Christmas Legends

Folklore of the Christmas season is fascinating. Whether true or not, these innumerable tales form the traditions of the holiday season. Animals are prominently mentioned in many legends and customs.

One Christmas legend tells of the little gray lamb with a longing in its heart to be white. It wandered to the dwelling of the Holy Family, lingering at the door. The Christ Child, seeing the lamb, beckoned it in. He laid his hand on its head, and it became white as snow.

Norwegians, Swedes and the Swiss make it a special point to be extremely friendly and hospitable on Christmas, both to domestic pets and wild birds.

A persistent Christmas legend is that bees hum a carol in honor of the Christ Child. In England, holly is placed on the hive to wish the bees a Merry Christmas.

Spainards are taught to treat cows kindly; they believe that cattle breathed upon the Christ Child to keep Him warm. Tradition holds that cows and horses knelt in adoration at midnight each Christmas Eve. Among the residents of the German Alps it is believed that on Christmas Eve all animals can speak.

In Worcestershire, it was at one time the custom to give a bunch of mistletoe to the cow that first bore a calf after New Year's Day, to bring good luck to all.

In Syria, the youngest camel which accompanied the Three Wise Men is called the camel of Jesus, and it is this camel which brings gifts to the children.

In Bohemia, a horse is taken out to a river at Christmas and walked against the current. The rider tucks an apple into the stream and if this horse it will be stronger during the coming year.

Volleyball Season Involves 120

More than 120 adults are involved in volleyball, just getting underway in the Muleshoe area for the 1968-69 season.

Fifteen teams are represented with nine of them being men's teams and six are women's teams. First games of the season were played on December 2.

This year, for the first time, the teams are sponsored. Only one team, the women's Diggers, are not sponsored as yet and are looking for a sponsor.

Castor Bean Harvest Ahead Of Last Year

Castor beans are 80-90 percent harvested for the 1968 crop, according to a spokesman for the castor bean industry in Bailey County. Average yield per acre is in excess of 2000 pounds and in some rare instances, over 2000 pounds per acre.

Castor beans jumped in county production from 300 acres in 1967 to more than 3000 acres in 1968. Production is expected to increase another 50 to 100 percent in 1969 as farmers are finding castor beans to be a good cash crop.

Castor beans stand weather abuse more than other field crops. For instance, just east of Muleshoe, in a band where hail caused much damage earlier in the year, cotton was damaged to the extent where there was nothing to harvest, while castor beans in the same area have just been harvested with little damage noted.

When the temperature reaches 30-31 degrees in the fall, castor beans stop growing and quit producing. Very few 'peps' or immature beans, were found at harvest this year, despite the early freeze in the area.

Quarter-Final Playoffs Friday Downed Sudan

Sudan's Hornets had their stingers pulled Friday night at Odessa, by being downed by Sonora's Broncos, but not before they got in 20-points worth of stings and giving the Sonora team a few worries before the game was over.

Sonora made all their 26 points in the first half and Sudan trailed by 13 points.

Neither team maintained absolute control of the ball during the second half although Sudan's Hornets did manage to get another TD on the board in the fourth to tighten up the game somewhat.

In semi-final action, Sonora will now take on the winner of the Ranger-Clifton battle.

Lazbuddie's Longhorns fell Friday night to hightered Throckmorton, who won the coveted Regional title in football. The 'Horns were outmanned, out-sized and out played, and although they lost the battle, they may have just won the war.

The 'Horns, looking amazingly small against the 40 pound average weight advantage of the Greyhounds, played and played and didn't give up even making their own lone TD of the crucial game 33 seconds before time ran out on the clock.

Two costly interceptions and two equally costly fumbles helped the Greyhounds down the mighty Longhorns.

In the very first play of the game, Lazbuddie fumbled and the Greyhounds recovered. The fumble recovery worked against the 'Horns, as they re-fumbled on their own first play of the game. 'Barford' kicker Monte Barnes teed the ball 28 yards after the 'Horns lost later a Sid Hargrove-Tom London pass in the end zone, scored on a 10 yard pass play, Joe Whittaker's toe kicked the extra to make it a 7-0 game with 5:38 on the clock in the opening stanza.

