The rural project was started in February, and was completed on schedule last week. It invol-

ved extending telephone facilities to serve 141 applicants in all areas surrounding the city. All rural patrons served by the project have complete local fa-cilities through the Haskell ex-change, and they now enjoy the same convenience in communications as patrons residing within

Some two years ago, at the request of the city and the C. of C., General Telephone Company started plans for a survey of the requested project, and later presented results of the survey to the City Council for approval. In connection with the heavy investment required in construction of the rural lines, the City Council approved a rate increase

Work was started Monday morning by Felix Miller, local contractor, on a 27x30 ft. addition to the old jail building now occupied by offices of the Soil Conservation Service and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation agency.

# Pilot Escapes With Slight Bruises When Plane Stalls and Hits House

Lee Faires, 30, pilot and only occupant, said he was attempting to make an emergency landing on the highway after his motor had stalled at low altitude.

Faires, formerly of Lubbock, recently purchased the Arrow-head Courts in South Haskell and Mrs. Faires has been here in charge of the busines for the past month. Faires had been devoting part of his time to business in-terests in Lubbock and had left there in the three-place plane about 8 a. m. Sunday. Arriving here, he circled the tourist court to attract the attention of wife so she could meet him at the Stamford landing field.

When the motor in his plane stalled, Faires attempted to land on the highway. The plane bounced several times and the left wing struck a sign at the Whittington Service Station, then careened about 200 feet further down the highway and crashed into the front porch of the H. N. West home, 707 South Ave. E.

Several men at the C. R. Cook Service Station nearby saw the plane hit the house and ran to the pilot's aid. Cook and Fred Jennings helped Faires from the plane, assisted by Thurman Medford and Frank Isham. Aside from being partly dazed and with light bruises and a small cut on his forehead, Faires was unhurt and dealined the services of an ambuscuse which had been summended. Several men at the C. R. The pilot of a light plane escaped with only minor bruises when his plane crashed into the fire department, fearing that the gas might, become ignited. A truck and firemen remained at South Haskell at 9:20 Sunday the scene until the plane could

The plane, described by Faires as a "Tri Caper" was badly demolished. He estimated cost of the plane in the neighborhood of \$10,000.

tour of the Northwest and Canada. The Haskell couple was in a party of 191 Texas people making the seventh annual Murray Cox-WFFA Farm Tour.

Traveling in a 15-car special train which left from Dallas, the first stop was at Des Moines, Iowa. Chartered buses met the train and carried the tourists to Willard's Restaurant for breakfast, where Iowa Governor Leo Hoegh was speaker.

While in Des Moines the party visited the state capitol, with its dome covered with 22-carat gold leaf; the Des Moines Art Center, said to be the nation's most modern; and were guests at a spec-ial program at Meredith Publish-

ing Company.
They next visited the Hy-Line hybrid chicken farm and Pioneer Seed Corn Farm at Johnston and the Beef Nutrition Farm. Then they spent several hours inspecting the Home Eco-nomics Department of Iowa State College, the first home economics school in the country, and the largest.

Next stop was at Duluth, Minn., the air conditioned city" located on the largest fresh water lake in the world.

At Superior, Wisconsin, they embarked on a sightseeing trip by boat, "The Chicago Queen, with lunch at the famous Flame Restaurant on the waterfront. At the Superior, Wis., docks

are the largest grain elevators and the largest ore docks in the world. Each dock can accomodate an entire ore train at one time and can transfer it to a ship in 30 minutes. Also the harbor has seven docks.

Next the tourist party went to Minot, South Dakota where they saw the Garrison Dam. Located 18 miles from Garrison Dam is a radar station maintained by the U. S. in cooperation with Canada. Cost of the station was estimated in excess of 40 million dollars. The Garrison Dam s the largest rolled-fill earthern fam in the world, being two miles ong and 210 feet high.

Next on the schedule was Regina, captitol of Saskatchewan, with a population of 75,000. The visited the legislative Texans capitol, the Museum of Natural History, and a station of the Royal Mounted Police, Canada's most colorful organization. They visted the Indian Head Experiment Farm and flower gardens, and made a 30-mile drive through the Valley of the QuAppelle River.

An entire day was spent in Calgary, Canada, where the tourists attended both morning and afternoon programs of the worldrenowned Calgary Stampede, where the vistors occupied a block of reserved seats. Their train traveled through the famous Spiral Tunnel, with the train emerging from the tunnel going almost in the opposite direction from which it entered while traveling only three-fifths of a mile. In eleven miles the railroad crosses the Kicking Horse River five times.

When the train reached Creston and Nelson, they were beneficiaries of Canadian hospitality. They were met by 50 private cars for a 45-minute trip through the very fertile valley. The city of Nelson boasts it never knows a 'boom" or "bust."

The trip was through one of the most interesting areas in Canada, the Dukhobar district. The Dukhobars are a religious sect from Russia. They made an overnight trip to Victoria on the steamer "Princess Elizabeth." The morning trip was to the world-famous Burchart Gardens and Dominion Experimental Station. The return trip to the United States was made by the "Princess Elizabeth" through the Juan de Fuca Straits.

Their next stop was at La Grande, Oregon. "the Switzer-land of America." Then at Sun Valley, Idaho they rode the longest ski lift in the world to the summit of Baldy Mountain, 9,240 feet high. The lift is called "the stairway to the stars.'

Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Lamar County, announced his withdrawal from the race last week because of health reasons.


State Democratic Chairman George Sandlin wrote all county chairmen directing them to put Ramsey's name on the ballot but to leave off Aikin's.


