN—Fire chiefs and marshals of all Texas towns and cities were urged this week to make a thorough inspection of all school buildings before the bells toll the opening of the fall term. Mark Wentz, State Insurance Commissioner and State Fire Marshal, pointed out that only a few days remain before the opening of schools and every precaution should be taken now to protect lives of children and teachers and safeguard public property.
 One proven way that fire hazards can be uncovered and corrected was by periodic inspections, and the best time to start such inspections is before the schools open, he said.
 It is more important this year than ever before to make early inspections of school buildings,

he said, because many new buildings and additions have been erected during the summer months to accommodate increased enrollment, that may have created new or additional fire hazards.
 Wentz said that fire chiefs and marshals have been called upon to look for the four causes of fires: 1. misuse of electricity. 2. interior of faulty heating systems. 3. careless disposal of matches and cigarettes, and 4. poor housekeeping.

In the inspection of electrical systems, investigators should be particularly on the lookout for faulty or inferior wiring, sloppy installation work, use of poor material, including unapproved electrical cords and appliances, use of makeshift fuses, and pennies as fuses, overloading of circuits, insufficient number of circuits and the improper care of motors.

Wentz called to the attention of school officials the fact that school fire losses in Texas had for the past five years been excessively high, amounting to nearly \$5,000,000 in insured losses alone during that period.
 He felt certain that the strict observance and practice of approved safety rules in all schools would cut those losses tremendously.

The insurance commission is also asking fire chiefs and marshals to make inspection of churches at this time. Insured losses on church properties in Texas amounted to \$2,500,000 during the past five years and with increased church attendance and activities, especially in the fall, this figure will climb unless all steps are taken to correct fire hazards.

 A pint-sized weather station has been developed for the Navy. Weighing about six pounds and 23 inches high, it can be held in one hand to record essential weather data automatically in total darkness and under severe weather conditions.

The USS Bennington has installed a new system of carrier aircraft landings using a reflector light, which is highly visible and can be seen further than the Landing Signal Officer by day or by night.

Larned, who counts time by the millions, figures the flint covering the coral first began to form about 10,000,000 years ago and not telling how many years before that the little coral animal was alive and forming its calcium frame.

Found along with the dredged up elephant's tooth was a tooth from a native Florida horse, disproving the theory that Spaniards brought the first horses to Florida.

Now considered by many as a near genius in the field of rocks, Larned did not get interested in them until 1952 when he was hunting for uranium. After getting his geiger counter, he found he had to study rock formations and thereby discovered a new avocation. He is a phosphate mine mechanic by trade.

Since Florida is considered young in geological time, fossils dating just 50,000,000 years, Larned's glee was unrestrained when he found a piece of rock containing shells of shellfish while uranium hunting in Georgia. These creatures lived on earth before man was created or in the pre-Cambrian era.

Larned plans to hunt fossils in Florida until he retires from his work at the American Cyanamid mines. He thinks by then he will know enough about fossils to give lectures and have enough rocks to stock a private museum. A conservative estimate, we'd say.

Drouth Brings on Feeding Problems For Stockmen

College Station—Roughage is a scarce item these days on most Texas farms and ranches. The prolonged drouth has cut deep in to supplies of all roughages and forced stockmen to turn to substitutes says Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian.

He reports that numerous calls and letters to his office indicate the wide-spread shortage of roughages and the intentions to use substitutes whenever possible. A frequent question has to do with the use of cotton burs and gin trash as a maintenance ration and whether or not there is danger of poison from cotton insecticides. The veterinarian says burs and gin trash can be fed and there is little or no danger from poison especially if no insecticides were applied to the cotton plants three to four weeks prior to harvest.

He also reports complaints have been received that livestock have suffered from prussic acid when fed baled sudan, Johnson grass, hegar or other sorghum hays. He says considerable of these crops were cut at an immature stage and baled before the plants had thoroughly dried and that the excessive moisture inside the bales was causing the trouble. The trouble can be remedied by breaking open the bales and letting the plants dry before feeding them.

Patterson also warns against using urea as a protein supplement where cattle are getting a very small intake of roughage or the forage is of poor quality. He says the animals cannot utilize the urea because of the low intake of carbohydrates, and urea poison will result.
