**Letter to Coke
 County band
 parents**

Dear Band Parents:

This letter is generated from my vantage point as a band director, a music educator, a teacher, and a community member who sincerely believes in the artistic value of every student in our school system. I am interested in seeing the development of that human quality cultivated to its fullest potential. If we are to ensure a balanced education for our pupils, then we are obliged to offer a balanced curriculum for their study.

A 1994 Gallup survey indicates over 97% of Americans feel playing a musical instrument provides students with a sense of accomplishment. An overwhelming majority of these voters feel music helps a child's overall intellectual development, teaches discipline, develops teamwork, and encourages poise and confidence. Music also instills an appreciation of arts and culture by our young people. In addition, 93% of Americans feel music is part of a well-rounded education. This figure represents a 13% increase of support for music education since 1992.

For the first time in our nation's history, music and arts education have been codified as core curricular subjects as part of Goals 2000: Educate America Act, recently signed into federal law. Comprehensive, sequential programs in music and the other arts develop expressive, physical, and creative abilities that are essential to the entire learning process. Music requires the individual to be responsible at a higher level of inquiry and accountability. Thus, the seeds of character-building are sown which is an answer to many of our problems.

Nearly 85% of Americans feel communities should provide the necessary funding for music education, according to a 1994 Gallup poll. The Robert Lee and Bronte Independent School Districts cannot afford to deny this opportunity of quality education to our students. We must ensure our children are given the same educational opportunities as other students throughout Texas and throughout our nation.

If our mission is to educate our students through a comprehensive curriculum, we must develop their quality of perception by fostering the acquisition of musical skills. Please join me in supporting the leaders of tomorrow by ensuring the stability of music in our school today. Thank you.

Years later, Susie and Earl Foster completed the job. I accepted Jesus Christ as my Savior when I was 40 and my life was never the same.

Persons granted protestant or intervenor status may be admitted subject to the pending procedural schedule adopted in Examiners' Letter No. 19 (or subsequent modifications) and must comply with all pending filing deadlines. Notice of the time and place of hearings as to other phases of Docket 8647, if any, will be provided to those who timely file a motion to intervene as provided in this Public Notice.

Legal Authority and Jurisdiction -- The Commission has jurisdiction over the matters at issue in this proceeding pursuant to TEX. UTILITIES CODE §§ 101.001-124.002, formerly TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. Art. 1446e (Supp. 1997), and TEX. REV. CIV. STAT. ANN. Arts. 6050-6066g (Supp. 1997).

1. Evaluation of transportation and storage services and practices;
2. Enserch/Lone Star's corporate restructuring;
3. Enserch Corporation management practices;
4. Enserch affiliate transactions;
5. Determination of whether there are any anti-competitive practices (Lone Star and others in industry);
6. Discriminatory practices;
7. Effect of customer changes on cost allocations; and
8. Determination of whether there are any anti-competitive practices - in-kind gas marketing.

Time, Place, and Nature of the Hearing -- The examiner has directed that the hearing on Phase II will commence beginning at 10:00 a.m., Monday, October 5, 1998, or such other date as may be set by the examiners, at the Commission's offices in the William B. Travis Building, 1701 North Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas, in Room 12-126, or, if the hearing is to be held in another room, in the room stated in the posting on the bulletin board in the first floor lobby of the Travis Building on the morning of the hearing. All persons granted party status must appear in person or by attorney at the hearing to present sworn testimony, documentary and demonstrative evidence, and argument regarding all issues.

If the hearing is not concluded on the day it commences, the hearing will be conducted starting at 9:00 a.m. on each subsequent business day until concluded, unless otherwise announced. The hearing may be continued from time to time and from place to place, as announced at each session of the hearing.

Unless requested by any party or directed by the examiner, evidence at the hearing will be presented by prefiled written testimony, by oral testimony given in the hearing, and by documentary and demonstrative evidence and exhibits.
