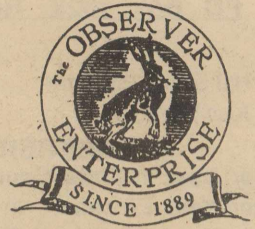

County voters continue to seek change

Change seems to be the rule rather than the exception in the local elections this year. Both sides of the county elected new members to their school boards, while voters on the east side of the county also elected one new member to the hospital board.

Bronte ISD placed two new members on the board of trustees in a very close election. David Scott received the most votes with 146. Jolene Henderson took a narrow win over incumbent Wayne Coalson and Bob Frazee. Henderson received 128 votes, Coalson 123, and Frazee 121.

Robert Lee voters ousted one incumbent in the balloting for RLISD school board seats. Newcomer Harvey Wojtek received the lion's share of votes with 150, while incumbent Bill Burns garnered 141; both will take the two available seats on the board. Incumbent Mark Riley received 93 votes, Manuel Abalos 14 and Steve Ebenstein 29.

East Coke County voters elected three members to the hospital board. Royce Fancher received 227 votes and will be a new member to the board. Incumbents Ed Cumbie and LeDrew Arrott will retain their seats with 164 and 161 votes respectively. Bill

Thomas received 139 votes in his bid for a seat.

Martin Lee will return to the mayor's seat for the City of Bronte; he was unopposed in his bid for re-election. All three council members were also running unopposed. Incumbents Leslie Rolls and James Lammers will serve on the council with newcomer Martha Ratliff.

Of most interest to voters on the east side of the county was the proposition for an increase in the sales and use tax. Voters in Bronte elected to increase the sales tax (which will be used for economic development) by a 118-64 margin.

All members running for election to the hospital board for West Coke County Nursing Home were unopposed in their bids for seats. Incumbents Bill Carwile and Winton Milliff will retain seats on the board. Linda Burns will take the remaining position on the board.

The City of Robert Lee city council and mayoral election had no candidates running opposed. As a result the city chose not to hold an election and passed an ordinance declaring all candidates elected to office. Kelly Nichols took the oath of office for the mayoral seat Monday. Council members John Con-

ley and Donnie Devoll will take their oaths Monday, May 13 at the regular council meeting.

SS earnings limit increased

If you're age 65 or older - but not yet 70 - and still working, you can earn \$12,500 this year before your Social Security benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$3 in earnings. There is no limit for people age 70 and older.

A new law, signed March 29, increases the annual earnings limit from \$11,520 in 1996 and gradually raises it to \$30,000 in 2002. In 1996, the limit will be \$13,500; 1999, \$15,500; 2000, \$17,000; 2001, \$25,000; 2002, \$30,000. After 2002, the annual exempt amount will be indexed to growth in average wages.

The new law does not change the earnings limit for workers who are age 62 but under age 65.

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NOTICE OF PROPOSED SURCHARGE

GTE* has filed an Application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish a maximum \$1.06 monthly surcharge to be added to the monthly bill of each customer for each access line. The purpose of the surcharge is to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with (i) reductions in Extended Area Service (EAS) charges referred to in PURA 95 Section 3.308 and (ii) providing Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) in certain exchanges pursuant to PURA '95 Section 3.304 and the Commission's Substantive Rule Section 23.49(c)(6) and (c)(12). If approved by the Commission, the monthly surcharge will be up to \$1.06 per month per access line. All ELCS customers currently subscribing to basic local service that are currently paying less than the ELCS rates of \$3.50 for residential lines and \$7.00 for business lines, will be surcharged \$1.06 up to a maximum rate of \$3.50/\$7.00 beginning no sooner than the June 1996 billing cycles. GTE will also request that a surcharge of up to, but not in excess of, \$1.06 per month per access line be implemented on an interim basis, subject to refund, until such time as the Commission has entered a final order on this matter. The requested surcharge is intended to (i) replace lost EAS revenues and (ii) replace lost revenues and reimburse GTE for the increased direct cost of service associated with all of GTE's ELCS by January 31, 1996. The deadline for intervention in this matter is July 12, 1996. Persons who wish to intervene in or comment on these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. All requests to intervene should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. **Interest group
promotes safe,
sober prom**

The Texas Coalition for Ve-
hicle Choice (CVC) is urging
parents and students to take
measures to encourage safe
and responsible driving dur-
ing prom night celebrations.
"There is so much excitement
surrounding prom festivities.
But in planning for the big
event, families too often make
a tragic mistake by overlook-
ing a key element of the
evening - who's driving?" said
Toni Barcellona, CVC State
Coordinator.

