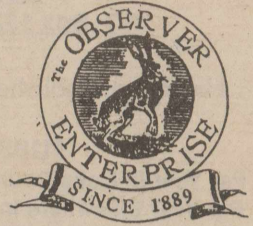

## Dove season opening set

Dove season is set to open in Coke County on Sunday, September 1, 1996. The Central Zone, which includes Coke County, will have a split season, the first period running from September 1 through October 19, with the remaining portion of the season set for December 26 through January 5, 1997. The season for the North Zone, which is basically north of Interstate 20, runs from September 1 through October 30. South Zone season will be September 20 through November 7. The South and North Zones will not have a split dove season. (Please refer to related article and map in this issue for further statewide information concerning this year's seasons.)

Reports from local ranchers have been encouraging concerning dove prospects for the upcoming season. One thing dry weather is good for... and that is concentrating dove populations around water sources. If this situation remains through opening day, look for some good reports from county hunters.

A word of caution to area hunters and fishermen -- if you haven't yet purchased your hunting/fishing license, you may want to get this done before the Labor Day week-

end rush. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has initiated a new system of licensing this year. The new system consists of an on-line phone hook-up with TPWD, and your new license is printed up while you wait. Some problems have been experienced with the new system; so the best advice to area hunters is to not wait until the last minute. Also, remember to take your driver's license and social security number with you when you purchase your new license.

**Ivey, Lee appointed to campaign steering committee**

State senate candidate Rick Rhodes, D-Sweetwater, recently announced his list of steering committee leaders in the 21 counties that make up Senate District 24.

"We've put together a great team of community leaders from throughout the district. We're so fortunate to have such a dedicated and diverse group - farmers, ranchers, teachers, small business owners and professionals. Our team truly reflects and represents the interests of District 24," Rhodes said today while campaigning in Bell County.

Rhodes is running as a conservative Democrat for the Senate seat being vacated by retiring State Sen. Bill Sims, D-Paint Rock.

A steering committee of leaders from the 21-county district has been selected by Mr. Rhodes. Among these committee members are Patti Ivey of Robert Lee and Royce Lee of Bronte.

Ms. Ivey, a native of Robert Lee, is chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority and a past member of the Omar Burleson Foundation which provides financial assistance to interns working for Congressman Charles Stenholm. She also is chairman of the State Water Conservation Commission and a Lifemaster Flower Show Judge and past director of the Texas Garden Club, Inc.

Mr. Lee, a former Coke County Judge, is chairman of the East Coke County Hospital District. A native of Bronte, Lee served as mayor of Bronte and is a 50-year Mason.

**Commissioners' Court meets**

An emergency meeting of the Coke County Commissioners' Court was called August 14, 1996, to draw additional names for the Grievance Committee. Names drawn were Bobbie Allen, Wanda Barbee, and Darrel Pitcock.

On August 16, a budget hearing was held for one hour for ideas and questions from the public regarding the upcoming budget. Three were present at the meeting.

After the hearing, the court proceeded to address the budget regarding changes brought about by the decisions of the Grievance Committee meeting. The Grievance Committee voted nine to zero in favor of Wayne Arrott continuing to receive his present salary until the first of January 1997, when he retires. An adjustment was then made in order to build this salary into the budget. The Grievance Committee voted eight to one on Kenneth Rasco's request to continue his salary as is, and the proposal was brought to Commissioners' Court for review. The court voted to leave Mr. Rasco's salary as the proposed budget stated. The budget was then adjusted with a decrease in the jail expense by \$1413.97 and a decrease in liability insurance by \$1500.00 to satisfy the increase from Mr. Arrott's changes.

The court adopted the budget as corrected and adopted a General Tax Rate of .398738, FM & FC Maintenance & Operation Tax Rate of .085845, and FM & FC Debt Tax Rate of .014867. The total tax rate for Coke County is .49945 for the 1997 tax year.

The meeting then recessed for five minutes and reconvened to discuss a bid proposal regarding a pickup for the sheriff's office. Bids were

authorized for the sheriff's office pickup. This is being funded by a \$17,000 grant from TNRC with additional funds from the county. Bids will be opened the 9th day of September, 1996.

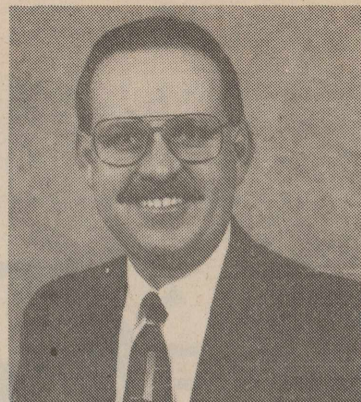

Attending a meeting does not have to mean you have a gripe; it can mean you're an interested citizen. The court meets on the first and second Mondays of each month, unless the day falls on a holiday.

