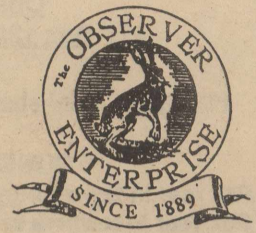

Bryan's Barn

Each December since 1991, Lucile and Wilson Bryan of Robert Lee have thrown the biggest birthday bash in Coke County. "It's a birthday party for Jesus," says Lucile, now 86.

The Bryans' six-acre spread on Messbox Creek ("probably named by a cowboy who dropped his lunch in the water," says Lucile) gleams like a boxful of baubles December 1-31.

"My husband, a young man of 84, collects new decorations year round," says Lucile. "He stuffs hundreds of milk bottles with lights, cuts out plywood Christmas and nativity scenes, and collects toys for the children to play with in the barn."

Last year, some 6,000 sightseers visited the Bryans' Christmas wonderland - dubbed Bryan's Barn - drawn by newspaper reports, word of mouth, and an inviting glow on the West Texas horizon. Indeed, lights adorn fences and cacti, glimmer from trees along the banks, illuminate the numerous nativity scenes, angels, elves, Santa and Mrs. Claus vignettes, and even the roads leading to the barn. "That barn's our playhouse," says Lucile. "Whatever Wilson does, he does all the way."

Admission to Bryan's Barn, one mile west of Robert Lee on Messbox Creek at F.M. 1904, is free. Lucile and Wilson turn on the lights each evening from 6-10 from the first Sunday of December through December 31 (December 1-31 this year). Follow the glow; you can't miss it. Bobby and Jeffie Roberts of Robert Lee enjoyed a 13-day trip October 25 through November 6, 1996. They visited 11 states (Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, and Arkansas) and traveled 3,585 miles. They spent 2 days in the home of their daughter and family, Sheila (Roberts) and Jim Farrar and Crystal and Lauren Hammerton, in Houston.

For Bobby's birthday, they gave him a ticket to see the Houston Oilers vs San Francisco 49ers football game October 27 at the Astrodome in Houston.

The beautiful fall foliage, the outdoor scenes (October pumpkins, shocked and baled hay, scarecrows, the beautiful fall flowers), and the huge rivers (Mississippi, Tennessee, Ohio, Arkansas, and Red Rivers) were awesome.

The most outstanding scene was Pigeon Forge, Tennessee, the home of Dolly Parton's Dollywood. A huge tractor made with baled hay and stalks of feed pulling a flat bed trailer made of logs was driven by a blonde headed, denim-clothed dummy. The trailer was filled with hay, pumpkins and children (dummies) with DOLLYWOOD written on the side. Shocks of feed, pumpkins, fall flowers, green lawn and evergreen and fall trees completed the scene.

Bobby and Jeffie spent one night in Hattiesburg, Mississippi, the home of the University of Mississippi. Chattanooga, Tennessee, was the next overnight stay. They visited the Tennessee Aquarium, Chattanooga Choo Choo - one of the South's most renowned landmarks. Opened in 1909 as Terminal Station, the train depot welcomed thousands of travelers

during the golden age of railroads. Then they drove to Lookout Mountain, a battle-ground overlooking Chattanooga.

Bobby and Jeffie spent three nights in the Knoxville, Tn., area visiting in the home of Bobby's second cousin and husband, Margarete and Herman Brabston, whom they had not seen for 10 years. On October 31, Halloween Day, Bobby and Jeffie toured The Apple Barn in Sevierville, Tn., Pigeon Forge (Dollywood), Gatlinburg, and drove through the Great Smoky Mountains on their way to Cherokee, North Carolina. As they drove around one corner to the next in the beautiful Smokies about 10 miles out of Cherokee, they rounded a corner to find a number of cars parked on both sides of the highway and people looking up. To their surprise, it was a live Black Bear about halfway up the tree. They did as the other people did - they stopped and took a picture of the bear.

Leaving Knoxville, Tn., they drove through the Cumberland Gap Tunnel which had just opened after being under construction for 17 years. The tunnel is 1 mile long with 2 lanes going each direction and a building down the middle that would equal another 3 lanes, lighted the entire mile. Halfway through the tunnel was the state line separating Tennessee and Kentucky. They drove up the steep, winding mountain road to Pinnacle Point and walked through three states (Tennessee, Kentucky, and Virginia) in order to get to the Pinnacle Overlook.

As the Roberts drove through Tennessee and Kentucky, the tobacco (the states' chief cash crop) had

been harvested and hung in the large barns to dry. The barns were open to allow the drying process; therefore, it was an usual and pretty sight to see the long, brown tobacco leaves hanging.

Bobby and Jeffie drove through the valley and hills in beautiful Kentucky, soon arriving at the home of Charlie and Charlene Davis on a lake at the foot of the Smokies and Daniel Boone National Forest near Zee, Kentucky. The next day, the four enjoyed touring the country by driving through the horse farms in the Kentucky Bluegrass area and through historic Old Washington and Maysville, Kentucky. They then crossed the Ohio River Bridge into Ohio, driving 50 miles along the beautiful Ohio River to enter Kentucky through Cincinnati, Ohio.

