HOW DOES IT WORK? Aldrin kills hoppers three ways-(1) ingestion (feeding) (2) contact, and (3) fumigant action. Since hoppers are most likely to get a lethal does of aldrin by ingestion, you will probably get better results with spray mixtures. Sprays are favored over dusts for higher initial kills and sustained killing over a longer period. You can substitute baits when spraying or dusting equipment is not available. An aldrin emulsifiable concentrate or wettable powder is used for "wet" bait formulations. "Dry" baits are made by impregnating attractive bait materials with an aldrin-oil solution.
