Hunter education course to be held

A hunter education course will be held in Robert Lee Saturday, October 24th, and Saturday, October 31st, from 8 am until 12 noon each day to certify in the 8-hour training. Mrs. Dianne Simpson will teach the course in the commissioners' courtroom at the courthouse.

Every hunter (including outof-state hunters) born on or after September 2, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training course.

If you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are:

•age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course.

*age 12 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course or be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

•under 12 years of age, you must be accompanied by a person 17 years of age or older licensed to hunt in Texas.

Minimum age of certification is 12 years and cost of certification is \$10.

Proof of certification is re-

quired to be on your person while hunting; it is not required to purchase a license.

Archery hunting season opens

Hunting for several game species opens and/or closes during the month of October. One of the fastest growing and most challenging of these is the archery hunting season for deer and turkey which opened on Saturday, October 3rd. That season will conclude on November 1st.

In addition to the proper legal equipment, an archery stamp, a \$7 fee, is required. Hunting hours remain the same, with the exception of migratory birds, 1/2 hour before sunrise to 1/2 hour after sunset. Archery kills must be included in all-season bag limits required for Coke County. Therefore, the four turkeys limit and the four deer/no more than two buck limit appolices

Equipment restrictions for archery are lengthy; hunters should read the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department's 1998-99 outdoor guide. In fact, a read of the entire publication is advised for much good info and legal regs.

Hunters sometimes think no regulations exist for javelinas. The season actually opened October 1, 1998, and will continue through February 28, 1999. Bag limit is two per season and might furnish some excellent archery hunt-

ing.
The long-standing drought will make feeders a plus for game hunting but during archery season the hunter does not have the advantage of the less-cautious game the mating seasons afford. Total camo and stealth make the season a challenge.

Quail season opens statewide October 31, 1998, and runs through February 28, 1999. Bag limit is set for 15 birds.

Mourning dove season closes in the Central Zone (Coke County) on October 18, 1998, and has been surprisingly good.

During a fire, the air's normal oxygen level - 21 percent - is drastically reduced. People experience severe physical disorientation when the atmospheric oxygen drops below 17 percent and are unable to breathe at all when the oxygen level drops to the 10-to-6 percent range.

Only about one fourth of home-fire victims die from burns. Most home-fire deaths result from inhaling smoke and poisonous gases produced by the fire. The majority of fatal home fires happen at night when people are asleep. The number one cause of fatal fires is smoking, resulting in an average of 820 deaths per year.

It is essential for family housing that a step-by-step escape plan be developed and practiced at least twice a year. Don't forget the installation and maintenance of smoke detectors can be a key to early warning.

In some occupancies, such as high rise buildings, the safest action when a fire alarm sounds may be to stay inside a dwelling unit and protect yourself from smoke until the fire department arrives.

In recent years, the three most frequent causes of fire in United States and Canadian homes have been: (1) cooking equipment (2) heating equipment, and (3) arson or

suspected arson. The Coke County Farm Bureau promotes public awareness of fire safety and encourages everyone to plan and practice "Fire Drills: The Great Escape."





Science classes sponsor "Make A Difference Day"

Mrs. Taylor's Science classes of Bronte Junior High School would like to extend an invitation for you to join us on Saturday, October 24th, which has been designated as "Make A Difference Day" in our Nation. The seventh and eighth grade classes have joined hundreds of schools nationwide in an important project called "Biodiversity Counts". This project is sponsored by The National Museum of Natural History, which is The National Center for Science Literacy, Education and Technology.

Our project has been centered around Kickapoo Creek, which cuts across the school campus. We are making ecological studies of the plant and animal ecosystems in and around the creek. Our first observations were shocking as to the amount of man-made pollution in and around this part of the creek. We decided to seek help in a "Clean-Up" campaign for this area.