Government statistics show
nationally that in 1994, more
than 1,700 teenage drivers
who had been drinking were
involved in fatal crashes. This
same year, in Texas 55% of all
fatal accidents involved alco-
hol. In the last 10 years,
250,000 people have been
killed and millions more have

been injured in automobile
crashes involving drunk
drivers.

The Coalition is calling for
students, parents, and teach-
ers to encourage and support
safe driving efforts such as
the Prom Promise awareness
campaign. Local businesses
and community leaders across
the country are sponsoring
alcohol-free prom parties or all
night "lock-ins," places where
entertainment and fun activi-
ties are provided throughout
the night to keep teens off
the roads and sober. Many
young drivers fall asleep at the
wheel trying to drive home
from post-prom parties that
don't end until early morning
hours. Barcellona said,
"Parents need to discuss cur-
fews or travel arrangements
for students who plan to cele-
brate into the wee hours.
Make sure there is a design-
ated driver, not only to deter
drunk driving, but also to help
ensure that tired teens get
home safely."

Barcellona also noted that
emphasizing four simple
messages will help make
proms the memorable times
that they should be:

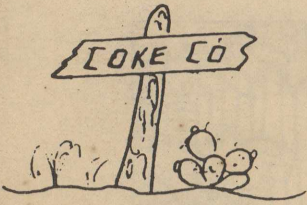
* **Keep it alcohol-free.**
Sponsors of proms and post-
prom parties should ensure
that no alcohol is served to
minors, and take extra steps
to guard against any alcohol
being brought in. Older
guests and chaperones
should set a good example by
refraining from alcohol con-
sumption during these func-
tions.

* **Don't drink and drive.** Two
in every five Americans will be
involved in an alcohol-related
crash at some time in their
lives. Positive peer pressure
can also discourage alcohol-
impaired persons from driving.
Refuse a ride from anyone
that has been drinking. "Party
sponsors can help by provid-
ing "no-hassle" or cost-free
rides home.

* **No Sleepy drivers.** Make
proper arrangements if a prom
party is expected to let out at
an unreasonable hour. Par-
ents need to let teens know
that it's okay to call home or
some other responsible party
if they are too tired to drive.

* **Always wear your safety
belt.** Even if you are a sober
and alert driver, others on the
road may not be. A safety belt
is your best protection in an
automobile crash, and a good
defense against drunk drivers
-- not only on prom night but
each time you travel by car.
The government estimates
that safety belts save more
than 5,000 lives each year,
and could save thousands
more if all drivers buckled up!

Barcellona said, "Let prom
pictures evoke lasting, pleas-
ant memories, not tragic, un-
forgiving reminders of care-
less behavior." Following this
simple advice during prom can
help provide greater peace of
mind for students, friends,
and parents alike.

Tips for lawns, landscapes and gardens

As you water your lawn this summer, do so less frequently, but more deeply. Giving your grass a thorough soaking every 5-7 days will produce a more heat and drought resistant lawn than daily, light sprinklings. Water early in the day if at all possible, because night watering can lead to fungal diseases of the grass. An easy way to determine when your grass needs water is to observe the grass, and when you can see your footprints in the lawn as you walk on it, it probably needs a drink.

When mowing your lawn, don't forget that removing more than one third of the height can lead to heat-stressed grass, especially when we have very high temperatures. Also, don't bag the clippings. Full of nutrients, these clippings will actually improve your lawn, not to mention reducing mowing time and limiting the amount of clippings that are taken to area landfills.

It is time to fertilize your St. Augustine and Bermuda lawns if you haven't done so already. For our area a fertilizer which is high in Nitrogen (first number and low in Phosphorous (second number) is the best. A high Phosphorous content will tend to build up in the soil profile as it is not readily utilized or leached out, and this can cause a tie up of

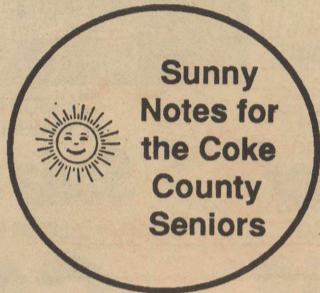

other essential nutrients, especially iron. A good fertilizer to use is a 21-0-0 plus iron. Iron is essential if your grass had a yellow chlorotic look last year.

