



Overweight kids need healthy diets/exercise


Generally, a young child should not be put on a strict reducing diet unless there is a specific medical reason. Severe food restrictions may interfere with bone, muscle and brain development. For most kids, the primary strategy for bringing their weight closer to normal is to slow weight gain until height catches up. This usually can be done by eating healthier and lighter, and by increasing the daily level of exercise.

It's especially important to try to preserve your overweight child's self esteem. One way is to approach weight loss as a family project so he does not feel ostracized. When planning meals, for example, offer the same healthy foods to the entire family to prevent your child from feeling deprived cr sin-gled out. The main reason more of today's kids are overweight is from living sedentary lifestyles rather than overeating. Television, computers and video games have replaced jumproping, bike riding, and other physical activities. Provide plenty of opportunities for physical activity by limiting television viewing and encouraging outdoor play. Get the entire family involved with bike rides, after dinner walks, and other fun fitness activities.

Here are some additional ideas to help your child lose weight:

Collecting Social Security

Young people who worry about collecting Social Security in the distant future should know that it is not just a retirement program. Disability and survivors benefits are paid to workers and their families. This protection can be extremely important, especially for young families. Some 42 percent of male workers and 28 percent of female workers will become disabled or die before they reach retirement age.

Windbreak tree seedlings available

One aspect of West Texas weather that can always be counted on is the wind. Although it provides such benefits as cooling breezes and power for windmills, it can also cause a variety of problems for Coke County residents. Wind erosion strips bare fields of valuable topsoil and deposits it where it is neither needed or wanted, such as on fence lines, roads, and dining room tables. Cold winter winds raise utility bills and are dangerous to unprotected livestock.

Windbreaks help reduce many of the problems associated with the wind. Field windbreaks significantly reduce soil erosion. Windbreaks around a homesite help reduce dust and protect the home from cold winds. Likewise, properly placed windbreaks protect livestock in confinement or in open pastures.

Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District, in cooperation with the Texas Forest Service, is providing tree and shrub species for conservation planting. Firstyear seedlings of evergreens, bareroot hardwoods and wildlife packets for quail, deer, turkey and squirrel are available at reasonable rates.

Statewide interest in the program is very high, and interested parties should place their orders as soon as possible at the Coke County SWCD/Natural Resources Conservation Service office at 214 East 7th Street. The seedlings will be delivered to the office by the Forest Service on February 14, 1996. To help insure successful establishment, they should be collected and planted as soon as possible after delivery.
