## Rural Telephone Expansion Project Completed on Schedule August 1st

Residents of a large area surrounding Haskell now have the convenience of telephone service as a result of the completion last week of a rural telephone extension program out of Haskell by General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The rural project was started in February, and was completed on schedule last week. It involved extending telephone facilities to serve 141 applicants in all areas surrounding the city.

All rural patrons served by the project have complete local facilities through the Haskell exchange, and they now enjoy the same convenience in communications as patrons residing within the city limits.

Extension of rural telephone service to a wide area in the vicinity of Haskell has been a major goal of civic leaders, Chamber of Commerce and City officials.

Some two years ago, at the request of the city and the C. of C., General Telephone Company started plans for a survey of the rural project, and later presented results of the survey to the City Council for approval. In connection with the heavy investment required in construction of the rural lines, the City Council approved a rate increase for the company to become effective on completion of the expansion program.

The Haskell rural project fills a long-desired need expressed by local business men and rural residents for extension of telephone service to a wider area surrounding the city.

## Lions to Sponsor Sales of Items Made by the Blind

Members of Haskell Lions Club will assume the role of door-to-door salesmen Monday, Aug. 13, when they stage the club's annual sale of brooms, mops, floor mats, etc. Proceeds from the sale will help provide employment for some 400 blind men and women in Texas working in lighthouses and other workshops for the blind. Lions retain a share of the proceeds for local purposes.

Brooms and other articles will be placed on sale in the business district Monday morning, and Lions will make a canvass of each retail store and business establishment.

Also during the day the sales drive will be extended to the residential sections of town.

The sales campaign, known as Caravan Sales for the Blind, have been held annually by several Lions Clubs in this section, and have met with generous support from the public.

## City To Ask for Water Rights On North Paint Creek Site

The City of Haskell will file an application with the State Water Board for a permit to impound waters of North Paint Creek as a source of municipal water, it was announced following a special meeting of the City Council.

Meeting with the Council were several members of the C. of C. water resources committee, and J. R. Coody, Jr., one of the owners of the Coody Ranch where the proposed city lake would be located.

Decision to file for the permit came after a lengthy discussion and study of a report made by Earnest Yeatts, Abilene engineer.

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State Water Board, the City will enter into an agreement with Coody on price to be paid for land required, and other matters relative to the proposed lake, if the permit is granted and a municipal water supply developed. If for any reason the city is unable to go into the project, the agreement will be cancelled, Coody and city officials agreed.

It will be likely 10 days or two weeks before the application is filed with the State Board, city officials indicated.

To Protect City's Interest

Decision to file for the North Paint Creek water does not mean that the City is committed to go into the project immediately, but if granted will assure that the water supply will be available if the City is able to develop it within a reasonable time.

Because wells which now furnish the city with domestic water have been diminishing during the past several months, the C. of C. Water Resources committee has recommended that efforts be made to develop an additional source.

City officials have cooperated and several weeks ago authorized the Abilene engineer to make a survey of the potential supply of water which might be developed with a municipal lake on the Coody Ranch.

The Council also has been given an estimate of the cost of securing water from the lake built on Paint Creek by the City of Stamford, which is now furnishing that city and Hamlin with domestic and industrial water.

## Mrs. J. W. Henshaw Dies Aug. 4 After Long Illness

Mrs. J. W. Henshaw, 74, resident of Haskell County for more than 50 years, died at 4:40 a. m. Saturday in the Haskell Hospital. She had been in failing health since 1950.

Funeral for Mrs. Henshaw was held at 3 p. m. Sunday, with the Rev. H. G. Hammer, retired Baptist minister and longtime friend of the family officiating, assisted by the Rev. Sam Reddell.

Burial was in Willow Cemetery under direction of Holden Funeral Home.

A native of Arkansas, she was born July 16, 1882 in Washington County. She came to Texas with her parents, and was married to W. H. Speer Oct. 1, 1896, in McLennan County. Her second husband was J. W. Henshaw, and they were married July 2, 1908 in Bell County.