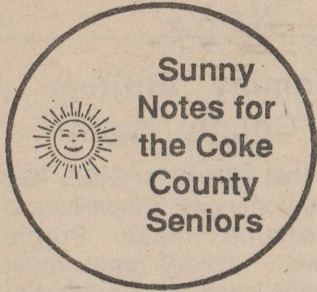

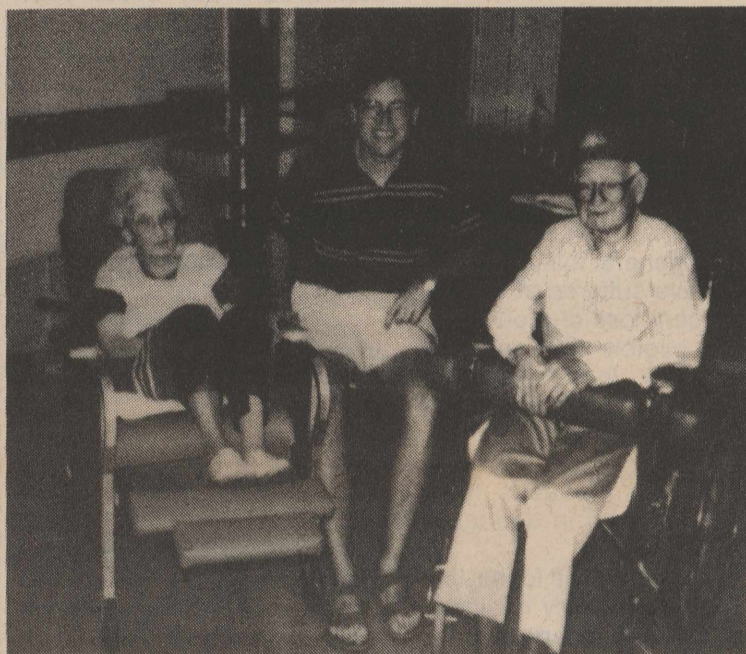

## "Meet the Steers" Night set

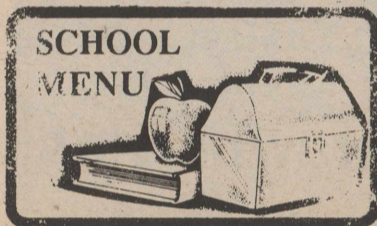

## Chan Langley joins RLISD staff

Chan Langley has joined the staff at Robert Lee ISD. Coach Langley will be coaching the Lady Steers this year. He and his wife, Rebecca, moved to Robert Lee just prior to the beginning of the school year.

Coach Langley comes to Robert Lee from Midland where he was a coach at Midland Lee for 4 years. He was also Assistant BCI at Odessa College under Coach Hefner, the girls head basketball coach, for 8 years.

Coach Langley is very excited about the prospects for Robert Lee's Lady Steers. He stated in a phone interview Tuesday evening that he was very happy with the way practice has gone so far this year. He believes that all the effort the girls have put into practice will lead to success for the team this season.

Although the team did lose some seniors to graduation last May, he feels that the spots left vacant on the starting line-up will be filled successfully. With several senior players on the team and 3 returning starters, he said that size and experience are the strength of the team.

## Women encouraged to exercise for heart

A Texas A&M University exercise physiology study reinforces a woman's need for regular exercise to reduce a risk factor for cardiovascular disease.

The study by Texas A&M exercise physiology researchers Peter Grandjean, Steve Crouse, and John Green, measured 12 premenopausal and six postmenopausal women's lipid (fat) levels after a single exercise session.

The researchers were looking at the effect the single session had on triglycerides, VLDL-C (very low density lipoprotein cholesterol) and HDL-C (high density lipoprotein cholesterol). Specifically they were interested in the way these three enzymes might affect the lipids.

The results showed that the women's triglyceride and VLDL-C levels had decreased 24 hours after exercise and remained lower 48 hours afterwards.

## Emergency farm loans being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by cold temperatures, rain, sleet, and snow are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in San Angelo, FSA Farm Credit Manager, Fred J. Greenway said recently.

Tom Green, Coke, Concho, Irion, Menard, Reagan, Runnels, Schleicher, and Sterling counties are among the ones in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the cold temperatures, rain, sleet, and snow which occurred on April 4 and 5, 1996.

Fred J. Greenway said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Fred J. Greenway said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 24, 1997, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Greenway said.

FSA is a credit agency of the US Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are US citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which US citizens hold a majority interest.

The FSA office in San Angelo is open from 8 am to 5 pm Monday through Friday.

