

Queers, allies rally for gay rights, free speech

West Texas winds blew cardboard signs of support, but it did not stop individuals in a rally for students of Lubbock Independent School District's Gay Straight Alliance at 4 p.m. Thursday in front of the George Mahon Federal Building.

Megan Bauer, president of Texas Tech's Lambda Law Students, said the rally was a way to show support for Lubbock's Gay Straight Alliance.

"I think the main idea is to raise awareness," Bauer said. "We think (the ruling) is a disservice to the youth of the high school."

Last week, U.S. District Judge Sam Cummings ruled in favor of LISD concerning the lawsuit with the GSA.

Cummings ruled LISD did not infringe on the First Amendment Rights or the Equal Access Act of the Lubbock High School GSA when LISD denied students the right to meet on school property.

Cheyenne White, president of Tech's Queers and Allies, said she hopes the rally shows numerous gay organizations are concerned about the issue.

"As gay students we have the same rights as other students," White said. "I disagree with the ruling because they ruled on the fact that the GSA had a link to gay.com. That's absolutely absurd. The Web site does not promote sex."

White said because the Web site had an advertisement that was sexual, the entire site was considered sexual material.

Cummings released a statement outlining his reasons for the decision and saying he ruled as he did because of the sexual content of the group's Web site.

"In summation, this case has nothing to do with a denial of rights to students because of their sexual viewpoints," Cummings said in his statement. "It is instead an assertion of a school's right not to surrender control of the public school system to students and erode a community's standard of what subject matter is considered obscene and inappropriate. At some point, a line must be drawn that considers the proper subject matter allowed in the schools of this city."

Cummings was unable to comment fur-

Lubbock was the first stop in Aerosmith's 40-city North American tour. Cheap Trick opened for Aerosmith and was booed by the loyal Texas Tech crowd when the lead singer made a negative comment about men's basketball coachBob Knight's guitar skills.

Scott Graves, a senior agriculture economics major from Bronte, was one of the students angered by Cheap Trick's comments.

"They dissed Bobby Knight," he said. "I am glad the whole crowd booed them."

Sandy Gellner, a United Spirit Arena employee



said the crowd was more excited about Aerosmith than Cheap Trick.

"People were still standing in line and asking where they could smoke when Cheap Trick was playing the crowd is obviously more excited about Aerosmith," she said.

The crowd was a mixture of teenagers and die-hard Aerosmith fans that have followed the bands career from their start in the early '70s.

Cathy Sheppard and her daughter Tiffanie Sheppard traveled from Amarillo to hear the legendary rock band.

"We had to come - it's Aerosmith for crying out

Terrorist bombs kills more than 190 in Madrid

FATAL EXPLOSION: Bombs hidden in backpacks blow apart four commuter trains; about 1,200 are wounded.

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A series of bombs hidden in backpacks exploded in quick succession Thursday, blowing apart four commuter trains and killing at least 192 people and wounding 1,200. Spain blamed Basque separatists but a shadowy group claimed responsibility in the name of al-Qaida for the worst terrorist attack in Spain's

Panicked commuters trampled on each other, abandoning their bags and shoes, after two of the bombs went off in one train in the Atocha station in the heart of Madrid. Train cars were turned into twisted wrecks and platforms were strewn with corpses. Cell phones rang unanswered on the bodies of the dead as frantic relatives tried to

"March 11, 2004, now holds its place in the history of infamy," Prime Minister Jose Maria

Aznar said. The bombing came three days ahead of Spain's general election, which is on Sunday. A major campaign issue was how to deal with ETA, the Basque militant group.

Campaigning for the election was called off and three days of mourning were declared.

It was also 2 1/2 years after the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks in New York and Washington, and was Europe's worst since the bombing of a Pan Am jetliner over Lockerbie, Scotland, in 1988 killed 270 people,

The 10 backpack bombs exploded in a 15minute span, starting about 7:39 a.m., on trains along nine miles of commuter line from Santa Eugenia to the Atocha terminal, a bustling hub for subway, commuter and long-distance trains just south of the famed Prado Museum. Police also found and detonated three other bombs.

