Stress management possible without pills

| Whether it is stressing about finals or worrying about looking good in a new bathing suit for summer, doctors at Texas Tech urge students not to turn to pills or other substances to deal with anxiety. <br> Dr. Kelly Bennett, medical director for Student Health Services at Th ompson Hall, said students should find healthy ways to handle the pressure of upcoming finals. <br> "I like to recommend that people find something wholesome to deal with their stress," she said. <br> Taking a break from studying, Bennett said, is more beneficial than popping caffeine pills or smoking a carton of cigarettes. <br> "If you take a double espresso shot," she said, "that's the same as one caffeine pill." | Although caffeine pills will not cause much harm if taken sporadically, Bennett said if taken regularly they can cause insomnia, stomach problems and tremors. <br> She said students should also àvoid the temptation of taking someone else's stimulant medication to get through a long study session, as detrimental side effects may result. <br> Bennett suggested students take a couple hours, and do something that relaxes them such as going out to eat with friends, working out, taking a nap or practicing relaxation techniques such as meditation. <br> "Take 30 minutes to an hour to do things you enjoy," she said. "Things that will relax you. Don't rush around to smoke or drink to get by." <br> Substances such as alcohol, caffeine and nicotine, Bennett said, are poor | chanisms for dealing with stress. She d habits such as these are likely to be -long if practiced during the college ars. <br> Stress causes a decrease in one's imune system, Bennett said, and using unalthy methods of dealing with stress n lower the immune system more, king students more susceptible to beming ill. <br> Bennett said going out with friends relax for a reasonable amount of time d slightly sacrificing on grades is worth to be a happy and healthy person inead of a stressed-out, self-absorbed, raight-A student. <br> Dr. Alan Kaye, chairman and profesin the department of anesthesiology the Texas Tech Health Sciences Cen, said students should also be aware king herbal supplements such as ginkgo <br> STRESS continued on page 7 |

School district bans baked items after marijuana incident SHARYLAND (AP) - Students in a Hidalgo Counry school disrict can't share their sack lunches or any other food from home w ing marijuana-laced brownies to friends.
"We do not permit a parent (or anyone else) to bring in food for students other than their own children without getting permission from the building administration," Sharyland Independent School District Superintendent Sandra Reed said in a letter to parents Wednesday.
The letter did not specifically mention the brownies but talked of Tafety, fairness and consistency as well as the state's guideslines for Foods of Minimum Nutritional Value.
Mission police charged the 17 -year-old student with felony delivery of marijuana following the incident last week. He allegedly shared the brownies wish five students, one of whom got sick and was treated by the school nurse.
Some students said they were upset about the ban, as they like to sring treats for their friends as the school year ends.
Sharyland school officials will meet over the summer to set up per-
The school has about 4,800 students.
