Dustin Favor is new Haskell Co. Game Warden

After seven months of rigorous training at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Game Warden Training Center in Hamilton County, the 60th Texas game warden cadet class held its graduation ceremony at the Texas State Capitol. The class included forty-one game warden cadets and five state park police officers.

These newly-commissioned peace officers have met the state-mandated requirements for peace officer certification, including criminal and constitutional law, firearms, self-defense, use of force, defensive driving, arrest, search and seizure, ethics and first aid.

The duties of a Texas game warden include the enforcement of all state laws, but primarily hunting, fishing and water safety regulations. As fully commissioned peace officers, they respond to emergencies, assist other law enforcement agencies and work to educate the public about conservation issues.

Serving Haskell County as a Texas Game Warden is Dustin Favor. He and his wife Danielle, a registered nurse at Haskell Memorial Hospital, have recently moved to Haskell. Born and raised in Childress, Favor has always had an interest in hunting and fishing.

After graduating Childress High School, he attended West Texas A&M in Canyon, earning a degree in Criminal Justice. Favor says his interest in becoming a game warden began while he was in high school. At fifteen years old, he had the opportunity, through a high school job shadowing program, to ride along with the game warden that served Childress. As

part of his college studies, he did an internship with Texas Parks and Wildlife. Favor says he enjoyed it so much, he continued the work even after the internship was concluded.

After college Favor began his career in criminal justice when he went to work for the Youth Center of the High Plains in Amarillo.

Although he worked several years at the Youth Center, his long time desire to be a game warden continued to grow. A very competitive academy, he was accepted for the most recent class, graduating August 2, 2016.

Favor is very excited about being in Haskell and serving the county as game warden. He says, "The people are very nice and friendly, and the community has been very accepting. I want to build a rapport with the community, as well as the hunters and fishermen. I am meeting people as I am out patrolling."

In the absence of a game warden, Haskell County has been covered for some time by game wardens from surrounding counties. Working out of the Abilene Region, Favor has an office in the courthouse. We welcome Dustin and Danielle to Haskell and wish him the very best as he begins this new career.

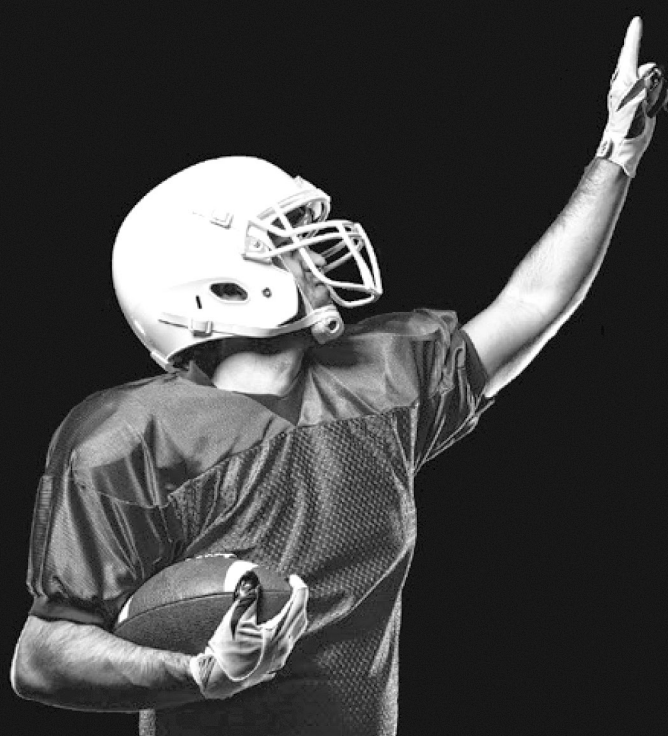

When something, or someone is very special, it needs to be celebrated. Charles Swinson, who turned 96 years old on October 3, is certainly someone special.

Special, not only to his family, but also to so many in the community. In fact, he has been honored with three birthday parties as he turned 96. Nancy Snelling at the Haskell Post Office, as well as the employees at Star Stop wanted to help him celebrate his special day by throwing him a party. First Bank Texas joined in the celebration with a cake and punch party on Monday. Friends stopped by to wish him a happy birthday.

At 96 years old, most would be content to sit in the easy chair and watch television. Charles has never been one to just sit. Even after retiring from his career job, he has stayed busy with volunteer work. At the age of 92, he and Leatrice were named Volunteers of the Year, an indication of their love and service to others in the community.

Charles says, "I believe that if you just sit in a chair after retirement, the chair will win. That is not what I wanted. So as long as my legs will let me, I will continue to be busy."

A typical day for this young 96 year old, includes breakfast at Star Stop, a trip to the post office where he also picks up mail for several people, a trip to the Bailey Toliver Chevrolet, on to the nursing home to see his wife of 74 years, then to the hospital to shave patients. He began this special practice in 1980, after he retired

and sold his cotton buying business. It is amazing the lift in spirits something so simple, can be to a patient in the hospital.

A 1938 graduate of Rochester High School, he has held many jobs in his life. From the banking business to book-keeper for several businesses to driving the ambulance, to owning his own business, he has always filled his days with productive work. In fact, he says at one time, he and Leatrice had seven side jobs. She also worked many years as a book-keeper for various businesses in town.

He makes at least two more trips each day to the nursing home, to have a snack and supper with his wife. And every other Friday, he picks up popcorn from First Bank Texas, which he delivers around town.

He has touched the lives of many as he has lived, worked and volunteered in the community, and in addition he has made a real difference in the lives of several individuals who became very dear to him.

Someone, who at 96, still mows his own grass, paints and helps so many each day, certainly deserves three birthday parties. Hope you had a great day and a wonderful year.

Recently I watched a volleyball game that taught me some valuable life lessons about leadership.

One team worked diligently to play a fundamentally beautiful game. They did a perfect bump, set, spike with each play. Their bumps (passes) were executed perfectly. Sometimes they would even sway to one side, dipping down on one bent knee with perfectly outstretched arms, delivering a perfect pass of the volleyball to their teammate.

The second team also played a great game with precision, skill and power, but their process looked a bit scrappier. They were also bumping, setting and spiking, but not always in that order or with the grace that the other team displayed. They might pass the ball and it would go directly back over the net rather than to their server as intended. Other times, they would go to the net to spike the ball and end up tangled up in it or over the line.

Guess which team won the game?

The scrappy team won. Sure, they were a strong team with some good skills, but they won because they were playing with all their heart. They left nothing on the court, and they never gave up...even when they were intimidated or made a mistake. But, how do you get a team to play with such desperation and heart?

The coach wasn't just coaching the team he was leading them to victory. He

had built a relationship with them and invested in them on and off the court. They wanted nothing more than to win...for themselves and for him. He jumped up and down, cheered, and yelled, he even flailed around like a crazy person from time to time, shaking all over with excitement for his girls. Those girls were not about to let their coach down. He was coaching with all his heart and they were playing with all their heart. And the results showed on the scoreboard. That was true leadership.

Leadership is not about a dictatorship or bullying people into making them do what you want them to do. It is not about lying to get what you want or manipulation. It is about building relationships and trusting your team. If your team can't trust you, then they won't listen to you or go the direction you want them to go. They certainly won't play hard and scrappy if they don't believe in their leader.

In small communities, budgets are always strapped, infrastructure is always in need of repair, and someone is always unhappy about something, but the heart of a small community is the reason we win the game. Our scrappiness and willingness to fight for all we have and each other is the reason Haskell continues to thrive. The people that make up the whole of this community are the reason for its success.
