Don't Throw Brush Control Dollars Out the Window

Whoa! Not so fast. Sure, it's starting to rain and temperatures are bumping 90, but it's still too early to leaf spray mesquite and control prickly pear according to a seasoned researcher. "It's not time to effectively spray either of these pests," said Dr. Darrell Ueckert, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station range researcher.

Ueckert and Dr. Allan McGinty, local Extension range specialist, are the fathers of the popular Brush Busters techniques that tout individual plant control using the most effective, safest and most economical methods available. In Texas alone, Brush Busters was the method of choice for mesquite control on over 600,000 acres of rangeland and pastures in 1998 alone.

"I've been getting a lot of calls from ranchers just itching to start their brush control projects now," said Ueckert. "It's obvious that some have forgotten the all important 'window of opportunity' that can make or break a brush control project. For leaf spraying mesquite, whether by hand or plane, that window starts once all the mesquite leaves turn a dark green, and the soil temperature is at least 75 degrees at a foot to 18 inches deep - any time before that and you're wasting money - if you're interested in

killing mesquite."


Ueckert said now is also the worst time to control prickly-pear with herbicides, because the plants are moving carbohydrates upward to produce new pads and flowers. Herbicides applied too early won't be carried down to the crowns and roots, a necessary step for good cactus control.

"The best time to aerially spray pricklypear is in the late summer through fall after the new pads are mature and the fruits turn dark red," said Ueckert. Hand spraying pricklypear with Brush Busters methods can be done year round, but it's most effective with late summer-early fall treatments.

"It is a great time to treat cedar (juniper) using the Brush busters cedar leaf spray or cedar soil spot spray methods," said Ueckert. "These treatments can be used yearround, but they are most effective if some rainfall is received within two or three weeks after treatment. May and June are normally our two best rainfall months in this area.

"So, landowners, if you're after mesquite or pricklypear, better wait until the time is right or you may well be throwing food money out the window, and I'm sure it won't be the window of opportunity, either."

Skywarn news

Watchers had a very busy week, with storms in our area almost every evening.

Wednesday the spotters were called out at 10:30 pm to watch a line of severe storms headed for Robert Lee, Bronte and Blackwell. At 11:40 pm Robert Lee had cloud to ground lightning, heavy rain and wind of 45 to 50 mph, with gusts to 60 mph. This storm gave us 4 1/2 tenths of an inch of rain, by my rain gauge.

Thursday they were called out at 5:45 pm. Nickel size hail was reported on the north side of Robert Lee. The Wildcat area reported winds of 30 mph. Dime size hail in town and golf ball size hail at the north end of the dam. By 6:30 the culverts were full. We were under a flash flood warning. This storm left us with 4 tenths of an inch of rain.

Friday the weather service had them watching a storm 3 miles east of Robert Lee and 9 miles west of Bronte, coming parallel with highway There was a lot of thunder and cloud to ground lightning. By my gauge, this storm gave us 8 tenths of an inch of rain. After midnight they were called out again as another line of storms was headed our way from Sterling County. We had thunder and lightning but the storm dissipated before it got here.

Sunday afternoon the skies were black in our area and the storms, again, dissipated before they got to us.

On Monday at 5:43 pm they were called out again with a tornado warning for all of the Concho Valley. Sterling City was hit with severe storms with large hail and several tornadoes were seen. Our

spotters were at various points, and the Tom Green spotters followed this storm to Silver. Robert Lee was spared this storm as it moved northeast into Nolan County.

Monday Bud Thompson, Keith Eubanks, and Darrell Sowell toured the weather station in San Angelo.

We have a great library. Come visit and check out a book.



He was reappointed as a missionary by the board. From 1992 to 1997 he was an International Mission Board missionary in Panama. From 1997 to 1998 he served at the Baptist Spanish Publishing House in El Paso, Texas, through the International Mission Board's International Service Corps (ISC)--a four to

24-month assignment to meet priority needs.

The new missionaries will fill diverse job assignments from starting churches to using student work, community development, education and business as tools of ministry.

In 1998 International Mission Board missionaries helped lead 333,034 people to Christ. They and their overseas partners started 4,223 churches and reported more than 4.4 million members in 46,833 churches overseas.

As missionary associates the Morrises will live in Miami, Florida, where they will work with the Baptist Spanish Publishing House in El Paso, Texas. The Baptist Spanish Publishing House provides books, Bibles, tracts and Christian literature in Spanish to 70 countries. They will work in literature distribution and promotion and be responsible for the book "Casa deposit, Bautista/Miami," covering Florida, the Caribbean and the east coast of the United States.

Since 1998 they have been serving in Florida through the International Mission Board's International Service Corps, working with the Baptist Spanish Publishing House. They are members of Cornerstone Baptist Church in Coral Springs, Florida.

Born in Waco, Texas, Keith Morris is the son of Harry and Dannie Morris of Mount Vernon, Washington. His parents were North American Mission Board missionaries in Washington, where his father was the director of missions

for the northwest area. He is now retired.

Keith was once the pastor of the First Baptist Church in Bronte. He considers Bronte, Texas, his hometown and First Baptist Church there his home church. South Main Baptist Church in Houston also was influential in his Christian growth.

He received his bachelor of arts degree from Baylor University in Waco and the master of arts in communications degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

Before his appointment he was an ISC worker in Mexico and Panama.

Born in Colon, Panama, Mixy Morris is the daughter of Gumercindo and Luisa Moreno of La Chorrera, Panama. While growing up she also lived in La Chorrera and considers it her hometown. She considers First Baptist Church of La Chorrera her home church. Christ the Only Hope Baptist Church in La Chorrera also was influential in her Christian growth.

She received the bachelor of science degree from

Escuela Secundaria P.P.S., in La Chorrera and the diploma in hotel management and tourism from the Merchant Marine Occupational School in La Chorrera.

She was an ISC worker with her husband at the Baptist Spanish Publishing House and a secretary for the National Prayer Commission with the Panama Baptist Convention.

The Morrises will go to the International Mission Board's training center in Rockville, Virginia, in July for orientation before returning to Miami.

With nearly 16 million members, the Southern Baptist Convention is the largest evangelical denomination in the United States, and the International Mission Board is the largest evangelical missionary-sending agency.
