Lee wins Pct. 2 Commissioner's race

East Coke County voters expressed their political desires by ballot Tuesday, Nov. 5, when they elected Democratic candidate Royce Lee to the Commissioner Precinct 2 post.

Lee edged out Republican candidate Luis Charles, Independent Sid McGinnis, and write-in candidates Wendell Lee and Wayne McCutchen in the election.

Opening weekend is a success

Opening weekend of deer season was a huge success in Coke County.

Coke County welcomed many, many hunters this past weekend. The hunters were honored with barbecues in both Robert Lee and Bronte. Over 1,000 people enjoyed the annual Robert Lee affair and over 400 hunters attended the barbecues in Bronte at B&K Processing.

According to Kerry Hall of B&K Deer and Wild Game Processing, his plant has seen over 250 deer come in during this first week of deer season.

Countywide, citizens surprisingly favored Rudy Izzard, Republican candidate for U.S. Representative, District 17, over Democrat incumbent Charles Stenholm. When votes were tallied for the entire district, however, Stenholm remained the people's choice.

For the State Senate seat, District 24, county citizens voted narrowly to elect Democrat Rick Rhodes over Republican Troy Fraser. With all votes in the district cast, however, Fraser won the right to the Senate seat.

In the presidential race, Coke County voters went Republican and supported Bob Dole to lead the nation, as did the state of Texas. However, Dole's 159 electoral votes nationwide were heavily outweighed by President Clinton's 380 to grant him a second term in office with a Republican - dominated Congress.

Public Notice

Pursuant to Tex. Rev. Civ. Stat. Ann. art. 1446e, § 5.08 (1996) Lone Star Gas Company and Lone Star Pipeline Company, Divisions of ENSERCH Corporation, and ENSAT Pipeline Company (collectively referred to as "Applicant") hereby give notice of intent to change the city gate rate of Lone Star Gas Company established by Order of the Railroad Commission of Texas in Gas Utilities Division Docket No. 3543.

Applicant proposes a Monthly City Gate Rate Calculation (MCGRC) to replace the rate approved in GUD 3543. The MCGRC recovers the costs of purchasing, storing, and transporting gas to the city gates, including an adjustment provision to recover the carrying cost of working gas in storage. Applicant also proposes transportation and storage rates for city gate deliveries with tracking clauses to recover fuel and lost and unaccounted for gas.

The proposed effective date of the change is November 29, 1996. The change is a major change, and will result in an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$24.2 million or 4.8 percent (4.8%). The customers affected are the 1.3 million residential and commercial customers in Texas served by Lone Star Gas Company under the rates established by the local regulatory authorities in the municipalities and the Railroad Commission in the environs areas.

A statement of Intent to make such change has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas in GUD 8664 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office in Austin, Texas and at the offices of the Applicant in Dallas, Texas.

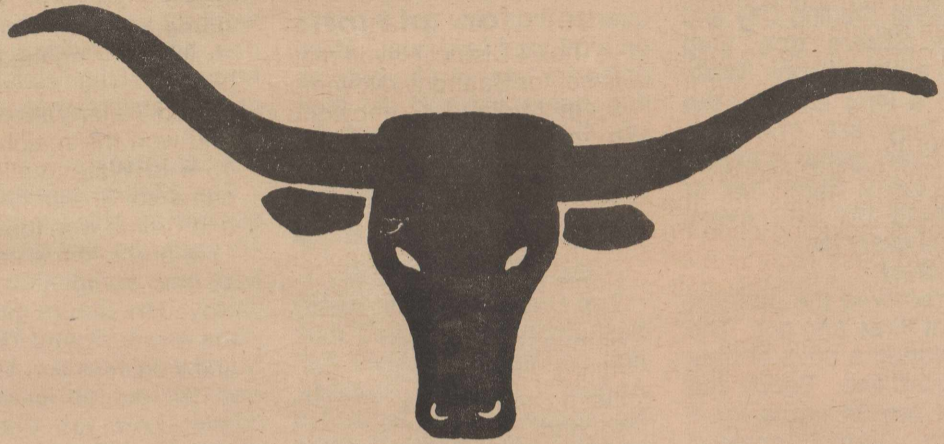

pass from Boxell to Freddy Landeros. The Bullpups were struggling to put something together when Blair again intercepted a pass, shutting down any chance for the Bullpups.