Governor Bush has a program called "Clean 2000" which includes recycling and clean waterways. Since Kickapoo Creek feeds into the Colorado River, it has an effect on other areas and people and natural habitats of Texas on its way to the Gulf Coast. Soil and Water Conservation, West Texas Watch for water monitoring by the Upper Colorado River Authority, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department have programs that address the fact that we should be 'Good

Stewards" of the land.

We would also like to propose a "Nature Trail" that would run the length of the Creek adjacent to the school campus. This area could possibly be used by all of the Bronte ISD students from Pre-K through 12th grades for scientific studies as an outdoor classroom, thus allowing a closer look at nature. The community would also benefit from this endeavor by having a nice place to walk or jog as a change from the track field. It would also add to the aesthetic beauty of our school campus.

If you are interested in the advancement of our extended learning in this area, we would like to invite your to meet us on October 24th at 9 am until? or whatever you can do to contribute to this project for the future of our school and community. We hope that our "Biodiversity Counts" project increases the awareness and consciousness of the biodiversity crisis and forms a growing community of young citizens who will be responsible stewards of the planet.

To address the questions you've raised about our Year 2000 effort, First National Bank in Bronte has established a formal Year 2000 Committee to oversee, plan, and coordinate Year 2000 activities. The Year 2000 Committee reports directly to the bank's Board of Directors and is chaired by the bank's Chief Operating Officer, with assistance from the bank's President, Information Systems Manager, and Auditor.

Each of the strategic areas of the bank has an active responsibility to implement Year 2000 compliance. Standards and methodologies for implementing and measuring Year 2000 compliance are regularly reviewed by the Board of Directors.

First National Bank in Bronte has made sure that management and employees have been trained to recognize problems that could occur due to the century date change. A great deal of time has been spent replacing programming and hardware and testing for a variety of date related problems. In addition to this, vendors that supply programming or hardware to the bank have been consulted to avert any unforeseen issues.

The bank's core banking systems, provided through Information Technology of Lincoln, Nebraska, have been tested at our own site and through many other banking sites. All software has been found to be Year 2000 compliant. Other critical systems of the bank have been replaced or modified to bring them into compliance.

As an additional safeguard, First National Bank in Bronte, has made contingency plans for Year 2000. "Hard copies" (paper) printouts will be created of data files on 12/31/99. There will be no problems due to "lost" records or incorrect calculations of interest because of the century date change. Bank employees will have accurate records.

Management has determined that expenditures related to the Bank's Year 2000 compliance problem should not have a material impact on the financial position of the Bank. The bank began to plan and budget for expenditures several years ago.

At the present time, we are monitoring all data on a daily basis and have experienced no problems. The Year 2000 Committee will continue to monitor all of the bank's data until all critical dates have been achieved (after 12/31/2001).

Program presented at Bronte Masonic Lodge





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Horticulture Update

September and October are usually the best months to plant container-grown and balled- and burlapped trees. Planting trees now will help establish the root system and allow for root growth during the winter. Always try to buy from a reputable nursery that can stand behind their product and offer assistance if problems arise. Remember to choose a proper location for your new tree, and find out the mature height and canopy size before you select a planting location. Also, whether buying a containergrown or balled-and burlapped tree, plant as soon as possible and never let the roots dry out. Use care when transporting the tree from the nursery to the planting site. Secure the tree well and, if you transport the tree in an uncovered vehicle, be sure to wrap the tree with some sort of fabric to prevent the leaves from windburn.

Planting the tree: When digging a hole for your new tree, the rule of thumb is to dig the hole twice as wide as the root ball, but not deeper than the tree was originally growing. Also, don't put anything back into the hole that didn't come out of it; refill the hole after planting with the same soil. If rocks or construction debris are present, be sure to remove these items

Adding compost, fertilizer, peat moss, or artificial media will delay the time that it takes for roots to adapt to the surrounding soil. Remember to remove container grown trees from the container, but leave the burlap on burlapped trees. If the burlapped tree has a piece of wire, plastic, or rope holding the burlap on to the trunk, remove it after planting so it does not girdle the tree.

