Two named to Dean's List

Rebecca Emert has been named to the Sul Ross State University's Dean's List for the Fall semester. Becca is a sophomore elementary education major and is the daughter of Tad and Therese Emert. She graduated from Robert Lee High School in 1998.

Eli Boxell, son of Lonnie and Marla Bloodworth, was also named to the Dean's List. son, 37, and Netia J. Watson, 46, each face a maximum life sentence.

Goldie Marie Thomas of Slaton and formerly of Robert Lee, died August 20, 1998, in a Lubbock hospital just one day after she was found comatose in the Watson's house at 330 W. Garza St. She was Thomas Watson's grandmother.

James said police immediately became suspicious about Thomas' death.

He said the Watsons called a funeral home before they called police.

"That struck us as kind of odd," James said. "The call came in to us as a deceased person...EMS worked it as (an emergency), and got a pulse." He said the Watsons

claimed Thomas injured herself from several falls.

"Their explanation didn't fit," James said. "Her injuries were inconsistent with a fall, and their demeanor didn't seem right."

James said Thomas moved from Robert Lee in June, and police developed "good information" that she had no injuries before moving. He said the beatings were likely from fists and were inflicted for about the five weeks prior to her death.

James believes the Watsons wanted Thomas' assets, which included cash and real estate. He said Thomas was a retired nurse, and the Watsons had power of attorney over her estate and knew of her assets.

According to an autopsy report, Thomas had multiple contusions on her face and scalp, recent cuts on her upper and lower lips, recent contusions on her tongue, and healing cuts behind her ears. She also had widespread contusions on both breasts.

Medical examiner Dr. Glen R. Groben ruled the death as heart failure caused by multiple blunt force trauma, which, he said, made it a homicide. It is Slaton's first homicide in about six years, James said.

Groben also determined Thomas had a diseased heart, which may have contributed to her death.

"The coroner ruled it a homicide, so our choices were murder or injury to an elderly," James said. "The penalties are exactly the same, and they believe they have a stronger case with the injuries."



THC travels throughout Texas

Larry Oaks, deputy director of the Texas Historical Commission (THC), and other THC staff members are holding a public meeting in Abilene on Feb. 4 and in San Angelo Feb. 5 to introduce a new agency initiative, the State of the State of Preservation. The THC is conducting a statewide survey to determine what constituents see as the condition of their historic resources and what their preservation-related goals are for the next five years. The results will determine how the THC can best assist communities across the state in the coming years.

"We are laying the groundwork to build preservation partnerships for a new millennium," said Larry Oaks, deputy director of the Texas Historical Commission. "By talking with people across the state to learn their needs, we can determine how to most effectively channel our agency's resources toward the common goal of protecting and preserving the archeological, historical and cultural resources of Texas."

The goals of the State of the State Preservation public meetings are to:

 Identify THC resources that the public may not know about.

·Learn what various communities see as their biggest challenges in preservation, and how the THC can help.

 Discover the strengths/weaknesses of various geographic regions from a historical/archeological resource protection standpoint.

•Discuss how to develop an action plan working with local and state contacts to protect and promote local historical resources.

Feb. 21 in College Station, Thursday, Feb. 25 in Hous-ton, and Friday, Feb. 26 in Beaumont.

The Texas Historical Commission is the state agency for historic preservation. The agency administers a variety of programs to preserve the archeological, historical and cultural resources of Texas. "Our abundant natural resources of soil, water, air, plants, and animals continue to provide us with a healthy environ-ment," Burt said. "The wise use of these resources sets us apart from every other country in the world. In Texas, NRCS works with 216 local Soil and Water Conservation Districts to address local resource issues. As part of the local celebrations, various activities are planned at each USDA-NRCS office in Texas. These will include conservation tours, displays, educational programs, environmental awareness, and other events.

"Each office will participate in its own program," Burt said, "which will be tailored to local natural resource issues or concerns. We have a real opportunity to have people across the state become better aware of our environment and the work of our conservation programs in Texas."


RL choirs attend **UIL** competition



Grow Texas Onions

Onion planting time is here! Onions do well in Texas if growers plant the right variety at the appropriate time.

Success with onions has to do with understanding the phenomena of bulbing. Bulbing occurs as a result of the length of daylight hours. Daylength requirement differs among varieties which have been broken down into shortday, intermediate-day and long-day types. The daylength requirement of an onion variety must be met or bulbing will not occur.

•Short-day varieties, such as the 1015Y or Texas Super Sweet onion, require about 12 hours of daylight and will produce anywhere in Texas if planted at the right time.

·Medium-day and long-day types, which produce hotter and more pungent onions, grow only in specific areas.

The larger the plant, or the more leaves it has when bulbing is initiated, the larger the



Where It's At

Since 46% of all car crashes are frontal crashes, riding in the back seat is the safest position. Any or all passengers are safest in the back seat. The National ABC Campaign emphasizes Air Bag Safety, Buckle Everyone and Children in the Back. By following these three simple guides, you can better protect your children in the event of a vehicle crash. Even though air bags continue to save lives and prevent many injuries in motor vehicle crashes, they can seriously injure or kill children who are not properly restrained. Therefore, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration recommends that all children aged 12 and under ride properly restrained in the back seat. Whether a vehicle has a passenger side air bag or not, the back seat is the safest place for children. To assure a safer ride for all passengers, buckle everyone every time. Texas law requires children aged 2 and under to be properly restrained in a safety seat that meets federal safety standards. From the ages of 2-4, children are required by law to be in either a child safety seat or in a seat belt. Secure infants and toddlers in a child safety seat that is appropriate for their age and size. Insist that everyone wear a safety belt every time.

bulb will be. The best way to have the right sized plant at the right time is to set out pencil-sized transplants six weeks before the average frost free date. In Coke County, the average date of the last freeze is March 24.

Most Texas soils are adequate for growing onions, but some may need more organic matter to increase drainage. Planting onions on top of raised beds will improve drainage and will enable the soil to warm up more quickly in the spring.

*Several weeks prior to planting, evenly scatter about 1/2 pound of a complete fertilizer, such as 10-10-10, over 50 square feet of bed surface.

*To plant onions, make small holes in the row 3 to 4 inches apart and about 1 inch deep. Set one transplant in each hole, firm the soil around it and water immediately.

*After three to four weeks, side dress plants with one cup of ammonium sulfate or 2/3 cup of ammonium nitrate. Place the fertilizer about 4 inches from the onion plants.

*Keep the soil moist, especially once bulbing (swelling at the base of the plant) begins.

*Mulch around plants v "h two to three inches of organic matter.

*Once plants start to mature, as indicated by a softening of the "neck" just above the bulb, allow the soil to begin drying. When bulbs are

mature, the softened necks will cause the plant tops to fall over. At this time, pull up the onions and place them in a dry area to cure.

·Several days later, clip the roots and tops, leaving 1 inch of stem attached to the bulbs to prevent entry of decay organisms.

Onions are usually ready for harvesting between May and late July.