With a short time, Skipper Shield picked off two pass attempts by 'Horn QB Troy Steinbock and both were equally disastrous to the 'Horns. With 43 seconds on the clock in the first Shield skipped over for the second TD of the game from Lazbuddie's 20 where he intercepted, Whittaker failed on the conversion and it was Lazbuddie's ball.

Danny Weaver made the next Throckmorton TD when he barreled over from the Lazbuddie one-yard line with 6:45 in the second. Whittaker's toe again made the kick good and it was a 20-0 ball game.

For the first time in 1968 football, Lazbuddie was on the losing end going into halftime.

With the first half of the game working smoothly, not one penalty was assessed against either team. This picture was changed somewhat early in the second as both teams received their first penalties. Several penalties in a row against the 'Horns moved

Cotton Harvest Seventy Percent Complete

Cotton harvest is approximately 70 percent complete this week with more than 73,000 bales being reported in Bailey County and the surrounding area.

The fifteen rural gins in Bailey County report 43,965 bales of cotton received and five other local gins report 10,136, with two cotton gins not reporting.

In the Lubbock area, the five gins report a total of 10,027 bales of cotton received to early afternoon Friday.

Although gins expect to be in operation up to and shortly after the first of the year, weather permitting, most cotton will be out of the fields by the end of the month.

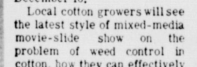

Applications Being Taken For West Point

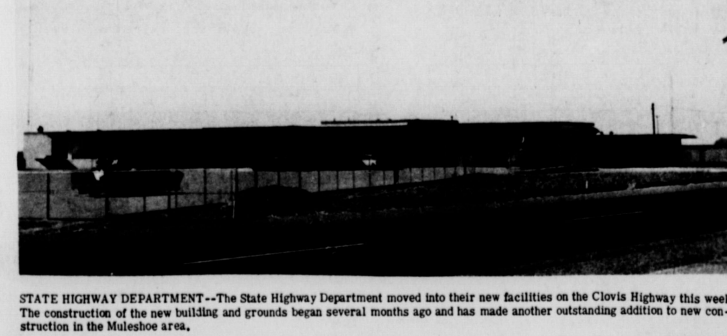
Congressman Bob Price issued an appeal today for more applications from Panhandle youths who desire nomination to one of the nations service academies.

Parents Urged to Begin College Financing

AUSTIN--Christmas is not too early to begin thinking about one of the largest purchases in a lifetime--college education. Edward Carpenter, director of Student Financial Aids at The University of Texas, reminds parents that arrangements for college financing can begin as far in advance as nine months.

parents should be aware of several changes contained in the Higher Education Act of 1968 which affect federally-assisted student aid programs. An example of change is the expansion of the National Defense Loan programs. Carpenter said the revision eliminates the "special academic consideration" clause and makes the program "more

consistent with other federal aid programs." The applicability of the Educational Opportunity Grants program was also expanded. Maximum grants were raised from \$800 to \$1,000. However, due to budget cuts, there will be a 78 per cent reduction in the number of first-time awards in the fall of 1969. Renewal awards will not be

affected. The grants can be no more than one-half the total assistance given a student, but under the new legislation, Work-Study earnings can be used for matching funds. This change is expected to reduce loan indebtedness incurred by aid recipients. Carpenter explained that previously only loans or scholarships were used as matching funds.

The allowable interest rate was increased from 6 per cent to 7 per cent for loans made under the Guaranteed Loan Program. This change is expected to make the program more attractive to lending banks. The Federal Government pays all of the interest while the borrower is in school if he and his family have an adjusted income of less than \$15,000 per year. Soldier's Memory Honored on Anniv. Of Pearl Harbor

Contemplating the anniversary of Pearl Harbor, Mrs. A.M. Bradley leafed through a scrapbook and came upon the story of a violin made by her

brother, T.W. Montgomery, a teacher at LaBuddie 1949-1951. The article, a part of a news bulletin written by the Seabees in March, 1944 described how Montgomery made the violin out of teak, mahogany, and other native woods while he was stationed for twenty months on the Island of Guadalcanal. It was said to be both beautiful and played musically and is still in use in a home orchestra of a nephew, John Montgomery, who lives at Eloy, Arizona.

The chin rest was made of balsa. He shaped the ribs by boiling and lashing them around beer bottles to take their shape. Keys for the violin were patterned from the ash legs of a broken G.I. cot. His only tools were a couple of files, a knife and a coping saw.

