The big parade will kick-off the rodeo festivities, to be held at 5 p. m. through downtown Baird. Rodeo performances begin at 8 p. m. nightly.

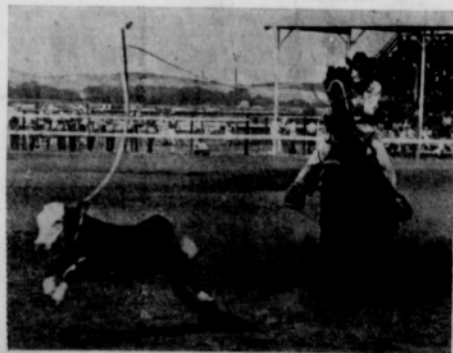

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

**AUSTIN** — Steadily-rising welfare costs will "bankrupt" state government unless prompt braking is applied, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes has warned.

Barnes - acknowledging that a tax bill which may climb to nearly a billion dollars is necessary to balance the Senate's \$6.99 billion version of the biennial state budget - named a special committee to recommend how to effect welfare economies.

Senate, meanwhile, approved the record budget while a subcommittee drafted a tax bill. The house is expected to move out this week with its appropriations bill.

Only one year of welfare financing is included in the Senate bill. With a half-way welfare budget, about 668 million in new taxes will be needed this year. Appropriating for welfare in a later special session will require nearly \$300 million more, unless the federal government steps in with additional aid.

Barnes' staff calculates Aid to Families with Dependent Children rolls are increasing by 3.10 per cent per month. Where 288,826 AFDC beneficiaries are anticipated by September 1 this year, 906,236 are seen by August 31, 1973. The latter figure would bring the AFDC cost to \$76 million a year - \$16 million above the proposed new \$55 million annual ceiling to be voted on May 18.

The Lieutenant Governor also noted that Medicaid costs have increased from \$22 million in 1968 to an estimated \$144 million for next year. He said state medical services to the needy - financed through Blue Cross family insurance policies which will cost nearly \$72 per family next year - are better than those received by all by the

very wealthy. "I am convinced we are going to have to reduce the cost, or the state is going bankrupt," said Barnes.

**OIL ALLOWABLE CUT** — May oil production allowable will be cut to a maximum daily flow of 134,076 barrels.

Railroad Commission cited reasons for the cut as substantial stocks of crude oil on hand, overall reduction in demand, and rising imports.

Commission's decision trimmed the allowable from 82.1 per cent in April to 77.2 per cent for next month.

May allowable, lowest in eight months, permits a maximum daily production of 3,637,654 barrels. Actual production is expected to be about 3,362,000 barrel daily, approximately what major buyers asked for.

Crude oil stocks on April 9 came to 108.3 million barrels, a million more than the week before and 2.4 million more than the year before. Ten of 14 big crude oil purchasers asked that the same allowable next month as in April. Three asked less, and one requested more.

**INSURANCE CHANGES VOTED** — The Legislature had some good news for insurance purchasers last week.

A bill to create a special pool to guarantee coverage to property owners in "catastrophe areas" (subject to hurricanes, tornadoes and other disasters) won final passage. The pool will be effective May 14. A pool arrangement may be worked out later for fire and explosion insurance is that is found difficult to obtain in some areas.

Another major bill passed by the Senate would create a statewide guaranty fund to assure payments of claims against insurance companies which go

broke. Hospital medical insurance policyholders, under a House-passed bill, could be reimbursed for treatment by any licensed, qualified practitioner of the healing arts - physicians, osteopaths, dentist, chiropractors, optometrists and doctors of podiatry.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court on May 12 will review the case in which an oilman sued the petroleum corporation which fired him after 13 months on the job because he did not find new supplies of oil to buy.

High Court will hear on May 12 Abilene's appeal from a lower court decision that it must pay \$38,000 to an oil producer who claimed his oil recovery operations were interrupted by its airport extension.

Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the stiff prison sentences given two black militants for destroying merchandise in a Dallas supermarket.

Court of Criminal Appeals also upheld the life sentence conviction of a man charged with leaving another to die in a North Dallas field after stripping and tying him.

**AG OPINIONS** — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held that former Gov. Allan Shivers' commutation in 1953 of the death sentence of a San Antonio man to life imprisonment with the provision that he never be eligible for further clemency is not binding on future governors.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: Sabine River Authority can enter a deferred compensation and pension plan with its executive employees.

Texas Water Rights Commission should reject all claims from parties asserting rights to use water from the Rio Grande in Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy Counties where claims have been adjudicated in courts.

Stephen F. Austin State University, Nacogdoches, may acquire joint ownership interest in or long-term lease of a football stadium owned by an independent school district.

