The problem is, we have been so wet this winter and spring that it's been hard to keep up.

In fact, this year so far has prompted some of the old-timers to proclaim that they can't remember a better spring in Coke County (I'll not mention their names -- some of 'em might object to being thought of as an old-timer).

This past week RL recorded from 3 to 4 inches. According to Pat Martindale at the city office in Bronte, the city proper got from 3.75 to 4 inches, with 4 to 5 inches being recorded north of town.

For some of the (official numbers) we referred to unofficial rainfall reporter Bobby Roberts, who reports Robert Lee rainfall totals to the San Angelo media. According to Bobby, Robert Lee has re-ceived 17.8 inches so far this year, with 4.3 inches recorded thus far in the month of June. In comparison, RL had recorded 5.9 inches through June 30 of last year. In August of last year, the monsoon season hit with 8 inches, making the total for 1996 25.5 inches. Our average annual rainfall in this area is 18.75

What that means is from July '96 through June 11, '97, which is less than a year's time, Coke County has received 37.40 inches of rain. We have truly been blessed.

(Editor's Note: We have made several calls trying to locate someone in the Bronte area who keeps rainfall totals, and have been unsuccessful to date. Please let us know if you can provide any information)



Wednesdays to become new SS check day

People who apply for benefits beginning May 1, 1997, will not receive their benefit on the third of the month as in the past. Instead, they will receive it on a second, third, or fourth Wednesday of the month. Benefits received in June will be based on the new delivery schedule. Current Social Security beneficiaries will continue to receive their benefits on the third of the month, and people receiving Supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments will continue to receive their benefits on the first of the month. The change is expected to even out the workflow of the agency by avoiding the peak of telephone traffic that generally accompanies check deliveries on the third of the month. It is expected to help reduce telephone waiting times for all callers.

10 Warning Signs of Alzheimer's

Alzheimer's is a progressive, degenerative disease attacking the brain resulting in impaired memory, thinking and behavior.

The Alzheimer's Association has developed a checklist of common symptoms viewed as warning signs. (Some of the symptoms may apply to other types of dementia.) Should several apply, a complete evaluation is recommended.

1. RECENT MEMORY LOSS THAT AFFECTS JOB SKILLS. Although it's normal to forget assignments, names, or a phone number every now and then, those with a dementia such as Alzheimer's may forget more often and not remember lost facts later.

2. DIFFICULTY PERFORMING FAMILIAR TASKS. Leaving food on the stove is one thing, but people with Alzheimer's disease might prepare a meal and not only forget to serve it - they'll forget they made it at all

3. PROBLEMS WITH LANGUAGE. It's not unusual to have trouble finding the right word every now and again. But an Alzheimer's sufferer may forget simple words or substitute inappropriate words that make sentences

4. DISORIENTATION OF TIME AND SPACE. People with Alzheimer's can become lost on their own street, not knowing where they are, how they got there, or how to get back home

5. POOR OR DECREASED JUDGMENT. That game on television may mmerse you so much, you forget to check on little Johnny until a few hours have passed. But an Alzheimer's patient wouldn't remember Johnny at all. They may also dress inappropriately, sometimes wearing several layers of

SS financing outlook unchanged


The Social Security Board of Trustees announced that the Old Age and Survivors Insurance (OASI) and Disability Insurance (DI) Trust Funds, which support benefit payments to nearly 44 million Americans, are in good financial condition, and will remain so well into the next century. The 1997 report concludes that - even with no changes in current law - the combined OASI and DI Trust Funds would be able to continue paying benefits for the next 32 years. Trustees emphasized in the report that it is im-

portant to address the issue of Social Security's long-range insolvency within a reasonable period to allow time for phasing in any necessary changes and for workers to adjust their retirement plans to take account of those changes. At the same time, the Board stressed that there is ample time to discuss and evaluate alternative solutions with deliberation and care.

They stated that the size of the long-range deficit -- 2.23 percent of total payroll -- is such that the long range balance could be restored within the framework of the present Social Security structure.

Texas puts squeeze on rabies

The Texas Animal Damage Control Service, working with other government agencies, helped lead an aerial assault that spread baited rabies vaccine for coyotes and grey wolves over South, West and Central Texas:

Concluding in February, the annual Texas Department of Health program involved personnel from the Texas National Guard and the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources. It tightened the "perimeters of immunity", compressing the areas where the rabies cases are centered.

The strategy is to fly in small bands around the infected areas each year until the areas have been spread completely with baited vaccine and the disease controlled.

Dr. Gayne Fearneyhough, director of the health department's oral rabies vaccination program, said establishing the perimeter and reducing cases within is important because it reduces the chances of rabies transmission to humans, as





Beta carotene can be found in carrots, pumpkin, winter squash, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, greens, apricots, and cantaloupe.


The USDA's Food Guide Pryamid recommends 3-5 servings of vegetables and two to four servings of fruit daily.

Smoke detectors not all they should be

All smoke detectors are not created equal.

The majority of smoke detectors in American homes may not detect the most common house fire in a timely manner, says electrical engineering professor Dr. B. Don Russell, an associate dean of engineering at Texas A&M University.

Russell, who has been studying detector failure for more than a decade, has testified in several court cases involving smoke detectors and has been a guest on the ABC news program "20-20" for a segment on smoke detectors.

Most smoke detectors in homes on the market - about 90 percent, by some estimates - sense fires and smoke by using an ionization chamber, Russell says.

"lonization detectors are faster than most other techniques on flaming fires," Russell said. "However, they are not as timely in detecting flameless combustion like smoldering fires caused by something like electrical shorts or cigarettes in upholstery."

Photoelectric smoke detectors are the best for sensing smoldering fires, which often fill rooms with smoke before flames can be seen, Russell says.