"An act of barbaric terrorism has engulfed Spain with profound pain, repulsion and anger," King Juan Carlos of Spain said on national television.

Worst hit was a double-decker train at El Pozo station, where two bombs killed 70 people, fire department inspector Juan Redondo said. One corpse was blown onto the roof.

At the Santa Eugenia station, "there was one carriage totally blown apart. People were scattered all over the platforms. I saw legs and arms. I won't forget this ever. I've seen horror," said Enrique Sanchez, an ambulance worker.

Forty coroners worked to identify remains, the national news agency Efe said, and a steady stream of taxis carried relatives to a sprawling convention center that was turned into a makeshift morgue. The government called for nationwide anti-ETA

rallies for Friday evening, and millions were expected to attend. Three days of national mourning were declared.

Who carried out the highly coordinated attack was a mystery. The Spanish government put the Basque separatist group ETA at the top of its list of suspects, although a shadowy group claimed responsibility in the name of al-Qaida.

Butler's sentencing brings mixed reactions

The sentencing of former Texas Tech Health Sciences Center professor Dr. Thomas Butler on Wednesday caused mixed feelings among Tech employees and students.

U.S. District Court Judge Sam Cummings sentenced Butler to two years in prison and more than \$58,000 in fines for charges related to the January 2003 bubonic plague a comment on the judge's ruling. scare in Lubbock.

Rachael Treadwell, a restaurant, hotel and institutional management major from El Campo, said Butler's sentencing fit the

"He brought the germs over illegally," she said. "He put a lot of people's health in jeopardy."

Butler should have found a different method of transporting the bacteria, Treadwell said.

"I agree that he probably had good intentions," she said. "But there is a legal way to go about all of that, and he could have."

The two years Butler must be separated from his loved ones is sad, but Treadwell said he should have known the consequences beforehand.

"I'm sorry he's going to miss out on his family," she said. "But one of his family members could have gotten sick from that."

Butler settled with Tech's Health Sciences Center a month ago, paying \$250,000 and agreeing to retire from his position at the university. Butler also surrendered his Texas medical license.

(AP) — Lubbock police arrested four teenagers Thursday in connection with the vandalism of a mosque over the weekend.


Assistant Police Chief Thomas Esparza said the crime is "hateful," but is no longer being investigated as a federal hate crime.

The Arabic newspaper Al-Quds al-Arabi said it had received a claim of responsibility issued in the name of al-Qaida.

The e-mail claim, signed by the shadowy Brigade of Abu Hafs al-Masri, was received at the newspaper's London offices and said the brigade's "death squad" had penetrated "one of the pillars of the crusade alliance, Spain."

"This is part of settling old accounts with Spain, the crusader, and America's ally in its war against Islam," the claim said.

Spain had backed the U.S.-led war on Iraq despite domestic opposition, and many al-Qaida-linked terrorists have been captured in Spain or were believed to have operated from there.

Spain's government is studying the reported al-Qaida claim but still believes ETA is more likely responsible, a senior official in Aznar's office said.

Spain's security forces were not ruling out "any line of investigation," In-

terior Minister Angel Acebes said.

The United States believes Al-Masri sometimes claims to be acting on behalf of al-Qaida, and it later turns out they were not. For example, they took credit for blackouts in the United States and London last year.

A U.S. counterterrorism official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said it was too early to determine who was responsible. The official noted that al-Qaida usually does not take responsibility for attacks.

If the attack was carried out by ETA, it could signal a radical and lethal change of strategy for the group that has largely targeted police and politicians in its decades-long fight for a separate Basque homeland.

But after police found a stolen van with seven detonators and the Arabic-language tape parked in a suburb near where the stricken trains originated, Interior Minister Angel Acebes said: "I have just given instructions to the security forces not to rule out any line of investigation.'

A top Basque politician, Arnold Otegi, denied ETA was behind the blasts and blamed "Arab resistance," noting Spain's support for the Iraq war. 1968.

The government said ETA had tried a similar attack on Christmas Eve, placing bombs on two trains bound for a Madrid station that was not hit Thursday.

"ETA had been looking for a massacre," said Acebes, the interior minister. "Unfortunately, today it achieved its goal.'