## The Purple Cow

This cow is in every beef herd in Coke County. This cow has been palpated OPEN today. She does not have a calf at least 48 days old.

How far down the road or distance in the future before this Purple Cow delivers you a PAYCHECK if she is bred and conceives today? Gestation time is 283 days, lactation to weaning is 205 days, hauling to sale and selling is 2 days, and 3 days to get the check in the mail. This is a total of 493 days total time before you can present the check to the banker.

With current estimates on cost of breeding and maintaining a beef cow for one year ranging from \$365 to \$425, let's assume the cost will be \$1.00 per day for maintaining a cow. With this, we can conclude that an open cow bred today costs you \$493 to own her from today to selling a calf. Will she raise a

calf that will sell for \$493 - 493 days from now? Palpation can determine these Purple Cows. Every cow must provide cash flow during the year by one of two methods: she produces a calf to be sold or added to inventory or we sell the cow.

Should we keep these Purple Cows in our herds, calving percentage will determine the size of the burden the calving cows must carry to allow this "freeloader" to grace our cow herds. Suppose you have 20 cows and have a 90% calf crop; this will result in 18 calves that must carry the burden of the two Purple Cows' loss of \$986, or \$54.77 per calving cow. If calving percentage drops to 80%, the burden per calving cow doubles.

As you can see from this example, these Purple Cows get pretty heavy for her pasture mates and your pocketbook before she provides some sort of calf to sell.

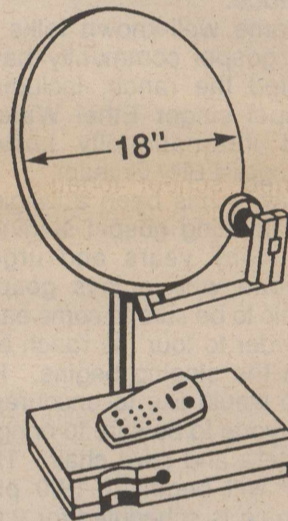

**Supplements not best for better health**

Those who think they are getting all the vitamins and nutrients needed each day through supplements instead of food, should think again.

"Vitamins in the form of pills and liquid or powdered supplements are no substitute for the real thing," according to Dr. Mary Kinney Bielamowicz, registered dietitian and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Not only are these supplements missing important fiber provided by food, they are big economic wastes."

However, supplements may benefit some such as the elderly who suffer from certain types of dementia or memory loss and forget to eat, she said. Doctors also may recommend liquid supplements in between meals for those who are underweight.

"In these cases, supplements provide carbohydrates, proteins and fats," Bielamowicz said.

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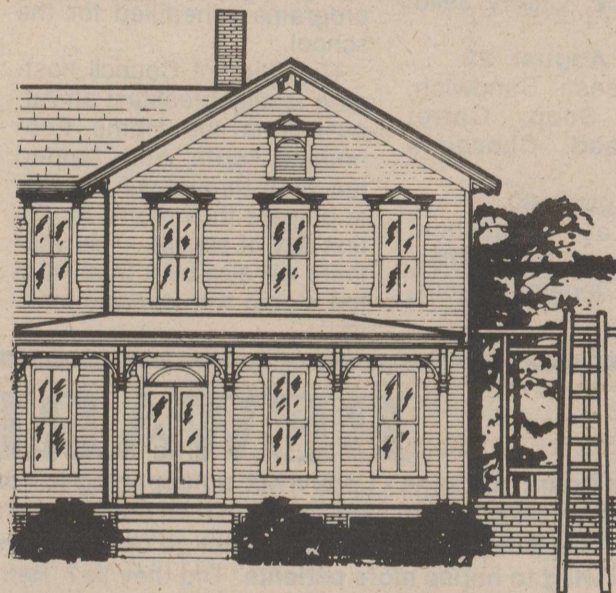

## Counselor's Comments by Vicky McCutchen

The summer flew by for most of us, and it seems parents are busier than ever these days. Busy doing what? Just for starters, both parents are working outside the home, and living in a small town sometimes requires commuting. This means getting home later with those same responsibilities of helping kids with homework and transporting them to and from extracurricular activities, whether it be church, scouts, gymnastics, piano, dentist, and the list goes on. Somewhere in between, there has to be time for a meal each evening and maybe a little conversation. Time does fly and before you know it, the time is gone.

Researchers learned recently from a survey that parents would rather have more time than money. With the schedule mentioned previously, parents barely have time to brush their teeth. So how do they have time to help their children succeed in school? The key is finding more time by using time wisely and more efficiently.

