
Dozens of militants drove freely through the streets of another central announcing to the Parliament in Rome that the two Italians and two Iraqis kidnapped with them were handed over to the Red Cross in Baghdad.

"The two girls are well and will be able to return to their loved ones tonight," he said, to cheers from lawmakers.

Pari and Torretta were kidnapped on Sept. 7 along with their Iraqi colleagues from the Baghdad office of their aid agency "Un Ponte Per ..." ("A Bridge To...") . Two different groups claimed responsibilty for the abductions, demanding the withdrawal of Italian troops from the country or the release of Iraqi female prisoners. The same two groups later put out Web statements saying the two Italians had been killed, but the Italian govern-

College Democrats, Republicans debate political ideals, policies

Representatives from the University Democrats and the College Republicans debated current issues and the political views of each presidential candidate Tuesday evening.

Dennis Patterson, a professor in the political science department and adviser to both organizations, enforced the rules of moderation.

"I just want students to be aware of politics, and the presidential debates will set the policy agenda for the coming months," Patterson said. "Each organization will have four minutes to discuss their view on five of the most important problems, according to the Gallup polls. Each side will then have a chance for rebuttal.'

Both the chairman for the College Republicans, Joe Biles and the president of the University Democrats, James Hershberger, made opening statements concerning their parties and informed the attendees about upcoming events for each group.

Representative from the University Democrats, Stephanie Shepherd,

started the debate by discussing the party's stance on education. "Kerry supports a well rounded curriculum," Shepherd said. "We are

not too keen on standardized testing, because teachers will lecture around each test and won't provide for a well-rounded learning experience."

She said Democratic presidential candidate John

Kerry wants to implement a more sophisticated testing so students can utilize a greater potential of learning capabilities. Kerry also wants to push for a national service opportunity, where students can serve in their community for two years and will have their four-year tuition paid off.

Representative for the College Republicans, Josh Ray, said urban school districts, which are generally led by democratic policies, need the most attention.

"Instead of raising the budget to hire more faculty, we need to focus on the teachers having more accountability," Ray said.

Engineering College gets grant from ExxonMobil

Texas Tech Recruiting Team Captain for ExxonMobil ration Doug Waterman handed a \$28,000 grant Pamela A. Eibeck, dean of the Col-

lege of Engineering, this month. Waterman said \$23,000 will be distributed among the departments of petroleum engineering, chemical engineering, computer science, mechanical engineering, civil engineering, electrical and computer engineering. The remaining \$5,000 will be given to the Department of

Information Systems and Quantitative Sciences in the Jerry S. Rawls College of Busiistration. ExxonMobil awarded grants to universidegrees in skills from which the company recruits

"In the three years I have participated in recruitment, the amount has been pretty consistent," he said.

Waterman said a representative from ExxonMobil will be coming to the Engineering Career fair next week to inform and recruit students.

"We are looking for undergraduate students and graduate candidates that would want to work for the company," Waterman said. "We also have student placements and cooperative education programs for students to work in."

Julia Allen, coordinator of College Development in the College of Engineering, said ExxonMobil has a formula based on how many college graduates go on to work for the corporation. ExxonMobil plans to give \$1.6 million to 86 universities.

"They give us about the same amount every year, depending on the formula," she said. "They've been pretty consistent with the funds."

Julia said ExxonMobil decides which departments at the universities receive the money.

"Since it is unrestricted grant money, the departments get to decide where the money goes to," Allen said. "Some of it will go toward scholarships, professional societies in each department of the College of Engineering and to different types of projects that the state is unable to fund."

Allen said the corporation donates money to bring recognition of the company to students.

"When they come to recruit on campus, students will know that some



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


Voting an easy thing for students to do

The right to vote is the fundamental power given with United States citizenship. The vote represents a citizen's empowerment to suggest which direction he thinks the country and his future should go. A vote is one's voice in this representative democracy.

Why do many college students forget this basic civic responsibility? All too often, the young adult and student demographic allow another election year to slip by without taking advantage of its power to influence.

Students attend college with a general concern for their future. Four years and, as of recently, a premium amount of money

Sudan a deadly too ignored — situation

ight now a war is going on. Every day more people are killed by rebels or the military or are caught in the crossfire. Many more are homeless - poverty-stricken after their homes were destroyed.

They're starving and beaten down. Torture, looting, massacres and rape are a common occurrence.

Meanwhile, the United Nations has declined thus far to really take any action, allowing thousands more to be killed or displaced each day. The government, accused of supporting the raiding militia and committing genocide, says there is a ceasefire.

Welcome to Darfur, the westernmost region of Sudan and the hub of what U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan called one of the world's worst humanitarian crises.

The crisis in Darfur, which has been going on for 19 months, has several origins. According to Reuters AlertNet, Sudanese troops are attempting to squash a rebel movement by villages suspected of supporting the insurgency. But the real issue goes much deeper.

The conflict can be considered in light of region, ethnicity, land and power. Sudan is reaching the end of a civil war, which divided the north from the south for many years. Belgian-based think tank International Crisis Group made the argument that the government's refusal to allow regional groups in the peace negotiations fueled part of the uprising by the Darfur rebel groups. Additionally, ICG theorized the international community is hesitant to get involved for fear of jeopardizing peace talks.

