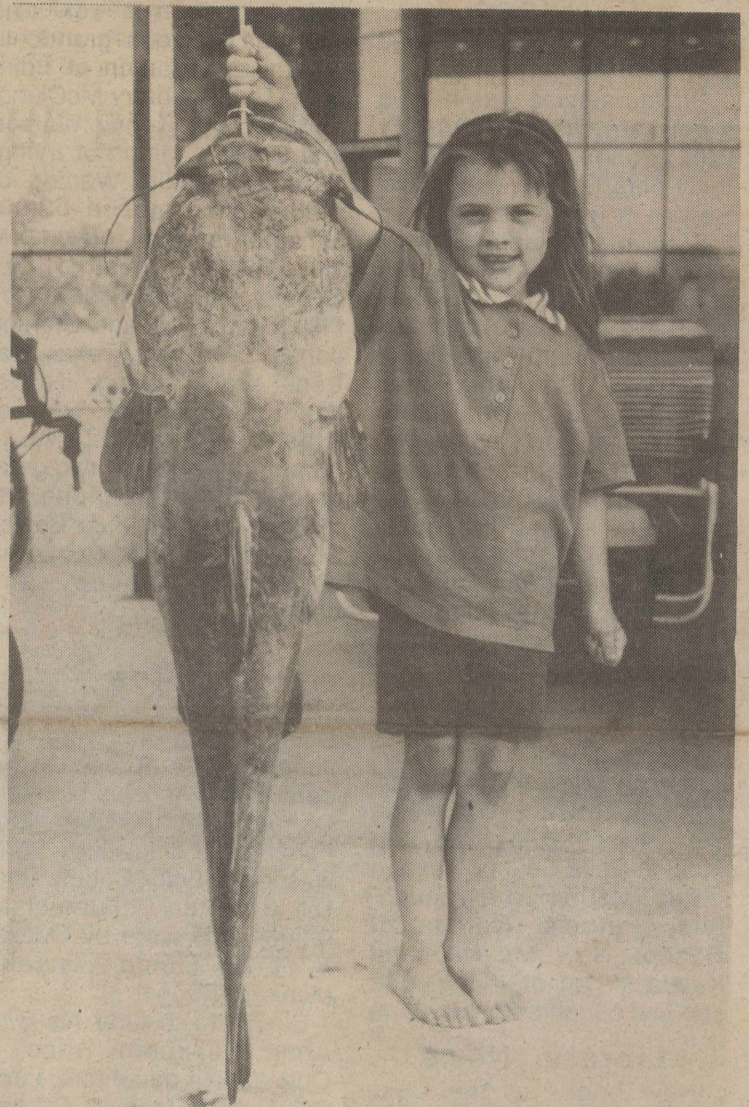

RL Baptist to host blood drive

In an effort to help stave off a summer blood shortage, Robert Lee Baptist Church will host a blood drive Saturday, June 13, from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.

Donors that want to make an appointment may contact Becky Ross at 453-2415. Appointments are not mandatory, but help keep donor flow smooth and will be taken before walk-ins. Donors are reminded to bring a positive form of identification, such as a driver's license or blood donor card. Donors are also asked to know the name of any medication they have taken in the past 30 days.

The blood drive will be conducted by United Blood Services of San Angelo, and representatives say the need for blood is always present.

"Summer is a particularly

critical time for the blood supply," said Angie Tyson, UBS Community Relations Representative, "Many of our regular donors are busy or out of town, so our blood supply dwindles. Unfortunately, the need for blood stays as constant as ever."

Donors must be at least 17 years old and weight at least 110 pounds. A donor must also be well and healthy at time of donation.

Because blood does expire after a time, UBS must draw around 325 units a week to supply and replenish the 18 hospitals in its service area.

"UBS San Angelo is merely the steward of the community blood supply," Tyson said. "If we experience a shortage, it's actually the patients and the communities that suffer."

