### Daniel Apparent Winner in Race For Governor

Senator Price Daniel had apparently won the Democratic nomination for Governor over Judge Ralph Yarborough in one of the closest gubernatorial races in Texas history, according to latest figures of the Texas Elecion Bureau.

Based on complete but unofficial returns tabulated Tuesday, Daniel had 698,125 votes and arborough received 694,578. In Haskell County, Yarborough received 1,997 votes to 829 cast for Daniel, it was announced following the official canvass of Saturday's election returns. The canvass was made Tuesday by the County Democratic Executive Committee and resulted in the addition of one vote for Yarborough, whose unofficial total had been reported at 1,996. Dan-

Marlow 936, Thompson 689. Countywide, voters gave Ralph Yarborough a better than two-toone lead over Senator Price Danield in their race for Governor. Yarborough received 1,996 votes, Daniel 829. Yarborough carried all voting boxes except one in the county. Plainview box No. 18 gave Senator Daniel 17 votes and Yarborough 13. In neighboring Tanner Paint box No. 19 the vote was Yarborough 24, Daniel 0. County voters also gave WIII Wilson a heavy majority over

Tom Moore in the race for At-torney General. Wilson received 1,754 votes and Moore 1,004. Ben Ramsey, unopposed candidate for Lieutenant Governor, received 2,648 votes in the coun

Heaviest decline in voting be-tween the first and second primaries was in Haskell Box No. 1, Rule No. 5, and Rochester, No. 5 with 100 or more votes less in each box, based on totals in the governor's race in both primaries.

The drop in second primary voting is attributed to the fact that voters in all but three boxes cart-side the town of Easkell were bal-loting on two State races only.

The parade was held Friday afternoon in connection with the National Championship Rodeo of the American Junior Rodeo Asso-



Provisions of Emergency Hay and Roughage Program Explained

County Agent

For the benefit of eligible farmers and ranchers, the provisions of the emergency hay and roughage program are outlined below: Administration will be by the Farmers Home Administration with Willam E. Lawson in charge of the Haskell office. Applications are now ready for roughage at the FHA office.

Amounts: Certificates will be

issued in the amount of \$7.50 per ton of roughage. In effect, certificates will serve as cash on the purchase price. The amount of \$7.50 will be granted all types of oughages. Roughages Qualifying: Loose or

baled hay, cottonseed hulls, pea-nut hulls, corn cobs, sorghum bundles, silage. (Mixture of hulls and meal will not qualify.)

Duration: Certificates will be ssued to cover feed requirements until Dec. 31, 1956. (The contract between the Federal and State government for this program runs until March 31, but continuation day on Dec. 31 will depend upon

Who are Dealers: Any seller of feed will qualify as dealers; thus one farmer may buy from another. The certificate is "Cashable" at any bank by the dealer (seller) who endorses the certificate. Eiligibility: This will be determined by the county committee of the FHA. Generally, requirements are the same under the

grain program. The applicant must devote 50 per cent or more of his time to farming or ranching ore receive 50 per cent or more of his income from that source.

The farmer must certify that his principal occupation is farming or ranching and that he does not have sufficient feed for his livestock. Contact the local FHA