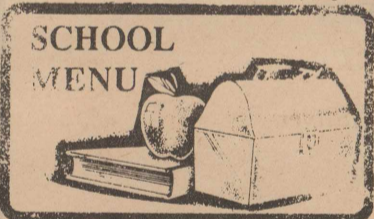

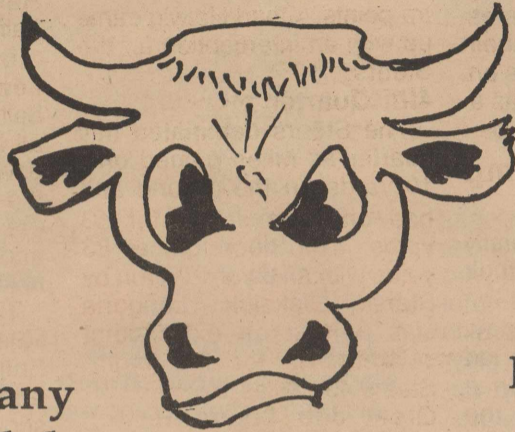

New UIL tiebreaker rule well received

Only nine out of 160 football districts statewide are not using the new University Interscholastic League (UIL) tiebreaker rules that settles games that end in a tie after regulation play, league officials reported recently.

Conference 5A has the most districts not using the new tiebreaker with six, while Conference 1A and Six-Man each have a perfect mark with all 16 districts using the new overtime period. Conference 4A, 3A, and 2A each have one district not using the new procedure.

The first-year NCAA rule (UIL football schools play under NCAA playing rules and not National Federation) allows games in district and post-district play to settle ties with an overtime period with each team alternating possessions starting at the opponent's 25-yard line.

In non-district games, games will still end in a tie, and in district play, schools as a group have the option of using the new rule or some other method(s). In the playoffs, all games will be played with the new NCAA rule.

In overtime, the possession continues until a team scores or loses possession by a turnover or on downs. If the teams remain tied at the end of the first alternating possession, another overtime ensues, and the process is repeated until there is a winner.

Since 1928, the UIL has used a system of penetrations (inside an opponent's 20-yard line), first downs and total yardage to determine which team might advance for play-off purposes or to help determine district wins or losses.

"The early responses from teams playing overtime games has been positive," UIL Athletic Director Charles Breithaupt said. "Coaches and fans have been pleased with the excitement generated in overtime games."

Discipline is an expression of love

Just as children and adolescents have a deeply rooted instinct to explore the world around them, they also have a need to push and test the limits of acceptable behavior. This is their way of asserting themselves, testing their strength and intelligence, and learning how others will respond to them.

Parents often lament that they seem to spend much of their time reprimanding children for the little things - dawdling at breakfast, fighting with siblings, leaving toys or clothes scattered throughout the house. Such behaviors, while irritating, are pretty much the norm for children. Knowing it is children's job to test limits and the parent's job to set limits gives us more realistic expectations in the area of discipline.

A well thought out discipline plan can save parents from searching for appropriate responses on the spot. By setting limits, communicating them clearly to children, and enforcing them consistently, parents can show children that there is a cause and effect relationship between behavior and consequences and that they can count on the parent's behavior to be predictable.

The word discipline means to teach, to train, and to strengthen. Children will feel loved, learn more effectively, and be more productive in an atmosphere that has structure and predictability. Appropriate boundaries and limits are necessary for children to successfully function in the home, at school, and in society.

The following six steps are important in implementing an effective discipline plan:

1. Define the rules: Decide as parents what behaviors will be acceptable or unacceptable within your family. Make certain that the rules are age appropriate and that you are not requiring behavior that they are incapable of exhibiting. At the same time, make sure that you are willing and able to enforce such limits and rules consistently.

