## Jury finds Reyes guilty

Daniel Balderas Reyes was found guilty of murder last Thursday by a Coke County jury.
The eight man, four woman jury panel deliberated approximately 7 hours before finding the Tom Green County man guilty of the murder in the beating death of Ollie Green The jury asked to have Reyes' testimony read back to them once before reaching the verdict.
After deliberating for another 2 hours during the punishment phase, the panel

Reyes contended that he had found Green lying on the ground outside his home and tried to help him But several witnesses testified that they had heard no cries for help before spotting a man fitting the description of Reyes in the yard.

## Burdens should be

 lifted on businessesby John Sharp, Comptroller of Public Accounts Texas businesses are burdened by rules and regulations that are sometimes contradictory, often stifling, and always costly. It's time to lift that burden from their shoulders.
While many state regulations help protect the health and safety of Texans, others are outdated, time-consuming, unnecessary, and illsuited to serving the interests of consumers or entrepreneurs. That new convenience store on the corner, venience store on the corner,
for instance, may have to deal with eight different regulatory agencies. The lawn care service that drops by once a month could be answering to as many as five.
There's no doubt that this regulatory burden is a deterrent to economic development. As many as 88 state agencies regulate everything from alligator farming to new chemical plants, issuing more han 800 separate certifications, permits, licenses, and other pieces of paper to businesses that want to do business in the Lone Star State and provide jobs for Texans.
One type of business is particularly prone to proliferating regulations - grocery stores. Texas has overseen many aspects of the retail grocery industry for decades, but the regulatory burden has grown in recent years. Grocers offer a wide range of products and services - from pharmaceuticals to beer, pharmaceuticals to beer,
video arcades to pot roasts video arcades to pot roasts -
and each is subject to a differand each is subject to a differ-
ent regulation. ent regulation.
In fact, nine different state agencies regulate the grocery trade, requiring 17 separate li censes, an array of inspections, multiple permits that expire on different dates, require different fees, and call for as many as one dozen different forms that contain esferent forms that contain es-
sentially the same information. Inspections by one agency may take place on Tuesday, while inspections by another occur on Wednesday, without anything even remotely resembling coordination. Standards and enforcement procedures are as varied as the cedures are as varied as
state agencies involved.
Like other Texas businesses, grocery stores deserve better than to be buried beneath a blizzard of endless paperwork.
I've proposed several specific. actions to bring these businesses a measure of re-
lief. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, for example, and the Texas Department of Health should consolidate and simplify their regulations covering retail fish dealers and food retailers These two agencies have similar applications and in spections. Consolidating them would reduce the bur den on grocers and improve compliance with laws to pro compliance with laws to pro tect consumers
What's more, transferring some current responsibilitie of the Texas Department o Agriculture to other agencies or state-licensed private inspectors would cut the state bureaucracy and save taxpayers more than $\$ 5$ million over the next five years.

But retail grocery stores are just one example of Texas businesses that bend unde the weight of the state's regu latory burden. That's why recommend a comprehensive review of all state agenc rules, regulations, and required paperwork. This review should include statewid hearings and public forums to hearings and public forums to give business owners and consumers across Texas the opportunity to air their concerns and help shape a new streamlined regulatory pro cess. Obsolete or redundan rules should be done away with, and turn-around times for issuing permits should be reduced.

Even Washington has begun to address this challenge The Paperwork Reduction Act, approved by Congress in 1995, has eliminated 16,000 pages of rules, some of which hadn't been reviewed in 40 years.

We should be able to do the same here in Texas.

## New pecan

cultivar released
The 42 year wait is over pecan lovers now have a new variety of their favorite nut. The Kanza was recently released by Texas' own pecan breeding program.
"People who appreciate good quality pecans, high in taste, perfect halves, will really enjoy the Kanza pecan," said Dr. Tommy Thompson, US Department of Agriculture pecan breeder
Trees planted this year will begin bearing nuts in about five or six years

Growers will find Kanza with nuts maturing in early fall is highly resistant to scab and therefore can be grown anywhere in the South's pecan growing area, said Thompson
"We think it's going to be real valuable to the east where scab resistance is required," said Thompson. "It's also a good enough cultivar that it's going to be grown to the west."
Pecan producers can rely on a simple guide for growing pecans - trees grown east of Interstate 35 must be genetically resistant to scab.
"It's a humid environment and, therefore, genetic resistance to scab is required," explained Thompson. "To the west it doesn't make any difference. It's dry enough that pecans never get this disease."

The Kanza was originally released as a pollinator for the

Pawnee, another early market pecan.

Pawnee were released by
the breeding program in 1984. It is a high quality pecan which, like the Kanza also matures in the first part of September.
"Pawnee has almost taken over all of the fruit stand market for early consumption in the October pecan market," said Thompson. "It is an excellent cultivar for growers who want to meet this early market."
The USDA pecan breeding operation is the only pecan breeding program in the world. It's located in the Brazos Valley near College Station, Thompson said, because that area has the best pecan growing soil in the world

Kanza is the 22nd cultivar to be released by the pecan breeding program, but the cross that produced it was first made in 1955
"This gives an idea of how long it takes to produce and improve a pecan cultivar," said Thompson.

The basic breeding program begins when a cross is made and then grown for 10 years. At the end of 10 years, graft wood is cut from suitable trees. This graft wood is then tested across the pecan belt for 15 years. Even after a total of 25 years it still remains a tria cultivar.
