Elections set for Saturday

Coke County voters will go to the polls Saturday, May 6, to cast ballots for the governing panels of the county hospital districts, county schools, municipal entities and the underground water district.

In the Robert Lee city election, a contested race for mayor highlights the ballot. John Conley, an appointee to the position, is seeking his first term as mayor and is being challenged by Ray Atwater. Three city council positions on the ballot prompted three candidates to file, Beth Prather, incumbent, Kenneth Green, and Kim Hodge. Eligible voters will cast ballots at city hall 7 am - 7 pm.

No challenge exists on the city of Bronte's ballots; two candidates are seeking two slots on the council. Gerald Sandusky and Pete Percifull, both incumbents, seek those positions. The city hall will be the polling place.

Robert Lee ISD has two vacancies on the board of trustees. Three candidates, Mary Grim, incumbent, Cathy Hendry, and Teddy Millican, will appear on that ballot. Voting will take place in the foyer of the high school.

Seeking the two vacant seats on the Bronte ISD board of trustees are five candidates. Kendall Gibbs and Steve Kelton, incumbents, will appear on the ballot, in addition to Charles Timmons, Bob Frazee, and Karen Blair Huddleston. The Bronte City Hall will serve as the polling place for the election.

Only one candidate will be on the West Coke County Hospital District's ballot for two vacancies on the board of directors. Mary Bessent, incumbent, filed for her seat on the panel. The vacant position could be filled by voter write-in or by an appointment by the hospital board. Voters may cast ballots in the Coke County Courthouse in the election Saturday.

Three candidates will be on the East Coke County Hospital District ballot to fill two vacancies. Those candidates are Charles Sonnenberg, incumbent, Royce Lee and Mollie Childs. Voting will be conducted at the Bronte City

Three incumbent members of the board of directors of the

Coke County Underground Water Conservation District whose terms expire will have their names on the ballot May 6. They are Wayne McCabe, Otis Smith, and Joe Ash. The only county-wide election, polling places will be held at the Robert Lee School(Precinct 1); Coke County Courthouse(Precinct 3); Bronte City Hall(Precinct 2); and Old Railroad Depot, Bronte(Precinct 4).

Early voting ended Tuesday, May 2, for all the elections to be held. The numbers in the early voting indicated more interest than the local elections normally draw.

COUNTRY AGENTS NEWS

CEU Credits to be Offered

Pesticide applicators will have ample opportunity to meet U. S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requirements in the coming

EPA requires that pesticide applicators be recertified. Requirements for applicators certified or licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture are summarized as follows:

Certified Private Applicators certified before January 10, 1989 have two options:

Option 1 - Obtain 15 continuing education units (CEU's) including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management by December 31, 1995, and repeat every five years thereafter; or

Option 2 - On a one time basis, take the Texas Agriculture Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the Texas Department of Agriculture private applicator test and make application for a private applicator license along with a required fee.

Certified Private Applicator's Licenses dated January 10, 1989 thru December 31, 1989 will expire December 31, 1994. If these individuals wish to continue spraying restricted use pesticides, they must take the Texas Agriculture Extension Service private applicator training course, pass the TDA private applicator test and make application for a private applicator license along with the required fee.

Since January 1, 1990, Licensed Private Applicators must obtain 15 CEU's, including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management every five years. These credits must be earned by December 31 of the year preceding license expiration.

Licensed Commercial Applicators and Licensed Non-Commercial Applicators must obtain at least five CEU's each year for license renewal. Two of these must be in laws and regulations and one in integrated pest management.

In the next few months there will be several opportunities to receive several hours of CEU's. On May 25th we will have a Predator Appreciation Day that will be worth 6 hours. This should be a very informative and interesting meeting tuned primarily to ranchers and livestock producers concerning various aspects of predation of livestock. Complete information will be forthcoming in news articles and producer letters.

Later this summer we will have a wheat production meeting worth one hour and the satellite conference in December worth five hours.



Betting on Beta Carotene

HEALTH NOTES

A number of medical studies provide evidence that eating fruits and vegetables rich in beta carotene is good for our health. The latest study suggests smokers in particular can benefit. The study, by Dr. Debra Street and her colleagues at Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health, associates low levels of beta carotene in the blood with an increased risk of a heart attack in smokers.

Published in the American Heart Association journal, Circulation, their report shows that smokers with high levels of beta carotene still have about twice the risk of a heart attack than nonsmokers, but smokers with low levels of beta carotene have about three and one-half times the risk.

Because there are only a few studies looking at the link between beta carotene and heart disease, the researchers caution against taking large amounts of beta carotene pills. Rather, they say the best advice is to quit smoking and eat a well-balanced diet with lots of fruits and vegetables.




