Bronte to vote on Toll-Free Calling

Bronte residents should receive ballots to vote on toll-free calling to San Angelo this week. This is the result of petitions that were circulated several months ago.

Residents will have 15 days to mark their ballot and return it in the stamped, self addressed envelope to the Public Utility Commission.

If 70% of the returned ballots are in favor of the toll-free calling, all phone calls from San Angelo to Bronte and vice-versa would be local calls. They would not show as extra long-distance calls on the monthly bills.

The cost for this service is \$7.00 per month for business phones and \$3.50 per month for resident or home phone lines.

If you have any questions or comments concerning the petition you should direct them to the Public Utility Commission at (512) 458-0256, Project Number 13761.

Hospital District, reported Wednesday morning only one candidate will be on the district's ballot for two vacancies on the board of directors. Mary Bessent, incumbent, filed for her seat on the panel. Alexander said according to election codes, the vacant position could be filled by voter write-in or by an appointment by the hospital board.

According to Kay Torres, Robert Lee City Secretary, three candidates filed for a place on the ballot for three vacant council positions. On the city ballot will be Beth Prather, incumbent, Kenneth Green, and Kim Hodge. John Conley and Ray Atwater have filed for the city mayor's position. John Conley has served as an appointee to fill Jackie Walker's unexpired term.

Three candidates will be on the East Coke County Hospital District ballot to fill two vacancies. Those candidates are Charles Sonnenberg, incumbent, Royce Lee and Mollie Childs.

Both incumbents, Gerald Sandusky and Pete Percifull, will appear on the city of Bronte's ballot. Two positions on the city council are open.

Robert Lee Independent

School District has two places vacant on the board of trustees. Three candidates will seek those spots - Mary Grim, incumbent, Cathy Hendry, and Teddy Millican.

Two places on the Bronte Independent School District are vacant. Seeking the seats on the governing panel are incumbents Kendall Gibbs and Steve Kelton, and newcomers Karen Blair Huddleston, Charles Timmons, and Bob Frazee.

Three incumbent members of the board of directors of the Coke County Underground Water Conservation District whose terms expire will have their names on the ballot May 6. They are Wayne McCabe, Otis Smith, and Joe Ash.



"Adopt-a-Highway" mark's 10th anniversary

Picking up trash on the highway right-of-way can be a grueling task, but some dedicated folks in Coke County find it a rewarding way to volunter their time and energy.

The tenth annual Great Texas Trash-Off, scheduled for April 1, will involve more than 100,000 volunteers statewide in one of the nation's largest single-day cleanups.

More than 1,500 Adopt-a-Highway groups will scour state roadways for litter, while Keep Texas Beautiful affiliates in 75 communities will be sprucing up city streets, county roads and parks. The groups expect to pick up 7.7 million gallons of litter statewide.

In TxDOT's San Angelo District, 139 organizations have adopted 278 miles of highway. TxDOT erects signs naming the organization that has adopted each two-mile section of highway. adopting organization agrees to pick up litter on its section at least four times a year. Sixteen organizations have adopted a stretch of highway in Coke County.

Groups participating in this year's Great Texas Trash-Off are Hayrick Lodge/Robert Lee, Bronte Church of Christ, West Coke County Community Development/ Robert Lee, Cornerstone Christian School/San Angelo, Adult Protective Services/San Angelo, San Angelo Masonic, and San Angelo School Foods Services.

TxDOT's antilitter program, which includes Don't Mess with Texas, Adopt-a-Highway and the grassroots partnership with Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., save the state between \$2 and \$4 million a year in litter expenditures.



Sims supports **Education Reform**

Senator Bill Sims (D-Paint Rock) contacted Senator Bill Ratliff to express his strong support for Senate Bill 1, the comprehensive Texas Education Code revision. On March 16, the Senate Education Committee favorably reported SB 1 to the full Senate. SB 1 is the culmination of two years of hard work to improve the entire K-12 education system in Texas. The full Senate anticipates taking up SB 1 on March 27.

In years past, efforts to create an equitable funding mechanism acceptable to the courts have demanded center stage while this year the Legislature is able to focus on improving the quality of the education Texas children receive. Top among the priori-

ties for Senator Sims is the move to free local school districts from unnecessary state government regulations, while maintaining adequate financial support and assistance to ensure that our young adults are ready to enter society or advanced edu-

cation upon graduation. SB 1 calls for more local control by allowing school districts to select their own textbooks, by allowing district voters to choose to become a "home-rule" school district, and by providing for up to 20 pilot projects to allow parents more choice in where they send their children. SB 1 also includes an amendment to the no-pass/no-play provision to allow for what Senator Ratliff calls a "warning shot." The amendment calls for a student to be removed from competition or performances for three weeks but allows the student to practice or rehearse with the team/group. This new language allows this "warning shot" for the student to be available only once in junior high and once in high school. After the "warning shot", the student would be subject to the full no-pass/noplay provision. In talking with Senator Ratliff, Senator Sims said, "It appears to me that the Committee has come up with a workable solution that maintains the integrity of the nopass/no-play provision made by the Senate Education Committee gives the student a wake-up call which I think is good. Sometimes we all need a wake-up call."