The Interior Ministry said tests showed the explosives used in the attacks were a kind of dynamite normally used by ETA.

The bombers used titadine, a kind of compressed dynamite also found in a bomb-laden van intercepted last month as it headed for Madrid, a source at Aznar's office said, speaking on condition of ano-

In a break with past ETA tactics, there were multiple attacks and no advance warning. ETA has usually gone after one target at a time and the largest casualty toll was 21 killed in 1987.

Former police chief First negative ads of Sharon questioned campaign released suing city of Dallas

DALLAS (AP) - Fired Dallas Police Chief Terrell Bolton on Thursday sued the city and the city manager who abruptly dismissed him six months ago, claiming wrongful termination and seeking more than \$5 million in damages.

City Manager Ted Benavides cited poor job performance in firing Bolton. the city's first black police chief, in August. Bolton's lawsuit argues that, according to the city charter, he should have been demoted rather than fired outright.

"I regret that it has come to this," Bolton said in a news release. "But we tried to give the city a chance to do the right thing and they refused."

Janice Moss, assistant city attorney, said the lawsuit has no merit.

"What the city did is appropriate under the law and the city will pre-

vail in the suit," Moss said. She said the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled in a separate case in 2003 that the section of the Dallas city charter that regulates firits ability to remove them.

Bolton is suing for damages that include loss of income and benefits, attorneys' fees, defamation of character, mental anguish and emotional dis-

"Mr. Bolton has suffered, and continues to suffer damages to his good name and reputation," the lawsuit states. "He and his family have been unjustifiably scorned and ridiculed by the media and the public. Mr. Bolton was rendered incapable of securing suitable employment."

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush unleashed the first negative ads of the general election campaign Thursday, accusing Demo-

cratic rival John Kerry of seeking to raise taxes by \$900 billion and wanting to "delay defending America." "John Kerry: Wrong on taxes. Wrong on defense," says an an-

nouncer in a new 30-second ad that will begin airing in battleground Kerry's campaign, calling the

\$900 billion figure "completely made up," prepared a response ad titled, "Misleading America." It accuses Bush of distorting the Democrat's record while touting Kerry's middle-class tax cut plans, campaign officials said on condition of anonymity.

A second Bush ad tells voters they face choices on the economy, health care and the war on terrorism. "We can go forward with confidence, resolve and hope. Or we can turn back to the dangerous illusions ing high ranking officers only limits that terrorists are not plotting and the city's ability to retain them, not outlaw regimes are no threat," Bush says in the second ad, without mentioning Kerry by name.

> The Bush ads, unveiled by the campaign Thursday, will begin airing in 18 states Friday. In addition, Bush will begin running his first radio spot, and it will make the same high-taxes, soft-on-terorrism argument against Kerry.

The Democrat's response ad will air in some of the same states, but advisers said they were unsure how many and how much airtime Kerry could afford to buy.

IERUSALEM (AP) — Visiting American diplomats pressed Prime Minister Ariel Sharon on Thursday for more details of his proposed withdrawal from the Gaza Strip, as his top security advisers recommended Israel also dismantle as many as 24 settlements in the West Bank.

The proposed pullout from much of Gaza and parts of the West Bank is part of Sharon's plan to impose a boundary on the Palestinians, at least temporarily, if peace efforts remain

The prime minister has given few details, raising concerns in Washington and with the Palestinians that he may abandon the U.S.-backed "road map" peace plan. That strategy calls for an immediate end to violence and the creation of an independent Palestinian state alongside Israel by next year, but neither side has moved to implement it.

The U.S. diplomats arrived for a two-day visit to hear more about the withdrawal plan, said Paul Patin, spokesman for the U.S. Embassy.

Sharon's office said the prime minister met with the Americans for more than three hours, and further talks would take place Friday.

In Washington, State Department official David Satterfield said the envoys were insisting that Sharon take steps within the framework of the "road map" and contribute to creation of a Palestinian state.