According to the UIL schedule, Bree will jump at 6 pm on Friday, May 12.



1994 Hunting Accidents reach all-time low

Texas hunting accidents reached an all-time low in 1994, recording five fatal accidents and 46 non-fatal accidents. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department hunter education officials remain concerned, however, over the number of hunters who may have avoided mishaps had they attended a hunter education course or been

aware of and practiced basic safety rules.

Texas sold more than one million hunting licenses last

"While hunter education awareness and training have increased because of the mandatory nature of the program," said Steve Hall, TPWD education director. amazed how many people involved in accidents haven't found the time nor the desire to improve their knowledge, skills or attitudes about basic safety habits. I'm not surprised either."

Notes of interest: 25 accidents were self inflicted; alcohol was a factor in only two accidents; six shooters were hunter education graduates; and 14 accidents occurred while violating game laws.

"Hunter safety is really a matter of common sense and an attitude sense and an attitude that says you will never point a muzzle at another person or yourself. That one preventive measure of pointing a firearm in a safe direction, coupled with treating every firearm as if it is loaded and being sure of your target, would eliminate virtually every hunting related accident," said Terry Erwin, TPWD's recreation safety coordinator.

"The most significant cause of accidents was dove hunters swinging their firearms out of their 'safe zone-of-fire' and shooting in the direction of their partners. This is why blaze orange is promoted on private lands and required of hunters on public lands," he said. "However, many dove hunters don't wear it because they are afraid the doves will spot them and veer in other directions."

If dove hunters don't wear blaze orange, Erwin suggests that hunters know where they at all times relative to their companions, roads and livestock, etc.

The hunter education course is offered statewide and is required for those born on or after September 2, 1971, to legally hunt in Texas. Everyone is encouraged to attend, regardless of their

"Hunting is actually a relatively safe outdoor activity, but the same things that apply to all outdoor recreationists apply to hunters: be prepared; have the right attitude; plan the activity and then act on

the plan; communicate; and increase your knowledge and skills about the activity; and have fun," Hall said.

Good news about children & TB

There's good news for parents concerned about their children being infected with tuberculosis. It is 100 percent treatable, if caught in time.

"Tuberculosis is not very contagious either," said Dr. Jeffrey Starke, associate professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "Ninety-five percent of transmission occurs because someone has spent quite a bit of time around another person with TB."

Diseases like measles and chicken pox, for which a vaccine was recently approved, are much more contagious.

Starke cautions that the rosy news is no reason to be complacent. It not treated, tuberculosis can become a chronic illness and can be fatal in its later stages.

"And it's not just seen in poor, inner-city children either," he said. "it is a disease that can affect anyone."

Tuberculosis's symptoms include coughing, low-grade fever, general malaise similar to the flu and weight loss. It is often misdiagnosed as bron-

Two "tools" are used to diagnose, a TB skin test to check for the germ's existence and a chest x-ray to confirm whether the germ has been activated. A positive test indicates infection with the TB germ but does not necessarily mean you have

Tuberculosis in not contagious, if the "carrier" is not sick. Only someone sick with TB can pass on the germ.

In children, the disease is treated with three or more medications. Infection (a positive skin test) is treated with one medication, usually isoniazid. Treatment of bothinfection and disease is about 100 percent effective in chil-

"Without proper treatment, the cure rate for TB goes from 100 percent to 25 to 50 percent," he said. "Treatment may require hospitalization and take as long as two years."

Drug resistance, an increasing problem for many infectious diseases, is being seen among TB patients, says Starke. To combat resistance, Starke says health departments employ "good oldfashioned public health."

"They use 'directly observed therapy," said Starke. "Because tuberculosis is a reportable disease, we notify the health department when we have a TB case, and the health department sends a health worker to that patient's

house to observe that medication is taken appropriately throughout the course of therapy. It's very time-consuming, but it works."

Starke says more and more counties are adopting "DOT" since medication non-compliance is a major factor in drug resistance.

Starke said that in an age when people often look for a technological "fix," obvious solutions are often overlooked.

"The major resource in controlling TB is people," said Starke.



If your household is one the millions which has been receiving U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) commodities on a monthly, bi-monthly, or quarterly basis, you can expect to get fewer commodities over the next 12 months than you have received in past years.

The reduction in this program - called the Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) - will be due to fewer surplus commodities as well as non-surplus commodities. During 1994, there was surplus cornmeal and butter in USDA storage which was available for TEFAP; however, there is no longer surplus cornmeal in storage. In 1994, Congress appropriated \$80 million for USDA to purchase additional (non-surplus) food for TEFAP, but in 1995, Congress appropriated only

\$25 million for additional TEFAP food.