On November 4, leaving the Davis's and starting their 1284-mile trip back to Robert Lee, they turned off IS 65 at Sonora, Kentucky, to visit the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln. They continued their trip on to Nashville, Tn., visiting Music Row and downtown (Wild Horse Saloon). Tuesday, November 5, 1996, they visited The Old Country Store in Casey Jones Village in Jackson, Tn. They crossed the Mississippi River at Memphis, Tn., and entered Arkansas. As they drove down Loop 440 in Little Rock, they were wondering, "Why so many highway patrol?" The President's plane was sitting at the airport they were passing, as President Clinton was in Little Rock for Election Day. Bobby and Jeffie spent the night in the home of James and Blanche Harmon in Benbrook, Texas. They returned home to Robert Lee on November 6.

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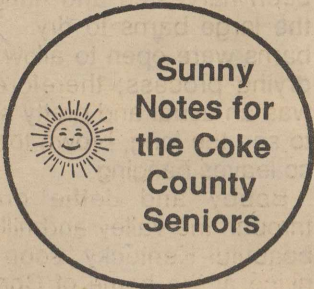

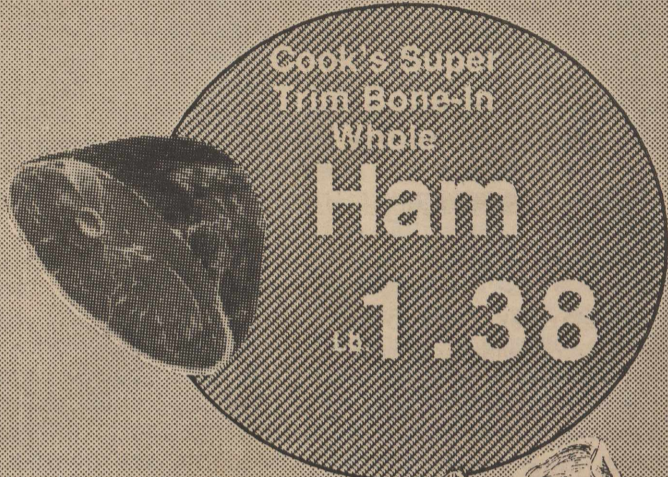

Counselor's Comments

Most college-bound students know that a necessary component of an admission application is a college entrance examination score; a university cannot process an application without one. Most students also know that there are two exams—the ACT (American College Testing) and the SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) - and that ALL Texas colleges (in fact, most U.S. colleges) accept both. The average student may not, however, know a great deal about the two tests and how they differ, and therefore may be unsure about which test would be best for him or her to take, based upon their ability, experience, and needs. The option is yours, as colleges use the results from either in the same ways, for admission, talent identification, and academic advising.

The SAT is a test of standard written English, verbal skills, and mathematics. It also collects demographic (background) information about you to share with colleges, takes approximately three hours to complete, and costs \$21.50.

The ACT consists of curriculum-based "achievement" tests in the areas of English, mathematics, reading, and science reasoning. In addition to the collection of demographic information, students are offered assistance with educational and career planning based upon the results of the ACT Interest Inventory, which helps you match the work activities and environment you prefer with careers and college majors. The ACT also lasts approximately three hours and the fee is \$19.00.

Your counselor or teachers can be a good resource in helping you choose the test you are likely to perform better on; talk it over with your parents as well. Either way, remember that an entrance exam score is only one piece of information a college looks at when considering your application - your class rank, grade point average, school and community activities, and job (if applicable) will also be factored in.

Remember as test time approaches to relax...it won't be as difficult as you think!