Sharon's proposals "should move us toward that goal, not complicate it," said Satterfield, the deputy assistant secretary of state for the Near





Doctor: take caution with foreign food, drink

There seems no limit to where Texas Tech students are headed for spring break. Mountains or beach, whatever their forte, students should have fun with minimal risks to their health.

Dr. Kelly Bennett, medical director for Student Health Services, said students are venturing to various places including Panama City, Cancun and South Padre Island. She said people must be aware of possible medical situations they may run into when out and about.

Shelby Hogue, a senior broadcast journalism major from Rockwall, said she is journeying to Sin City for spring break. Hogue said she does not plan to spend a lot of time by the pool but plans on touring the city by foot.

Bennett said anyone spending any time in the sun should take precautions and wear sunscreen and lip gloss with SPF protection. Students going to the beach should wear sunglasses and re-apply sunscreen every two to three hours after water exposure. SPF 15 to 30 is recommended.

A good way to remember when to wear sunscreen, Bennett said, is by looking at one's shadow. A short shadow means greater sun intensity.

Though Las Vegas is known for harboring some wild parties, Hogue said she does not plan to get into too much trouble.

"I'm really excited about Vegas,"

she said, "It's ideal for drinking."

However, Hogue said she and her friends are responsible with their alcoholic intake.

"Now that I'm 22," she said, "Drinking is something we do, but it's not something we indulge in."

Las Vegas and other sunny vacation spots pose an increased threat who do choose to drink, Bennett said. When prolonged sun exposure and alcohol consumption mix, dehydration is always a risk.

Bennett suggests people avoid becoming dehydrated while drinking by making sure to drink eight ounces of water per alcoholic drink and to also remember to drink nonalcoholic drinks as well.

Eating before drinking, drinking

at a slow pace and avoiding alcohol binges are also strongly advised, Bennett said.

Laura Mills, a senior broadcast journalism major from Longview, said she is traveling to Chicago with her boyfriend to visit his parents. She said she plans to take it easy this spring

"It's not your typical party," she said. "We're gust going to sightsee the city."

Mills said she is looking forward to shopping. She said she and her boyfriend will probably only drink occasionally, taking advantage of St. Patrick's Day in Chicago.

"In Chicago, they have huge parties with green beer," she said, "because a lot of people up there are

Bennett said anyone traveling outside of the United States should be cautious when eating out at even the finest restaurants. Avoid drinks with ice in them, brush teeth with bottled water and do not eat fruit or vegetables that cannot be peeled, including salad.

"When traveling abroad one is always better off drinking bottled water," she said.

On New Year's Day, Bennett said she suffered a bad case of food poisoning because she trusted the foreign



ust a few days after Super Tuesday, the Bush campaign began running cam paign ads. No one would have given them a second look, but there was something different about them. The ads, in English and Spanish, contained references to the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11.

Critics say the ads, titled "Safer and Stronger," are in bad taste. Many are calling them atrocious because they feature wreckage from Ground Zero.

In a CNN interview Patty Casazza, who lost her husband on Sept. 11, said, "I find it offensive that he's used 9/11 as a pretext for re-election."

Casazza went on to claim the ads are inaccurate because Bush has not made this country stronger; she says Bush could have prevented the tragedy and thus is advertising his mistake.

Bush Camp quickly came out in defense

"I think it's very tasteful. It's a reminder of our shared experience as a nation. I mean Sept. 11 is not just some distant tragedy from the past, it really defined our future," former Bush adviser Karen Hughes said in an in-

It's really hard to agree with someone who could possibly be trivializing a great national catastrophe to help re-elect a president, but I almost do (key word: almost)

The controversial commercials do serve as an emotional reminder. And I agree the tragedy is too recent to forget. But Hughes is dead wrong when she says it is "very tasteful." It is not just country singers that have gotten into promoting their product with an event that caused our country so much pain. This has been going on since Sept. 12, 2001. Some might have even skipped solidarity and began to think of marketing ideas right after they heard the news.

I have seen everything from T-shirts, to calendars, to mock \$2001 bills with George W. Bush's face on the front.

There were other instances where people thought they were making a "tribute" to those who died, when in essence they were just trivializing the fact that almost 3,000 people were killed in the attacks.

