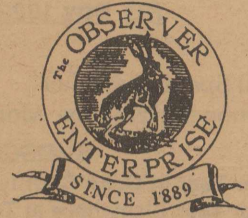

### County teams face off in 59th Coke County Championship

Football teams from Bronte and Robert Lee high schools have gone up against each other 58 times so far this century. The first game was held in 1939 with Bronte emerging victorious, 8-0.

However, over the years, Robert Lee has won the most games. They have posted 36 wins, with Bronte posting 26. There have been 3 ties.

Most points scored by a team in one game was a dead tie. Robert Lee took the win in 1945 with a score of 54-0. Bronte came back in 1986 to score 54 points to Robert Lee's 27.

The teams didn't play during the war years of 1942 and 1943, but played twice a year from 1944 to 1954.

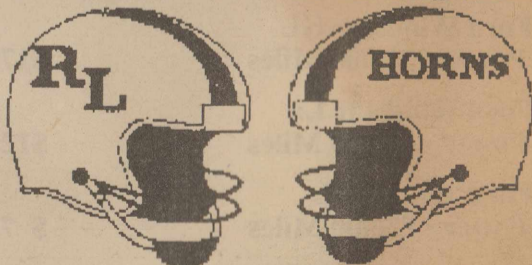

## New scholarship program offers college funds and international travel to high school seniors

Nominations are now being accepted for the EF Global Citizen Awards - a new scholarship program offered by student travel operator EF Educational Tours. Bases on student essays, EF will offer scholarships to twelve seniors - ten from the United States and two from Canada. Each student will receive \$1000 toward their college tuition and a ten-day expenses-paid educational tour of Europe.

### Campaign signs not allowed

As the Nov. 3 election fast approaches, candidates and campaign workers are reminded to be careful where they place campaign signs.

Such signs are not allowed on state highway right-of-way, which is reserved for official traffic control signs. Campaign signs erected on highway right-of-way will be removed by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), and the owner can be charged for removal costs.

In addition, a person placing an unauthorized sign in highway right-of-way can be fined up to \$500 per sign.

The law keeps highway rights-of-way clean and uncluttered so that official traffic control signs are clearly visible for the safety of the traveling public, according to Walter McCullough, San Angelo District Engineer.

Campaign signs can be placed off highway right-of-way as long as they:

- Are solely related to a public election;
- are no larger than 50 square feet;
- are erected no more than 90 days before an election and removed 10 days after the election; and,
- are made of lightweight material.

Signs within city limits may be subject to local ordinances.

