### UIL announces major changes

Last week's biennial realignment and reclassification by the University Interscholastic League for the 1996-97 and 1997-98 high school seasons in the state were cause for celebration or consternation. Depends on who you talk to.

Biggest news locally is the stepping up to 2A for several perennial football state challengers, including Roscoe, Crawford, Lindsay, Sunray, Thorndale, Tornilla, and White Deer.

Robert Lee and Bronte will compete in Region II football with a few changes. In Coke County's district will be Christoval, Garden City, Mertzon, Miles, Sterling City, and Water Valley. The Steers and Longhorns are luckier than most since many Texas schools find themselves traveling long distances to games. Menard and Eden will play farther south than they ever have. The Yellowjackets will make a 278 mile round trip to Sabinal and 300 miles to and from D'Hanis. Eden faces 320 miles back and forth to Sabinal and a 432 mile road trip to D'Hanis.

According to the UIL's Class 1A basketball schedule for the next two years, only two teams will compete against the Longhorns and the Steers in their district - Sterling City and Water Valley.

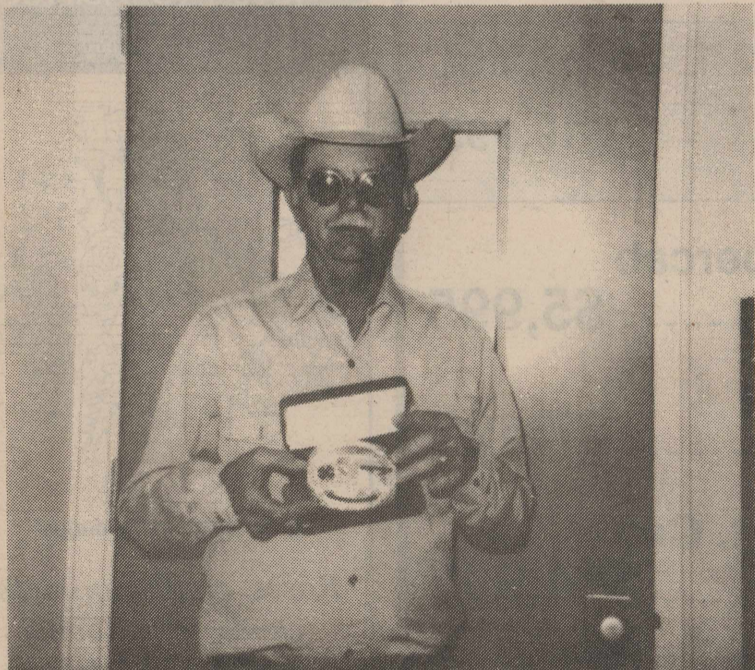
### Valentine's party scheduled

**Shamrock Clinic to begin bone/joint clinic**

Dr. James Wimpee of San Angelo will be conducting twice-a-month diagnostic clinics at the Robert Lee Shamrock Clinic, a division of Shannon Health System. The first clinic will be Wednesday, February 14. Dr. Wimpee is a leading diagnostician in the field of bone and joint disorders involving arthritis and nerve injury or trauma, including sports injuries. "Shannon is endeavoring to have frequent specialty consultations available in its regional clinics," Dr. Wimpee said. "Early diagnosis of some diseases such as rheumatoid arthritis can make dramatic differences in the long term." Because pain such as that caused by arthritis often develops slowly, he said many people tend to try and live with it rather than seek treatment. "By the time they do look for help, a lot of damage has already been done. We want to stop that cycle by taking this service out to the regional clinics where the people are. I think we can make a positive difference in the health of many individuals who otherwise might not seek medical help early on when it's most important."

Dr. Wimpee is board certified in orthopedic surgery. He is a graduate of Baylor University in Waco and Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and he is a Fellow of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons. He has practiced in San Angelo since 1959.

The Robert Lee Shamrock Clinic is located at 722 South Washington across from West Coke County Nursing Home. George Zerucha, PA-C, is the primary health care provider at the clinic.

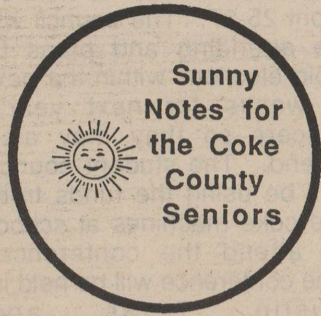

## Longhorn basketball results

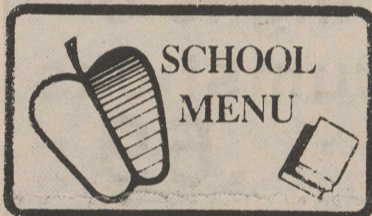
The Bronte Longhorns have been busy on the court the last couple of weeks. Following is a brief recap of the past few weeks.

## Br. 8th graders planning for future

The 8th grade students of Bronte High School are in the process of planning for their future. Career guidance is a part of that plan. Mrs. McCutchen, school counselor, has administered the Career Occupation Preference System (COPSsystem), which includes the Career Occupational Preference System (COPS) Interest Inventory, the Career Ability Placement Survey (CAPS), a measure of abilities, and the Career Orientation Placement and Evaluation Survey (COPES), a measure of work values which are published by the Educational and Industrial Testing Service (EdITS) in San Diego, California. These three instruments have been developed for specific use in group-based assessment components offered to groups of students by both professional and paraprofessional staff including teachers, counselors, specialists in job placement and occupational information, and classroom teachers from a variety of disciplines.

After the test is complete, the results will return in approximately two weeks. The students will then review all data with Mrs. McCutchen and research careers suggested according to each student's input on each test. This is an excellent starting place to help students prepare and obtain information on careers available and to develop a career plan for high school. A meeting will be held in the spring with parents to discuss the results and the career plan.

