ORDINANCE \#1063 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND REGULATIONS FOR THE ROBERT LEE SANITARY LANDFILL WHEREAS, on the 12 th day of May, 1997, the City Council of the City of Robert Lee did adopt an ordinance setting forth days and hours for the sanitary landfill to be open to the public and establishing regulations and fees.
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Robert Lee that;
Section 1. Open Saturdays from 9:00 am to 12:00 noon
Section 2. There shall be an $\$ 8.00$ minimum charge for one (1) cubic yard or less. In excess shall be $\$ 5.00$ for each cubic yard. These charges shall apply for persons who are not currently paying for trash pick-up with the City.

Section 3. There shall be a $\$ 15.00$ minimum charge plus the cost of the load for opening of the landfill on days other than set forth. This charge shall apply for all persons.

Section 4. There shall be no hazardous waste. Landfill will accept only the following items: Construction \& Demolition, lumber, tree limbs, grass, concrete, bricks.
Section 5 . The City shall reserve the right to refuse dumping of anything considered undesirable by the City.
Section 6. This ordinanc shall go into effect on the 12th day of May, 1997, and shall be subject to changes as determined by the City Council. All ordinances and resolutions and parts thereof heretofore adopted and in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed insofar as they conflict with.

## Over 40 eyes

You may not feel old when you reach 40 , but chances are your eyes will.
Nearly 90 percent of people over 45 are wearing glasses all or most of the time
"It's a normal biological phenomenon," said Dr. Richard Lewis, professor of ophthalmology at Baylor College o Medicine in Houston. "Ou tissues are not infinitely elas tic. We develop wrinkles in our skin, we develop gray hair and we begin to lose the abil ity of the lens to focus up close."
While some people experi ence blurred vision as they age, others will witness more subtle changes in vision. Ey strain and fatigue are common complaints from people who have their eyes too close to their work

To help focus on the fine print and relieve stress on their eyes, many people in their 40 s turn to over-the counter reading glasses.
"These are acceptable for the average person who isn" unusually nearsighted or farsighted and who doesn't have a significant problem wit astigmatism," said Lewis.
But the glasses do have limitations
"They are made for the av erage face, which means the center of the lens may not line up properly with the eyes," said Lewis. "An eye-care professional should make the necessary adjustments.
While reading glasses can be effective for people in their 40s and 50 s , Lewis says the glasses should not take the place of a complete, regular eye examination. Middle age is when the most common form of glaucoma begins to appear and other common diseases, such as diabetes, have potential complications inside the eye