Mr. and Mrs. Henshaw moved to Haskell County in the later part of 1905 and settled in the old Rose community east of Haskell where he engaged in farming for a number of years. In recent years they lived in Haskell. Mr. Henshaw preceded his wife in death on Dec. 3, 1953. Two sons also preceded their mother in death. One son, Lieut. Marvin J. Henshaw died in the Southwest Pacific during World War II, and a younger son, James O. Henshaw died Sept. 7, 1955.

Mrs. Henshaw had been a lifelong member of the Baptist Church.

She is survived by 11 sons, D. L. (Jack) Speer of Haskell, G. H. Henshaw of Abilene, E. B. C. M. H. S. and W. J. Henshaw, all of Fort Worth, L. H. Henshaw of Waco, M. F. and O. H. Henshaw of Haskell, R. C. Henshaw of Tulsa, Okla., and A. A. Henshaw of Lamesa; 21 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren; and three sisters, Mrs. W. H. Arthur of Harlingen, Mrs. Ann Kieselberg of Oklahoma City, Okla., and Mrs. Allie Miller of Waco.

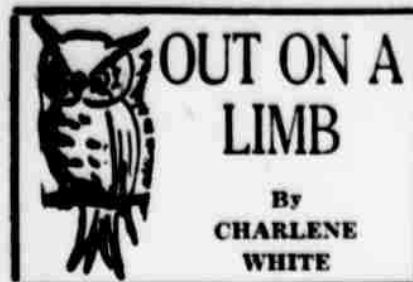

Mr. and Mrs. Hoie Harrel returned recently from an extended tour of the Northwest and Canada. The Haskell couple was in a party of 191 Texas people making the seventh annual Murray Cox-WFFA Farm Tour.

Traveling in a 15-car special train which left from Dallas, the first stop was at Des Moines, Iowa. Chartered buses met the train and carried the tourists to Willard's Restaurant for breakfast, where Iowa Governor Leo Hoegh was speaker.

While in Des Moines the party visited the state capitol, with the train emerging from the tunnel going almost in the opposite direction from which it entered while traveling only three-fifths of a mile. In eleven miles the railroad crosses the Kicking Horse River five times.

When the train reached Creston and Nelson, they were beneficiaries of Canadian hospitality. They were met by 50 private cars for a 45-minute trip through the very fertile valley. The city of Nelson boasts it never knows a "boom" or "bust."

The trip was through one of the most interesting areas in Canada, the Duhobor district. The Duhobors are a religious sect from Russia. They reject all governmental authority, and refuse to register births, deaths or marriages or permit their children to attend school. Some of them believe in nudism. At Caselgar a group of Duhobors met the special train at the station and sang in the Russian language. The leader of this group is the grandson of the founder of the religious sect.

At Vancouver the tourists attended the Theatre Under the Stars, where they saw "The Merry Widow" presented by the Vancouver Civic Theatre Society.

They made an overnight trip to Victoria on the steamer "Princess Elizabeth." The morning trip was to the world-famous Burchart Gardens and Dominion Experimental Station. The return trip to the United States was made by the "Princess Elizabeth" through the Juan de Fuca Straits.

Their next stop was at La Grande, Oregon, "the Switzerland of America." Then at Sun Valley, Idaho they rode the longest ski lift in the world to the summit of Baldy Mountain, 9,240 feet high. The lift is called "the stairway to the stars."

Final stop on the tour was in Central City, Colo., fabulous mining town of the gold rush days. The tourists were entertained at a matinee of the opera, "The Ballad of Baby Doe," presented in the world-famed Central City Opera House.

From Central City the party started the final stage of their trip to Dallas.

