

This is a special message to graduating seniors, their families and friends. Be sure to buckle up as you begin your graduation celebration. With graduation just around the corner, the best way for you to make sure your celebration and your future are happy ones is to buckle up on every trip. The Buckle UP! Message is clear. It is important to buckle up on every trip, not just when you think about it, but all year long. In Texas in 1995, two thousand one hundred and eighty-six front seat occupants lost their lives in motor vehicle crashes. Of that number one thousand one hundred and eightythree were unrestrained. In that same year, about 54% of the 16-20 year olds that died in crashes were not wearing their safety belts. If these young people had buckled up one hundred and sixty-four people might still be alive to-

Buckling up not only saves lives, but also helps prevent serious injuries, many of which can cause permanent disability. In 1995, 266,859 persons across the U.S. were injured because they were not buckled up.

Property Tax information

"Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies & Responsibilities" is available at the Coke County Appraisal District office in the Courthouse, second floor, west, at Robert Lee. Published by the State Comptroller's office in Austin, the pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas works and tells property owners about possible tax savings. Chief Appraiser, Patsy Dunn, noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, school districts and special districts (such as water and hospital districts).

"Remedies" describes how homeowners can file for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads. It tells about other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans, other disabled persons and senior citizens. The pamphlet also contains information about appeals to the appraisal review board (ARB). The ARB is a citizen board that hears taxpayer protests to ensure that property values are fair and

Productivity appraisal is another type of tax relief available to agricultural land owners. Farmers and ranchers may be eligible for a special, lower valuation based on what the land will produce rather than what it would sell for in the open market. Applications must be filed at the appraisal district office.

Appraisal district staff can offer more information and help with applications for special land appraisal, tax renditions, over-65 tax deferrals, and exemptions. The office is open from 8 am to 5 pm, Monday through Friday.





Child car seat program helps ensure safety

Despite her own injuries, the frightened mother brought her car to a halt in a shower of broken glass and crunched metal, then turned to her child in the back seat. The wide-eyed toddler stared back, without even a scratch. Fortunately, just days earlier, staff from the Safe Riders Program had reinstalled his safety seat securely and correctly in the family auto.

"People hear about our check-up clinics and drive up to have us check their car safety seats," said Susan Warren, director of Safe Riders, a statewide traffic safety program at the Texas Department of Health (TDH). "Manufacturer instructions often are so difficult to understand that most people don't install child safety seats properly. It can take our trained staff up to a half hour to wrestle them into place."

When correctly secured in the back seat, safety seats reduce the risk of death from traffic crashes by 71 percent for infants and by 54 percent for toddlers. "We know this program can protect children from serious injury or death," Warren said. "Many people tell us about children surviving car

Host families needed for HS exchange students

Catch the spirit of international friendships by hosting a high school exchange student from Spain, Mexico, France, Germany, Great Britain, Thailand, Japan or one of the former Soviet Union countries through World Heritage International Student Exchange Program. At the same time the student will be teaching their newly adopted host family about their own culture and language.

Families may select the youngster of their choice from student applications, photo collages, and biographical essays. Once paired, students and families are encouraged to begin corresponding prior to the student's arrival.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children, taking more than 2,658 lives of children under age 15 nationally and seriously injuring another 300,000 children each year. In 1997 in Texas, 250 children under age 15 died in crashes. Warren said that research shows 87 percent of child safety seats in Texas are not installed correctly, placing children at risk in auto accidents.

"With some 300 different car models and at least 75 different styles of car safety seats, it's no wonder that so many are not installed as they should be," she said. From four to six Safe Riders car seat clinics are held each month around the state.

Here are some suggestions from Safe Riders for checking your child's safety set:

•Make sure the auto's safety belt holds the car seat securely. If you can rock the child's seat forward or from side to side more than 1 inch, the seat is not installed correctly.

•Most seats need a harness clip, which should rest on the child's chest, even with his or her underarms. Make sure harness straps are not torn or frayed.


•The straps should fit snugly, allowing no more than one finger between the straps and the child's body.

•Read your car owner's manual for special installation instructions.

•If you don't have your car seat instructions or have questions, call the TDH Safe Riders Program toll free at 1-800-252-8255 for a copy. You also may call the car seat maker for advice.

Besides ensuring proper installation at check-up clinics, Safe Riders staff members also collect hazardous seats that have been in a car crash, are more than five to seven years old or have been recalled by manufacturers. "Drivers get a new seat right there," Warren said. "We replace about 25 seats at each clinic."

These car seats are funded by the National SAFE KIDS Campaign, a non-profit injury prevention organization. Safe Riders Program funds come from a federal grant provided by the Texas Department of transportation. Throughout the year, trainers and a mas-

cot, "Buckle Bear," visit elementary schools across Texas to teach children about using seat belts properly. A recent federal rule established a standard anchoring system for new cars and light trucks by the end of this year. "That's great," Warren said, "but it takes at least 20 years to get a car model off the road, so we'll be checking car seats for a long time."

