Voter turnout high

Good voter turn-out marked Gibbs with 110 to be returned most of last Saturday's taxing entity elections in the county. Interest in the governing panels was also indicated in early voting counts.

In the only county-wide election, Coke County Underground Water Conservation District voters returned the three incumbent directors on the ballot to their positions. Joe Ash, director at large, received 325 total votes. Wayne McCabe, Precinct 1 director, garnered 125 votes while Precinct II director Otis Smith received 116 votes.

With two existing vacancies on the Bronte city council, the two incumbents were reelected to the posts. Gerald Sandusky gained 135 votes and Pete Percifull had a 130 total.

John Conley, acting mayor of Robert Lee, gained his first term by defeating challenger Ray Atwater 142-37. Three candidates for the city council filled three council positions on the ballot, Beth Prather, incumbent, with 135 votes, will be joined on the council by Kenneth Green, 98 votes, and Kim Hodge, 100 votes.

In the Bronte ISD balloting, incumbents Steve Kelton gained 118 votes and Kendall

Counties declared disaster

In response to a request from Governor George Bush, the Consolidated Farm Service Agency (CFSA) has declared Runnels County as a natural disaster area and has designated six contiguous disaster counties. Governor Bush's request came on the heels of damages and losses caused by drought conditions from October 1, 1993 to August 31, 1994. The contiguous counties are Coke, Coleman, Concho, Nolan, Taylor and Tom Green. The declaration allows family farmers to qualify for CFSA emergency loans for damages and losses caused by the drought. Emergency loan applications will be received through November 15, 1995, for physical and production losses. CFSA county offices can provide affected farmers with further information and assist them in completing applications for assistance.

Three candidates for two positions on the Robert Lee ISD school board brought out a good number of voters. Elected to the board were newcomers Teddy Millican, with a 190 total, and Cathy Hendry who had 145. Mary Grim, who gained 116 votes as the incumbent, was the third candidate.

Two vacancies on the East Coke County Hospital District board of directors will be filled by Royce Lee and Charles Sonnenberg. Lee received 173 votes, Sonnenberg gained 134, followed by Mollie Childs with 91.

Results for the West Coke County Hospital District's May 6 election were unavailable until votes are canvassed. Mary Bessent, incumbent, was the lone candidate on the ballot for two positions. A number of write-in votes were cast and will be tallied.

At the Morris Williams Golf Course in Austin, site of the State 1-A golf competition on Tuesday and Wednesday, the Lady Steers made their school and hometown proud. The team - Krystal Carver, Melissa Smith, Maranda Wojtek, Meagan Hill, and Kizzie Howell - shot a 455 on the first day and improved 10 strokes to a 445 on Wednesday. Their 900 stroke total raised them to a 5th place finish. In spite of failing to get a medal, the girls have made giant strides. Only Carver had played any competition golf before and she is a junior, the oldest of the squad.







Proof of residency not required

Coke County residents are no longer required to show proof of residency to obtain vehicle registration. Texas Governor George W. Bush signed Senate Bill 178 into law on May 1. The legislation takes effect immediately and is aimed solely at motorists who live in El Paso, Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston-Galveston areas. The federal government has identified those areas as being in violation of air quality standards.

In 1991, Texas lawmakers established a centralized emissions testing program. It requires motorists in the major metropolitan areas to get a vehicle emissions test before the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the tax office could issue registration. An additional 50 cent fee was charged to administer the program.

Meanwhile, Coke County residents were required to show proof of residency to confirm that they were not trying to avoid an emissions test. An additional 25 cent fee was collected to pay for the program.


Because the new law takes TxDOT out of the emissions program, the tax office will no longer collect the 25 cent fee at the time of registration.

TxDOT is taking steps to remove the proof of residency requirement from the registration renewal notices. The state mails more than one million of these bills each month and many of them are printed several weeks in advance. Until the renewal notices are corrected, motorists should be aware that proof of residency is not required for obtaining vehicle registration in Coke County.

Galaxy Classes hold Open House



Becoming aware of news events is a vital life-learning skill that the News Bowl aims to promote.



Predator Appreciation Day set

The last in a series of five Predator Appreciation Days is set for May 25 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in San Angelo, Texas. The day-long activity begins with registration at 8:00 am. Registration is \$10 per person at the door. The training will offer six continuing education units (CEUs) available to all Private, Commercial and Noncommercial applicators at the training.

The educational event is being sponsored by the Extension offices in Coke, Concho, Irion, Menard, Runnels, Schleicher, Tom Green, Sterling, Howard, Mitchell and Glasscock Counties. Assisting agencies include the Texas Animal Damage Control Service (ADC), Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA), Texas Department of Health (TDH) and the Texas Sheep and Goat Commodity Board.

