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





Brush Buster demonstrations

There are three Brush Buster demonstrations for control of prickly pear that have been put out in the county. One plot put on last summer on the Don Bowen ranch just as you top the divide on Highway 208 utilizes 1% Tordon 225 (Picloram) mixed with water on the south side of the sign and 1% Tordon 225 mixed with diesel and water on the north side of the sign. Two new prickly pear tests have been put out on Don Fields and Troy Wimberley's Salt Creek Beefmaster ranch and J.E. Quisenberry's ranch.

The Salt Creek test is located on the north side of Highway 158 west of Robert Lee. Two different treatments were used on this test with the plot to the right of the demonstration sign being 1% Tordon 225 mixed with diesel and water. The plot to the left of the sign used 1% Tordon 225 mixed with water as the carrier.

The J.E. Quisenberry plot is located east of Bronte 4 miles on the south side of Highway 158. This plot was put out using 1% Tordon 225 mixed with diesel and water.

Both treatments show initial yellowing of prickly pear with the diesel plots showing a slightly quicker melt down of the pear. Initial results show that there should be excellent control of pear using the individual plant treatment.

Cost of the treatment varies with the plant density and

Farm Service Agency announces 18th CRP sign-up

The next CRP general signup will be held during a 7week period from October 26 through December 11.

This is another opportunity for landowners to sign up for a voluntary program to get financial and technical assistance for improving their land, water and wildlife resources. If you've never tried to get into the program, if your CRP contract offers were not accepted in the last sign-up or if your contract expires in 1999, this is the time to make a new contract offer.

The new, environmentallyfocused CRP provides immediate benefits to producers, ranchers and taxpayers through reduced soil erosion, improved water quality and expanded wildlife habitat. Under this voluntary program, landowners enter into contracts with USDA to place erodible and other environmentally sensitive cropland in conservation practices for 10 to 15 years.

The COC will continue to evaluate and rank all eligible CRP offers using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI).

size. The chemical mix cost 92 cents per gallon and the cost of chemical in the plots mentioned above figured \$1.44 for the Salt Creek test with 82 pear clumps treated in one plot measuring 1.28 acres or about .018 cents per clump treated. In the Quisenberry plot the pear was denser and larger with 263 clumps treated in 1.6 acres with a chemical cost of \$3.45 per acre of .014 cents per clump treated.

Small grain forage test

A small grain forage test was put out on Jay and Jolene Henderson's field south of Bronte on Highway 277. There were five varieties of certified wheat that are supposed to be the best forage producers including WinMaster, 812, Longhorn, TAM 202 and WinTex. A new triticale blend called TRT 2000 and a new oat called Dallas was also used. The new Dallas oat has shown to be extremely resistant to freeze damage in experimental tests conducted up North and the TRT 2000 triticale is supposed to be an excellent forage producer.

Conservation Reserve Program

Changes in the United States Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) have forced many producers to spend unnecessary dollars.

In recent years, the USDA has made changes in the program rules for being accepted into the CRP. Producers in West Texas are required to plow up already existing perennial grasses and replant with a native grass, which the USDA claims is more environmentally beneficial to wildlife.

The cost of this reseeding program is expensive and the chances for failure high. In addition, leaving existing wildlife without food or protection and the possibility of a drought are all expensive

The CRP was originally enacted in 1986 as a long-term

land retirement program. Its primary objective is to reduce soil erosion by contracting with landowners for the removal of highly erodible cropland or environmentally sensitive terrain from production for 10 years. Producers are required to establish a cover crop on the land and receive an annual rental payment for participating in the program.

In action taken at their annual meeting, soil and water conservation district directors

want the National Association of Conservation Districts and those in charge of developing policies for the CRP, to revise this rule and find alternatives to the program that are economically feasible and environmentally sound.

"Recent changes in the program rules have caused many producers to agree to plow up good stands of perennial grass and reseed other perennial grasses," said Kermit Shults, Chairman of the Terry Soil and Water Conservation District. The Terry SWCD is headquartered in Brownfield. "The plowing of these fragile soils will leave them without cover for an extended period of time, creating severe erosion problems."