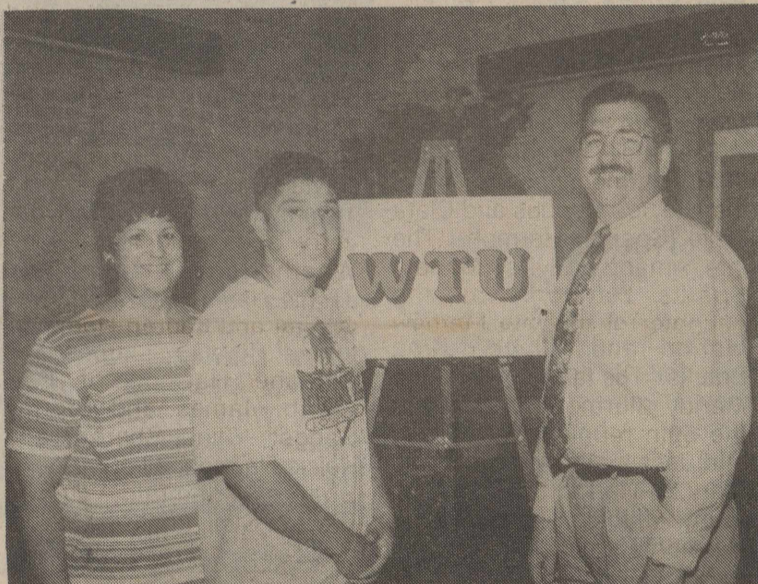
Sponsored by WTU from Bronte High School were Mrs. Jerita Taylor, (teacher) and Jimmy Soto (student).

There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas, and West Texas can be proud of their schools for being chosen to send teachers and students to the Symposium.

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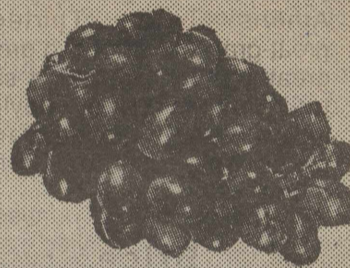
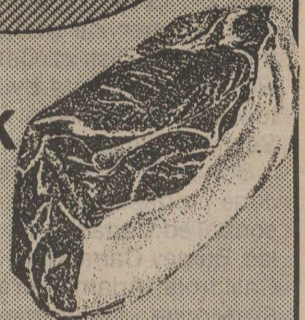

The Juror Reimbursement Donation Program was discussed and approved as presented. Future Jurors will have the choice of donating their fees to the designated funds.

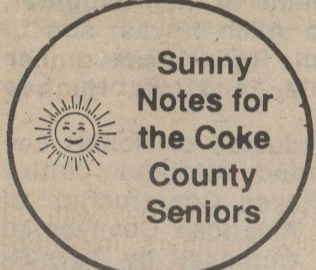
Communication through Judges and Commissioners offices was discussed.

Termites pose threat

Farmers and ranchers can beat the heat

With the hot summer days in full swing, farmers and ranchers face several health concerns. Heat cramps, heat exhaustion and heat stroke are just a few of the risks faced when the summer sun arrives.

Even short periods of high temperatures can cause problems. Farmers and ranchers need to be aware of the dangers associated with working outdoors. If the body temperature gets too hot, heat problems can occur. The body has its own way of regulating body temperature and avoiding heat problems most of the time.

During exercise, work outside or in hot environments, or even during inactivity in hot weather, you perspire or sweat. The evaporation of this sweat results in cooling, but if the climate is hot and humid the process is less effective.

Heat cramps are the least severe and are the first signals that the body is having trouble with heat. They are painful muscle spasms that usually occur in the legs and abdomen. Usually rest and fluids are all the person needs to recover.

Heat exhaustion is a more severe condition than heat cramps. Heat exhaustion results from loss of fluid through sweating when a person has failed to drink enough fluids. The person still sweats but experiences weakness, fatigue, nausea or a headache. The person experiencing heat exhaustion should rest in a cool place and drink an electrolyte solution, like a commercial sports drink.

Heat stroke is a medical emergency. It develops when the body systems are overwhelmed by heat and begin to stop functioning. A heat stroke victim's skin is hot, dry and red or spotted. The victim is usually mentally confused, delirious or unconscious. Unless the victim receives quick and appropriate treatment, death can occur. Any person with signs or symptoms of heat stroke requires immediate hospitalization. However, first aid should be administered until medical personnel can arrive. Victims of heat stroke should be moved to a cool area. Loosen any tight clothing and apply

cool, wet cloths.

Several precautions should be taken to prevent heat disorders.

Water is one of the most important nutrients in your diet. Those who work outdoors should try to drink 4 ounces of cool water every 15 minutes. Consumption of soft drinks and caffeine should be avoided, and consumption of salt or salt solutions are not necessary.

People should limit activity in hot or humid environments. Try to find something to do inside or in the shade.

Wearing white or light colors and porous clothing also prevents heat-related illnesses.

The most important thing to do is to watch for signs and symptoms of heat problems in yourself and those around you. If the signs are present, stop the activity and take steps to cool the body, prevention is the key.