A \$10 a month supervisory fee may be assessed a person granted probation after trial.

**HOSPITAL CONSTRUCTION RUSHED** — A multi-million dollar construction program due for completion this spring will provide more and better facilities for Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Other building by MH-MR will get under way in the next few weeks.

When completed, the current program will provide added bed space at four state schools, to accommodate 660 new students. Three state hospitals will have modern quarters for 600 mentally ill patients, and centers for specialized treatments of adolescents are contemplated. San Antonio, Austin, Terrell, Lub-

bock, Richmond and Corpus Christi institutions will get the new facilities.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Former Stephenville Mayor Jack Arthur was named by Gov. Preston Smith to the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Smith designated W. F. Tinsley of Austin chairman of the Texas Water Development Board.

**DROUGHT AID SOUGHT** — As drought-stricken areas

awaited major federal assistance, the Legislature called on Governor Smith to declare the drought a "grave public calamity" and to set up a joint committee on a relief plan.

Lieutenant Governor Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutscher named seven senators and seven representatives to a panel to work on the state program for purchasing and distributing hay and to serve as liaison with state and federal agencies. Sen. Wayne Connally of Flor-

esville and Rep. Oscar Carrillo Sr. and Benavides head the Senate and House committee members. Governor, said the legislative resolution, can order a relief program administered by the Agriculture Commission.

Smith, meanwhile said he expects to request emergency federal disaster relief benefits for 87 additional drought-hit counties, bringing the total number to 147.

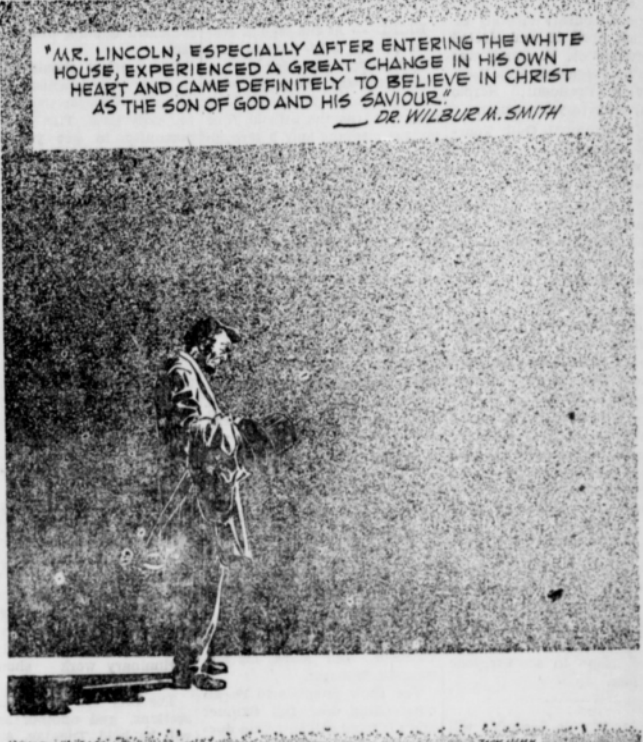

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FEDERAL DEPOSIT INSURANCE CORPORATION

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

OMAR BURLESON, M. C. WASHINGTON — The insurance industry, covering life, health, accident, fire and other disaster — particularly automobile, is coming under scrutiny of the Federal Government.

There are those who would set Federal standards by which State regulatory agencies must comply or the government itself would step in. The process would be the same as that now applied to certain safety standards — the same as now in effect for meat inspection.

More and more the idea of setting Federal regulations as a substitute for State regulations is being talked and advocated in the name of protecting the consumer.

As our society becomes more compact and State lines less distinguishable, uniformity in matters of safety, pollution and other problems not especially peculiar to any community or State, may become desirable, if not necessary, to be efficient and effective. On the other hand, trend toward Federal direction is further eroding States' authority and control.

Take automobile insurance as an example. It is not the fault of the local agent that our automobile insurance is high and seems to be getting higher. His rates are fixed and he can do nothing about it. Complaints of cost increases and difficulty in settlement of claims is nationwide.

Secretary of Transportation John A. Volpe established the Administration's position favoring a modest start in the "no-fault" concept. This concept provides that no matter who is at fault in an automobile accident the claimant collects. This, it is reasoned, would provide faster adjustments, reduce bureaucracy and court litigation in many cases. The theory is that it would eliminate costs all along the line and thus trim cost of insurance.

Actually, there is little experience to provide guidance for this idea. Massachusetts, from which State Secretary Volpe comes, has had "no-fault" insurance since last January. A number of States have the matter under consideration by their Legislatures. Senator Hart of Michigan has offered a bill which would in fact, nationalize the idea. His Committee has held a series of hearings on the proposition and will likely hold more.