However, it is important to note that TEFAP was never intended to serve as a household's sole - or even primary - food source. TEFAP was designed as an outlet for surplus commodities in order to reduce the huge surplus inventories of food being stored in warehouses at taxpayer's expense. As such, it effectively achieved that goal. It is among the smallest of USDA's numerous food assistance progrms, accounting for less than onehalf of one percent of the \$39 billion spent on the programs.

From 1989 to 1993, at a time when funding for TEFAP decreased by \$40 million, total USDA funding for all of its food assistance programs actually increased by \$13 billion. The Agriculture Department feels it can better use its food dollars by targeting its funding on the programs that are designed to be the mainstay of Federal food assistance - the Food Stamp Program, WIC

The history of TEFAP explains why funding is being During the decreased. 1950's and 1960's, needy households that required food assistance were given U.S. Department of Agriculture commodities. In the 1970's, however, the Food Stamp Program - which gave recipients more flexibility in meeting their nutritional needs - replaced the distribution of USDA commodities to needy households. Since that time the Food Stamp Program has remained the government's primary food assistance program for needy households.

In the late 1970's and early 1980's, there was a large build-up of surplus price-support commodities which the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) held in storage throughout the country. In 1981 the President responded to public concern over the costs to taxpayers of storing vast quantities of food by allowing USDA to distribute surplus commodities to needy households. In 1983, Congress formally authorized The Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program (the word "Temporary" was dropped in the late 1980's).

The amount of commodities which Congress authorizes USDA to distribute through TEFAP is restricted to that amount which is in excess of the quantity needed to carry out USDA's other programs.

At first, there were massive surpluses of cheese, rice, honey, nonfat dry milk, cornmeal, flour, and butter available for distribution. However, by 1988, more than five billion pounds of those surplus USDA commodities had been distributed to needy households through TEFAP. Because of this massive distribution, as well as legislative changes in agricultural pricesupport programs, the volume of surpluses was vastly diminished. In fact, by 1989, there was not enough surplus cheese, rice, honey, and nonfat dry milk for USDA to donate for TEFAP distribution. The only large surpluses commodities remaining in 1989 were butter, cornmeal,

Although funding for TEFAP has been decreased, it is important to look at the "big picture," and that is the reduction in TEFAP funding has been more than made up by the funding increases for the main food assistance programs. By focusing more of its funding on the primary food assistance programs. USDA feels it can maximize the effectiveness of its funds in meeting the nutritional needs of the households which are at the greatest nutritional risk.



To make vegetables more appealing, Stuff suggests: *Mixing favorite vegetables with less popular ones. *Offering celery stalks as "edible spoons" for scooping up stew. *Adding red or green bell pepper to tacos. *Taking children to farm stands or produce markets to let them select their own vegetables.

Infants design own schedule

The best feeding schedule for a breast-fed infant is the one the baby designs, says a lactation specialist at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center.

Reading an infant's signals, however, can be challenging, said Dr. Judy Hopkinson, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Hopkinson be-Medicine. lieves that an insight into the physiology of breastfeeding can help nursing mothers understand their infants' feeding patterns.

"It is important for a nursing mother to know that the more often her infant nurses, the more milk she produces," Hopkinson said. Mothers should also be aware that the fat content of human milk, a major calorie source, changes as an infant nurses.

"The fat content varies from mother to mother, from feeding to feeding, and within a single feeding as the milk changes from foremilk to hindmilk," Hopkinson said.

The early milk or "foremilk" quenches thirst and provides calories, fat and important proteins and nutrients. The "hindmilk", released later, contains more fat, satisfies hunger and provides additional calories and nutrients necessary for growth.

"Almost all babies adjust their intake so they get the nutrients they need regardless of the mother's milk fat content," she said.

"This is a marvelous way nature employs checks and balances. Babies consume more milk if the fat content is low. If milk fat content is high, they consume less."

Hopkinson urges nursing mothers not to interfere with the natural process.

"If a mother interrupts a feeding, she may unintentionally reduce the child's fat

Feeding schedules vary

from infant to infant, Hopkinson said. Some babies may nurse four minutes per side six times a day while others may nurse 20 minutes per side 12 times a day.

Babies signal mealtime by crying, fussing or nuzzling the breast. Most babies signal they are finished by drifting off to sleep or by letting go. These signals are more reliable than a clock, Hopkinson

"An exclusively breast-fed infant is getting enough to eat if he is wetting six to eight diapers a day, has regular bowel movements and is sleeping some between feedings, she said.

Regular visits to a pediatrician can also assure a mother that her infant is well fed, gaining weight and growing. If a nursing mother has questions, she should contact her pediatrician or a lactation consultant.