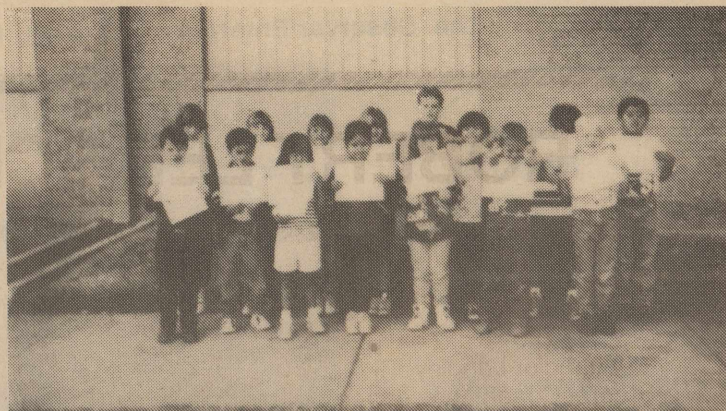

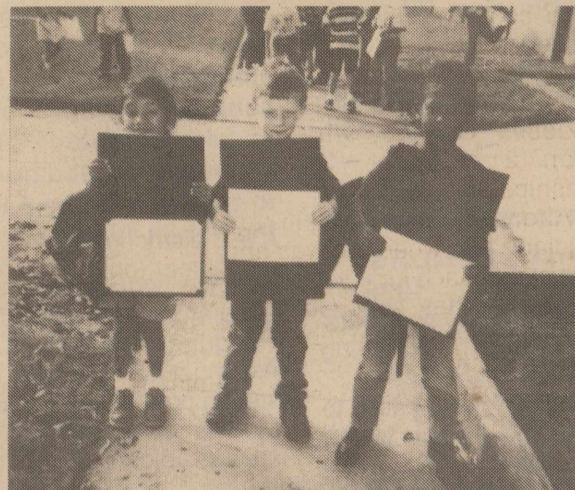
Bronte Nursing Home employee of the month for November is Victor Fuentes. Victor has been a janitor for Bronte Nursing Home for the past three years.

The early name of Bronte was Oso.

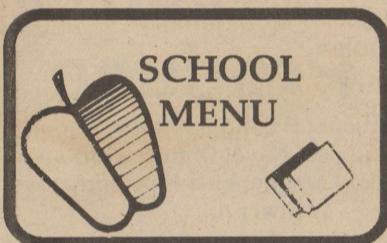

Coach seeks more wins

Chandler Langley, RL Lady Steers Coach, has come to Robert Lee with a familiarity with winning. Robert Lee's Lady Steers are pretty familiar with winning themselves. Seems like a perfect match. In an interview with Coach Langley Monday morning, one couldn't help but get the feeling that this man means business. He is enthusiastic about basketball and is committed to the Lady Steers and a successful season.

Coach Langley has been coaching for 8 years. He began coaching as a junior in college with the BCI Summer League. He was an assistant coach under Ken Hefner of Odessa College, who has won 2 National Championships.

After college he went to Midland Lee where he was an assistant coach for 4 years.

Langley has coached in 8 National BCI Tournaments. In one tournament he coached a team opposing Lisa Leslie, a center for the US Olympic Ladies Basketball team. He said he feels extremely lucky to have coached several All-State players on the Sr. National All-Star Team. The last National All-Star BCI team he coached in April finished 5th in the nation - coming within 2 points of playing for the national championship. Each sub-varsity team he has coached has finished 2nd, 1st, and 1st in their respective districts.

Coach Langley said he is extremely proud of the job the

girls have done thus far this year. He stressed that it is very difficult to come into a new year under a new coach with new ideas and learn a different system for strategic plays. He feels that the team has done well, as their 4-1 record thus far for the year will attest. The girls have come up against some tough competition as they have played 2 3-A schools and 1 2-A school, Coahoma, (which, coincidentally, is ranked in the top 20 of the state in class 2-A).

The RL coach said, "Talent alone will not get you to the top - if you don't work harder than everyone else, talent won't matter."

He stated that he feels defense is the key to winning ball games and that the girls are executing better on that end of the floor.

When questioned about re-districting that took place this year (only 3 teams will vie with RL for the District title - Bronte, Sterling City and Water Valley) he was quite sure that this district will be a tough one. The district is very competitive, and he hopes that by playing a tough, full schedule now, the team will reach its peak during district competition.

Langley said he was very pleased with the depth he has on the bench. He stated that each girl on the team is expected to come in and fill a role. The girls that come in off the bench and have 2 or 3 assists are just as vital to the welfare of the team as the girls that score 20 or 30 points a game.

Coach Langley stated the support by the community has been greatly appreciated by the girls. He said they feed off the support of the crowd and

need the continued support of the community and hope it will grow. He said the coaching staff and administration have been great in helping out.

The Lady Steers will compete in the Ballinger Tournament December 5-7. They will face off against Menard in the first game of the tourney. Other teams competing will be Ballinger, Bronte, Eldorado and Brady.

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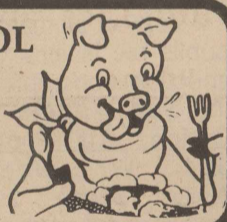

The post office is a source of information about many things not directly related to the obvious services of the Postal System. As an excellent example of this, the next time you have trouble locating an address in a strange locale, go to the post office and ask for directions. The post office provides a means of both input and outtake to and from the whole world. The people who work in the post office know what is going on, especially on the local level.

It provides us with an identity, which is probably why the census takers use the post office where we get our mail as the surest means of identifying the physical location of the families listed.

It is convenient, sometimes saving a drive of several miles in order to receive or send mail.

It provides support for the community and its schools, businesses, civic organizations and local special commemorations and occasions.

Most of all, it provides a service that cannot be equaled by any other organization. And it is the last service to go. When the post office closes, it is a funeral occasion because it means that a community no longer exists.

But as long as it continues to open its doors, the rural post office is, and always will be, the "Heartbeat of (Rural) America."