The morning session will be moderated by Rex Jones, Tom Green County Extension Agent. The topic and speaker will include: "Predator Appreciation" explanation, "Interpreting Physical Evidence of Predation", and "Assessing the Costs of Predation", Dr. Dale Rollins, Extension Wildlife Specialist.

SS offers tollfree number

If you're like other busy people, finding time to take care of your personal business during the day is often a problem. That's why Social Security's toll-free phone number gives you service at night and on weekends, in addition to normal business hours.

When you call 1-800-772-1213 on your touch-tone phone at night and at any time during weekends and holidays, you get a recorded menu of choices that lets you take care of certain kinds of Social Security business. You can ask for: *An application for an original or replacement Social Security card. *A form to obtain a record of your earnings and an estimate of your future Social Security benefits. This is called a Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement. *A document verifying that you receive Social Security benefit payments, Supplemental Security Income, or both. You may need this document to show proof of your income to other agencies.

You can also call to ask for these forms during daytime hours--7:00 am to 7:00 pm on business days. Our phones are busiest early in the week and early in the month; so if your business can wait, it's best to call at less busy times such as nights and weekends, or later in the month.

Shifting your call to less busy times helps not only you, but all callers. About one of every five calls made during peak periods are to request one of the three documents listed above. So if those calls are shifted to less busy times, other callers stand a better chance of getting through without a busy signal.

Other services available to callers at night and on weekends include recorded information about Social Security programs and the opportunity to order popular Social Security leaflets.

Driggers returns from Siberia

John V. Driggers, preacher for the Bronte Church of Christ, has just recently returned from a missionary adventure to the other side of the world. The part of Siberia that he, his brother-in-law, Edwin Myers and another Bible instructor, Jay Don Rogers of Delta, British Columbia, journeyed to was exactly twelve time zones away - half way around the They spent five globe. weeks, as part of an educational agreement and cultural exchange with the city of Omsk, a Russian education center with a population of over one and one half milion.

These Bible teachers lectured to teachers and students in several different public schools and universities on THE HISTORY OF CHRISTIANITY IN A WORLD CULTURE.

"The best part of this adventure," states Driggers, "was just spending time with and getting to know the Siberian people."

"Without doubt, the worst part of the trip," he adds, "was traveling through crowded airports, going through customs with some fourteen pieces of baggage (about half of it overweight), and then riding on those overcrowded city buses!"

He tells of one of the most frustrating parts of the trip that happened, not in a foreign country, but, when they were almost home. They arrived at DFW just as some April thunder showers and storms were rolling across the area and ended up about four hours behind schedule.

Driggers relates that one of the predominate differences between America and Russia that his team had to contend with, was the economics of these two countries. He says in a little over three years the exchange rate has skyrocketed from around 1,000 rubles to one American dollar to the current 5,000 plus rubles to the American dollar.

According to Driggers, all the Russian people seem to really be struggling with their newly acquired freedom, as noticed in their out-of-control inflation rates and confused thinking in their leadership about the economy.

John says he is so "very thankful for good ol' Bronte, Texas, USA.

Mr. Driggers wants to invite the public to come to their church building at 118 S. Jefferson Street this Sunday at 5:30 in the afternoon to a "show-n-tell" presentation as he relates some of the interesting stories about his trip. 

We have been told that not letting our feelings out may cause severe depression later, but a study by phychologists at Stanford University suggests that dwelling on the death of someone too long can also result in depression.

Dr. Susan Nolen-Hoeksema and her colleagues found that people who dwell excessively on negative emotions aroused by their loss are at high risk for long-term depression. She says depression is a normal response to the loss of a loved one, but people who recover from their griefrelated depression within a month following their loss tend not to lapse into depression months later.

On the other hand, people who are still very depressed after six months may remain that way for a very long time. There are effective ways to cope with grief and depression and it is important to know that depression is a very treatable problem. ©1994, Lyle Dean, Inc.

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Sports Nutrition -When Myth is confronted by Truth

For a long time, one group of people has recognized how improtant diet can be in athletic training.

In one study, 77 percent of high school and college athletes ranked their parents first or second, followed by the media and magazines as their major sources of nutrition information. Only about 10 percent ranked medical personnel and 15 percent chose coaches as major sources of sports nutrition information.

What this does is question the accuracy of the nutrition information obtained by athletes with so many sources of varying information. In one high school study, football, basketball and track coaches were questioned to see how knowledgeable they were. The results indicated that of 86 percent of the coaches that provided nutrition information to their athletes, only 11 percent had taken at least one college course in nutrition.

Another study revealed that 51 percent of trainers and coaches surveyed believed the most desirable diet should be 45 percent protein, 45

percent carbohydrate and 10 percent fat when the dietary guidelines of most health organizations recommend about 55 percent carbohydrate, 20 percent protein and no more than 30 percent fat.

