RL Baptist to host blood drive

In an effort to help stave off a summer blood shortage, Robert Lee Baptist Church will host a blood drive Saturday, June 13, from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.

Donors that want to make an appointment may contact Becky Ross at 453-2415. Appointments are not mandatory, but help keep donor flow smooth and will be taken before walk-ins. Donors are reminded to bring a positive form of identification, such as a driver's license or blood donor card. Donors are also asked to know the name of any medication they have taken in the past 30 days.

The blood drive will be conducted by United Blood Services of San Angelo, and representatives say the need for blood is always present.

"Summer is a particularly critical time for the blood supply," said Angie Tyson, UBS Community Relations Representative, "Many of our regular donors are busy or out of town, so our blood supply dwindles. Unfortunately, the need for blood stays as constant as ever."

Donors must be at least 17

years old and weight at least 110 pounds. A donor must also be well and healthy at time of donation.

Because blood does expire after a time, UBS must draw around 325 units a week to supply and replenish the 18 hospitals in its service area.

"UBS San Angelo is merely the steward of the community, blood supply," Tyson said. "If we experience a shortage, it's actually the patients and the communities that suffer."

CRMWD officials host tour

John Grant, General Manager of Colorado River Municipal Water District, and C. L. Wingert, Assistant Manager of CRMWD, recently hosted a tour starting at the Colorado City low flow salt diversion located in the Colorado River northwest of Colorado City.

Present for the tour were

sold to oil companies to be used in secondary recovery

wells. John Grant agreed that while the main responsibility of the CRMWD is the quality and quantity of water for their customers, they have a responsibility to the property owners around Lake Spence. Rep. Junell stated that the CRMWD has a problem in perception by the lake residents. These perceptions, right or wrong, were at the bottom of the CRMWD troubles with the residents. The way to combat misconceptions is with wide dissemination of facts. The CRMWD should inform the people of actions to be taken and the reasons for those actions. He added the lake people are reasonable and will be able to understand the problems facing the CRMWD.

John Grant stated the extra demand brought on by the hot dry weather required the bringing on line of the Lake Spence pump station. This will help meet the requirements of Midland and Odessa.

The tour broke up with Rep. Junell and others attending a briefing at the Coltex Refinery clean up site west of Colorado City

After lunch, Lake Colorado City Park Rangers, Texas Department of Corrections Officers and Nancy Sullivan carried the group to the proposed site of construction of 16 new cabins. Mark Fambro of TPWF briefed on the site and the construction material to be used. Rodney Cooper, TDC, said by using convicts to do the labor, costs could be minimized. Nancy Sullivan added that Mitchell County would take the responsibility for the "dirt work." The state park has approximately 175,000 visitors each year. This is a boost for the Colorado City economy. Rep. Junell asked the players to get together and submit a detailed list of material, staffing and associated costs to his office. George Bell, Regional Director of TPWF out of Waco also attended.

The tour then headed to Lake Spence. First stop overlooked the lake on the north side near the dam. Here Laura Pedersen of the Sunshine Gardens joined the group to help present a local business person's view. Sam White, of Champion and a property owner, stressed adversarial relationships between the lake people and CRMWD are not needed. John Grant restated the commitment to Lake Spence property owners and the businesses that rely on tourists brought in by the lake but emphasized maintaining the quality of water was an important responsibility. Lake lvie has over 500,000 acre/feet of water and Lake Spence has less than 100,000 acre/feet. It was stated that since lvie catches water from the Concho River, Oak Creek and others, it appears Spence could store some water for recreation and tourism versus storing so much in Ivie. Mr. Grant commented the CRMWD would take that into consideration. Rep. Junell, having listened to the discussion, pushed for a commitment from the CRMWD for a 10 foot rise in the level of Lake Spence,

then later on we can shoot for an additional 5 feet. This would balance out the storage, help prevent Lake lvie from being overfilled which necessitates release of precious water and renew tourism and property values at Lake Spence.

John Grant agreed to this commitment with leeway to take care of extraordinary circumstances and to manage the chloride levels.

tains enzymes. Soak for at least 30 minutes - longer if the stains are old.

For beverage stains (including coffee, tea, soft drinks, wine and alcoholic beverages), sponge or soak the stain in cold water, then pre-treat and launder. If safe for the fabric, use liquid household bleach (sodium hypo-chlorite), otherwise use color-safe bleach. For older stains, try pre-treating or soaking in a product containing enzymes.

Mildew stains should be laundered, using liquid household bleach, if safe for the fabric, or soaked in colorsafe bleach and hot water. If the mildew infestation is severe, the fabric may be damaged beyond repair.

For mud stains, let the stain dry, then brush off as much residue as possible. For light

stains, soak in liquid laundry detergent or a paste made from powder laundry detergent and water. Do-it-yourselfers will find water-based paint easy to remove IF you do it before the paint dries. Rinse the wet stain in warm water, then launder the object. For oil-based paint and varnish, use the solvent recommended by the paint manufacturer as a thinner. If not available, use turpentine.