Approximately 800 soil and water conservation district directors and other conservation leaders are attending the 58th annual meeting of the SWCD directors which is being held in Corpus Christi.

The 5th grade class at Bronte Elementary have just completed their 9 hours of training to become Peer Mediators for the elementary school. Mrs. McCutchen, counselor at Bronte schools, spent 1 1/2 days with the students and Mrs. Lee working on skills that will help them become peer mediators. What is peer mediation? It is students helping students to work out their problems. Students learn specific skills in communication, dispute resolution, and socialization, which they then apply in the school, family, and community setting. Benefits to schools are that students take responsibility for solving their own problems and teachers can concentrate on teaching.

Mediators are good listeners, people who don't take sides but stays neutral, a fact-finder, someone who helps people hear each other's point of view, someone who can be trusted, someone who is caring and supportive, and a person who helps people feel safe to talk.

The day was spent doing fun activities which enhances teamwork skills, builds listening skills and feeling vocabulary, and practice in role-play situations. Speaking skills are a large part of mediation, too. Students learn active listening techniques they will use for a lifetime.

if a problem occurs at school, a referral is made and a peer mediation is set for the disputants and mediators through Mrs. McCutchen. It will take place where it is quiet ston. and convenient for all involved. If the disputants work out their problem, an agreement form is written and signed by all at the meeting. If there is no solution, mediation ends until the two or more disputants are ready again. At schools where mediation occurs, discipline referrals are very few because students are coming up with their own solutions with the help of mediators.

the mask on top of their heads when walking and pull it over their faces only when reaching their location.

*The elastic should be permanently attached to the mask, and there should be no sharp points on the elastic or the mask.

*Be certain that masks, wigs, beards, and hats fit securely and are not cumbersome.

*An alternative to face masks may be the application of non-toxic face paint or make-up to the child's face.

*Look for "flame resistant" labels on costumes, masks, beards and wigs. When shopping for fabrics to use in home sewn costumes choose flame resistant fabrics. Sales people can assist in identifying these fabrics.

*Avoid costumes made out of flimsy materials and outfits with big, baggy sleeves or billowing skirts. These are more likely to come in contact with an exposed flame or candle than tighter fitting costumes. Be certain that costumes allow children to walk easily without tripping and entangling their feet.

*Do not allow children to carry knives, swords or other props unless they are soft and flexible.

*Buy or make Halloween costumes that are light or bright enough to make them more visible to motorists at dusk and in the dark. Reflective tape or decals may be added so that children are visible at night to motorists.

*Children should wear comfortable, well-fitted shoes or sneakers. Do not let them wear mother's high heels.

The final conference speaker is Officer Grab Davis with the Tom Green County Sheriff's Department. Davis will address horse theft prevention.

Windbreak program for Coke County producers

Seedling applications for conservation windbreaks are now available to Coke County landowners through the Texas Forest Service West Texas Nursery or local Soil and Water Conservation District. Several varieties of evergreens and deciduous trees and shrubs are available.

Each year, West Texas Nursery provides adapted windbreak seedlings, at cost, to assist producers in incorporating conservation windbreaks into their farming and/or ranching operation.

"Windbreaks are trees and shrubs systematically planted adjacent to fields, homesteads, or feedlots as a barrier to reduce or redirect the wind," says Robert Fewin, Texas Forest Service forester, Lubbock. "And when properly planted, they become a management tool that affects every aspect of the farm or ranch."

Windbreaks create permanent, natural protection and habitat for wildlife, reduce

erosion, and increase land value and aesthetics.

Evergreens are sold in boxes of 30 and the hardwoods in bundles of 100. Seedlings ordered this fall will be shipped or delivered in the spring of 1999.

Wildlife packets for habitat establishment also are available. Each of the four wildlife packets contain 100 bare-root trees and shrubs which cater specifically to the habitat needs of quail and pheasant, deer, turkey or squirrel.

West Texas Nursery's primary objective is to produce and sell quality seedlings at a price landowners can afford, allowing them to plant large quantities of trees for windbreaks. Producers are encouraged to purchase seedlings this fall before preferred stock is sold out.

