

Cattle Sharply Higher as Good Rains Come By TED GOULDY

FORT WORTH - Liberal amounts of moisture reported from the cattle country during the past few days put a bullish tone to trade at Fort Worth Mon-

Immediate demand from wheat areas, as well as stepped up demand from winter clover graz-ing areas of East and Central Texas, caused stocker classes to This higher surge carried slaughter kinds upward as stocker buyers invaded the classes that have been selling largely for slaughter. All cattle and calves were fully 50 cents higher and many stocker kinds were 50 cents to \$1 and more higher. Choice fat cattle were virtuallacking, a few in the \$20 to \$22 range, but most of the me-tium and good slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$16 to and lower grades scaled lown on the \$12 to \$16 bracket. Fat cows cleared at \$10 to \$12.50, and canners and cutters sold from \$7 to \$10.50. Bulls cashed at \$10 to \$14. Good and choice slaughter calves sold from \$16.50 to \$19, and common and medium sorts cashed at \$12 to \$16. Culls sold from \$9 to \$12. 



Youths Under 17 **Do** Not Need

**Hunting** Permit Austin-Persons under seventeen years of age do not need regular licenses to hunt and

fish in Texas, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. In a clarifying statement, he

said some confusion has been caused through a new state law exempting persons 65 years of age or older from buying hunting and fishing licenses which has a companion measure de-creeing that persons under sixteen years of age did not have to buy licenses. An old law ex-empting residents under 17 was not repealed hence this statute still prevails.

The executive secretary em-phasized that young and old in the free category must obtain exempt licenses when hunting deer because of the deer tagging law affecting all hunters.


