Bronte blood drive scheduled The East Coke County EMS will sponsor a blood drive in Bronte Saturday, May 31 from 10:00 am until 2:00 pm at the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall.
United Blood Services of San Angelo will conduct the drive, where organizers hope to draw 15 to 20 donors Donors are asked to provide identification, such as a driver's license or UBS donor card. Donors are also asked to know the name of any medication they are currently taking.

Appointments are available, but not mandatory, by contacting Gwen Baker at 473-2201. Donors with appointments will be taken before walk-ins. The entire donation procedure takes approximately 45 minutes.
United Blood Services of San Angelo must collect more than 300 units of blood per week to adequately supply area hospitals. There are ap proximately 20 hospitals in the UBS service area, including those hospitals in San Angelo, Big Spring and Brown wood.
Patients in need in area hospitals rely on volunteer blood donors to keep the blood supply ample. Because a unit of whole blood is separated into components, one donation can help up to three patients.
Not everyone is able to do nate blood. Some people have a medical condition that would keep them from ever donating, or they may have a condition that results in temcondivy ther tist in temporary deferral. Listed below are some of the qualifications that must be met before someone can donate blood The donor must: feel well and healthy at time of donation; be at least 17 and no older than 79; weigh at least 110 pounds; not have received a tattoo, body piercing or accidental needle stick in the past 12 months; and must not have had a positive test for hepatitis.
However, many medications and vaccines do not defer a donor. For example, some-

## Brush Busters

 demonstration tourWith the ever increasing encroachment of mesquite, cedar and prickly pear in our rangeland, coupled with the cost of broadcast aerial spraying, brush control measures had become just about economically unfeasible, but the new Brush Busters individual plant treatment developed by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, has given us an opportunity to clean up our rangeland at a modest price with excellent results.
Next Wednesday, June 4, beginning at 2:00 pm, we will have a tour of various Brush Busters brush demonstrations beginning on the Cumbie Ivey, Jr. ranch between Bronte and Robert Lee. On this tour we will view demonstrations utilizing the Brush Buster individual plant treatment method for controlling mesquite using the new Curtail chemical of four various mixtures. From Cumbie's place we will next tour cedar, prickiy pear and tasajillo control using Tordon 225 and Velpar on the Bobby Bolding ranch, which is located about a half mile south on Seven Mile Hill Road (next to big telephone tower). Dr. Allan McGinty, District Extension Range Specialist, will also be on hand with a 4-wheeler and back pack sprayer rigged up to demonstrate how we put the test out and explain what equipment is used. I will be
able to give 2 hours of CEUs for your Pesticide Recertification requirement during this tour.

Spring can bring not only warmer weather and flowers but also a less welcome visitor to the home -- fleas
"This looks like it probably will be a reasonably good year for flea production," said Dr. Roger Gold, urban entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
A very mild, moist spring which hasn't put a stress on the fleas living outdoors -- will the fieas living outdoors -- will
contribute to heavy flea numbers as the weather warms up.

To know how to contro fleas, it helps to understand their life cycle, Gold said. The adult female flea feeds on blood from the animal, then lays her eggs. The eggs roll off the animal and into grass pet's bedding, carpet, or the pet's bedding, carpet, or the
furniture where they spend furniture where they spend
the majority of their time as larthe majority of their time as lar-
vae. During that time, they vae. During that time, they use dry blood from the animal's coat or the furnishings to survive.
After fleas go through several molts, the pupate, and once at that stage, they can stay in a suspended animation for many months, even up to a year, without having to feed or move around, Gold said.
As soon as an appropriate host comes by, they break into the adult stage and begin to feed. In order for a flea to lay eggs upon being an adult, it has to both mate and get a blood meal.
"And so, oftentimes people will rent an apartment or move into a different home, they'll be met with fleas that have been very hungry waiting for new residents." Gold said.
The most common variety of flea in Texas is called the cat flea, even though it occurs on dogs.
To control fleas, there are a number of new products available in pill form or as a pour-on solution that can be given to pets, he said. These disrupt the biological cycle of the flea and keep the adults from laying eggs.
Additionally, Gold urged sanitation -- using a vacuum cleaner on a regular basis and keeping pet bedding clean -to rid the house of eggs that have already been laid.

Then, he urged the use of a growth regulator to keep immature fleas from developing
into adults -- the blood-feeding stage.
He noted that research by Dr. Roger Meola, a professo of entomology at Texas A\&M University, has proven that the cat flea can use human blood. "It doesn't necessarily prefer it over cat or dog blood, but it can complete its development."
"I think it's important that we control fleas in homes," he said. "They're not only a nuisance, but they are possible vectors of a number of important diseases of animals and humans."
Fleas can transmit bubonic plague, the disease -- now ex tremely rare -- that killed about 25 million people during an epidemic that swept through Europe in the 14th century.
Additionally, murine or epidemic typhus is transmitted from rats to humans, primarily by the oriental rat flea. This disease flares occasionally in the western states.
Fleas are intermediate hosts of some tapeworms, which occasionally can parasitize people. This organism is spread from infected animal feces to fleas and then to humans by accidental ingestion of infested fleas.

## 101 Deadly Days

 of SummerMemorial Day through Labor Day has been labled the '101 Deadly Days of Summer' on Texas highways. During this time many Texans will enjoy summer picnics, visits to relatives, and long drives to vaca tion destinations.
Travelers are urged to drive safely to prevent needless deaths and injuries. Accord ing to statistics released by the Texas Department of Public Safety, 3,715 people lost their lives on Texas highways during 1996.
People of all ages traveling this summer are urged to follow a few simple guidelines.
-Don't drink and drive Nearly half of all highway fatalities are alcohol-related. Des ignate a driver before leaving. Offer a wide range of non-alcoholic beverages at social functions. Take the keys from impaired friends or family members.
-Drive the speed limit. Speed is a factor in one-third of all highway fatalities (second only to alcohol as a factor in highway crashes). The physical force in a crash doubles with each 10 mph over 50 mph .

- Always wear safety belts. Safety belts reduce the risk of a fatal or serious injury by 40 percent to 55 percent. Make sure all passengers in the ve hicle are buckled up, too.
- Use child restraints. Kids trust adults to look out for them. Make sure all children are buckled up in a federally approved child safety seat according to weight, height, and age. Always place children in the back seat. Never place a rear-facing child restraint in front of a passenger side air bag.

ily. Everyone needs to utilize preventative measures to ensure safety while out and about this summer. Always drive defensively and expect the unexpected.

## Don't be a pain

 in the boatWith summer coming on, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reminds boaters to: Always wear a personal flotation device (life jacket); Obey Boating While Intoxicated laws (BWI); and Be especially careful on personal watercraft.
Nearly nine out of ten boating related drownings involve victims who were not wearing a life jacket, according to the US Coast Guard.
"The goal is to educate the public that a life jacket can save their life," said Jim Robertson, TPWD law enforcement director.
Robertson noted that life jackets are essential because contrary to popular belief, most boating accidents are not fiery collisions. Most accidents occur when someone falls overboard or capsizes their boat. Even experienced swimmers lose coordination and drown. Heavy clothing, boating under the influence, or cold water can also be factors in drownings
*Buy your own personal life jacket and use it. One size does not fit all. There may not be one available that fits to rent or borrow
*Look at the label. It will provide weight, size, and use information.
*Try it on to check the fit Once the straps and buckles are secure, it should not slip over your head or come above your ears.