Next it is suggested to build a 4 inch tall berm around the edge of the hole and filling it with some sort of mulch (shredded bark, compost, etc.). This procedure will make it easier to water, and reduce weed competition.

Care of the tree: The tree should be watered immediately after planting and watched carefully for the next several weeks. Check the soil moisture daily, making sure that the root ball does not dry out. Gradually wean the tree from supplemental irrigation by lengthening the interval between waterings. This will encourage the roots to grow into the surrounding soil.

Balled-and burlapped trees need to be selectively pruned back by 30 to 40 percent to compensate for roots that were damaged during digging. The nature and growth habit of the tree you buy will determine how you prune. Encourage trees to develop a strong branching structure by removing weak and narrow crotch angles. Container grown trees do not require pruning immediately after planting because all the roots are present in the container. However, later pruning might be necessary to establish the desired characteristics mentioned above.

Flu Shots for Veterans

Flu shots are now available to eligible veterans at the local VA Outpatient Clinic. Veterans residing in the San Angelo area may report to the San Angelo VA Outpatient Clinic, 2018 Pulliam, San Angelo. Veterans currently registered for health care through the San Angelo VA Outpatient Clinic will be read show their VA identification cards to receive their shots. Unregistered veterans will be asked to simply present proof of eligibility for VA benefits (DD Form 214) in order to obtain their flu shots. If interested, they will be able to apply to receive the VA Primary Health Care at the medical center. Pneumonia vaccine shots will also be available for veterans who are medically determined to need them.



U.S. sheep industry files petition for import relief

Worried about the devastating impact of lamb meat imports flooding the U.S. Marketplace, the American Sheep Industry Association sheep producers, feeders, processors and packers filed a petition for import relief with the U.S. International Trade Commission on Wednesday, September 30.

The petition triggers a sixmonth investigation by the ITC, to be followed by a Presidential decision as to the form and duration of the relief. The investigation, with information gathered from importers and all segments of the U.S. sheep industry, will begin immediately. A hearing on the Section 201 trade action is expected in January 1999.

"We are confident the results of the investigation will show imports have caused serious harm to the American lamb industry," said Lorin Moench, Jr., President of the American Sheep Industry Association. "All parts of the

chain - from gate to plate need to focus on seeking relief or risk losing their businesses."


In the last five years, imported lamb has skyrocketed from 15 percent of the American market to nearly one-third of all lamb consumed in the United States during the first half of 1998. More than 95 percent of the imports come from Australia and New Zealand. Imports increased by nearly 50 percent during 1993-97 and continued to rise by another 12 percent between January-June 1997 and January-June 1998. Prices paid to American producers plummeted during the 1998 Easter Passover season, the market's traditional peak season, reaching a 4year low of 60 cents per pound for slaughter lambs.

Industry leaders blame the import surge on the Asian financial crisis and the openness of the U.S. Market. That, coupled with the European Union's quota on lamb imports, has turned the U.S. market into a "relief valve for excess lamb from major lamb-producing countries," said Moench.

Support for the petition has come from all segments of the U.S. sheep industry. Nine companies or associations have signed on as co-petitioners and hundreds of people or groups have contributed financial backing to the effort.

"The imports are having such an impact that you have to speak up, voice your disapproval and put your name on the dotted line. We're losing too many of our producers," said Bill Brennan, plant manager for lowa Lamb Corporation, one the of co-petitioners. Based in Hawarden, lowa, lowa Lamb Corporation is the largest packing house in the nation dedicated solely to lamb meat.

The petition asks the Commission to recommend to the White House a four-year period of relief in the form of an increased tariff on imported lamb coupled with a quota above which an additional tariff would be levied. This would allow imports to continue but at prices that will not drive U.S. producers out of business, said Peter Orwick, Executive Director of the American Sheep Industry Association.
