Fluhmann awarded Carr Scholarship

Jeremy M. Fluhmann from Robert Lee High School has been awarded a Carr Academic Scholarship at Angelo State University for 1995-96.

Over 300 Carr Academic Scholarships for 1995-96, ranging in value from \$1,000 to \$6,000, have been awarded to qualified high school seniors. During the current year approximately 900 students from throughout Texas and the nation, as well as numerous foreign countries are attending Angelo State University on Carr Academic Scholarships. As a general rule, students must rank in the top 15 percent of their high school class, have a high school grade average of 90 or above, and present a combined math and verbal score of 1000 or higher on the SAT or a composite score of 25 or higher on the ACT. Supported by a growing multi-million dollar trust established by the late Robert G. and Nona K. Carr of San Angelo, the undergraduate scholarships may be renewed annually by the University for students who maintain the required academic record. During a four-year course of undergraduate study at ASU, Carr Academic Scholarships can be worth from \$4,000 to \$24,000.

Wilfred Dee "Blackie" Sparks, 72, of San Angelo, passed away Friday, May 26, 1995, at his residence in Quail Valley, after a courageous battle with cancer.

Blackie was born September 1, 1922, in Coke County, Texas to J. N. and Molly Sparks. He was married to Maurine Murtishaw at the parsonage of the First Baptist Church of Bronte on March 28, 1941. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1991.

Blackie was a cowboy at heart and worked on various ranches in the area from the age of 14, which he continued to do after his marriage. He served a brief stint in the Army during the last days of World War II. In December of 1951, he began a 33-year career with the Col-Tex (Cosden) Refinery in Colorado City, retiring in 1982. Childress Melvin B. Childress, 82, of Robert Lee died Friday, May 26, 1995, in the West Coke County Nursing Home.



Through years of constant use and biological wear and tear, the brain, like other vital organs of the body, gradually loses some of its sharpness in processing information, especially temporarily forgetting names. But the University of Texas Lifetime Health Letter points out that virtually everyone has this problem in older age. This normal age-related memory loss does not indicate deminished intelligence or ability to learn, it just means the brain may need more time to recall information from memory. Understandably, many people worry that their inability to remember represents an early stage of Alzheimer's disease, but Dr. Roy Varner, medical director of the Harris County Psychiatric Center in Houston, says the ability to worry about memory loss might be a good indication a person does not have Alzheimer's. He says an ominous sign is when an older person does not seem to be aware of the problem, but family members have noticed.


Storm assistance

Decorations on the serving table included flowers and colors chosen by the class and serving was done by the UMW members and Methodist youth. One hundred people, including guests and workers, attended.


Three seniors, who are members of the United Methodist church, were honored at the Sunday morning service and given a

With the exception of this last dog, all were taken to the San Angelo Animal Shelter. Last year alone, approximately 9,000 animals passed through the shelter. Of these 9,000 animals approximately 7,000 were euthanized, (put to death)

The domestic canine, (dog), cannot survive by themselves in the wild. They will literally die a slow and painful death starvation, and/or by dehydration.

Dogs are "pack" animals by instinct. This means they have to be lucky enough to pack up with others of their kind for survival. Unlike an organized wolf pack, which kills for food, domestic dogs tend to kill for fun as well as for food. Ask anyone who has raised sheep about the financial havoc a pack of domestic dogs can cause.

I have never seen a cute, cuddly, fuzzy puppy or kitten that eventually didn't develop into an adult. It's a fact of life, we're born, grow into maturity, become old and eventually die

Consider some of these numbers the next time you decide you need a pet; dog food, approximately 50¢ a day x 365 days equals \$182.50, vaccinations given at the veterinarian's office run approximately \$45.00 a year, city li-cense tags are \$5.00. So far, we have a total of \$232.50. Now add professional grooming, the cost to spay or neuter, heartworm prevention medication. By now we are up into \$300-\$400 range. Think about it, and this excludes accidents, emergencies, and boarding fees.

Please remember this, pets are more than for Christmas, they are for their lifetime. If you can't handle the responsibility of pet ownership, don't get one.

Wheat seed decisions should be made now

Wheat producers might want to consider obtaining planting seed from area farmers during harvest in the next few weeks due to several reasons. First, we should make a good wheat crop in this area and it should be of good quality. Second, the late freeze in the Kansas and wheat belt area and drought on the High Plains will greatly reduce the overall wheat production picture. This will make wheat prices good for us but will greatly increase the already high seed wheat prices this fall. Producers might want to catch their own seed or contact another producer who looks to make a good crop. If you do catch seed from your field or another producers', make sure the seed is fully matured, has good weight to it and free of weed and wild oats. It would be a good idea to go look at the field your seed will come from and not just look in the back of the truck once it has been har-

In selecting what variety to obtain, producers need to analyze their situation and how the crop will be handled. If you plan to graze out your wheat and not harvest it, there are several of the newer varieties that produce tremendous forage. Also, in the last few years, the beardless varieties have become very popular for graze out, because the livestock can graze the beardless (or awnless) wheat easier when it begins to head and mature. Besides wheat varieties that produce tremendous forage, there are alternatives such as some of the rye varieties, oats and triticale that produce a large amount of grazing. Some producers even mix varieties between early maturing and late maturing so that forage production can be strung out.

Another idea is to plant one field in early varieties and adjacent fields in later varieties and rotate your grazing.

Whatever your wheat plans are for next year, some thinking and decision making now could save you some expense on seed purchase this fall.