The Safe Riders Program also emphasizes bicycle helmet and older adult traffic safety. Last year, the bicycle helmet program distributed about 10,000 helmets to Texas children through community groups, churches, hospitals and child care centers. The older adult traffic safety program holds regional Ride Safe/Walk Safe and Safe Communities workshops that focus on aging and driving as well as bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Travelers southbound on 277 told our watchers that they encountered hail 1 3/4 inch in diameter.



Watering lawns and gardens during drought conditions

For our area, water is probably the most limiting nutrient that is required for green lawns and gardens. With the drought conditions we have been experiencing lately this is becoming more true than usual. To get your garden and lawn off to a good start this spring, there are several tips on efficient watering that need to be considered.

When watering your lawns, especially if you are using Robert Lee water, it is important to give it a deep soaking watering rather than short frequent watering with sprinklers. The reason for this is to leach the salt content into the soil formation and not have it collecting over time in the top

Twice a widow or widower? Higher SS benefits could be in your future

While visiting a local senior adult center, a 70-year-old woman told me she had been widowed twice - once at age 48 and 18 years later at age 66. When her second husband died, Social Security automatically converted her spouse's benefits to widow's benefits based on his record. I asked her permission to check her file to determine whether she could be receiving a higher benefit on her first husband's record.

Sure enough, because her first husband had a higher earnings record, we advised her to file a new claim. As a result, her benefits were immediately increased.

When a spouse dies, Social Security's practice is to automatically convert the spouse's benefit to a widow or (widower) benefit based on the deceased spouse's record. The conversion letter suggests the person should contact Social Security if she or he had been a widow or widower from a previous marriage. In some cases, the surviving spouse may be eligible for a higher benefit based on the previous spouse's record. Unfortunately, some people who may be eligible for the higher benefit do not contact

Some divorced women and men also may be eligible for benefits based on a deceased ex-spouse's record if the marriage had lasted at least 10 years. In some cases, these divorced individuals may not know they could be eligible for higher benefits. And, we may not be aware of their eligibility unless they contact us.

of the soil profile whereby the salt accumulation could damage the grass or garden. The soil should be wet from 4-6 inches deep for effective moisture retention. Water only when the top 1-2 inches of soil becomes dry as over watering can be just as detrimental to lawns as not having enough water. This is due to water logging which can cause suffocation of the grass due to lack of oxygen in the soil.

To water your garden for a good start up, again give the soil a deep soaking by running water down the furrows instead of light frequent sprinklings which can leave the salt residue on the plants.

Fertilizer for your lawn can also be very important especially during dry conditions. The proper rate of fertilizer to apply can only be determined precisely after a soil test has been run on your lawn. Applying more fertilizer than needed will cause a need for additional water and will cause excessive mowing. There is a new lawn fertility test that is inexpensive and can be obtained in the County Extension office at the courthouse. Fertilizing lawns should be done for our area in late April or early May. Hopefully we will have had some rainfall by this recommended to split the fertilizer applications in two separate times. About half of the fertilizer should be applied and watered in sufficiently and wait two weeks to a month and apply the rest. A general rule of thumb for fertilizer is to apply 3-4 pounds of actual nitrogen for 1,000 square feet of lawn area.





The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will host a workshop May 10 at 1 pm in the Training Room of the Vehicle Titles and Registration Building to discuss funding requests for eligible projects that qualify for the TEA 21 federal funding.

Approximately \$128 million will be awarded in November to projects throughout the 25 TxDOT districts.

Categories for the Transportation Enhancement Program include pedestrian and bicycle facilities, safety and education activities for pedestrians and bicyclists, acquisition of scenic easements and scenic or historic properties, scenic or historic highway programs such as visitor centers, landscaping and beautification projects, control and removal of outdoor advertising, archaeological planning and research, environmental mitigation, and construction of transportation museums.

Nomination applications are due in the district office by Aug. 9 at 5 pm. Sponsors that apply for funding must be endorsed and submitted by a governmental entity, depending on the location of the

FSA expands preferred lender program by Congressman

Charles W. Stenholm The Farm Service Agency ·(FSA) has relaxed the standard for lender participation in the Preferred Lender Program (PLP), according to Congressman Charlie Stenholm. The PLP streamlines the process under which agriculture loans are reviewed

and approved.
The PLP was implemented on February 12 and required a lender to have made 30 agriculture loans in three years to be eligible to participate in the program. Under this rule, only 238 lenders nationwide would have been eligible.

Following the change, lending institutions must have made 20 agriculture loans within five years to be eligible for PLP participation. This will make 747 lenders eligible for PLP status nationwide.

Stenholm has been critical of the strict eligibility requirements and encouraged FSA to relax the lender require-

"The PLP is designed to allow lenders to make loans to eligible borrowers without unnecessary and burdensome government regulations," said Stenholm. "The goal is to streamline the paperwork requirements for as many producers and lenders as possi-