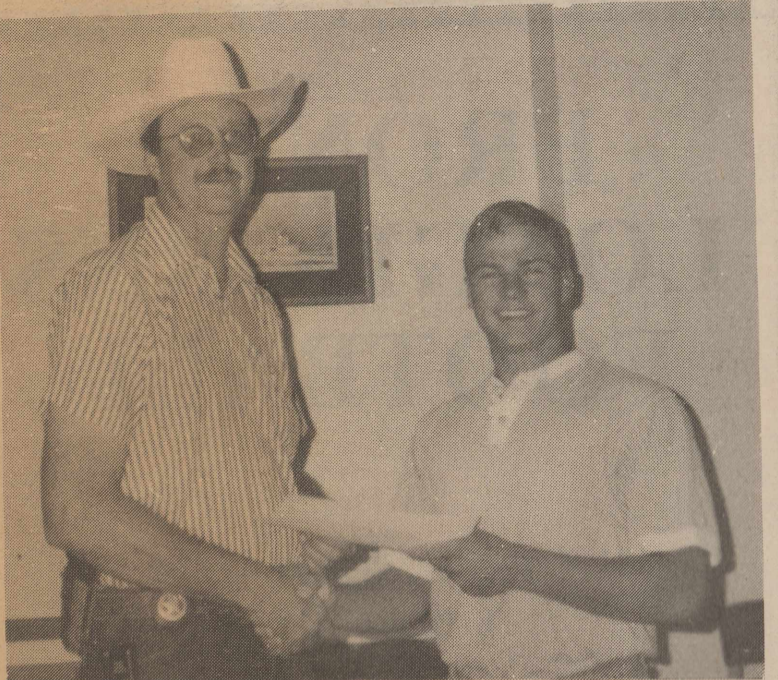

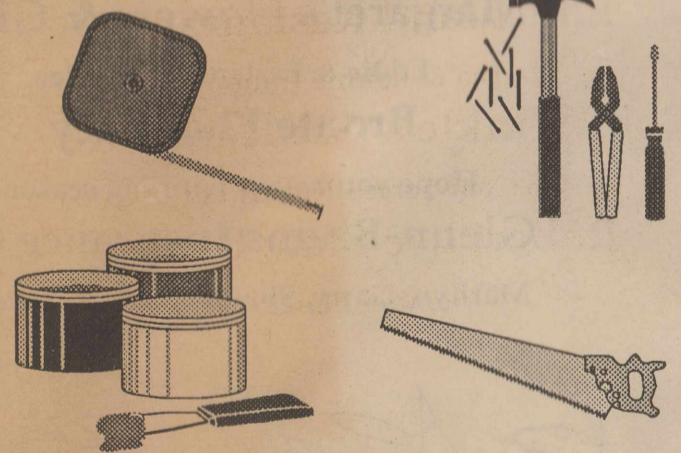

COUNTRY AGENTS NEWS

**Beef cow nutritional supplementation**

Some things never seem to change, and this is certainly true in beef cattle production. Even though a lot has changed in the last 20 or 25 years, beef cows still need the same nutrients they always have, vitamins, minerals, protein, and energy. In general, we can say the following about these four classes of nutrients under typical grazing conditions:

**RL City Council reports**

-Resumes for the Municipal Judge appointment were reviewed and interviews were scheduled.

-The Building Committee report was tabled.

-A date was set for a meeting with residents of Overland Trail regarding request for sewer services. Residents will be notified.

-The trip to Robinson was rescheduled.

-Approval was given to purchase a chainsaw from an employee.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned at 8:30 pm.

1. Minerals, especially phosphorous and salt but also magnesium and several trace minerals, are practically always deficient in most perennial pastures and native ranges. The only exception is when plants first start new growth.

2. Protein is periodically deficient. A shortage can occur at almost any time, but is almost certain during winter dormancy and, in most years, late summer.

3. Energy is occasionally deficient. Fortunately, it also is periodically in surplus in most years. Cows can store excess forage energy as body condition or fat. But at times, especially during drought or under overstocked conditions, stored body reserves are depleted.

4. Vitamins are rarely deficient under most grazing regimes. During extended periods of drought, lack of vitamin A can be a problem.

What has changed in the last 20 to 25 years is that we know more about specific nutritional needs. And we have more choices and better products to meet these needs. What do we mean?

1. Good high phosphorous minerals (8% to 15%) are widely available. Not so common are minerals adequate in magnesium, copper, zinc, manganese, and selenium. Check your mineral.

2. We now know that various forms of protein are required for ruminants such as cattle. You've probably heard of bypass or undegradable protein sources. However, this seems to be of less concern in cow herd nutrition than stocker or feedlot programs.

3. There is no question that the average cow is now larger and higher producing. So nutritional requirements are higher. And recommended minimum protein levels are now greater to ensure efficient rumen function.

4. There are limits in feeding high starch supplements to cows on range, pasture, or hay. Excess starch reduces efficiency of forage consumption and utilization. Poor results usually occur from feeding more than 3 to 4 pounds a

day of a feed based on corn, milo, etc., including most breeder cubes.

5. More new, useful by-product feeds are available.

How should we use this information in planning beef cow supplementation programs?

1. Provide good mineral free-choice year round.

2. Always supplement protein when needed. This will use forage most efficiently and help keep cows in good body condition most economically. It is easier to maintain body condition than restore it.

3. Don't be afraid of good by-products like soybean hulls, wheat midds, rice bran, and others.

4. If we provide minerals and protein when needed, and don't overstock, then supplemental energy can be minimized. Supplementing high levels of energy is usually biologically and economically inefficient. But if grass is short and energy is needed, either supply it or reduce animal numbers. Otherwise, reproduction and performance will be unacceptably low. You can't starve a profit out of cows.