These hearing have developed evidence that "no-fault" insurance for small accidents would formalize what is already a policy of some companies. To look further, however, the issue is not quite that narrow. The wider and longer-range view touches on the moral question of what personal responsibilities a driver assumes for the privilege of using the highways and streets. It raises the question of whether safe drivers would not, in the end, subsidize the unsafe ones. Further, under proposals now being considered in the U. S. Senate, a disturbing aspect of the "no-fault" idea is that citizens in lesser accidents would be compelled to waive rights to use the courts to settle a claim they thought to be unjust.

Another troublesome element in the "no-fault" system is the groundwork it lays for a broadening of the concept to cover accidents of greater seriousness. It would seem to imbue in State or Federal laws the principle that government can establish an arbitrary value upon the emotions, the bodies and time of a citizen of the United States.

For several years, there have been pending in the Congress proposals to indemnify the victims of crimes. If you are burglarized or robbed, the Federal government would make restitution. There seems to be some parallel between these ideas. Would it encourage irresponsibility, sometimes maybe on the part of a victim as well as the trespasser?

Whatever may develop toward a more equitable system of auto insurance or indemnity for the victims of crime, nothing to reward the wrongdoer should be included.

# FARM BUREAU PROTESTING NEW TRANSPORTATION LAWS

**EDITOR'S NOTE** — Our apologies go to Dale Wilson president of the Callahan County Farm Bureau, whose story concerning the new transportation laws was incorrectly printed.

The story in our paper was written for the Mitchell County News, the names listed were for Mitchell County Farm Bureau.

The corrected article follows:

Farmers and ranchers are being urged by Dale Wilson of Clyde, president of the Callahan County Farm Bureau, to let the federal government know how proposed farm truck driver regulations would affect their operations. Letters should be addressed to John A. Volpe, Secretary, U. S. Dept. of Transportation, Washington, D. C. 20515, Wilson said.

Proposed U. S. Dept. of Transportation regulations pertaining to farm truck driver qualifications will become effective on July 1 unless farmers and ranchers can convince the government that they should not be put into effect. The regulations were scheduled for last Jan. 1, but were postponed to permit Farm Bureau and other organizations to study the regulations and file statements.

The regulations would affect drivers of all farm trucks - including pickup trucks, Wilson said. Although the new regulations would be applicable to interstate commerce, recent court decisions indicate that the interstate commerce clause applies to anything and everything which might at some time enter interstate commerce, Wilson said.

Proposed regulations would include the following requirements for drivers of farm trucks:

- (1) Be at least 21 years of age.
- (2) Carry a certificate, executed by a physician during the preceding 24 months, evidencing fitness to drive a truck.
- (3) Pass a road test in truck operation.

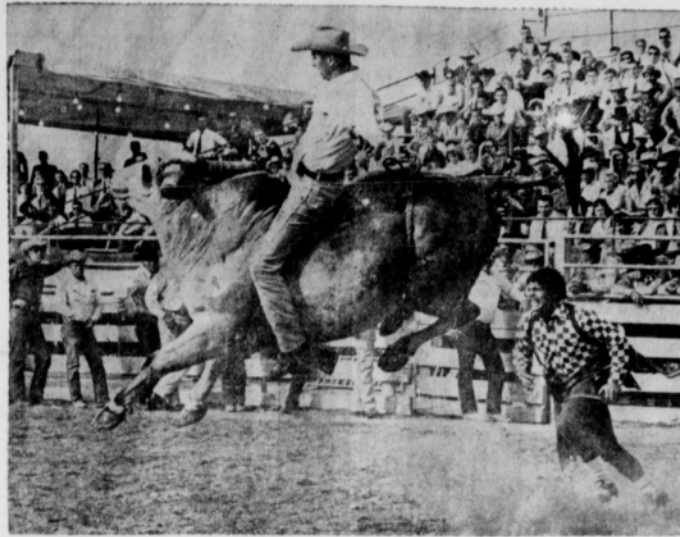
(4) Take and pass an examination on the federal Motor Vehicle Safety Regulations.

(5) If driver is employee of farmer, he must supply the farmer with evidence of compliance with the four preceding requirements, plus an application for employment which shall disclose traffic violations and disposition thereof, plus an annual supplementary statement relating to traffic violations.

(6) A farmer who employs a driver would be required to "verify" the driver's driving record - and to maintain for each driver a file containing items 1 to 5 above, plus a record of the employer's verification of the employee's driving record.