One way is to use time in the car with the kids. The road to San Angelo or Abilene can prove to be a worthwhile learning experience. Review those spelling words, discuss

the contents of that essay they have due, repeat addition facts, study vocabulary words, and the list could go on. Another way is to set priorities by deciding what's really important. Then decide how to spend your time and make sure your decisions reflect what matters. A good example would be to order food to go and spend time reading with your child instead of slaving for hours over a meal. By spending one-on-one time with kids, parents are sending a strong message of "you are special", and kids do notice. Maybe you are forgetful and need to make an appointment on the family calendar with your child once a week. Treat that appointment as seriously as if it were an important business meeting. Remember the 80/20 rule that businesses often use. It simply means that 80 percent of the results in any job come from just 20 percent of the effort. Use this rule as you decide how to spend your time. Instead of just "doing things right," you'll start "doing the right things."

Remember, five years from now your kids won't remember the night you left the dishes in the sink. But, they'll treasure forever the memory of the walk you took with them to look at the night sky.

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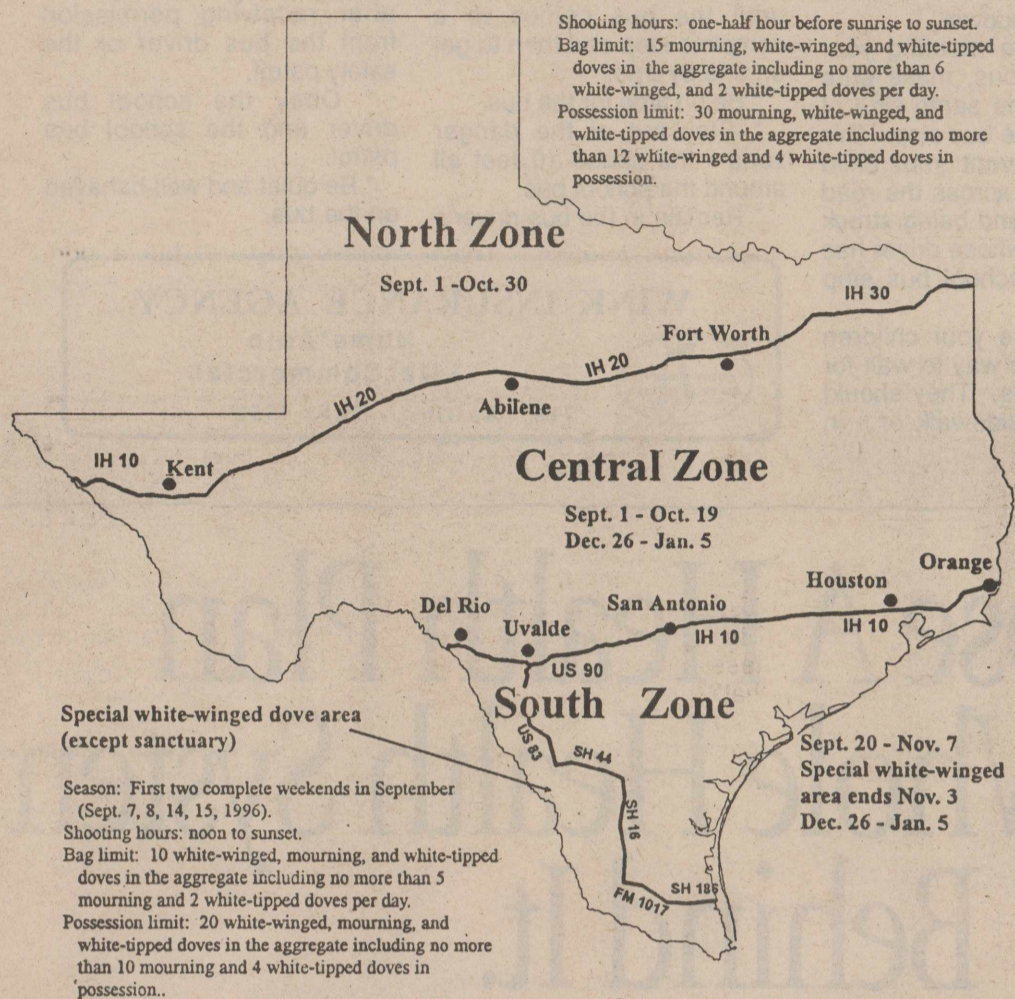
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# 1996-97 Dove Hunting Seasons



## Dove hunting prospects good

Considering opening day of dove season in Texas is typically hot and dry anyway, don't expect this year's drought to have much of an impact on the birds or the hunters, according to state wildlife officials.

"If you've hunted doves much in Texas, you know it's probably going to be hot," offered Vernon Bevill, migratory bird program director for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). "And, mourning doves are accustomed to Texas weather conditions. I expect this year's hunting prospects to be similar to past seasons and potentially better in some areas due to dry conditions."