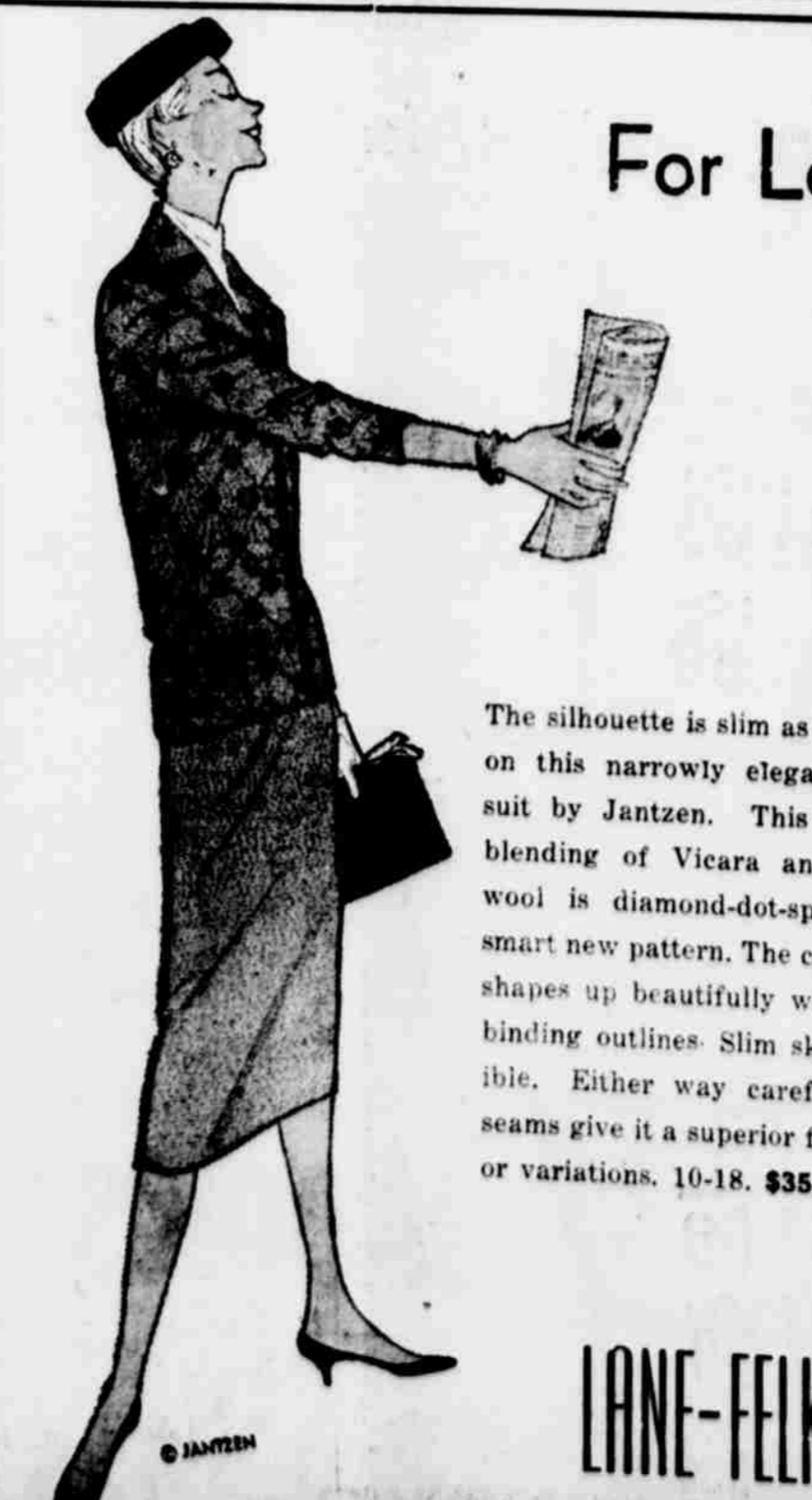

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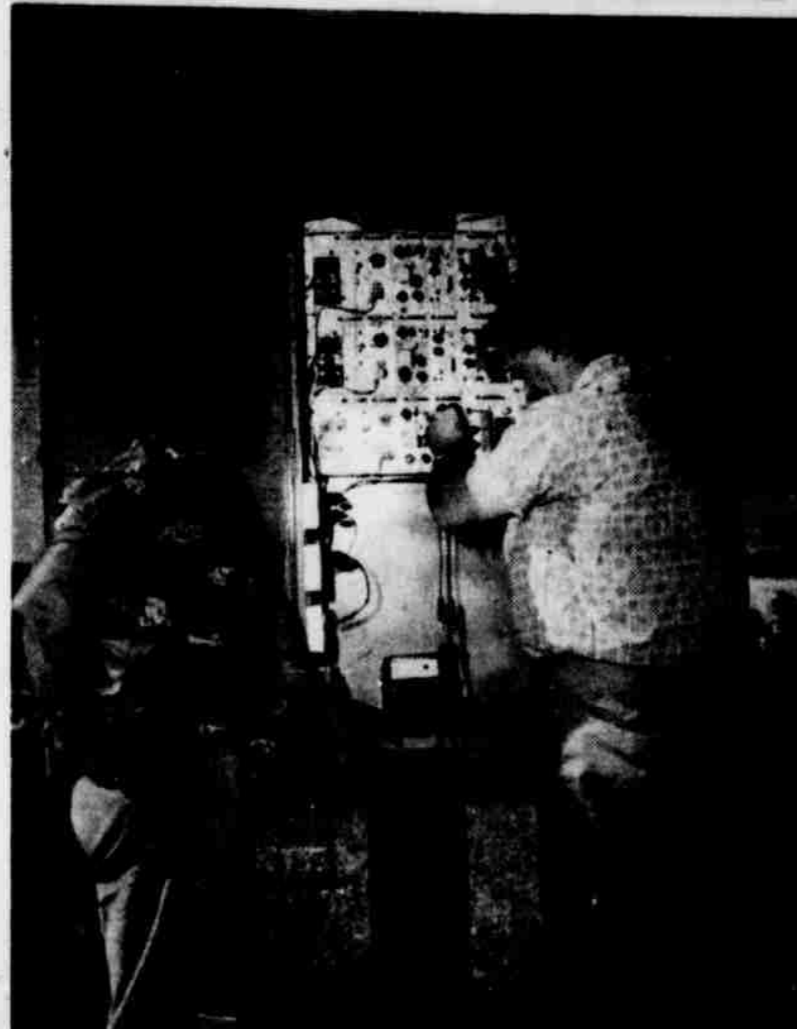

Aikin Withdraws  
As Candidate for  
Lt. Governor

The name of Ben Ramsey will be listed as the lone candidate for Lieutenant Governor on the ballot for the Aug. 25 runoff primary.

Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Lamar County, announced his withdrawal from the race last week because of health reasons.

State Democratic Chairman George Sandlin wrote all county chairmen directing them to put Ramsey's name on the ballot but to leave off Aikin's.

Ramsey will be certified as the Democratic nominee following the Aug. 25 election. He led Aikin by about 270,000 votes in the first primary but failed to get a majority over all three opponents—Aikin, John Lee Smith and C. T. Johnson.

The action will reduce to two the number of contested races for statewide office in the runoff. Those will be Price Daniel and Ralph Yarborough for Governor and Will Wilson and Tom Moore, Jr., for Attorney General.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by The City Council of Stamford, Texas:

That the Honorable W. B. Harrison, Mayor of the City of Stamford, Texas, proclaim August 9, 1956, as an official "Rainy Day" for the City of Stamford, Texas, and all surrounding territory and enjoin and request the prayers and hopes of all people that such day will in fact be a rainy day, but that although it may be a dry rainy day, it is the hope of this Council that this "reclamation will promote better spirits and humor among the people.

### Voters Will Ballot Nov. 6 on Nine Amendments

Texas voters will ballot on nine proposed amendments to the State constitution in November. Eight of the amendments will appear on the ballot of the General Election to be held Tuesday, Nov. 6.

Through an error in drawing up the amendments, proposal No. 9 was scheduled for the second Tuesday in November, the 13th, one week after the General Election. This will require the holding of a separate statewide election for balloting on the single amendment.

The amendments are as follows:  
No. 1 HJR 31—Permits compensation to person imprisoned for offense not committed.  
No. 2 HJR 23—Gives commissioners court additional taxing power.

No. 3 HJR 15—Relates to building program at State institutions of higher learning.

No. 4 HJR 5—For a better teacher retirement system.

No. 5 HJR 2—Increasing Veterans Land Fund by \$100,000,000.

No. 6 HJR 46—Relating to oaths of office of State officers.

No. 7 HJR 11—Pertaining to commitment of persons of unsound mind.

No. 8 HJR 9—Allows judge to deny bail to person twice convicted of felony.

No. 9 HJR 30—Relating to physically handicapped.