Wilson said letters to Secretary Volpe should include the farmer's personal appraisal of how his farm or ranch operations would be affected if the regulations are adopted. The local farm leader urged each farmer in the county to request the present exemptions for farm truck drivers be retained.

Also, he said, Congressman Omar Burleson and the two Texas Senators should be contacted and requested to intervene with Secretary Volpe in

the matter of retaining present exemptions, or at least in modifying proposed regulations so that they will not be so damaging to agriculture.

Farm Bureau is requesting that present exemptions be retained, he said. In the event that this is impossible, the Farm Bureau is asking that the following recommendations be included in any regulations which are issued:

- (1) An exemption for small farm trucks under 10,000 lbs. gross weight. This would include pickups.
- (2) An exemption for local farm hauling.
- (3) Postponement of effective date for six months more.
- (4) A comprehensive educational campaign in news media to let farmers and ranchers know what is about to happen to them.
- (5) General distribution of a summary of the regulations.
- (6) A procedure for development of permanent regulations based on common sense, actual need and good judgment.

The local farm leader said that farm truck drivers have an excellent safety record. In Texas, for example, the amount of bodily injury claims paid per farm truck policy is only one-tenth the amount of bodily injury claims paid per policy for all non-fleet commercial trucks, he said.

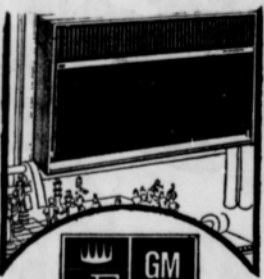

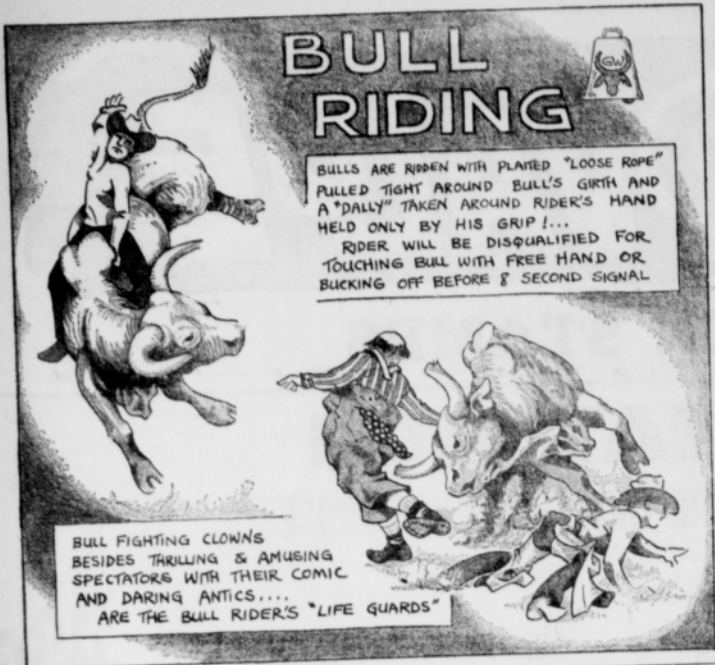

**WHAT IS NEW TESTAMENT BAPTISM?**

We are interested in doing the will of God because only by doing it we can enter into the kingdom of God (Matt. 7:21). Only by studying the teachings of the New Testament can we know what the will of God is.

Last week's article dealt with the necessity of being baptized in order to be saved, because this is a part of God's revealed will. This week let us look at WHAT New Testament baptism is. This is important because many think they have been baptized in a way that will save them, when, in fact, they have not been baptized in the way which is revealed in God's will (the New Testament).

First, scriptural baptism requires that the one being baptized be a believer. Jesus said, "He that BELIEVETH and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). Many people were baptized when they were infants, and too young to believe. In the New Testament no one ever received baptism before first being taught so that they might believe. So any who think that they were saved because they were baptized when they were babies, have not obeyed the Lord's teaching in the New Testament about "BELIEVING and being baptized."

Secondly, scriptural baptism is "for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38) One cannot be saved in his sins. But, many have been baptized AFTER they thought they were saved. This would be AFTER their sins were forgiven, if such were the case. This is not the baptism which the scriptures teach.

Scriptural baptism requires immersion in the water. Paul says, "Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life." (Rom. 6:4). "Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead" (Col. 2:12). Many who have been only sprinkled with water, or had a little water poured on their heads, have not been "buried with the Lord in baptism," and thus have never been baptized in the New Testament way. Is it important to do the will of the Father in the way He has revealed it to us in the New Testament? Have you truly been baptized in the way the Lord commands and teaches us?