Texas will normally produce about 50 million mourning doves annually, according to Bevill, and even though biologists around the state have documented a decline in numbers based on their breeding season surveys, there should still be plenty of birds in September. "Even if statewide production is down to 35 or 40 million mourning doves, that's still a very hardy population and we also get millions of migrant birds passing through Texas that were produced in states to our north," Bevill said.

Because mourning doves can travel upwards of 20 miles per day during the nesting

season and prefer watering and feeding in relatively dry areas, bird activity could actually improve this year, according to Ron George, TPWD wildlife division deputy director. "If there is seed on the ground, dry weather usually makes it easier for doves to feed. They prefer feeding on open ground where they can get to the vegetation and they like to land on dry ground near tanks and lakes when watering."

If the dry weather persists, George added, it may actually be of benefit to hunters, too. "With fewer sources of water, the birds are going to congregate around those remaining watering places," he explained. "I wouldn't recommend sitting over a water hole, because doves tend to avoid heavy hunting pressure and you could burn out a spot in a hurry."

George suggests allowing the water to serve as an attractant. "Back away from the water and take advantage of passing shots at birds coming by. Because grain crops may be somewhat reduced this year, doves will likely be more concentrated and hunting opportunity can be better than usual."

Brownwood biologist Larry Holland is hoping the dry weather continues, at least through the first couple of weeks of the season. "Last year was a disaster because we had a cool front come in

along with a couple inches of rain and it pushed our resident doves out before the season opened.

"As for dry conditions around here, we haven't reached the critical stage yet," Holland said. "We could stand a rain, but we've had some scattered showers. There may be a little less seed production because it was so dry early when the good dove feed started to grow, but right now we're seeing a lot of resident birds and good concentrations of them."

Holland noted some doves are still nesting now and he reports seeing concentrations of doves in fields they'll probably be utilizing during September. He suggests hunters make some pre-season scouting trips in search of fields and native food sources preferred by doves, such as sunflower and dove weed or goat weed. "If you can find concentrations of doves in fields now, that's likely where they're going to be when the season starts."

In the Panhandle, good numbers of doves are showing up particularly in and around CRP (Conservation Reserve Program) fields, which serve as both feeding and nesting areas in the High Plains ecological region.

"Recent rainfall in the High Plains has improved the nest habitat, filled small stock ponds and stimulated a growth of major dove food

plants," according to biologist Jim Ray. "However, this additional surface water and food supply may make hunting more challenging in some areas because the doves can disperse over a wide area rather than concentrate in the traditional areas. Hunters should plan to check their areas before the season opens to determine how the birds are distributed."

As usual, according to Amarillo biologist Danny Swebston, "Hunter success in the northern half of the Panhandle will depend on when the first major cold fronts arrive. The southern counties in the region generally can count on good hunting through mid-October."

Despite a dry cycle that's lasted more than four years in the Trans Pecos, dove hunters should experience better hunts for a longer period of time this season, according to Alpine biologist Mike Hobson. "Native seed production, availability and distribution throughout the Trans Pecos far exceeds that of last year. Hunters should plan on late evening hunts around stock tanks, springs or seeps which provide permanent water sources."

Dove hunting season opens Sunday, Sept. 1 in the North Zone for 60 consecutive days. The Central Zone season runs Sept. 1-Oct. 19 and Dec. 26-Jan. 5. In the South Zone, dove season runs Sept. 20-Nov. 7 (except in the Special White-winged area, which closes Nov. 3) and Dec. 26-Jan. 5. The daily bag limit is 15 in the aggregate, including no more than six white-winged and two white-tipped doves.

Season dates in the special white-winged dove area are

Sept. 7, 8, and 14, 15. Bag limits are 10 per day in the aggregate, including no more than five mourning doves and two whitetips.

Dove hunters are reminded that a valid Texas hunting license is required, along with a Special White-winged Dove Stamp in order to take whitewings.



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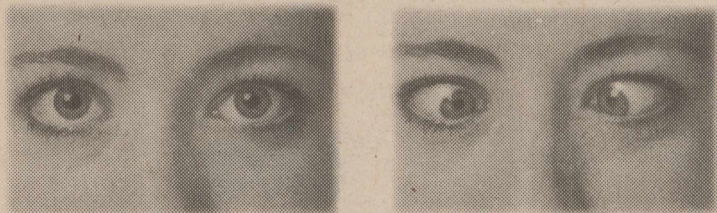

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### Help prevent school bus fatalities

New clothes, backpacks, lunch boxes, school buses. The first day of school is exciting for students, but the new school year can bring tragedy if school bus safety rules are not followed. The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds motorists to obey traffic laws and watch for children boarding or exiting school buses. Parents and teachers should talk to children about school bus safety.

