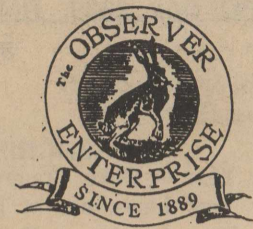

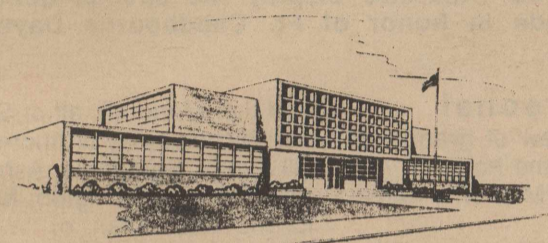

County to begin new budget year

The time has come again to start working on the budget for next year. The County's budget year runs from October through September. We're working diligently on this and hope to have it ready to approve by the first meeting in July. Again, we come to the community and ask that if there are any special requests affecting the County Budget, please let us know by June 10. We really do appreciate any comments regarding the budget and the budget process. We're your elected officials, and if you don't tell us what you want done, we don't know. Please make yourself heard - attend the Commissioners Court meeting on June 10th and let us know what you would like to see accomplished in the County.

The County has been without a County Attorney since January. Effective June 1 Lane Arthur will assume the responsibilities of that office. Mr. Arthur ran for the position in the Primary, and the Commissioners Court waited until the last date anyone could file before appointing Mr. Arthur. District Attorney Charlotte Harris has assisted the County since January, allowing the County to wait until this time.

The County Attorney Secretary resigned March 1 and then the Commissioners voted to reduce the Secretary position to half-time effective with the employment of the new Secretary. The Court felt that this should take care of County business and the Attorney should pay the Secretary for his or her private business.

Judge Davis is still recovering from a stroke at her

daughter and son's homes in Abilene. Judge Moore, Rosa Long, and Judge Walker are taking care of her office while she is recovering.

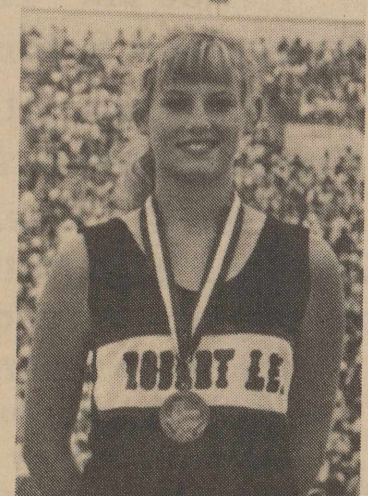

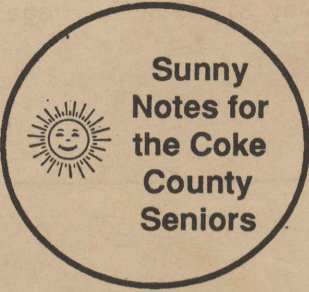

The County has transferred ten thousand dollars from the County Attorney Fund to the Bronte and Robert Lee Park Funds. Both Recreation Halls greatly needed the ceiling and the floors repaired, and these funds should meet that need. With the decrease in valuation the last few years, it has been hard to find extra money for the needed repairs until they have become drastic. The Commissioners would like to start trying to do some repairs each year. This next year we will be working on some ADA repairs at the Senior Citizen Centers and Recreation Halls in Bronte and Robert Lee, the Library, and the Courthouse. The Courthouse will be getting a new front door sometime next week, as the wind popped the other one and broke it. The door needed to be replaced as it leaked air and the closure was worn out.

The County Road Crews are working on the Sanco Sand and Gravel Road (Valley View Road). The materials are being bought by the people involved, and the County is doing the work.

The County adopted a Drug Policy required by the Texas Department of Transportation for CDL Drivers. This policy is now in effect.

Eating heart-healthy at restaurants

Restaurant-goers can make healthy food choices with little planning, say nutritionists at The DeBakey Heart Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"Most Americans realize the importance of lowering the amount of fat and cholesterol in their diet but forgo healthy meals when they eat out," said Lynne Scott, director of the heart center's Diet Modification Clinic and an assistant professor of medicine at Baylor.

Scott is co-author of "The Living Heart Guide to Eating Out," a pocket-size reference guide that lists 160 tips on choosing low-fat, low-sodium foods when eating in restaurants. The guide also offers some planning-ahead advice to diners:

- * Plan ahead for fat consumption. Choose lower-fat foods for other meals and snacks on days when dining out.