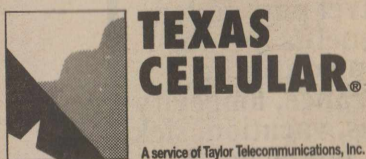

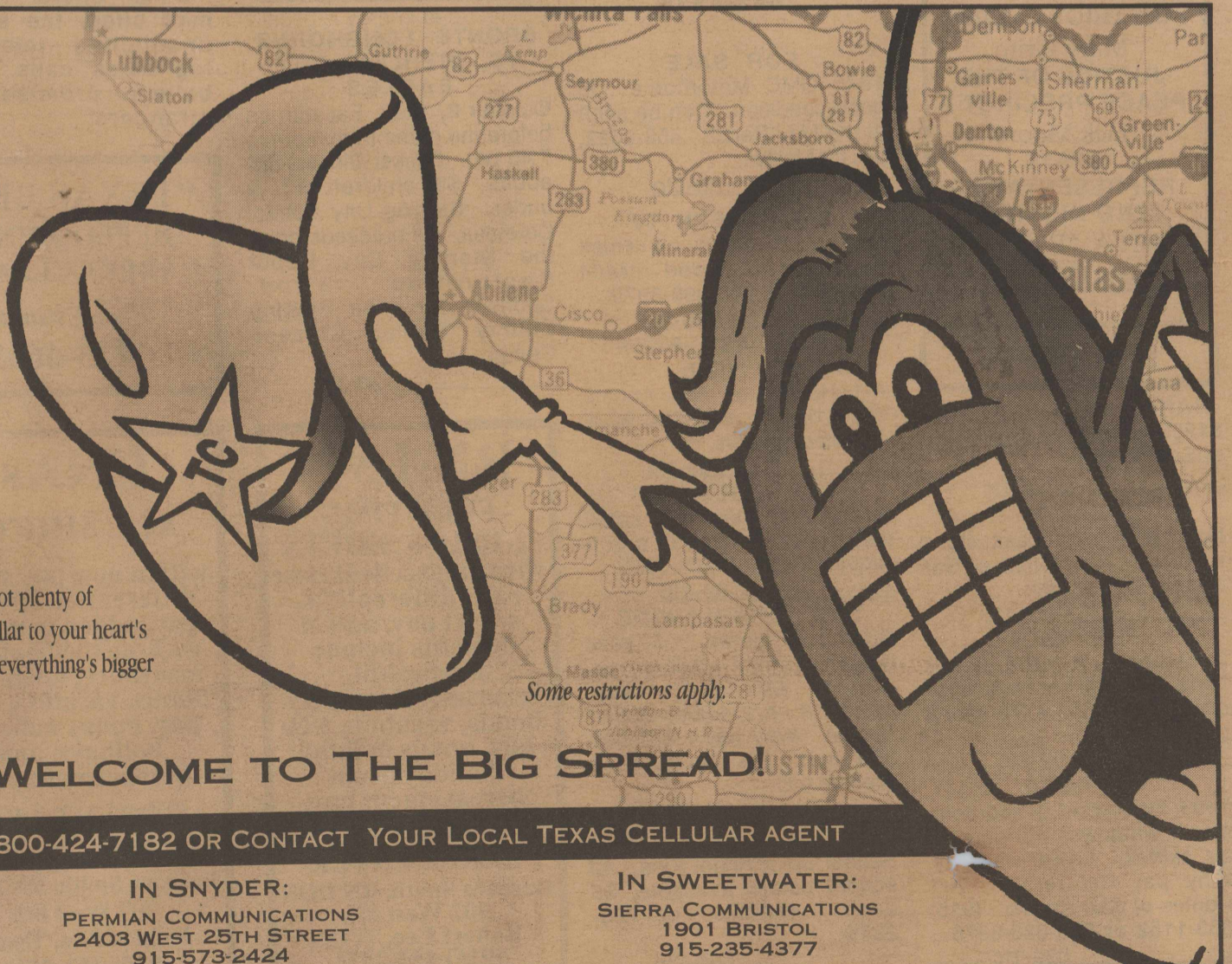

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES FOR USE AND SUPPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT OF THE CITY OF BRONTE FOR THE 1998-99 FISCAL YEAR; PROVIDING FOR APPORTIONING EACH LEVY FOR SPECIFIC PURPOSES; AND PROVIDING WHEN TAXES SHALL BECOME DUE AND WHEN SAME

SHALL BECOME DELINQUENT IF NOT PAID.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE:

SECTION 1. That there is hereby levied and there shall be collected for the use and support of the municipal government of the City of Bronte, upon all property, real, personal and mixed, within the corporate limits of

said City subject to taxation, a tax of \$0.402003 on each \$100.00 valuation of property, said tax being so levied and apportioned to the specific purposes here set forth:

For the maintenance and support of the general government (General Fund), \$0.402003 on each \$100.00 valuation of property.

SECTION 2. That taxes levied under this ordinance shall be due October 1, 1998, and if not paid on or before January 31, 1999, shall immediately become delinquent.

SECTION 3. All taxes shall become a lien upon the property against which assessed, and the City assessor and collector of the City of Bronte is hereby authorized and empowered to enforce the collection of such taxes according to the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas and ordinances of the City of Bronte shall, by virtue of the tax rolls, fix and establish a lien by levying upon such property, whether real or personal, for the payment of said taxes, penalty and interest, and the interest and penalty collected from such delinquent taxes shall be apportioned to the General Fund of the City of Bronte. All delinquent taxes shall bear interest from the date of delinquency at the rate as prescribed by state law.

SECTION 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

date above set out.