Resolution No. 1

WHEREAS, the members of the Democratic Party in Texas have always striven to make their party one of integrity and honor, and

WHEREAS, leaders of the state government in 1952, led by Governor Allan Shivers, seized control of the Democratic Party and brought shame and disgrace upon it by turning its machinery over to the Republican candidate, and

WHEREAS, by abuse of his power and control of the state machinery, Allan Shivers forced the state Committee and state convention to endorse his traitorous acts, and

WHEREAS, Allan Shivers has wielded his power by disregarding and overriding the caucus selection of the Democrats elected by their counties and by refusing to seat other legally elected delegations, and

WHEREAS, it became necessary for Speaker Sam Rayburn and Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson to aid the Democrats of Texas in re-building their party, and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of these two great Democrats, the Democrats of Texas in May took major steps in re-establishing the party's integrity by electing a delegation to the National Convention pledged to Senator Lyndon Johnson as President and to support the nominee of the convention, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Democrats of Haskell County believe the Democratic Party belongs to all the Democrats and should never again become the property of one man or clique, and

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be mailed to the Hon. Sam Rayburn, and to Senator Johnson,

Resolution No. 2 WHEREAS, We the delegates to the Haskell County Democratic Convention, meeting in the District Court Room in Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, on this the 4th day of August 1955, declare ourselves to be Democrats assembled under the provisions of the election laws of Texas; and

WHEREAS, We have those among us who call themselves Democrats and vote in our Democratic primaries, but bolt the Democratic Party in the general election and vote for candidates who are not Democrats; candidates who have cross-filed their names on the Republican ticket and fought for the election of Republican candidates. We as Democrats loyal to the cause of Democracy, look with fear and distrust on a candidate for public office who have cross-filed his name, and worked for the election of a candidate of another party; we feel he has no place on the Democratic ticket, and that he is unworthy of the confidence and support of any voter. He has betrayed the Democratic Party that elected him. We feel him irresponsible to his trust, that he would betray his trust, and vote and work for the party candidate that offered him the most power and money; and we look with doubt and disfavor on any voter who deserted the Democratic Party and voted for the nominees of another party, and we hereby go on record refusing any person a vote in this convention who bolted the Democratic Party in 1954, until he or she say they are now Democrats and will, if called upon sign a pledge they will support the nominees of the Democratic Party from the precinct level to the Presidency of the United States; and we go on record as refusing any person who bolted the Democratic ticket in 1954, a place as delegate or alternate to our State Democratic Convention to be held in Fort Worth, Texas, September 11, 1956, and we hereby

RESOLVE, that we will send only delegates to our State Convention who are loyal Democrats, and our delegation to our State Convention is hereby instructed to vote as a unit on all matters coming before the State Convention, to hold caucuses on controversial matters and resolutions, and to vote as a unit on the judgment of a majority of the delegates.

Resolution No. 3 WHEREAS, there is a run-off in the Texas Democratic Party for office of Governor of the State, and in order that the people be better informed as to the intents, purposes and platforms of the candidates thereof, the secretary of this County Convention is hereby requested to send by registered mail the following inquiry to each of the candidates for Governor:

1. If elected Governor will you oppose both a Texas sales tax and a Texas State income tax, and veto such measures if they are placed before you?

2. From what source do you propose to raise the revenue to carry out the projects outlined in your platform?

3. Will you support an increase in the Texas Production Tax on Natural Gas?

4. Will you actively support the nominee of the Democratic Party for President of the United States?

In addition to forwarding this resolution by registered mail to the candidates for Governor, the secretary is hereby authorized to release this resolution to the press, in order that the people be as fully informed as possible. In fairness to all concerned it is hereby noted that failure of any candidate to reply shall be construed as a negative answer. Mr. Wright and other directors and officials of the company were introduced by A. C. Pierson, host director. In turn, Wright praised the Haskell banker for his local service on the executive board of the company.

Following the luncheon, Wright in a brief talk outlined the operations of the company to local business men and guests, giving them an insight into the problems of the industry.

He stressed as important factors in the efficient organization and management of public service corporations the "securing, training, and retaining" of capable personnel. Also important is the securing of needed capital for expansion.

For every telephone in General's system, the investment is \$288, he pointed out.
