

Coke County athletes display talent in Austin Bronte and Robert Lee

athletes made an impressive showing, as they usually do, again this year at the UIL State Championship Track Meet and State Golf Tournament in

On Monday and Tuesday, May 6 and 7, Robert Lee golfers heated up the course as the girls racked up a twoday total of 405 to capture second place in state. The golf team not only brought home the silver, but boasted the following medalists: Sophomore Melissa Smith, 91 & 92; Senior Krystal Carver, 95 & 99; Senior Maranda Wo-jtek, 105 & 105; Senior Trish Minjarez, 100 & 120; and Junior Meagan Hill, 113 & 109.

Bronte golfers included medalists Wendy Johnson, 106 & 106; Kim McCorkle, 113 & 114; Angie Shults, 119 & 115; Shelly Sims, 118 & 118; and Olivia Guzman, 116 & 127. The Bronte girls golf team ranked sixth in the state this year.

In track and field competition which took place Friday and Saturday, May 10 and 11, athletes made their Coke County friends and family proud again. Bronte's Kim Hall brought home a bronze in the 100 M. Hurdles with an impressive time of 15.96. Robert Lee sophomore Bree Bolding earned third place honors in the High Jump with her jump of 5'2". Runner Heather Millican, of Robert Lee, joined the ranks of state athletes again this year, placing fourth in the 800 M. Run. Her time was 2:22.95. In the Shot Put, Junior Shalon Waldrop garnered fifth place in the state with her throw of 35'4 1/2".

Robert Lee's Daniel Hayes took eighth place in the pole vault competition, while Robert Lee athlete Matthew Millican ran the 400 M. in 52.77 to capture eighth place. In the 1600 M. Relay, Robert Lee's team, consisting of Aaron Hood, Eric Hood, Mike Pentecost, and Matthew Millican, came in seventh place with 3:34.12.

WHEREAS, emergency medical services teams consist of emergency physicians, emergency nurses, emergency medical technicians. paramedics, firefighters, educators, administrators, and others; and

WHEREAS approximately two-thirds of all emergency medical services are volunteers; and



After their twoday experience with the infant, everyone was having second thoughts about having children. They were very glad to give it back. "It was a big responsibility and it took up all my spare time," commented Holly McDuffie. One person, not paying attention, got his baby kidnapped. Later, the baby was safely returned to Scott Graves.

"Baby Think It Over" is a fourth generation model. She records abuse, neglect, and minutes crying. This prevents students from leaving the baby in their car at night to avoid taking care of her. Larry Graves said, "She woke me up seven times one night." This was a memorable experience for all of the students.

Landscape maintenance practices save water

Proper maintenance is a key principle in reducing irrigation requirements in the landscape. Maintenance practices, such as mulching, mowing and fertilizing greatly impact the water efficiency of any landscape, as well as the landscape's ability to survive a drought.

Research at Texas A&M University has shown that unmulched soil may lose twice as much water to evaporation as mulched soil. Mulch is a layer of material covering the soil surface around plants. Mulches can be organic materials, such as shredded bark, compost and wood chips; or inorganic materials, such as lava rock, limestone and woven plastic.

Use a mulch wherever possible. A good mulch preserves soil moisture, prevents soil compaction, keeps soil temperatures more moderate and reduces weed populations. In case weeds do get a start, they are much easier to pull if a mulch has been used.

Organic mulches will decompose and sometimes wash away, so make checks regularly and replacements when necessary.

In addition to mulching, other maintenance practices help save water in the landscape. Mowing turfgrass at the proper height helps conserve moisture. For example, the optimum height to mow St. Augustine grass for water conservation is three inches. The typical mowing height is 2-2 1/2 inches. However, the taller height promotes a deeper, more water efficient root system. Taller grass acts like a living mulch, shading the ground, thus reducing moisture evaporation from the soil. Also, grass that is allowed to grow taller grows slower; therefore, needing less water and mowing.

Another maintenance practice that adds to the efficient use of water by plants is proper fertilization. Applying fertilizer to the lawn at the proper time and in the proper amount can save time, effort and money through reduced mowing and watering. Fertilizers can also be a major source of pollution of streams and groundwater if excessive amounts are applied.

Fertilize the lawn once in spring and again in fall to produce a beautiful turf without excess growth which demands frequent watering. Use a slow-release form of nitrogen in spring and quick release form in fall. Apply only 1 pound of actual nitrogen fertilizer per 1,000 square feet of lawn at one time. By using this fertilizer schedule, no other fertilizer is needed for most shrubs and trees in the lawn area.

Other cultural practices that add to the efficient use of water by plants are periodic checks of the irrigation system, properly timed insect and disease control and elimination of water-demanding weeds.

What and where our children eat

More of the nation's children are eating away from home during the mid 1990s than in the late 1970s. They are also consuming more beverages and grain-based snack foods and combination foods, such as pizza. And they are eating less fat and drinking less milk, according to data from the U.S. Department of Agriculture food consumption survey.

Parents want to know what and where their children are eating when they don't eat meals with the family, and everyone wants to know how they can make healthier food choices.

* Three- to five-year-olds most often eat at someone else's house, followed by fast food restaurants and then day

Grade school children most often eat at the school cafeteria, followed by someone else's house, then fast food restaurants.

Teen boys - eat most often at fast food restaurants, then the school cafeteria.

Teen girls - eat most often at the school cafeteria, then the fast food restaurant.

Kids are drinking more beverages across the board. The most popular drink is non-citrus juices, which include apple juice, grape juice, and juice blends. Two to three times more children and teens drink non-citrus fruit juices. Preschoolers consume four times more non-citrus fruit juices, with apple juice the most popular choice.

The second most popular drink is soft drinks. Nearly three-fourths of teenage boys can drink an average of 34 ounces, almost three 12ounce cans per day. Twothirds of teenage girls can drink about 23 ounces, which is about two cans per day.

Milk consumption has dropped considerably for all age groups. A little more than half of teens drink milk in the 1990s, compared to threefourths of the teens that drank milk in the 1970s. Lowfat and skim milk are now consumed more frequently than whole milk among all ages except the five and under group.

Preschoolers - drink, on the average, 12 ounces per

School-age girls - also drink 12 ounces per day.

School-age boys - drink about 16 ounces per day.

Children are now consuming more grain-based foods and combination foods than ever before.

Crackers, popcorn, pretzels, and corn chips are most popular. Girls tend to favor

these foods more often than and vegetables are not eaten boys. Thirty-five percent of school aged girls eat at least one of these snacks per day.

Combination foods such as pizza, pasta with sauce, burritos, and tacos are the most asked for food choices for all age groups. Pizza, however, is the most popular. Other foods such as fruits

tal calories, reflecting the trend for the population as a whole. The fat intake ranged from an average of 32 percent for teen girls to 34 percent for preschoolers. The Dietary Guidelines for Americans, which provides guidance for maintaining a healthful diet, recommends 30 percent or less of calories from fat.

Parents should follow the Recommended Dietary Guideline to ensure that their children are eating properly.