Several myths have become prominent among athletes who are trying to enhance their physical performance. These myths and the real truth about each concept are as follows:

*Muscle-building myths -The more protein and protein supplements you eat, the more muscles you will have. The truth is that no evidence exists that excess protein will lead to more or stronger muscles. In fact, excess protein is stored by the body as fat. Steroids are by far the best way to develop massive muscle. The truth

is that steroids can be extremely dangerous. Yes, steroids may build muscle, but they can have many risky side effects such as stunting growth, causing acne, deepening the voice and altering sex organs. The right way to build muscle is through a wellbalanced diet and regular exercise.

*Quick Energy Myth - VItamin supplements give you more energy. The truth is that none of the known 14 vitamins supply energy. Some vitamins can help the body better utilize energy but these are ordinarily supplied through a normal diet. The water soluble vitamins such as the B and C vitamins when taken in excess are simply flushed out by the urine. Others such as the fat soluble vitamin A, D, E and K in excess are stored in your body fat and can be danger-

ous when taken in excess. *Performance Myths - Water during exercise upsets the stomach and slows you down. The truth is that no evidence supports or any other problems. Inadequate salt intake causes muscle cramps. The truth is that cramps are caused

by severe loss of water through sweating. Cottonmouth in athletes is caused by drinking milk. Actually, dry mouth is due to lack of saliva resulting from stress and loss of body fluids.

ATHLETES CAN **AVOID DEHYDRATION DURING SPRING AND** SUMMER MONTHS

As Texas temperatures become warmer, it is especially important for athletes to take precautions such as drinking plenty of cool fluids before, during and after practice and competition in track, softball and other sports even if you don't feel thirsty. Thirst is really no guide to how much water your body needs. Weigh yourself before and after exercising and allow 2 cups of fluid per pound of weight loss during sweating. Salt tablets are not the answer as too much salt increases your body's water needs. Besides, salt tablets can irritate your stomach and cause nausea. Working out in rubber or plastic suits can cause serious dehydration, limit performance, thus leading to heat exhaustion and heat stroke. One adequate indicator of hydration is the color of urine. The more hydrated, the lighter and clearer the color.

Weight loss lowers

cholesterol

Measuring the success of a low-fat diet prescribed to lower cholesterol is as easy as stepping on the scales.

Weight loss signals a reduction in cholesterol for most people, according to a study at the DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Participants in the study had cholesterol levels above the 240 considered high by the National Cholesterol Education Program. The 59 men and 164 women were given the American Heart Association's Step 1 diet that limits total calories from fat to 30 percent, with no more than 10 percent of the calories from saturated (animal) fat.

Those who lost five pounds or more in the first month and kept the weight off for six months lowered their cholesterol by almost 10 percent. Those who did not lose weight achieved only a 4 percent cholesterol reduction, that drinking water during ex- according to Dr. J. Alan Herd, ercise causes upset stomach the study's principal investigator.

Children may need more fiber

Many children may not be getting enough dietary fiber.

"The average diet is highly refined, and overprocessing removes much of the natural fiber that children and adults need," said Janice Stuff, a registered dietitian at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Stuff said that a 40 pound

child needs 10 grams of fiber daily compared to 15-20 for teens and 25-35 for adults.

A child can get 10 grams of fiber each day by eating a whole-wheat bread sandwich, a medium apple or pear, a half cup of vegetables and a half cup of beans or lentils, said Stuff.


To be sure a child is getting enough fiber, Stuff suggests: *Adding raisins or berries to

whole-grain cereals.

*Adding whole-grain flour to pancake mix.

*Adding vegetables to pizza toppings and spaghetti sauces.

*Serving popcorn as a snack.

He came home for a 10 day leave following graduation on March 31, 1995. Jowell returned to San Diego April 14 to begin second phase training.







PASS may help SSI recipients

If you are receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) based on a disability and would like to start a new career, you can establish a plan for achieving self support (PASS) to help you achieve your goal. By using a PASS, you can set aside income and/or other resources to start a business, to go to school or to get job training. The funds or resources which you set aside for such goals are not counted as income or resources for determining eligibility for SSI payments or the payment amount.

For example, if you set aside \$100 per month under a PASS, the amount of your income which is counted for SSI purposes would be reduced by \$100. As a result, your monthly SSI benefit would be increased. And, if you are not currently receiving SSI, setting up a PASS may help you qualify for payments because of the reduction in countable income.

There are basic steps to follow when you set up a PASS:

** Choose a work goal that you expect to be able to do when the plan is completed. (The Social Security office can help or refer you to an agency that can help you come up with your work goals.)

** Decide what training or equipment is needed to reach your target job.

** Determine the cost of the items you will need.

** Find out how much money you must set aside monthly to pay for these items.

** Keep the funds set aside for your PASS separate from any other money you receive. A separate bank account is usually the most convenient

way. ** Prepare your plan in writing, and sign and date it.

Bring or mail your plan to the nearest Social Security office for review and approval.






