
The Court then approved Carlos Valdes-Fauli as Architect, Agent, and Construction Manager for the project.


A Flag Waving Fourth in Fredericksburg Area

Protecting property during drought

Now is the time to be thinking about what you can do to protect your property during the current and future droughts. Even though no one can prevent a drought, certain precautions can lessen the impact of one. Dealing with natural resource concerns now can minimize negative impacts and produce long-range benefits after the drought. Below are a few ideas to consider.

• Practice conservation stocking. Maintaining flexibility in stocking rates is critical. The base herd should make up about two-thirds to threefourths of the carryinlg capacity. The remainder should consist of livestock that can be quickly liquidated to take some off the pressure of the grass.

 Consider how much forage you have and how long it will last if properly used. Generally, 60 to 70% of the year's forage has been produced by July 1. A cow eats about 26 pounds dry weight of forage a day - a pile about 2 feet high and 3 feet wide. · Consider culling. Reducing herd size will place less strain on forage plants (and improve breedback percentages). Although supplemental feed programs help producers, they may also encourage hanging on to livestock instead of culling. This may not relieve pressure on the grass and may even encourage improper grazing. As plants are continuously and closely grazed, they lose their ability to capture energy from the sun, root reserves are used up, and root systems reduced. The end result - if grazing is not corrected - is death of the plant. The next stage will be bare, crusty "lizard-lick" ground that won't absorb water and invasion of undesirable plants.

• Cull deeper into the herd if conditions worsen.

• At some point, it may be necessary to defer all livestock to avoid ruining future forage production. If land is not leased for hunting, doing so would provide some supplemental income.

• Set up small grazing exclosures for visual comparisons of grazed versus ungrazed areas as a management tool. About 50% of the leaf surface produced each year is needed by the grass to maintain its own health.

• Consider fencing alternatives. While you may have less livestock on the place and they can be moved a little easier, consider constructing cross fences. Pastures that are too large can be divided into smaller, more manageable units.

• Provide supplemental feed for wildlife.

• Think about the long-term. Make sure your grazing plans, conservation plans, and drought plans are up-to-date.