Pick the perfect melon

Texas SpringSweet Melons is the name given to the cantaloupe and honeydew shipped from the Lower Grande Valley of Texas in May and June. These melons are usually the first domestic melons in the market place each year.

Use the following guidelines to pick a perfect melon.

When purchasing cantaloupe look for a smooth, rounded, depressed scar where stem used to be and a melon that yields slightly on its blossom end (opposite from the stem end) when touched. Select cantaloupe with a golden net covering and creamy yellow background as the interior flesh is normally a vivid orange. A good indicator of a ripe cantaloupe is a sweet musky aroma. Cantaloupe should be eaten when it gives off a fragrance. If you find some stem on the melon, it was picked too soon.

Honeydew should have a creamy yellow or white exterior color. The blossom end should be slightly springy and the shell should be creamy yellow. If the melon is greenish in color, it will never ripen. When honeydew feels too firm, do not refrigerate but leave at room temperature until the melon softens. Honeydew becomes sweeter after picking.

Watermelon are ripe when the underside is yellowish and firm. When the underside is white or green, it is immature and was picked too soon.

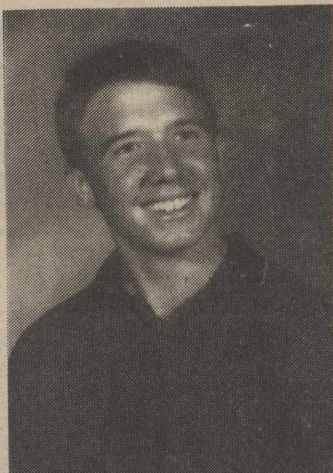
Crenshaws are best when the blossom end is soft and the skin is golden and green.

The shell of a casaba is golden when the melon is ripe.

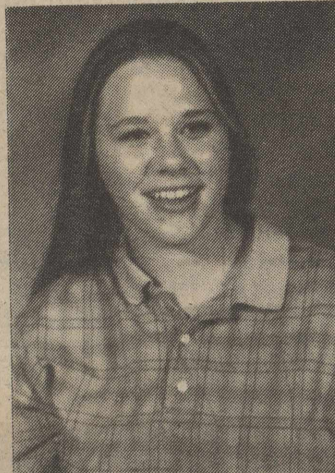
Persians are ripe when the blossom end is soft and the shell is mauvish with netted skin.

The African horned melon should have an orange to golden yellow color and be covered with spines. It should be approximately five inches long and three and one-half inches in diameter.

A melon that should not be soft is the Pepino. As it ripens, this melon is green to yellow with purple stripes. It should not be bruised.



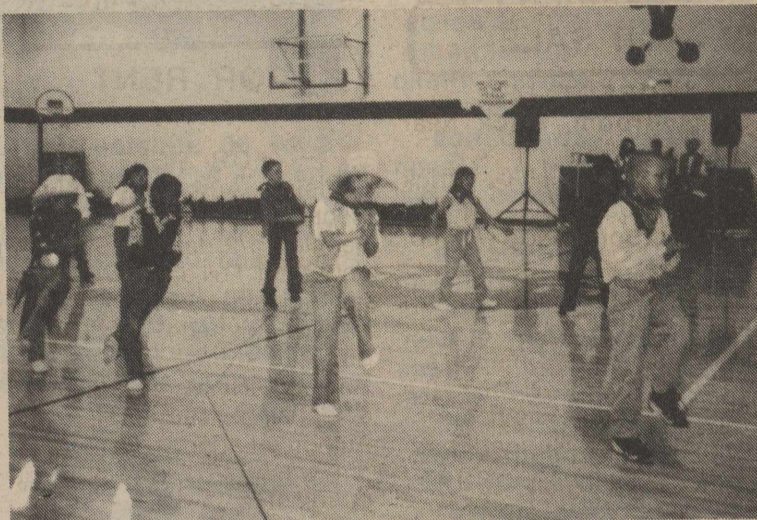

Alcohol can cause birth defects

No one knows if there is a safe amount of alcohol consumption for pregnant women, but most experts agree that it is best for the baby if the mother avoids all alcohol while pregnant. The Texas Department of Health (TDH) advises women who think they might be pregnant to stop consuming alcohol. "If you're planning a pregnancy, it's best to stop drinking alcohol before you try to conceive, and avoid alcohol during the entire pregnancy," advised Mary Ethen, an epidemiologist with TDH's Texas Birth Defects Monitoring Division. She advises women who drink to avoid pregnancy until they can abstain from alcohol for the nine months from conception to birth and also while breast feeding.

Ethen also encourages all women to visit their doctor early to confirm suspected pregnancy and receive prenatal care.