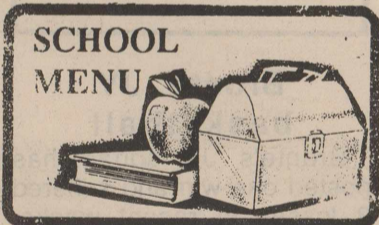

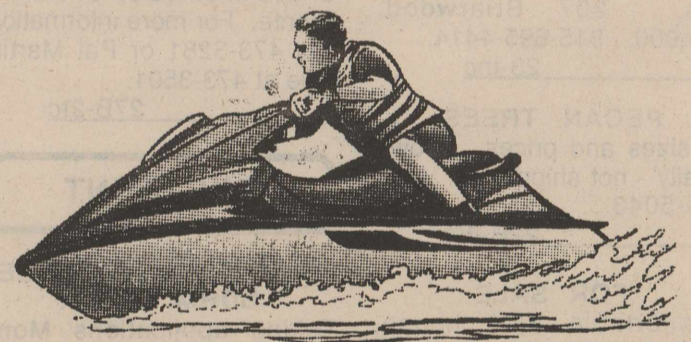
Robert Lee's "A" girls posted the only win of the evening for Robert Lee, defeating Bronte's "A" team 39-11.

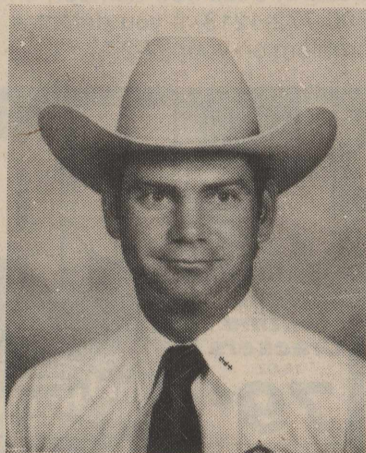

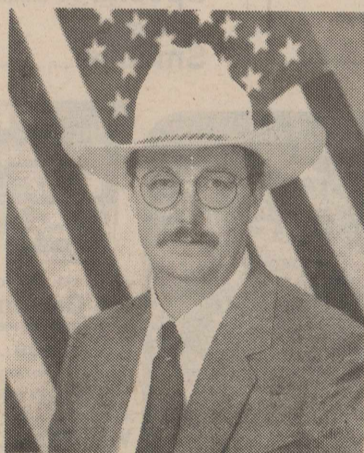

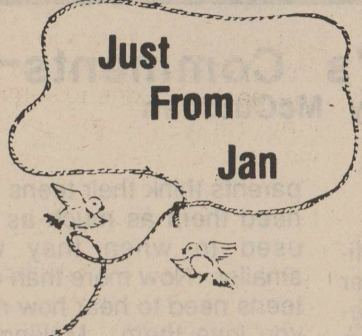

**Cooking for One or Two**

More and more Texas families have only one or two members. Meal planning, food buying and meal preparation pose unique problems for singles and couples. These problems prompt many small families to settle for convenience foods and snacks, leading to monotonous meals and poor nutrition. A little advance planning and new techniques can make meals for one or two more enjoyable and nutritious. Simple meals are easier to plan, purchase and prepare. Plan meals on weekly basis and then post the menus in the kitchen as a reminder to follow them. Consider the food on hand and make a grocery list. The amounts and types of food you buy depend upon the methods of food preparation you prefer and the storage available. Generous freezer space lends versatility to meal planning. Cook large batches of items such as spaghetti, barbecue and casseroles that are easy to freeze. For oven dishes, try this idea. Line serving size oven dishes with foil, fill with food and freeze. Once frozen, remove the item from the dish, seal the foil, label and return to the freezer. Later, simply return the item to the original dish, heat and serve.

\* Main dishes - Main dishes take a large share of the food dollar, so plan their purchase and use wisely. Instead of cooking a whole roast or steak, divide each into serving size portions and freeze individually. Then prepare each section in a different manner for variety.

\* Vegetable dishes - Vegetable dishes provide excellent nutrition and unbeaten flavor for meals. Buy bags of vegetables and use only the amount needed for individual servings. Steaming is a great way to cook frozen and fresh vegetables. You can cook two vegetables at once in one pan with a steamer and conserve nutrients and calories in the process. Marinate leftover vegetables. Congealed salads add variety and keep well in the refrigerator for several days.

\* Breads and Cereals - rice, noodles, spaghetti, oatmeal, barley, and other cereal products can be bought in large quantities to save money. Fresh breads often go stale or become moldy before they are used up in small households. Bread can be frozen and slices removed as needed.

\* Dairy Products - keep powdered milk available for baking. Cottage cheese and yogurt are great for light lunches or supper served with fresh fruit or a favorite bread. Purchase milk in pint or half gallon size.

\* Fruits - include a serving of fresh, whole or canned fruit

in your daily diet. Fruit juices are an excellent source of vitamin C.

Leftover foods in the refrigerator until they are no longer edible is a needless waste of money and food. Prepare smaller portions if you or your family prefer not to eat reheated foods.

**Check W-2 for SS #/name**

Be sure your Social Security number and name are correctly shown on the W-2 form (statement of earnings) your employer is required to give to workers before the end of January, Social Security Manager Franklin H. Upp announced.

"Compare the number and name shown on the W-2 with the information on your Social

Security card. Report any discrepancies to your employer and local Social Security office right away.

The name and number on your W-2 must match your Social Security record so that your earnings will be credited to the correct Social Security record," Upp said. "Call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, if you detect a problem on your W-2."
