



# Water Levels Drop During July In State Reservoirs

The Board of Water Engineers at Austin, in its monthly report, said that Texas' 35 major reservoirs were 90 per cent full of usable water

This reflected a 3 per cent drop as of July 31, as compared to June's 93 per cent capacity hold-ings. A total of 9,110,850 acre feet The district meeting was one of ings. A total of 9,110,850 acre feet the ten throughout West Texas held, of water were in the reservoirs. Lake Stamford on Paint Creek held 49,100 acre feet at the end of July, 82 per cent of capacity. This was a decline from 51,000

acre feet reported in June. Red Bluff Lake near Orla remained the driest with only 5.2 per cent, or 15,970 acree feet of water of the vast 307,000 acre foot reservoir full.

Medina Lake near San Antonio uso was below the averagt. It held 91,660 acre feet of water, 37 per cent of capacity.

The board said stream flow showed a return "to somewhat normal conditions after the extremely high flood stages of the past few months."

July rainafil in Texas was generally light, with the heaviest falling in the area west of the Pecos

'H'igher than usual flows were maintained in the Trinity, Brazos and Colorado rivers due to the releases of stored flood water from upstream reservoirs."

Flood control pools were empt-ied to about 2,500,000 acre feet of water, or 58 per cent of capacity. Water levels in observation wells rose in El Paso and Travis counties, while declines of 4 to 14.9 feet were recorded in Atascosa, Bexar and Harris counties and in the Winter Garden area near La Pryor. No change was recorded in Uvalde.

# Egg Buyers and Sellers to Be Licensed

The Texas Egg Law, which becomes effective August 22, pro-vides that no person can buy or sell eggs within this state for subsequent resale without first obtaining a license from the Commissioner of Agriculture, County Agent F. W. Martin expiains. The exception to this says Mar-

inforcement of the provisions of this act, each licensee shall pay a license fee. The annual fee for a license fee. The annual fee for dealers, wholesalers, and processors shall be determined according to the average weekly volume of the month in which license fees handled the most eggs in the preceding 12 months ending on May 31. The proceeds of such license fees shall be paid into the State Treasury by the Commissioner of Agriculture in a fund known as the Egg Law Enforcement Fund.

The deadline for obtaining li-censes is Oct. 20. Actual enforce-ment of the law will start February 17, 1958.



Cotton Problem - -

(Continued from page 1) said, are these: cotton's surplus up, acreage has been cut, costs have risen, and profits are trending downward. Competition has in-creased a total of 21 million cotton bale equivalents since World War II. Synthetic fibers, domestic and foreign, have risen by some 8 million bales, paper by a million, and foreign cotton production has gone up 12 million bales. All these things make it urgent that cotton get competitive on a three-way basis of price, promotion, and re-search, the speakers said.

Regarding price, it was pointed out that cotton's position in relation to the newer synthetics is good, but, compared with rayon, cotton's major rival, it's poor. At home, rayon undersells U. S. cotton by 4-8 cents a pound, and by about the same margin overseas. This price differential hurts cotton in many ways, not the least of which is the growing practice of blending. Blending a percentage of rayon-maybe 20 or 30 per cent with cotton fabrics which used to be all cotton is eroding markets away, the speakers declared.

Promotion-wise the synthetic producers spent \$20 million annually to sell their products, compared with less than \$1 million a

In this connection, the speakers noted that cotton's present and future sales promotion opportunities are unlimited. Using slides and other visual aids, they demonstrated how cotton can be effectively sold in those markets where personal preference and opinion are major sales influences. At the same time, they stressed the urgent need for bigger sales budgets in such markets as men's wear work clothes, children's clother, domestics, and rugs.

A grave disparity exists on the research front too, the speakers reported. Recognizing quality de-fiency as their basic weakness. the synthetics have been pouring \$60 million a year (compared to cotton's \$14 million) into research. This effort has resulted in the development of man-made fibers superior to cotton from the standpoints of strength, abrasion resistance, and color fastness, and fibers equal to cotton in absorb-ency, heat resistance, and water

repellency. Despite these disquieting facthowever, cotton has made giant strides and great opportuniles exist for cotton to forge further ahead. For example, despite limited funds, the program of the National Cotton Council—the organization that represents the entire raw cotton industry-has paid off dramatically, the speakers said. Since the Council was found-

ed, far greater consumer demand has been generated, and domestic consumption has risen by 50 per cent or 3 million bales annually. The Council's program has helped stimulate increased efficiency of production and processing. It has improved quality through re-search, and has spurred sales through hard-hitting advertising and promotion campaigns. With more production efficiency, more research, and more promotion, cotton can hold and steadily expand its markets, the speakers

In fact, they said, if cotton can fishing. merely hold on to its present share of the domestic and foreign market, the present trend can be reversed and a market for 15 million bales can be built in four or five years. for fiber products grows across the world, and under conditions of continued population growth and improved standards of liv-

On the other hand, if consumption of cotton can be increased by but one per cent at home and by 20 per cent of the expected foreign textile consumption rise, then cotton can balloon its total market to over 17 million bales by 1960, and well over 20 million bales a year by 1965.

But in projecting these possibilities, the speakers again warned that cotton must at least partially overcome present disparities in promotion and research. If the powerful trend now working against cotton and for its competftors is not halted, domestic and foreign consumption will go down to 8 million bales a year by 1960 and will sink further to 7 million bales by 1965, they predicted.

# **USDA Lists 31** Undesirable Wheat Varieties

By F. W. MARTIN On July 17, U. S. Department of Agriculture named 31 wheat varieties which are undesirable because of inferior milling and baking qualities and which will be discounted 20 cents per bushel in price support rates on the 1958 wheat crop. Eight new varieties have been added to the list of 23 designated as undesirable for the 1957 wheat price support program. This will be the third year discounts on undesirable wheat varieties have been included in the

price support program. Hard Red Winter-Blue Jacket. hull, Kanking, New Chief, Pawnee Sel. 33, Purkof, Red Chief, Red Hull, Red Jacket and Stafford. Soft Red Winter-Kan Queen. Kawvale, Nured, and Seabreeze.

except in Wisconsin and Washing-Spincota, Sturgeon.

Durum-Golden Ball, Peliss and Greeson, Rex and Sonora. Additions to the list of undesirable varities include Fifty Fold.

Queen, Kinney, Nured and Sea-The undesirable varieties are designated nationally except for Henry which is named as unde-

sirable in all but the states of Wisconsin and Washington. These designated varieties were found to be undesirable for commercial food use. The discount was adopted in the support operation to discourage their production and lessen the possibility of U. S. wheat of inferior quality finding its way into domestic and export channels. Representatives of crop mprovement associations have strongly urged the action to help improve the quality of over-all U.

wheat production.




