Applicant proposes a Monthly City Gare Rate Calculation (MCGRC) to replace the rate approved in GUD 3543. The MCGRC recovers the costs of purchasing, storing, and transporting gas to the city gates, including an adjustment provision to recover the carrying cost of working gas in storage. Applicant also proposes transportation and storage rates for city gate deliveries with tracking clauses to recover fuel and lost and unaccounted for gas.

The proposed.effective date of the change is November 29, 1996. The change is a major change, and will result in an increase in annual revenues of approxi mately $\$ 24.2$ million or 4.8 percent $(4.8 \%)$. The customers affected are the 1.3 million residential and commercial customers in Texas served by Lone Star Gas Company under the rates established by the local regulatory authorities in the municipalities and the Railroad Commission in the environs areas.

A statement of Intent to make such change has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas in GUD 8664 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office in Austin, Texas and at the offices of the Applicant in Dallas, Texas.

New UIL tiebreaker rule well received Only nine out of 160 football districts statewide are not bali districts statewide are not
using the new University Interscholastic League (UIL) tiebreaker rules that settles games that end in a tie after regulation play, league officials reported recently.
Conference 5A has the most districts not using the new tiebreaker with six, while Conference 1A and Six-Man each have a perfect mark with all 16 districts using the new all 16 districis using the new 4A, 3A, and 2A each have one district not using the new procedure.
The first-year NCAA rule (UIL football schools play under NCAA playing rules and not National Federation) allows games in district and post-district play to settle ties with an overtime period with with an overtime period with
each team alternating poseach team alternating pos-
sessions starting at the opponent's 25 -yard line.
In non-district games, games will still end in a tie, and in district play, schools as a group have the option of using the new rule or some other method(s). In the playoffs, all games will be played with the new NCAA rule.
In overtime, the possession continues until a team scores or loses possession by a turnover or on downs. If the teams remain tied at the end of the first alternating possession, another overtime ensues, and the process is repeated until there is a winner.

Since 1928, the UIL has used a system of penetrations (inside an opponent's 20-yard line), first downs and total yardage to determine which team might advance for playoff purposes or to help determine district wins or losses.
"The early responses from teams playing overtime games has been positive," UIL Athhas been positive," UlL Ath-
letic Director Charles Breithaupt said. "Coaches and fans have been pleased with the excitement generated in overtime games."

Just as children and adolescents have a deeply rooted instinct to explore the world around them, they also have a need to push and test the limits of acceptable behavior This is their way of asserting themselves, testing their strength and intelligence, and learning how others will respond to them.
Parents often lament that they seem to spend much of their time reprimanding children for the little things . dawdling at breakfast, fighting with siblings, leaving toys or clothes scattered throughout the house. Such behaviors, while irritating, are pretty much the norm for children. Knowing it is children's job to test limits and the parent's job to set limits gives us more realistic expectations in the area of discipline.
A well thought out discipline plan can save parents from searching for appropriate responses on the spot. By setting limits, communicating them clearly to children, and enforcing them consistently, parents can show children that there is a cause ad effect relationship between behavior and consequences and that they can count on the parent's behavior to be predictable.
The word discipline means to teach, to train, and to strengthen. Children will feel loved, learn more effectively, and be more productive in an atmosphere that has structure and predictability. Appropriate boundaries and limits are necessary for children to successfully function in the home, at school, and in society.
The following six steps are important in implementing an effective discipline plan:

1. Define the rules: Decide as parents what behaviors will be acceptable or unacceptable within your family. Make certain that the rules are age appropriate and that you are not requiring behavior that they are incapable of exhibiting. At the same time, make sure that you are willing and able to enforce such limits and ules consistently.
2. Explain the limits: Be very specific when describing guidelines to children. Young children especially think in very literal terms. "Be a good girf, can mean several things to a young child and is much too vague. Be concrete in fermis of what is to be done. when, and how well
3. Make consequences clear: There should be nothing for children to gain by breaking a rule. The consequences you establish help children decide whether or not the rules are worth breaking. Determine which consequences are meaningtul for each individual child.
4. Use warnings: No child is capable of regulating behavior
perfectly all of the time. All children need to be warned when they are approaching a boundary or breaking a rule. Avoid meaningless threats; say what you mean. One warning is sufficient to remind children of the rule and the consequences for breaking it. This allows children a chance to correct the behavior and regain control.

Parents who fail to set limits
through with consequences are setting their children up or a great deal of frustration and difficulties outside the home. These children will inevitably have difficulties adjusting in school, participating in youth activities, and interacting with other children and adults.