Trees, like your lawn, respond better to infrequent, deep watering. Remember when watering or fertilizing your trees to place the water or fertilizer at the drip line

(edge of outer branches), as this is where the ends of the feeder roots are located. Also, if you use a string trimmer (weed-eater), be extremely careful not to damage the trunk of shrubs or trees. Continually hitting the bark of these plants with the trimmer can cause open wounds for insects or disease to enter, and severe damage can actually damage the cambium layer under the bark and kill the tree. This is especially true for young tender trees.

Be very careful when deciding how to get rid of weeds in your lawn. Before you buy some of these weed and feed fertilizers, read the label on the bag, as many of these products will kill flowers and trees, especially pecan trees. The best weed control is to have a healthy, growing lawn that is well maintained that will crowd the weeds out, and if not, the old time hoe is still one of the best tools to own.

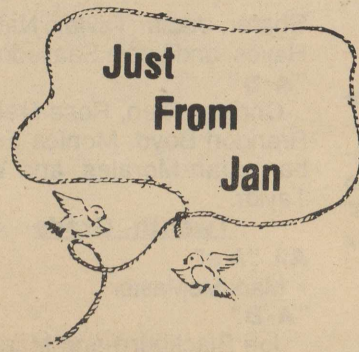
Baylor conducts prostate study

Men with urinary problems may qualify for a Baylor College of Medicine study of drug treatments for benign prostate hyperplasia, or enlargement of the prostate gland.

Volunteers must be 50 or older with any of the typical symptoms of benign prostate urinary hyperplasia: weak urinary flow, severe urinary urgency, difficulty in starting urination (urinary hesitancy) or frequent nocturnal urination. They also must not have been treated previously for BPH or prostate cancer.

Participants will be given one of two drugs, a combination of the two drugs or a placebo to determine the long-term benefit of the medications and to learn if they can block the progression of benign prostate enlargement, which can worsen and eventually require a surgical procedure for relief.

The study is part of a long-term multi-center clinical trial sponsored by the National Institutes of Health. Additional information is available by calling 713-798-5050.

Senior Citizens may need meal assistance

The aging process affects vision, health, mobility and other factors, which may leave older Texans unable physically to drive to the grocery store, shop for food, cook and feed themselves. With these physical barriers, it is no surprise that these elders or their family members may find them undernourished and unable to maintain their normal weight.

Help is available for those who want to help their parents remain healthy and independent as long as possible. Older adults can start taking advantage of the local community services such as congregate meals at the senior citizens feeding sites, local

services providing meals on wheels or other available services for the elderly. These programs for which many may be eligible are designed to give them the boost they need to stay independent and living on their own as long as possible.

Some helpful eating hints for seniors, which also should be encouraged by family members who may be assisting their loved ones, are listed below:

* Eat a healthful diet chosen from a wide variety of foods such as those recommended by the USDA Food Guide Pyramid.

* Know and maintain a normal weight.

* Eat plenty of complex carbohydrates found in fruit, vegetable and whole grain products.

* Eat less fried foods, gravy and other foods higher in fat, saturated fatty acids and cholesterol.

* Limit salt, salty foods and other highly processed foods containing sodium.

* Include fiber rich foods (20 to 30 grams of fiber daily) such as whole grains, bran, and pectin in your diet. These are excellent choices for seniors.

* Drink at least a quart of water daily -- whether or not you are thirsty.

* If you drink alcohol, do so in moderation.

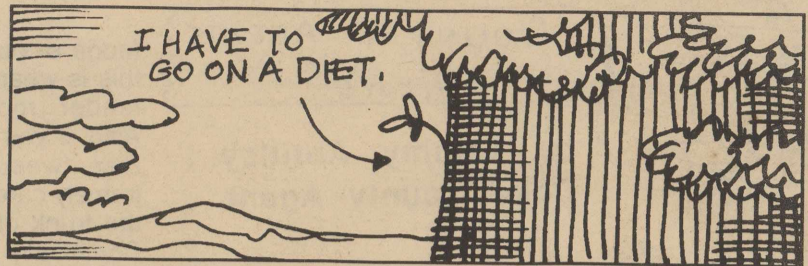