Smoking Kids

The more than four hundred thousand premature deaths each year in the United States blamed on smoking are totally preventable, and the key opportunities for prevention are in children and teens, since most people who are going to smoke are hooked by the time they are twenty years

That is the preamble to a report from the Surgeon General discussed at an American Heart Association conference in Chicago on Children's Heart Health. The report concludes that most young people who smoke are addicted to nicotine and say they want to quit but are unable to do so. Among young people, those with poorer grades and lower self-images are most likely to begin using tobacco.

Although smoking by young women is increasing, ninety percent of teen smokers are males. One of the authors of the Surgeon General's report says many teens simply lack the skills to say no to the pressure to smoke.

This program has been inaugurated with the "Let's Draw the Line" campaign and is being observed by communities all throughout the United States during the month of April.

Teenagers drink 35% of all wine coolers sold in the United States. The following is a brief overview of youth and alcohol in the U.S. - 87% of high school seniors have used alcohol; in comparison, 63% have smoked cigarettes; 32% have used marijuana; and only 6% have used cocaine. Approximately 2/3 of teenagers who drink report that they can buy their own alcoholic beverages. Use of alcohol and other drugs is associated with the leading causes of death and injury (e.g., motor-vehicle crashes, homicides, and suicides) among teenagers and young adults. Alcohol and other drug use at an early age is an indicator of future drug or alcohol problem.

The ultimate goal of every family and community is to build safe and healthy environments in which they work and play. Prevention does work. Since 1979, dramatic increases in public attitudes of perceived risk and social disapproval toward illegal drugs produced a decline of nearly 50% in the number of new triers and nonaddicted users through all segments of the population.

Children with Asthma

Keeping children with asthma out of the hospital can be accomplished with some family teamwork.

"Teamwork is the key to any chronic condition," said Dr. Kristin Moore, an allergist and clinical assistant professor of medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Getting parents and asthmatic kids to work together and follow the doctor's orders can help control asthma."

Moore suggests parents take the lead as "coaches" on the team, making the child the "star player" whose role is to keep the asthma treatment current.

"Start by taking as much time as needed with the doctor so that both parent and child understand why and how drugs are to be taken," she said.

Then recruit other members for the team so the child will not feel he or she is facing asthma alone, said Moore, who suggests siblings, parents of friends where the child may spend the night, teachers and school nurses as possible "teammates."

"Having friends and supporters in as many places as possible can help ease the child's embarrassment about the condition or of having to interrupt school or play to take medication," Moore said.

A brief meeting can provide team members with essential information about asthma and the importance of taking medications on time and the use of a peak flow meter.

A peak flow meter is a simple device that the child can blow into to determine if the airways are obstructed. The child can be taught how to look for specific measures that indicate the need for medication, preventing a possible asthma attack.

A variety of drugs can treat the inflammation of the airways that cause an asthma attack. Doctors typically begin with inhalers that open airways and control inflammation for up to 12 hours. Steroids are prescribed for some asthmatics who need stronger treat-

"The team should stress the importance of regular medication because missed treatments can sometimes lead to an asthma attack," said Moore.

Asthma is a leading cause for pediatric admissions to hospitals, second only to surgery. Hospitalizations are often a result of missed medications or allergic reactions.

There are many conditions that can cause an asthma at-

tack. It is frequently an allergy to dust or mold, but it can also be an allergic reaction to plants, a dirty carpet, chalkboard dust or a common cold.

When the team understands the game plan - regular medication and avoiding environmental conditions that cause allergic reactions - the "star player" should experience few problems with asth-

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

Principles of Stain Removal

*Know as much about the stain and fabric as possible. Refer to the garment's permanent care label.

*Heat sets stains. Do not press a stained fabric or dry it in the dryer.

*Treat stains quickly. Old stains may be impossible to remove.

*Old remedies, such as applying milk to ink stains, are unreliable. The milk may produce an additional stain.

Leave cologne at home

Travelers should leave the cologne at home when headed for areas where insects can be a health problem.

That's because colognes and perfumed products such as hair spray, deodorants and soaps attract insects that can cause illness through toxins they inject or diseases they spread.

But there are ways to minimize the risks, said Dr. James H. Runnels of the Travel Medicine Service at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

One precaution is the use of insect repellents.

A repellent's ingredients will depend on which insects it is formulated to repel, so buyers should match ingredients to expected insects, Runnels said.

The most effective ingredient for battling mosquitoes, chiggers, ticks, fleas and biting flies is N, N-diethyl-metatoluamide (DEET), and permethrin, and permethrin, sold as Permanon, can be applied to clothing to repel ticks.

Runnels cautions adults not to let children use DEET products without a pediatrician's advice.

He also recommends being selective about eating and sleeping arrangements.