In 1995, no school bus drivers or passengers were killed while riding on school buses in Texas, but 1,370 people were injured while traveling on them. Seven people were killed in accidents directly or indirectly involving school buses, while 2,556 were injured.

The most common time for accidents is when school buses are loading or unloading students. Students should be taught safety rules and to watch for traffic before crossing streets. Students also should watch for vehicles illegally passing stopped school buses on either side of the bus. According to the National School Bus Loading and Unloading Survey, most children injured or killed while getting on or off buses are under the age of 10.

A safe, reliable and efficient system for transporting children to and from school is part of the total educational program. To ensure the proper operation of school transportation systems, the DPS oversees and updates the state's school bus driver training program.

"Practicing good school bus safety requires a combined effort of the motoring public obeying the traffic laws, parents and teachers educating children to be safe and school bus drivers being properly trained to decrease the number of school bus related accidents," said Debbi Goertz, DPS program administrator for school bus transportation.

**Reminders for motorists:**

\* Drive with care when near a school bus. If you approach a school bus from either direction and the bus is displaying alternately flashing lights, you must stop until the school bus has resumed motion, until you are signaled by the driver to proceed, or

until the red lights stop flashing.

\* You are required to stop when meeting or passing a school bus which is on a different roadway or a controlled-access highway where the stop is in a loading zone and pedestrians are not permitted to cross.

**Reminders for children and students:**

\* Handling a school bus requires skill and concentration. Remind children to stay in their seats

and keep hands and arms inside the windows.

\* If you are meeting your child at the bus, make sure you are on the same side of the road as the bus stop. This will help prevent your child from running across the road to meet you and being struck by a vehicle whose driver has ignored the school bus stop law.

\* Make sure your children know the safe way to wait for the school bus. They should stay on the sidewalk or - in

rural areas - well off the road. Remind them not to board until the bus comes to a complete stop and then to get on one by one.

- \* Be on time for the bus.
- \* Stay out of the danger zone - the space 10 feet all around the school bus.
- \* Remain in the bus driver's

line of vision.


\* Cross the roadway only after receiving permission from the bus driver or the safety patrol.

\* Obey the school bus driver and the school bus patrol.

\* Be quiet and well-behaved on the bus.

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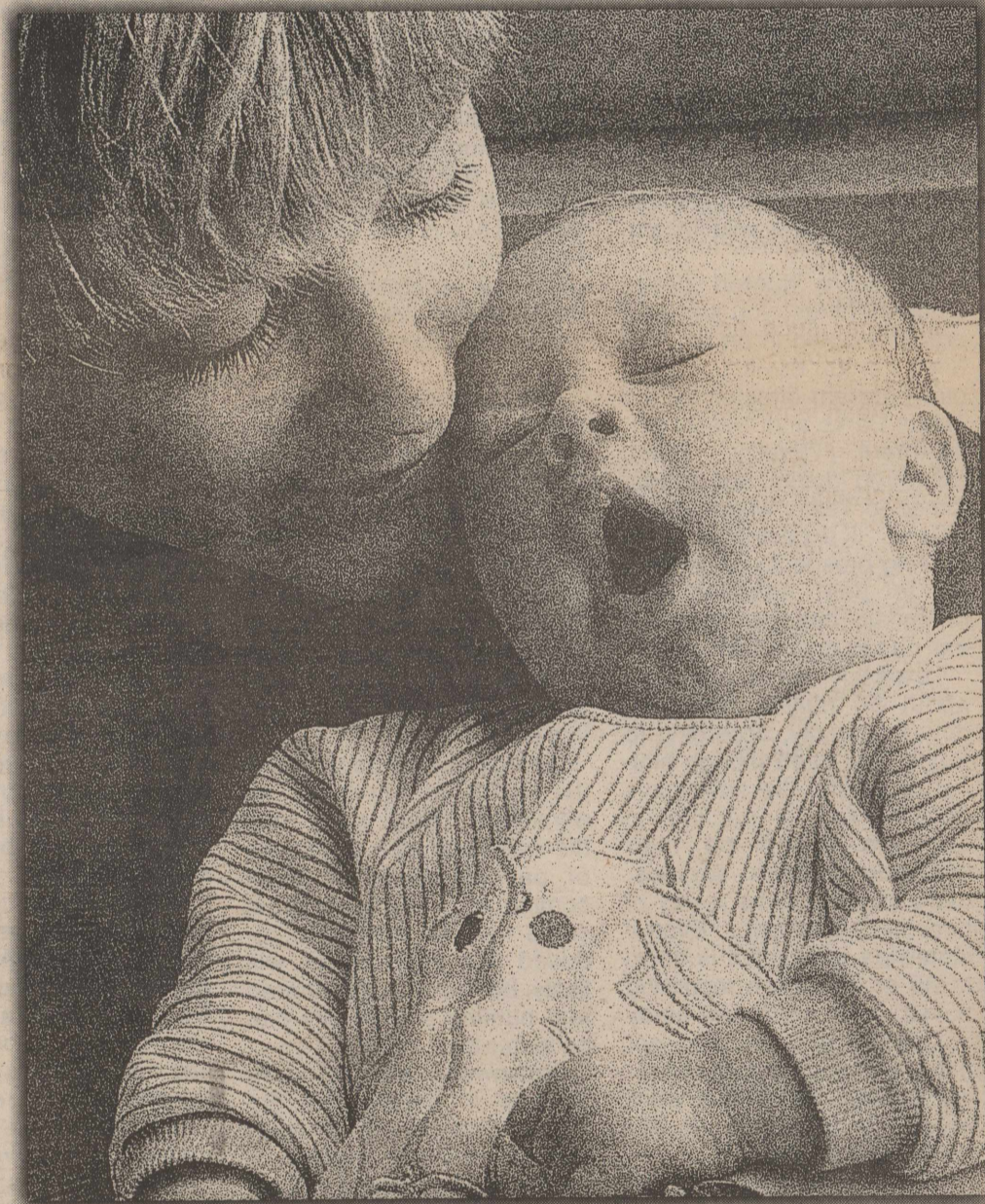
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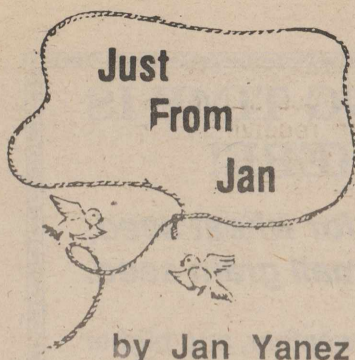

