

(d) By the term "general pow

(e) By the term "municipal street lighting" is meant a ser-vice available to the City of Baird Texas, for the purpose of illuminating streets and alleys only.

(g) By the term "domestic offpeak water heating service" is meant the usage of electricity for the operation of approved types of water heaters during off-peak hours.

(h) By the term "consumer" is meant any person, firm, or corporation using any electric cur-