T.W. Montgomery died in November, 1960 and his widow lives in Littlefield, where she is a teacher.

Mrs. Bradley feels that this story of how a lonely soldier occupied his time should be told to honor the memories of soldiers who spent months and months away from their homes to serve their country.

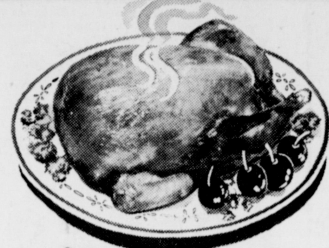

1st Christian Church To Burn Mortgage

December 8 will be a date to be registered in the history of First Christian Church, Muleshoe, as this is the day long looked for when the mortgage on the building can be burned. All members, past and present, and more particularly the charter members of the church are urged to be present to help in the celebration which is to be held at three o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Dudley Strain, pastor of First Christian Church, Lubbock, is to bring the principal address. Dr. Strain served as one of the trustees signing the loan application. Johnny Moore, a former minister, will also be present and will introduce charter members and past ministers. Mr. G.T. Maltby will also have a part on program.

Mrs. Thorman White has written a history of the church, which is published below.

The First Christian Church of Muleshoe was organized June 15, 1950 after a revival meeting held by Rev. L.C. Reese, National Evangelist for the Christian Churches.

The organization committee was headed by Mr. Glenn T. Maltby. Members assisting him were Clyde Bray Sr., Mrs. R.R. Holton, Mr. and Mrs. D.R. Aylesworth, John Dudley and Mrs. Jack Epps.

Mr. Maltby was elected chairman, Clyde Bray as Treasurer, Frances Roy as secretary and John Roy as pastor. Bible School Superintendent. It was decided to keep the charter membership open until January 1, 1951.

The Charter Members were: Mr. and Mrs. D.R. Aylesworth, Mr. and Mrs. L.M. Bell, Jr., Mr. Clyde Bray Sr., Mrs. H.M. Bryant, Mr. and Mrs. John Roy, Mrs. Jack Epps, Mrs. Neil Rockey, Mr. W.F. Creamer, Mr. and Mrs. John Dudley, Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Smith, Mrs. W.D. Moore, Mrs. Leota Willterding, Mrs. R.R. Holton, Mr. James Case, Mr. and Mrs. G.T. Maltby, Mr. Otto Smith, Mr. Ed Edmiston, Mr. Charles Lonn, and Miss Frances Roy, Mr. and Mrs. L.C. Reese.

At the beginning services were held in a rented building at 26 East Ave. D. After a short time the church purchased the house of worship formerly occupied by the Primitive Baptist Church, located in the Garlin Addition. In August 1950, Frank Reese was called to serve as the first minister of the new congregation. He served until the early summer of 1951.

The Muleshoe C.W.F. was organized November 13, 1950. Mrs. Rector of the C.W.F. of The First Christian Church of Lubbock helped. The officers were as follows: Mrs. Pearl Moore, President, Mrs. Helen Holton, Vice President, Mrs. Margaret Epps, Secretary-Treasurer, Mrs. Leota Willterding, Worship Chairman, Mrs. Jean Aylesworth, Study Chairman, Mrs. Mary Bell Service Chairman.

In late summer of 1951 the present site of the church was purchased. The First Christian Church of Lubbock helped financially.

April 1952 Johnny Moore drove from Canyon, where he was in college, to preach on Sundays. He moved to Muleshoe in June of 1952. Johnny served the church that summer, and later returned to Canyon where he could serve the church while there was no minister.

In April of 1953 a lay-minister from Levelland, Vincent Larson, was called to preach. He was a good worker for a limited ministry. He resigned in January 1954. Thereafter, except for Sunday morning services conducted by laymen from the Christian Churches of Lubbock and the labors of Evangelist, Harvey Redford, in May of 1954, the congregation was without Ministerial oversight until November of 1954, when James Todd came to Muleshoe as a full time minister.

A short time after James Todd began his work here, H.D. Moran, Church Architect for the Texas Board of Christian Churches, came to Muleshoe. Mr. Moran was asked to draw plans for a new church plant. When these plans were submitted, in the summer of 1955, they were approved and detailed plans and specifications were thereafter prepared in order that bids might be received for construction. The building committee composed of D.R. Aylesworth, chairman, L.M. Bell Jr., and Mel Smith, J.H. Hanks, and Harry Mitchell were authorized to proceed with the plans for the new building.