The last games of the season will be Monday, November 2nd, against Miles, at home, 4 pm and 5 pm.



Everything you always wanted to know about your ACT score report - but were afraid to ask

Like most students, the first thing you will look at when you receive your ACT results is your score. While the score is probably the *LEAST* important piece of information on the page, that is fine as long as you don't stop looking at that point. Your ACT score report has a great deal to share with you, about yourself as well as your top choice colleges, if you just know how to decipher it.

Let's look at your scores first, just so you'll quit thinking about them. You receive scores for each of the four tests (English, mathematics,

reading, and science reasoning). Your composite is the average of the four scores, and the number most people refer to when reporting their ACT score. You'll notice that you also receive subscores in three of the four tests (to further define your abilities) and you will also find that the subscores DO NOT add up to that test's score - that's okay, they're not supposed to. In order to give some perspective to your scores, check how they relate to those of other ACT-tested students, both nationwide and in your home state. Now, on to the good stuff!

The next section of your score report is entitled "Your College Planning," and has information about you and how you compare to the students attending the colleges in which you're interested. If the

three colleges you listed par-ticipate in our "College Profile Service" this comparative data will be right on your report. If not, check the college's admissions literature, or talk to one of their admissions representatives, to get the answers you need to fill in the blanks. If you haven't positively selected a college yet, take time to read Section 2 of Using Your ACT Assessment Results, the booklet that your counselor gave you (or you received in the mail) with your student report. Additional support materials, like ACT's College Planning/Search Book or computer software, are probably available in the counseling office.

The "Educational/Occupational Planning" portion of your score report should be of

interest to you, even if you feel certain you know what you want to study and which career you want to pursue. The results of your Interest Inventory might point you toward a career that you never considered (or even knew existed) that you would really enjoy. They might indicate that you would not enjoy your chosen field, due to the work task required for which you expressed a strong dislike. It is not uncommon for people to change majors or careers, but the sooner you learn more about youself, different jobs, and the match between the two, the sooner you'll make the best choice possible for you. Following the suggested activities in Section 3 of Using Your ACT Assessment Results is a great way to find

that match.

Remember, your parents and counselor want to help you reach the difficult decisions that are before you right now, so never hesitate to discuss with them the questions and concerns you have. The information provided by your ACT Score Report is a great catalyst for any number of questions, so check out your scores, and then really dig in and explore your options!

Hunting for deer lease answers

Deer hunting is big business in Texas, and hunting leases remain a constant revenue source for many Texas landowners.

Recently the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University revised The Texas Deer Lease. Written by Judon Fambrough, senior lecturer and attorney, this report provides useful information on many deer lease issues, and it may be an essential tool for deer hunters.

The "no trespass" notice is new to this edition. The report also provides information on how to prevent trespassing and poaching. Five ways landowners may limit entrance are discussed. The guide also elaborates on the Sept. 1, 1997, measure that legalizes purple paint marks on trees and posts in lieu of "no trespassing" signs.

The guide discusses the new rules regarding liability insurance and landowner liability. By having specified mini-

mum levels in place, says Fambrough, landowners receive two benefits.

First, the landowners' liability is capped at the stated amounts. Second, landowners owe hunters no more duty that is owed trespassers. Ways to limit landowner liability, including the use of waivers, are covered.

"Texas landowners hold a unique position," says Fambrough. "Unlike many states, Texas has little federally or state-owned land available for public hunting. This places private landowners in control of a major supply of huntable land and affords them a unique source of income."

In Texas, all indigenous wild animals, such as white-tailed deer, belong to the state. Although the state regulates when, how and the number of deer that may be taken, it cannot authorize trespassing on privately owned land. Independent permission must be secured from landowners.

Historically, permission was granted for the asking; how-

ever, Texas landowners began exacting a price for this privilege in the form of an agreement, commonly referred to as a hunting lease.

"The hunting lease is a license that grants permission to do something that otherwise would not be allowed or would be illegal," says Fambrough. "It is characterized as a license because the Texas hunting lease does not grant the hunter exclusive possession or control of the land."