### Reduce the sugar in your diet

Americans eat about 140 pounds of sugar and sweeteners per person in a year. Nearly 1/5 of our calories come from sugar. We use sugar in preparing foods at home, but as much as 75 percent of the sugar in our diets comes from foods made outside the home by food manufacturers.

#### Names of sugars used in foods

There are more than 100 substances called sugars which can be added to foods, so you must learn to read labels and look for terms such as these: Sugar, Honey, Corn syrup, Molasses, Brown sugar, Invert sugar, Lactose, Sucrose, Glucose, Dextrose, Fructose, Turbinado sugar, High-fructose corn syrup, Maple syrup, Manitol, Sorbitol, Dextrins.

#### Reducing sugar in your diet

- \* Use less of all sugars. Add less sugar to foods, coffee, tea, cereal, and fruit.

- \* Choose fewer foods high in sugar such as prepared baked goods, candies, and sweet desserts.

- \* Read ingredient labels to identify all the added sugar in a product. Select items lower in total sugar when possible.

- \* Buy fresh fruits or fruits packed in water, juice, or light syrup rather than those in heavy syrup.

- \* Reduce the sugar in foods prepared at home. Try new recipes or adjust your own. Start by reducing the sugar gradually until you have decreased it by one-third or more.

### Forms of government defined

**Feudalism** - You have two cows. Your lord takes some of the milk.

**Pure Socialism** - You have two cows. The government takes them and puts them in a barn with everyone else's cows. You take care of the cows. The government gives you as much milk as you need.

**Bureaucratic Socialism** - You have two cows. The government takes them and puts them in a barn with everyone else's cows. They are cared for by ex-chicken farmers. You have to take care of the chickens the government took from the chicken farmers. The government gives you as much milk and eggs as the regulations say you need.

**Fascism** - You have two cows. The government takes both, hires you to take care of them, and sells you the milk.

**Pure Communism** - You have two cows. Your neighbors help you take care of them and you all share the milk.

**Dictatorship** - You have two cows. The government takes both and shoots you.

**Pure Democracy** - You have two cows. Your neighbors decide who gets the milk.

**Representative Democracy** - You have two cows. Your neighbors pick someone to decide who gets the milk.

**Bureaucracy** - You have two cows. At first the government regulates what you can feed them and when you can milk them. Then it takes both, shoots one, milks the other and pours the milk down the drain. Then it requires you to fill out forms accounting for the missing cows.

**Anarchy** - You have two cows. Either you sell the milk at what your neighbors think is a fair price or they try to take the cows and kill you.

**Capitalism** - You have two cows. You sell one and buy a bull.

### Snake venom may lead to cancer drug

The striking molecular resemblance of enzymes from rattlesnake venom and human cancer cells may help nature bite back at the deadly disease with potent new drugs.