Ethnicity also is a source of conflict. The black African farmers who are being displaced and killed have lived near the Arab pastoral communities that are home to the militia, known as Janjaweed, according to Reuters. Both groups are dark-skinned and Muslim, and ethnic divisions were practically nonexistent in the past. Now, local leaders are exaggerating the differences, in part to incite the rebellion.

The struggle for land is part of the crisis; Darfur originally belonged to the Furs, an African group. Some Arab groups felt left out of the land-dividing process.

But what it all comes down to is power. The government is Islamist and upholds sharia, the Islamic law, adding another source of conflict, as southern Sudan is populated primarily by Africans who practice Christianity or animism. The control of Sudan's oilfields is in question, and ICG attributes much of the massacre and

displacement in Darfur to a governmental policy of ethnic cleansing, cutting the rebel movement off at the knees.

The rebel movement has two arms: the Justice and Equality Movement and the Sudan Liberation Army. Both want inclusion in the decision-making and a share of the power — and the oil revenues — and are fighting to get it.

The problem is, a few rebels are fighting, but hundreds of thousands of people who are not fighting are dying. The U.N. estimated about 1.2 million African villagers have been displaced, about 150,000 have fled to Chad and about 50,000 have been killed in raids perpetrated by the militia and government troops. Add to these numbers rampant starvation and the possibility of epidemics, and what you have is a huge mess that has gone on for too long and that probably will not be cleaned up anytime soon, since nobody appears to be doing anything about it.

I found out the above information

through a lot of searching. I went to www. msn.com and typed in "Sudan." The results were the World Fact Book, a link to the best hotels of Sudan and some historical information. There also were a few links to humanitarian organizations asking for donations to help the refugees, but that was it. Meaning, no news stories, no Web sites set up to address this crisis, which is just as real and just as severe as those going on around the world. I had similar results at other search engines.

So I hit the AP wire. One story about the U.N. dedicated about six lines to Sudan, but other world crises took center stage.

Sadly, I have gotten more information watching MTV-U while I work out than I have from mainstream new sources. There's nothing on the wire, nothing in major newspapers and news stations.

Today is the day I'm ashamed to be a

Where are the reporters? Where are the cameras? Where are those annoying guys with notepads dodging bullets who have shown up everywhere else — Iraq, Russia, Afghanistan; you name it, we're there. But somehow, somebody somewhere failed to realize that something huge and important was going on, and so nobody knows.

And nothing is done.

People continue to die, to get raped, robbed, beaten, tortured, bombed and driven from their homes.

And nothing is done.

But I cannot just blame the media for the gross lack of information. The U.N. has done nothing, except threatening sanctions against Sudan if the genocide, the senseless, systematic wiping out of another group of people, did not stop. Unfortunately, sanctions, meant to punish the government, end up punishing the people, the very same people who right now are fleeing for their lives and watching their world crumble around them.

The crisis in Sudan is real, it is deadly, and it will continue if something is not done. Innocent people - men, women and children, farmers and camel herders, people who want to be left alone and allowed to live - are being denied that right every day, while the media ignores it and the major international players look

Today is the day we should all stand up and demand change.

Presidential debates far from the reality of political world

n this age of reality television, Americans have grown accustomed to inviting Lordinary people into their homes via the television set, becoming completely engrossed in their lives. We do this because we like them — or hate them — and because

On Thursday, in this same mindset, America will watch the first of three presidential debates.


While the debates are scripted in every way to look real, they are far from reality. Every answer to every question has been rehearsed, reworked and refined a dozen times before it reaches our ears. Likewise, each detail has been analyzed from every angle and debated before the debates ever begin.

This year, both campaigns jockeyed to gain the extra hand spending two weeks going over the details for this year's debates. The result of this toil was a 32-page "memorandum of understanding," which deals with every minutia from room temperature to podium height.

While these details may seem insignificant at a glance, they are anything but trivial. Each detail trumped by one of the campaigns is a small victory in the larger war for the presidency.

Consider the podium height. Bush stands at about 6 feet, and when viewed on TV, he appears short compared to the 6-foot-4inch Kerry. So, the Bush camp insisted the

"There you go again," after an awkward and formulaic response from Jimmy Carter on Medicare, America laughed, and Carter

was reduced to a punch line. In 1992, the Clinton campaign had been portraying Bush Sr. as an elitist president who did not "feel the pain" of the average American. So, when Bush glanced down at his watch during the waning moments of the final debate, he came across as apathetic, which played perfectly to the cliché of an out-of-touch president.

In 2000, Gore generally was thought of as a teacher's pet, while Bush was seen as the class clown. As a result, when Gore began to sigh and role his eyes at Bush's responses, throwing his hands in the air as if only he

own words, misunderestimated. But while Kerry is a skilled debater, Bush has never lost a debate since he ran for Governor in 1994, and he has faced some of the best in


The reason for this is simple — Bush does not try to be what he is not. He sticks to what works for him and is relentless at saying what he wants to say. In doing so, he comes across as

likeable and consistent. Kerry's style is completely opposite from this, in part because he has been debating regularly in courtrooms and on the Senate floor for the past 30 years. He is verbose in his answers and likes to explore the finer points of the figures and statistics about which he talks. But while his method is in many

ways superior to Bush's, it does not translate well to the average voter.

And translating well is what both men will be trying to do on Thursday - connect with you and me on an individual basis. The candidate who achieves this will be the person we invite into our homes for the