There are appropriate ways to remember and to honor the victims of Sept. 11, their families and even America. But it's hard to know if it is all about reverence when ringing in the background is a sales pitch like this: "It's a tribute to the victims and their families. All you have to do is send \$19.95 and we'll send you your Sept. 11 teddy bear with the American Flag on its tummy."

Relay team to compete against NCAA's best Red Raiders to play

'We want to be All-American," junior Licretia Sibley said.

The Texas Tech women's 4x400 relay track team is headed to the NCAA Indoor Championships in Fayetteville, Ark., today through Saturday. After running a time of 3:33.85, breaking the Tech's previous indoor and outdoor records, the four runners will get their shot at a higher level of competition, one that can only be described in two words.

"Real tough," junior Shereefa Lloyd said.

Lloyd also had some other words for the runners she expects to see, and a sigh of hope in her statement.

"I think we will compete with people at the Olympic level," Lloyd said. "I just hope we finish in the top eight and be All-Americans."

Sophomore Tori Polk said she will not predict a certain position for Tech's finish in the race.

"I'm hoping we'll be on top somewhere," she said. "I can't say a specific spot. I know we want to drop our time." Out of about 330 schools, 10 teams

get invited to join the 4x400 women's relay team competition at nationals. With Tech having the seventh fastest time of the indoor season, the Red Raiders were asked to attend the event and will compete with the fastest runners in the nation.

Head coach Wes Kittley said after the Big 12 tournament, the foursome is looking for a little revenge.

"At that tournament, Baylor knocked the baton out of one of our girls' hands, so we were disqualified," he said. "We want to move it to another level at this one, and we want to reach the top eight."

Kittley said the request Tech received to join the national event shows the potential of the runners.

"I think it is pretty phenomenal. I didn't dream that they would break both the records, and with the four of them running, it shows what they can do," he said. "We must be doing something to get invited."

Prior to breaking the school record, Kittley said the team was hard to get going because of health issues.

"We got off to a slow start at the beginning of the season," he said. "One had a sore hamstring, another wasn't up to par. We struggled to get them all healthy. Now, they have all

Knight: revenge should not be factor in game against Colorado

DALLAS - It doesn't matter to Texas Tech basketball coach Bob Knight that his fifth-seeded team lost to Colorado on Feb. 18 in Boulder, Colo.

If his team would have won, he still would feel the same way he does going into today's game against the fourth-seeded Buffaloes to begin Big 12 Tournament play for both teams.

"Any time you play a team again, no matter how the first time goes, you always hope you have better focus and limit mistakes," Knight said. "It's not just because we lost. I'd feel the same if we had won the game."

In the game less than a month ago, the Red Raiders (21-9, 9-7 Big 12) were beaten 85-75. The game was paced by CU's two main threats in center David Harrison and guard Michel Morandais, who had 24 and 22 points respectively. Harrison also grabbed 10 rebounds and rejected seven Tech shots.

Tech forward Devonne Giles led the Raiders with 18 points and 18 rebounds and has since averaged just more than 13 points per game. Emmett scored 16 in the loss.

presents many problems and plays a 16 points per game during the last six good overall game on both ends of the floor and "any team that does that is gonna be tough." Colorado is led by Harrison, who was

named first-team All-Big 12 earlier in the week. This season he has averaged 17.1 points and 8.8 rebounds per game.

Harrison has been criticized by some for being too emotional, and sometimes letting his emotions get the best of him, and it showed last season when he got in a fight with former Tech forward Pawel Storosynzki and was ejected from the game in the second half. Colorado lost the game.

Buffaloes head coach Ricardo Patton said Harrison has since grown up as a player, as well as a person.

"He's come a long way," Patton said. "He's a young person who's had a lot of attention on him, some of the instances were appropriate and some were not."

Knight said the junior is a deadly weapon for Colorado and has improved greatly since last season.

"I think he's better at everything he does (this season)," Knight said. "He moves better and does everything better on both ends of the floor."

Tech is led by the Big 12's all-time leading scorer Emmett, who is averaging 20.8 points per game, but the team recently has had other players step up.

Most recently those players have been guards Jarrius Jackson and Ronald