A trial drug called Batimastat was found to stop the invading cancer cells, said Dr. Edgar Meyer, a biochemist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Meyer's previous observation that the molecular structure of rattlesnake venom enzyme is almost identical to those of human cancer cells has aided research into finding ways to stop cancer.

Although the enzymes differ, he said, the venom molecules have fundamentally the same structures as a cancer cell. The biochemist noted that cancer is extremely complex, "but there are steps which define what happens and when. Then you look for inhibitors that are good at stopping that process."

### New vaccine found for Lyme disease

A new vaccine may provide the first effective protection against Lyme disease, say medical researchers in Texas and Maryland.

Scientists at Texas A&M University's Institute of Biosciences and Technology in Houston and MedImmune, Inc., in Gaithersburg, Md., say tests in laboratory animals suggest the new candidate vaccine could protect humans against Lyme disease even after they've been infected with the bacterium that causes the disease.

If tests of the vaccine in lab-

oratory animals continue to be promising, MedImmune plans to request FDA approval to begin studies in humans in 1997, company officials say.

Lyme disease is caused by a bacterium known as *Borrelia burgdorferi*. The spiral-shaped organism is found in tiny ticks called deer ticks, which pass the disease to humans and animals when the ticks bite them to feed on their blood.

**Hummingbirds need help heading south**

Texas and other parts of the southeast United States are about to be invaded - not by space aliens, but by hummingbirds. The tiny birds, especially the Ruby-throated Hummingbird, will soon begin their long migration from summer nesting grounds in Texas and points north to overwintering sites in the tropics of Mexico and South America.

Due to the severe drought this year, hummingbirds need your help more than ever. The drought has greatly reduced the nectar-rich plants that the hummers need to survive, so feeders will be sorely needed. After the long trip, in some cases from as far as Alaska, the hummers need a place to stop and rest before the hazardous final leg of their journey.

Many hummingbirds are trans-gulf migrants that travel across the Gulf of Mexico to their winter homes. Hummingbirds have been migrating to the tropics for thousands of years. This behavior probably began with the last Ice Age. They leave with the fall and onset of winter to seek flowering plants and insects in the tropics, returning again in the spring.

Seventeen species of hummers have been recorded in North America, and Texas is visited by all. Ten of these species are more common and we refer to them as the Texas Ten. The other seven are rare and included the elusive Green Violet-ear and Blue-throated hummingbirds. Many of the rare hummingbird species that visit Texas do so during the fall migration season.

And, it isn't too early to begin planning for the spring migration as well. Now is the time to start planting a hummingbird garden for next spring, wildlife experts say. Native perennial, nectar-rich flowers not only are beautiful to look at, but also provide a valuable food source for the hummers in the area. The three most favored species of flowers for hummers are salvia, honeysuckle, and lantana. Other favorites include hibiscus, scarlet sage, Turks cap, trumpet creeper, morning glory, shrimp plant, four-o'clock, and Indian paintbrush.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is currently in its third year of a five-year study to map and record hummingbird migration patterns, feeding habits and locations. The public is being

asked to help. If you feed hummers, plan to enroll in the survey now for next year. The survey for 1997 will begin early in January.

A \$6 donation will allow you to participate in this survey along with over 3,000 other Texans. Survey participants will receive a packet that includes a hummingbird range map, a packet of native seeds to attract hummingbirds, recipes for hummingbird nectar and a survey form to record hummingbirds sighted.

The most common hummingbirds seen during fall migration are the Ruby-throated and Black-chinned Hummingbirds. Ruby-throated hummers breed in the Eastern part of the state with a scattering of isolated occurrences throughout the western part of the state. Black-chinned Hummingbirds are commonly found in the Southwestern part of the state with isolated occurrences around the Houston-Galveston area and throughout the Panhandle.

Ruby-throated males are easily identified by their bright red chin feathers, called a gorget, and a green upper body. Black-chinned males, as their name suggests, have a black gorget with a purple band underneath it, along with the green upper body that is common among most hummingbirds. Sometimes the red throat on a Ruby-throat is extremely dark and can be easily mistaken for a Black-chinned hummingbird, but the red is distinguishable under correct lighting conditions. While the two species' ranges do overlap in the Central Texas area and along the upper central coast, they are not commonly found together in opposite parts of the state.

You can help the hungry hummers by putting out hummingbird feeders. Hummingbird nectar is easy to make: combine 1 part sugar with 4 parts water and bring to a gentle boil. The excess can be kept in the refrigerator for a week. Remember to clean your feeder every 2-3 days to reduce bacterial growth. Red food coloring is not needed in your mixture because most feeders have enough red on them to attract hummingbirds.

### Veterans seminar to be held in San Angelo

Did you know Texas veterans now have \$110,000 in special low-interest loans available for the purchase of a home, land or to make home improvements?