The congregation was aided in financing the project by the many generous gifts from the people of the Muleshoe Community as well as from the members of the Christian Churches of District #2 of Texas. The additional necessary funds which were not thus obtained were provided by a loan from the Board of Church Extension of the Christian Churches. In May of 1956 James Todd resigned as the minister to take the church at Plains, Texas. The takeover, a lay preacher from Lubbock supplied the pulpit on Sunday mornings until near the close of August, 1956. At that time Dean Smith moved

splendid progress was noted. A substantial number was added to the membership and the stewardship of the group made a healthy growth. In June of 1962 Ray completed his studies at Tech and was graduated with honors. He resigned July 1, 1962 to accept a call to the Christian Church at Olney, Texas.

From the time of the departure of Ray Vinson the pulpit of the church was filled from Sunday to Sunday by laymen sent to us from the Christian Churches of Lubbock. These men rendered a very valuable service in keeping the membership together and active in the work until another minister could be located.

In March of 1963 David Branson was called as minister of the church. He served until May 1964. Mr. Frank Koistra of Lubbock was good enough to drive to Muleshoe every Sunday to preach, and visiting Sunday afternoons until August 1964. Charles Grow was called to minister to the First Christian Church August 9, 1964. Charles (Chuck) Grow served well until October 1966. At a Special Board Meeting on June 10, 1966 the high honor of "Elder Emeritus" was bestowed on Mr. Glenn Maltby. During the time the church was without a minister from October 1966 until September 1967, Mr. Frank Koistra again came to the rescue by serving as interim pastor.

Beginning September 1, 1967 Rev. Walter Bartholf came to The First Christian Church of Muleshoe as her minister.

to Muleshoe to assume the duties as resident minister. He remained with the Muleshoe church until early in the spring of 1957 at which time he resigned. Thereafter, until September 1959, the burden of Sunday services was carried by Johnnie More with short periods of vacation during the ad-interim ministries of Brother Brown and Brother Taylor.

In September of 1959 Ray Vinson was called to be the part time minister of the First Christian Church. During his ministry here Ray carried a full course of study at Tech in Lubbock. During the 34 months that he spent here

Nursery News

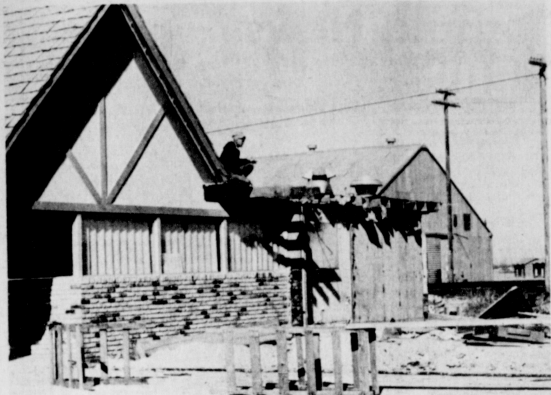
We often divide trees into about three or four categories, that is the shade trees, fruit trees, and evergreens. There is, of course, some overlapping and to go further they should be divided by either evergreen and deciduous, and then the further division made. Here on the plains we prefer to stick to the mixed division and call them by use. The shade trees are very nice when the sun is really boiling down. The fruit trees are a dual purpose in that they furnish a break or shade as well as producing fruit on an occasional year. The evergreens are in a class by themselves because of the fact that they do not shed the leaves or needles. We covered some of the more popular shade trees this close to the season that we often hunt some greenery. Now we will deal with some of the more popular evergreens.

The cedar is the one that gets most of the credit for being evergreen. To a lot of people the cedar covers the entire lot. Upon closer examination we find the pine, spruce, juniper, magnolia, some of the olive family in the ligustrums that develop into trees, and some few more are adapted to this area. Again the ones that are evergreen here might be deciduous in a temperature zone cooler than ours.

The pine makes a very nice specimen tree and can be used for the same purpose as some of the trees planted primarily for shade. They are, by nature, a rather tall tree and is unique in that the pine will sing in the wind where other trees will not. The pinon, or N.M. state tree is of the pine family. Some consider the spruce the "elite" of the evergreens. That is the Colorado blue spruce. There are several other spruce and they are all symmetrical and usually fill from the ground up to a point.