Travelers may want to avoid open-air restaurants and outdoor buffets where insects have easy access to food and beverages.

When selecting hotels, travelers should check to see that the rooms are screened or air conditioned.

Campers should use mosquito netting and never leave food or beverages unprotected.

Runnels also suggests that travelers:

*Avoid jewelry and brightly colored clothing

*Cover their bodies as much as possible.

*Steer clear of non-moving bodies of fresh water where mosquitoes can breed.

*Avoid walking barefoot. *Lie on a lawn chair, blanket or large beach towel when at the beach or pool. They should also not lay clothing on the ground; scents on the clothing may attract insects.

*Test stain removers on an underside seam or facing to determine if harmful. Watch for any change in color, ap-

pearance or texture. *Follow instructions for the use, storage and safety of all cleaning agents carefully. Always use in a well ventilated

*Excess stains should be carefully blotted or scraped from the surface without dam-

aging fabric.
*When in doubt, fragile fabrics or large, difficult stains be left to a should professional dry cleaner. Point out the location and type of stain, if known.

*Some stains, such as soft drinks or fruit juices, may be invisible or difficult to see because of fabric design.

*Never mix stain removers (especially ammonia and chlorine bleach). If more than one remover is needed, rinse thoroughly between the use of each.

Most common spots and stains will be removed by prompt and correct washing practices. However, some stains require special procedures. The complexity of today's dyes, fabrics and finishes makes it difficult to satisfactorily remove all stains without damaging the fabric.

Benefit statements start 60-year-olds

If you're age 60 or older and not yet receiving Social Security benefits, you can expect to get a statement sometime in 1995 telling you about how much you could receive in benefits. In February 1995, the Social Security Administration (SSA) will begin mailing a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement (PEBES) to everyone who is age 60 or older, has earnings credited to his or her Social Security number, and is not currently receiving Social Security benefits.

The initial mailing to an esti-

continue through September. Beginning in October 1995, and each year thereafter, statements will be sent to people who reach age 60 during the year. Toward the end of the century, Social Security expects to send the statements each year to everyone who is age 25 or older. ... an estimated 123 million

These SSA-initiated mailings are required by law. Their purpose is to help workers make sure their earnings are correctly reported. These reported earnings are used to calculate a person's future Social Security benefits. That makes the statement a valuable financial planning tool. The statement shows the taxable earnings reported by the employer(s) and the estimated Social Security taxes paid. The estimates are based on the person's date of birth and earnings reported for work in jobs covered under Social Security.

The Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement shows the retirement benefit amount workers under age 62 can anticipate at ages 62, 65, and 70. For older workers, the estimates are based on the person's current age. If, for example, you're 63, your statement will show the estimated benefits for your current age and for age 70. After age 70, you will receive an estimate based on your current age only. The statement also includes estimates of benefits that may be paid should the worker become disabled or die before retire-

While your PEBES doesn't guarantee you an exact amount of benefit (that will be determined when you apply for benefits), it will provide an estimate to help you plan your financial future. After you read the statement, you don't need to do anything unless you believe the earnings information is incorrect. If the error involves recent earnings at your current job, contact your employer. If your statement shows any other incorrect earnings, report the discrepancy to Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. When you call, be sure to have your records of the correct earnings handy - such as W-2's, pay stubs, and tax returns. You also should call the toll-free number to report an incorrect name or Social Security number on the

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

Pre-marital counseling advised

Take a few steps to prepare for the "first step down the aisle," advises a marital expert.

Three important requirements to help avoid marital pitfalls are pre-marital counseling, knowing your needs, and open communication, says Bob Beck, a clincial associate professor in Baylor College of Medicine's Department of Psychiatry.

"Most therapists who work with couples will say you have got to talk. There is no substitute," Beck said. "The majority of couples I see could avoid counseling or risk losing their relationship if they had taken preventive measures."

Beck suggests premarital counseling with a therapist or clergy trained in marriage counseling as a way to help couples talk about needs and expectations.

He says many couples get past the first communication hurdles, but fail to talk about expectations they have of each other emotionally.

"Couples need to know each others' needs for different times in life - when they feel good, bad, inadequate, proud, uncertain," he said.

have rough spots, Beck said. However, the following should be recognized as warning signs of serious marital discord:

*Lack of trust.

*Drifting apart, avoidance.

*Repeated conflicts over the same unresolved issue. *Diminished or decreased intimacy.

*Marked change in behav-

Inflexibility in negotiating changes.

For couples noticing these warning signs, Beck encourages open communication. If first attempts to discuss problems fail, set aside time to talk by having dinner out or going for a walk.

"If talking fails, use self-help books," Beck said. "They can help couples understand what is happening in the relationship and give them a shared language to use to communicate."

The last step is seeking help from a counselor or therabist. Seek a referral from a physician or a friend who has had a successful experience with a relationship counselor.

There is no magic pill for a successful marriage, but there are some "rules to live by" that can give it a better chance, Beck said.