2. Explain the limits: Be very specific when describing guidelines to children. Young children especially think in very literal terms. "Be a good girl," can mean several things to a young child and is much too vague. Be concrete in terms of what is to be done, when, and how well.

3. Make consequences clear: There should be nothing for children to gain by breaking a rule. The consequences you establish help children decide whether or not the rules are worth breaking. Determine which consequences are meaningful for each individual child.

4. Use warnings: No child is capable of regulating behavior

perfectly all of the time. All children need to be warned when they are approaching a boundary or breaking a rule. Avoid meaningless threats; say what you mean. One warning is sufficient to remind children of the rule and the consequences for breaking it. This allows children a chance to correct the behavior and regain control.

5. Follow through: This step is often the most difficult part of discipline. It takes energy, time, and perseverance. But it is essential if children are to learn that you mean what you say and that there are consequences for inappropriate behaviors.

6. Use positive reinforcement: After consequences

have been enforced, provide children with positive encouragement. Talk with them about the behavior that resulted in the consequence, but don't dwell on it. The bottom line will always be to reinforce desirable behavior by giving more attention to it than to unacceptable behavior.

Parents who fail to set limits

for children and to follow through with consequences are setting their children up for a great deal of frustration and difficulties outside the home. These children will inevitably have difficulties adjusting in school, participating in youth activities, and interacting with other children and adults.

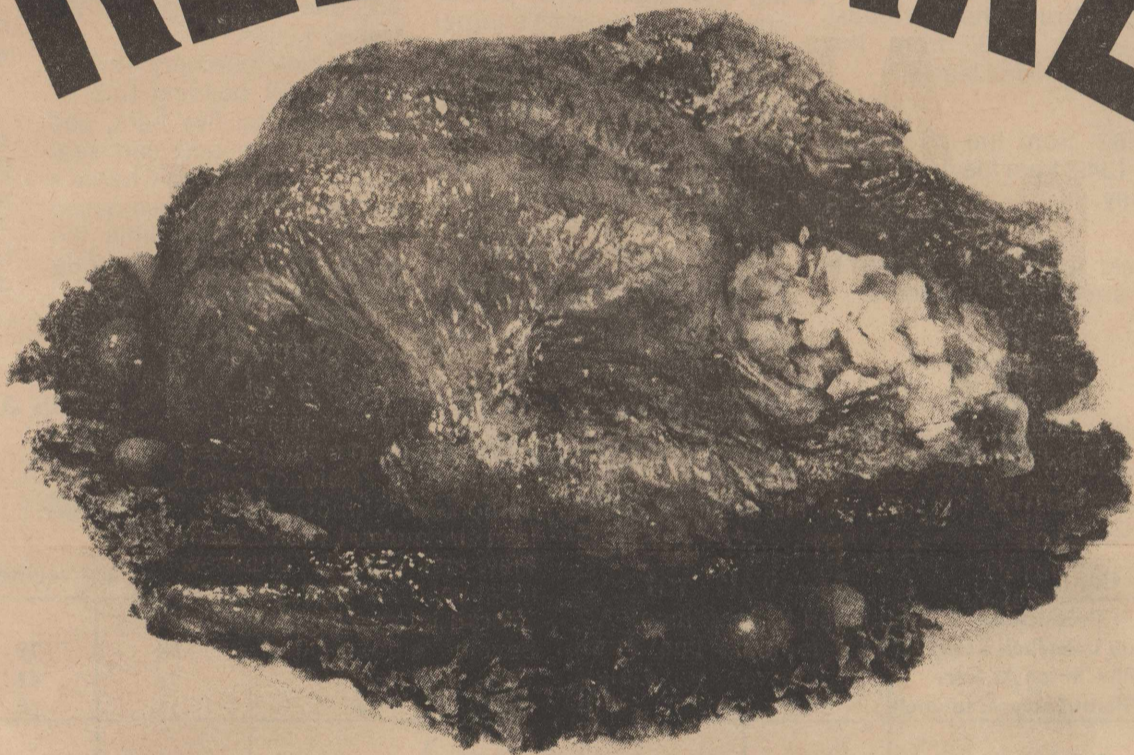
