## RL to vote on expanded calling

Robert Lee telephone users will soon have the opportunity to decide on ELC -Extended Local Calling. This is a telephone service that allows residents to call and receive calls from San Angelo without being charged long distance fees. Should local GTE customers approve this plan, all calls to and from the ELC approved city, in this case, San Angelo, will be billed as local calls for a monthly fee. Current plans call for a mail-in ballot to be sent to area subscribers to vote on the Extended Local Calling recommendation. If approved by local residents, ELC, when operational, will allow telephone users access to and from San Angelo without dialing "1" before the number.

The Bronte school has been and is in good financial shape. We've got good teachers (the very best) and good programs and classes for our students.


The problem has been because of very poor public relationships within the school personnel and also with the public. We need and we must demand that we have both a good administration and also good public relations in our school.

Other guests present for the luncheon and program were Terry Myers, Mike Hartman, Ray Barnett, and Jeff Schoenfield.



college after high school requires a student to plan, beginning as early as the 8th grade. In my last article, the 9th grade was covered, which included the criteria for a student to attend that select college. This week we will cover the 10th grade and some tips for success.

In the 10th grade, a student should take biology or chemistry, if biology has already been taken. A student should continue with a second course in the same foreign language. In math, taking geometry and more algebra is important because an accelerated pace will interest the best colleges. Many students in the 10th grade will take the Preliminary Scholas-tic Aptitude Test (PSAT) to find out how they do with this kind of test, even though more juniors take this test than sophomores. Taking the PLAN (Pre-ACT) test in the 10th grade will help students to find out how they perform on this kind of test. By the 10th grade students should be talking with their parents about college and possibly visit some local colleges, even if they really aren't interested in them. This will give them a sense of size and atmosphere. By studying hard in English classes, students will practice the writing skills that will be extremely important in any career they choose. It makes no difference how talented a student is in a sport, the band, or in an interest group, poor grades will stand out on that high school transcript. Each college a student applies for will request a copy of their high school transcript,

Wanting to attend a select which includes all of the classes taken in high school beginning with the 9th grade. This transcript includes each semester grade and the number of credits or units earned. The ranking and the grade point average will also be included.