- * Do not skip meals in anticipation of eating out. You will be hungrier and more apt to overeat.

"Brown bagging" at lunch

For many busy people, "brown bagging" at lunchtime is the best way to ensure proper nutrition.

- * Cheese and whole-grain crackers.
- * Whole-grain breads, pita pockets, or bagel sandwiches made with chicken, tuna, or lean luncheon meats and mustard.
- * Pasta or leafy salad with low-fat dressing.
- * A frozen entree like pasta, vegetables, and chicken.

DPS approves alcohol testing device

The State of Texas Department of Public Safety, Breath Alcohol Testing Program recently approved the latest equipment in the battle against drunk driving. Time to treat for cattle grubs

Cattle grubs are internal parasites and their damage is largely unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage. Feed efficiency and animal vigor are reduced in infested animals.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May.

The time to control grubs is from now through August when grubs are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency. Considerable hide damage will occur if infested animals are slaughtered.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no functional mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to manage.

Heel flies lay their eggs on an animal's hairs in the lower leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few months, and after eight to nine months, appear in the mature grub state on the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd, it's best to treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide or injectable treatment during the May through August period.

Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulate throughout the body, and kill grubs while they are small. Injectable treatments are circulated in the animal's body fluids to kill the invading pests.

These insecticides come in various forms -- dips, sprays, pour-ons, injections, and spot-on treatments. A listing of approved insecticides and methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the County Extension Office.

Time is ripe for summer melons

If the taste and fragrance of a fresh, juicy slice of melon makes your mouth water, you are in good company. Melons have been a favorite fruit for many centuries. They appear in Egyptian tomb paintings dated to 2400 BC and are mentioned in the writings of the early Greeks and Romans. Watermelons were a common refreshment of Americans in Massachusetts at the start of the 17th Century.

This summer you can enjoy traditional melons such as cantaloupe, honeydew and watermelon, or go for the exotic by trying crenshaw, persians, pepinos, casabas or the African horned melon. Use the following guidelines to pick a perfect melon every time:

Cantaloupe - Buy when there is a smooth, rounded, depressed scar where the stem used to be. If you find some stem, the melon was picked too early. Cantaloupe should be eaten when it gives off a fragrance.

Honeydew - The blossom end should be slightly springy and the shell should be creamy yellow. If the melon is greenish, it will never ripen. Honeydew becomes sweeter

after picking.
Watermelon - They are ripe when the underside is yellowish and firm. If it is white or green, the watermelon is immature.

Crenshaws - Buy when the blossom end is soft and the skin is golden and green. The flesh is golden pink.

Casabas - The shell is golden when the melon is ripe. The flesh is white.

Persians - When ripe, the blossom end is soft and the shell is mauvish with netted skin. The flesh is a shade of orange.

African Horned Melon (kiwano) - The melon should have an orange to a golden yellow color and be covered with spines. It should be five inches long and three and one-half inches in diameter.

Pepino - As it ripens, this melon is green to yellow with purple stripes. It should not be soft or bruised. The pepino is four to six inches in length and oval-shaped.

Any way you slice it, the melon is a great warm weather pick-me-up dish.

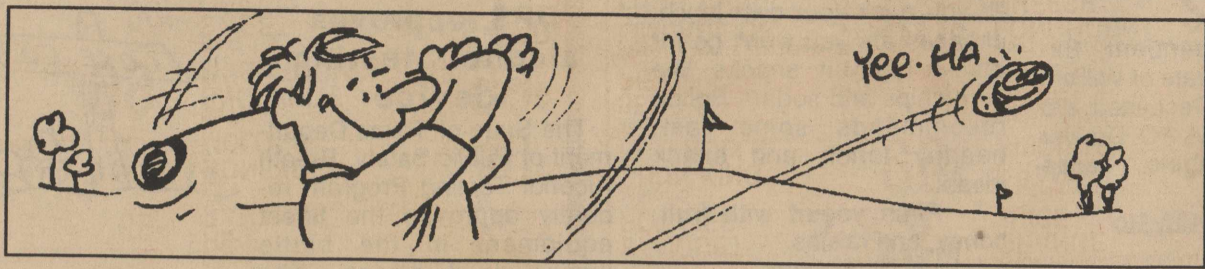
Families who host for P.I.E. are also eligible to claim a \$50.00 per month charitable contribution deduction on their itemized tax returns for each month they host a sponsored student.
